## Man Sentenced To 25 Years In Murder Plea Bargain

A return trip through the court system brought a much lighter sentence to John David Robinette of Cisco.

Wednesday in 91st District Court Robinette, age 35, pled guilty to murder. He admitted shooting Richard Louaine (Country) Williamson, 36, of Ranger on April 15, 1990, at a house southeast of Cisco.

In a plea bargain arrangement Robinette was sentenced by Judge Jim Wright to 25 years in prison. He will have to serve at least one-third of this time before being considered for parole.

Last year, in a jury trial for the same murder, Robinette was found guilty and sentenced to 75 years in prison. Robinette pled "not guilty"

in this trial. Recently Robinette's conviction was overturned by the 11th Court of Appeals in Eastland. The Court ruled that inadmissible inflammatory remarks were repeated after being struck them from testimony.

Earlier Lisa Marie Rose of Cisco entered a guilty plea to the same murder and received a five-year sentence.

District Attorney Emory Walton was the prosecuting Attorney in the jury trial of Robinette. Steve Herod of Ranger was the Court-appointed defense lawyer. He also represented Robinette in the current plea bargain arrangement, agreed to by District Attorney Leslie Vance.

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## WORK ON 911 COMPLETE AT DISPATCH, COUNTY COMMISSIONERS TOLD

Eastland County Commissioners Tuesday heard that 911 Emergency Services work had been completed at the County Dispatch.

"As far as we know, we've done all we can do," said Pct. 1 Commissioner Richard Robinson. He explained that a lot of electrical and mechanical work had been completed, including a conduit laid for a new cable.

Judge Bailey said the West Central Texas Council of Governments recently sent street names and sequence numbers on Carbon. The County has been mapped in order to tie each residence into the 911 system.

Reports were that Carbon had named streets, put up new signs, and compiled well with the request for house numbers.

Judge Bailey mentioned that the Commissioners needed to make a form to give people who have been missed in the addressing, so they could get into the system.

"If you have no phone you're not in the system," one Commissioner remarked.

Judge Bailey said he did not know when the 911

number would become operational. He had a phone bill with him which listed the date as Jan. 31, 1992.

This bill was termed "confusing" in another way. Sent to a citizens in the County, the bill had an ext. a charge for 911 sitting to one side. Although this charge apparently did not apply in Eastland County, some people might think it was theirs and go ahead and pay the amount Judge Bailey remarked.

On another matter, the Commissioners agreed to authorize the county to pay Comm. 4 Reggie Pittman's operating expenses until some precinct tax money came in. The precinct was out of money, the court was told - with about a 10-day lapse expected before funds came in.

Pittman gave a report on the County jail, saying that 24 inmates were currently being held. Three of these were for TDC, 15 were waiting trial, 2 were city prisoners, 1 on a bench warrant, and 3 on blue warrants.

On the inmates waiting for a trial, Pittman said that 13 had been held as long as 30 days, 1 over 30

days, and 1 over 90 days.

On the courthouse report, Pct. 2 Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth said that the Fescue grass on the grounds was looking good.

He said that inside the building the boiler was "ready to go," but that a roof was leaking again above part of County Tax Collector Nancy Trout's office. It was repaired the last part of Jan., 1991.

There was a discussion on pay for Election Judges. The Commissioners voted to raise the compensation of Election Judges and Clerks to \$5 per hour. The budget will be amended to reflect the raise.

County Clerk JoAnn Johnson told the Commissioners that they need to be thinking about moving the elections held in the Carbon School Building to a different place.

She said one reason is that it is necessary to contact school officials in Eastland and get a key before using the building.

But she listed another reason that sounded more urgent - that vandals are breaking into the building, and "taking it over."

County Agent David Tunmire stopped by the

Commissioners Court to invite Court members and other officials to attend the Annual Extension Program Council Meeting that evening at Calvary Baptist Church in Cisco. The Commissioners indicated they would attend. They also thanked Tunmire for his work on the Courthouse lawn.

