



Visitors Express Gratitude To Community

Some visits are so special that they leave a bright afterglow. That's the way the weekend of September 27-29 was for Rosalie Leslie Loreto of Eastland, when four nephews from the New York City area visited in her home.

These Loreto nephews are part of the family of the late Justice Charles band. Judge Loreto's career inlcuded twelve years on the Municipal Court and 15 years on the New Court. He died in Eastland on July 1, 1990.

The son of Italian immigrants, Charles Loreto grew up in a large, loving and closely-knit family. All his nieces and nephews meant a lot to him, but these four-sons of of his brother, James - had a special place. For he had lived in their home for several years before his marriage to Rosalie Leslie, Texas native and Assistant Dean of Women at the University of Maryland.

The visitors welcomed by Rosalie Loreta Friday included Dr. James Loreto, an optomologist from Bethesda, Maryland, near Washington, D.C. Dr. Loreto's specialty is eye surgery. Also in Eastland was Thomas Loreto of Harrison, New York. Thomas Loreto works in the New York Metropolitan area as Group Supervisor, U.S. Customs Dept. One of his responsibilities is John F.

Kennedy Airport. Also in the group was Alfred Loreto, of North Port, Long Island, N.Y. Alfred Loreto is a Technology Instructor in the Public School System on Long Island. Another visitor, Richard Loreto of Orangeburg, N.Y., works in the N.Y. Metro area. He is Project Manager/ Asst. Superintendent for New York City Electrical Contractor. His area of supervision includes JFK Airport, La Guardia Air-

ther Tetzar in New York City, where in July 1990 he officiated at a Memorial Service for Judge Loreto.

The next stop was at the home of family friends Tom and Dee Neville. The Nevilles and Charles and Rosalie Loreto became friends when Mrs. Neville worked as a secretary for the Judge in the mid 1990's.

At that time he was retired and spending much of the time in Eastland working on his memoirs. These were complied into the well-known book 'In the Name of Justice', published in 1985.

A stop at Eastland Memorial Hospital gave the nephews an opportunity to tell doctors, staff and personnel how much they appreciated the good care given to their Uncle. The were very pleased with the facility.

Late Friday afternoon the Loretos went to the home of Judge and Mrs. Austin McCloud.

The McClouds had a group for dinner. 'And what a dinner!' says

Rosalie Loreto. There was good food, good company, and many interesting topics to discuss. The visitors also enjoyed a video presentation of the 'Polo on the Prairie' fund raiser for M.D. Anderson Cancer Center.

Saturday morning dawned bright and beautiful - a great day for touring the area. First stop Hotel in Cisco, which the visitors found interesting. Although the building was not open, they enjoyed reading the Historic Marker and looking

toward Albany, the Loretos were intrigued by Moran. Why did this small town have five exits off the highway, they asked? They stopped to take pictures of the 'Yacht Club' and other local

The rolling hills and wide vistas toward Albany drew their eyes. They found the town full of atmosphere. There was an interesting stop at the Old Jail Museum, where docents were most attentive.

But the modern world soon intruded - two Patriot Missile launchers were being hauled down the streets of Albany.

At noon the visiting nephews said they 'didn't want the same kind of food we can get in New York City - we want some real barbecued beef!'

They were directed to a barbecue place (Cook's) where mesquite wood was used in a grill. The food was great, Rosalie Loreto reports.

At the barbecue place the easterners saw two 'real' cowboys sitting and eating with their hats on. They began to want western hats like those fellows were wearing, but were told there was no Western Wear' store in Albany. So they made a quick

run to Breckenridge, where six cowboy hats were purchased - four for the adults, and two for children back home.

When the group reached the Eastland area they drove on to the Bob Perkins home at Lake Leon.

They said Lake Leon was very scenic - they 'loved' the area.

'I'd like to pitch a tent here at Bob Perkins,' one of the visitors remarked. After a good visit there, the group came into town for a Saturday night dinner at the First Methodist Church. Speakers on mission work were being fea-

tured during the program. 'Can we wear our big hats to the Church?', a nephew inquired.

Loreto replied. 'But I hope you don't leave them on your heads while you eatlike those cowboys did in Albany!'

So the hats were carefully hung up in the Church, with assurances that no one present at the program was apt to take them!

The event at the Church gave another opportunity for the Loretos to say 'thank you for your prayers and kindness.'

The visit began to wind down - only another night at the Loreto home in Eastland, then back to the DFW Airport and big city living. But as the men discussed impressions of their stay, various observations surfaced.

They were astonished at the low prices of houses in Eastland County. One nephew said he was spending more on taxes for his home in a New York to buy a home here!

The visitors were impressed with the number of Churches in the towns, and gratified to find 'no saloons' in Eastland and Cisco. 'That's good!' they commented.

Weeks To Be Featured At Stephenville Opry






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Eastland County 4-H Awards Banquet Held

As a family physician in Eastland, Texas, I would like to inform the readers of some of the most recent difficulties I have had with Medicaid of Texas. As you know, Medicaid is a federally funded, state administered program to assist in providing health care to those who are unable to pay for it. My recent dispute with Medicaid involves four hospital admissions during the past year which they have refused to pay for, even though I felt they were medically necessary. The bureaucrats in Austin who work for Medicaid periodically review the hospital charts of Medicaid patients and decide

whether or not they deem them to be medically necessary admissions or not. Those which they believe were not medically necessary they do not pay for, but then do not allow the patient to be billed for the cost either. Therefore, the hospital does not receive any reimbursement for the services they provide for these patients. I have recently sent four hospital charts to my Con-

gressmen in Washington D. C. The most outstanding of these four cases is that of an 18 month old child who was admitted to the hospital with a temperature of 105 degrees having had a seizure just prior to arrival to the hospital. This patient was placed in the hospital, started on antibiotics and on seizure medication, and then was able to leave the hospital within a

couple of days.

I don't think you wil find many doctors in this country who would have the courage to send that child home until his temperature and seizures were brought under control. We physicians who continue to take Medicaid patients are attempting to provide the best possible health care available and yet are being opposed in this fashion by Medicaid itself. Incidents like this will only discourage physicians from taking Medicaid patients, which will further endanger their access to health care. The public needs to be continually updated on the governmental practices in regards to health care so they can register their complaints with their congressmen and senators. In many cases the laws that are made by Congress are implemented in whatever fash-

and state agencies desire and in many cases this has gone completely out of control. The autocratic methods of Medicaid must be put to a stop.

said Gary Harris, M.D., chairman of the American Lung Association of Texas. "This is especially true during an epidemic year when the disease is widespread throughout the community."

At greatest risk from severe effects of the flu are the following groups: adults and children with chronic disorders of the heart and lungs, including children with asthma; residents of nursing homes or other chroniccare facilities; and otherwise healthy people who are 65 or older. Physicians, nurses, and other personnel who have contact with high risk patients, and providers of home care to high risk persons such as visiting nurses, as well as all to be vaccinated because they can transmit influ-

enza to high risk persons. Other groups who should consider immunization are: the general population - anyone who wishes to reduce the chance of acquiring influenza infection; persons infected with HIV, and foreign travelers.

To be protected, the American Lung Association of Texas and the Texas Department of Health recommended that high risk individuals get their flu shot now. "Influenza kills each year, despite the fact that it is a preventable disease," said Harris.

"With the availability of effective vaccines, the number of deaths caused by the flu can be substantially decreased." Vaccinations may be obtained by calling your physician or local health department.