Later Judge Bailey told the Commissioners he had been informed that the County Agent's position now vacant in the Extension Office here would not be filled. Three Counties in State District 14 are losing an Agent - Eastland, Hill and McClennan. Eastland County has had no agent in this position since Scott Hodges resigned Jan. 1, 1991.

So Eastland County Agents Tunmire and Janet Thomas will not have an additional agent to help with Livestock and 4-H work. There are nine 4-H Clubs in the County and a number of young people who are involved in the work.

The Commissioners agreed that the County Agents would need all the help they could get to keep this fine work going.

## COURTHOUSE LAWN A BEAUTY SPOT NOW



The Courthouse Square is a bright spot now, thanks to the work of Pct. 2 Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth, County Agent David Tunmire, and others who helped on the beautification project.

A lush stand of Fescue grass makes a soft green carpet between pecan and walnut trees. The yellow barricade markers are due to come down in about another week, says Ainsworth. The newly planted Fescue needs about two weeks to get established before it can be walked on without damage, he adds.

Ainsworth began planning the lawn beautification right after he assumed supervision of the grounds and Courthouse last January. He consulted with David Tunmire and they realized that a sprinkler system was needed for any per-

manent lawn improvement.

Obviously a lot of hard work had to be done on leveling the grounds, and new soil was needed before planting anything.

The County Commissioners agreed to purchase an underground sprinkler system, and this was installed during the summer. There was also extensive work on lawn leveling and rebuilding, with labor provided by jail inmates. Ainsworth, along with courthouse employees David Cross and Donald Leach helped with various jobs on the premises. Three loads of dirt were hauled in, and tree trimming and spraying was completed.

By early September the ground was in shape to plant, but Ainsworth and Tunmire decided to wait until after Old Rip Day

Sept. 21. There was a lot of traffic on the grounds that day, so more smoothing was needed before County Agent Tunmire began his planting Sept. 23.

Tunmire used a seed spreader to sow the Fescue, and the job was not easy. But his labor did not cost the county anything, nor did any of the other work done by individuals on the courthouse grounds.

"I'm really pleased with the way people have helped on this improvement project," says Ainsworth. "This Fescue grass is supposed to be green winter as well as summer - that's why Tunmire recommended it."

The commissioner looks across the lawn and chuckled. "The way that grass is looking now, I may have to let out some contracts to cut it!"

## MAN INJURED AFTER STABBING

One man is in jail after the stabbing of Cisco resident Donald Wayne Boyd, 54.

Known hitch-hiker Herman Ray Hall, 45, was arrested Thursday while walking on road 2461 South of Ranger not far from where the incident took place.

Hall, originally from North Carolina, was on his way from Arizona to Dallas according to Deputy Sheriff Terry Simmons, when he was apparently picked up by Boyd in Ranger.

Boyd then drove his car South from Ranger on the county road where the stabbing occurred. Law enforcement officers are still not sure why Boyd was attacked.

After Boyd was stabbed in the neck he started running down the road and luckily stumbled upon oilfield workers near by who brought him into town for medical treatment.

Boyd was treated at Eastland Memorial Hospital and then transferred to an Abilene hospital where he was listed in fair condition. A major artery in Boyd's neck was severed.

Sheriff's deputies found the car, unmovable, shortly after arriving at the scene, but it was first believed to have been stolen, Simmons said.

Herman Hall has been charged with attempted murder and is under \$50,000 bond.

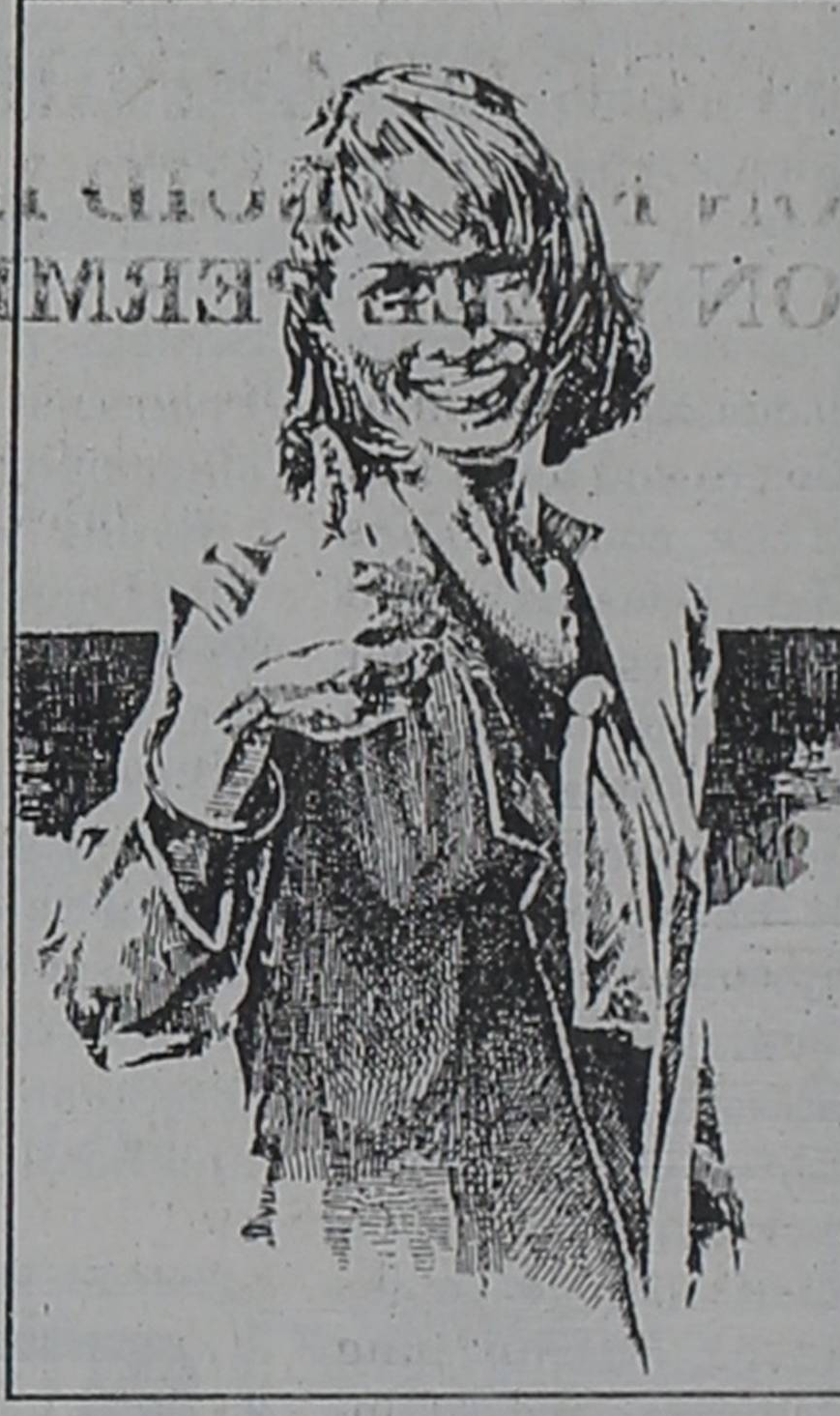

The annual meeting of the Eastland County Extension Program Council was called to order on October 15, 1991 by Dr. Ronald Pope, Chairman.

The meeting was held at the Calvary Baptist Church Fellowship Hall in Cisco and included a sponsored Fish Fry. The sponsors were Birdsong Peanut Company, Eastland National Bank, First National Bank-Cisco, Peoples State Bank-Rising Star, Production Credit Association and Freedom Bank-Ranger.

The audience of 50 heard a special presentation from guest speaker State Representative, Bob Turner. Four issues which

Turner identified as being important in Texas' future were environment, health and health care, economic development in rural areas and education.

A summary of 1991 programs conducted by Extension Program Council Program Area Committees was presented by committee members. The critical issues in the 1991-94 Long Range Extension Program for Eastland County that were addressed in 1991 were Financial Planning and Money Management, Agricultural Profitability, Economic Development, Revitalization of Rural Communities, Agricultural Diversification, Chemical and Waste

Management, Strengthening Families and Leadership Development.

Result demonstration cooperators were recognized for their work in 1991. ### DELIVERY DATE SET FOR HAY SHOW

Saturday, November 2, 1991 has been set as the delivery date for hay being donated for the Eastland County Hay Show. Hay can begin arriving at 9:00 a.m. at the Eastland County Show Grounds.

You can enter the show by contacting the County Extension Office, local V.O. Ag. Teacher or bring the hay to the show grounds on November 2. It is important that hay is in place by November 2, so samples can be taken for analysis.

The Eastland County Hay Show is an important educational event for producers and helps support the county show grounds. Donated bales of hay will have protein run on them and then judged. Dr. George Alston, Extension Agronomist, will judge the hay and present a program on hay production and quality.

The bales of hay will be auctioned off following the show. Funds raised by the auction will go to the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association to retire debt and improve facilities of the county show grounds.

The show and auction will be December 7. Plaques and ribbons will be awarded.

### NORTH CENTRAL CATTLE RAISERS CLINIC

The North Central Cattle Raisers Clinic will begin at 8:30 a.m. with registration and viewing of Agri-Business Exhibits on Thursday, October 24, 1991. This was formerly the Tri County Cow-Calf Clinic. The clinic is being held at the Stephens County Agriculture Center located 3 miles east of Downtown Breckenridge on Highway 180.

Producers attending the clinic will receive 2 continuing education credits

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toward the renewal of their private applicator pesticide license. The clinic also includes a sponsored lunch so producers planning to attend the clinic are asked to pre-register by calling the Eastland County Extension Office at 629-1093 by October 21, 1991.

The program topics will include, cool season forages, soil nutrients, warm season forages, native and introduced warm season perennial grasses, herd health, pelvic measurements, EPD's and implants.

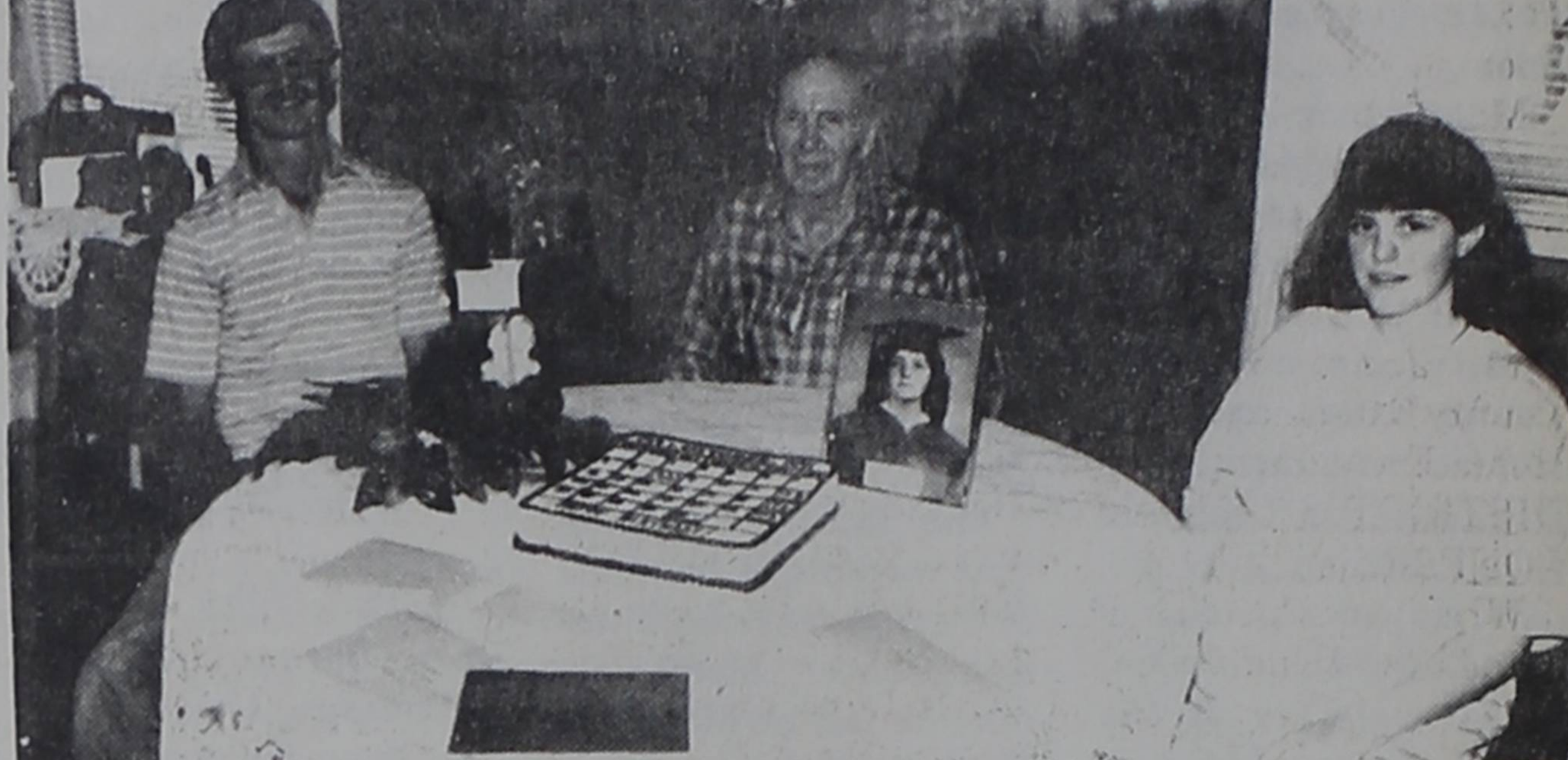

**Pharmacy Topics**

By Bob Mueller

Someday scientists may be able to spot signs of cancer in ordinary urine tests. So far, researchers at Johns Hopkins University, using molecular diagnostics, have been able to spot mutated genes linked with bladder cancer in cells naturally shed in urine.

Patients with life-threatening asthma can be helped with large doses of triamcinolone, say researchers at Albert Einstein College of Medicine-Montefiore Medical Center, Bronx, New York. The drug is given over three days and the effect lasts six to nine months.

New CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) technique is getting good results, say doctors at Seton Hall University School of Graduate Medicine. Pressure is applied to the upper abdomen (in addition to standard CRP) to move arterial blood back toward the heart.

Powerful drug against migraine and cluster headaches - dihydroergotamine - once only available by injection, is now being formulated as a nasal spray. Clinical trials will conclude soon.

**Halloween Safety Tips For Ghouls And Goblins**

Halloween is almost here, and everyone is preparing for the big night. Although having fun and filling up those trick-or-treat bags are foremost in their minds, children need to remember to follow safe practices. According to the Department of Emergency Medicine at Scott & White in Temple, parents should keep in mind the following safety tips:

\* Make costumes short enough so the child won't trip when going up and down stairs.

\* Use white colors or big patches of white on the costumes to ensure good visibility.

\* Use fire-retardant fabric for the costumes or treat the material with a chemical fire-retardant.

\* When making masks or hoods, cut out holes in them that are large enough to assure easy breathing and good vision. Using makeup or face paints instead of masks is an even better idea.

\* If face paints are used, make sure that they are designed specifically for this purpose, they are non-poisonous and that the

paint can be washed off easily.

\* When lighting Jack O'lanterns, use small flashlights - not candles - in order to prevent fires.

\* Have an adult accompany the children while they are trick or treating.

\* Trick or treating should be done before dark, especially if you have young children. Set a curfew for the older children and enforce it.

\* Instruct the children to stay in their own neighborhood and to call on only people they know and trust.

\* Give each child a flashlight and remind him or her not to shine it into anyone's eyes, especially someone driving an automobile.

\* To prevent falls, remind children to use sidewalks instead of cutting across yards and vacant lots.

\* If your child gets sick, try to find out exactly what he or she ate and where it came from. Call your doctor immediately or contact the Scott & White Poison Control Center at (817) 774-2005.

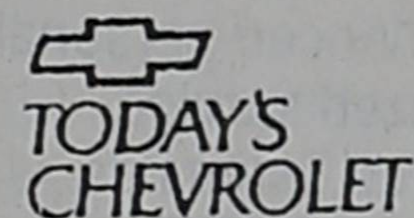
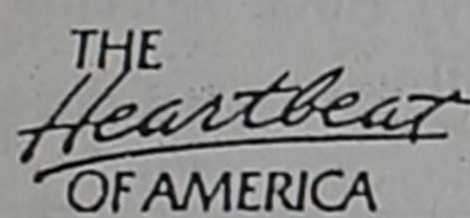

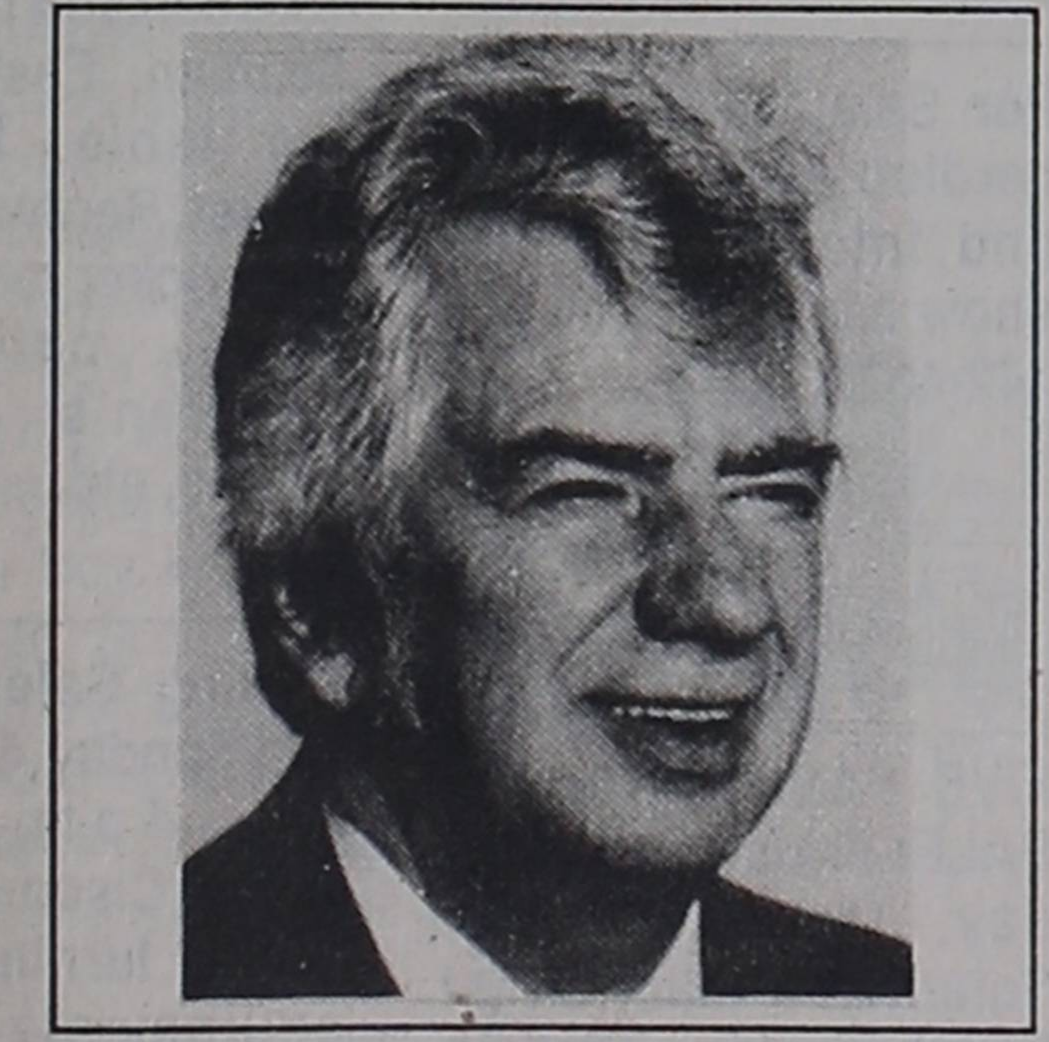

**Notices Being Mailed To Disabled Children**

The Social Security Administration (SSA) is sending notices to more than 450,000 children who are entitled to reviews of their Supplemental Security Income (SSI) claims. About 600 are being sent to children in the Big Country area.

The notices are being sent as a result of the Sullivan v. Zebly court agreement. The agreement requires Social Security to notify children who, from January 1980 through February 1990, were found not disabled or no longer disabled, and therefore ineligible for SSI.

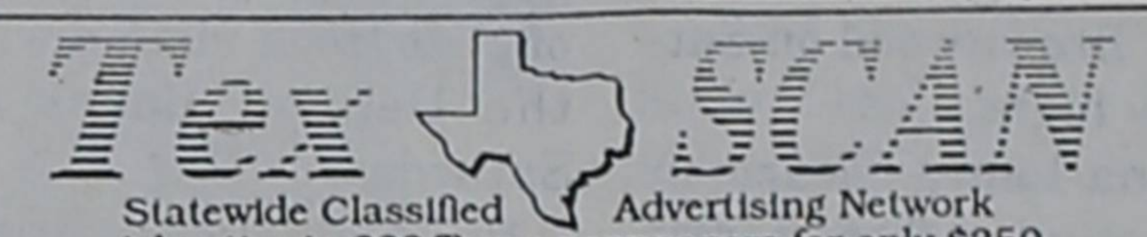
The notice informs children of their right to a review and asks them to return an enclosed reply form within 120 days if they want a review. Once SSA receives the reply form, it will contact the child to set up an interview. The child (or someone for the child) should bring to this interview pertinent medical records or the names and addresses of his or her doctors.

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### Fishing Outdoors

#### Leon In The Pan-handle

Lake Leon is in the top slot to be chosen by a group of Amarillo Bass Clubbers as the site for their 2 day end of the year classic. The final vote will take place Thursday night. If selected 20 anglers will make the drive in to compete for a purse of \$1,500.00. This may not seem like a big deal, but for our little lake to ripple that far out is great.

It was stated during our initial contact that the T. U. Program Honey Hole showed Leon to have the potential for all 20 anglers to catch at least one fish. These anglers will be fishing for 5 fish each day with the 2 day total winning this Mini Classic. Hopefully next week, if Leon is selected, we will see a few photos and have the breakdown for you.

And the fishing at Lake Leon has been heating up. Some good limits are coming on jigs and spinner baits. The top water bites have been Lara Spook's for size and shadow's from Tom Mann for sheer numbers. But there has been only about a good 30 minutes for the top waters. Leon's crappie have backed off again as the water temperatures have slowed in their decline.

Proctors bass are fair with jigs and crankbaits producing on the water willows. The crappie action has been good with lots of limits in the deep brushpiles.

We heard a hot new method for the shadow and sluggo type lures. Itchy Twitchy style. Sounds good. I know if it works in East Texas, it

will here. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Texas Big Game Awards program will kick off this fall in an effort to recognize the importance of habitat and wildlife population management as essential to the welfare of wildlife resources and the habitats upon which they depend.

The program, which is new to Texas but is being used in 27 other states, will begin with the 1991 antelope and archery deer seasons. David Synatzske, a wildlife biologist on the Big Game Awards committee, said the program's goals are to recognize the quality of animals reflective of management efforts by land managers; the importance of hunting as a population management tool; and to encourage participation by young and new hunters.

Awards will be regionalized with categories for typical and non-typical whitetailed and mule deer, and antelope. A special "Texas 400" certificate will be awarded to the top 50 typical whitetailed deer within each of the eight established regions. All scored entries will be recognized in a ranked listing and certificates awarded to participants with equal recognition made to land managers on whose lands the animals were produced.

Entry into the program is open to wild-reared native white-tailed deer,

mule deer and pronghorn antelope that are legally harvested in Texas during the current year's hunting season. The program will recognize the quality of the animal, the hunter, the land manager upon whose property the animal was taken (optional) and hunters harvesting their first animal.

Hunters harvesting their first deer or antelope will be recognized in an alphabetical listing. Certificates will be awarded for first deer in youth and older hunter categories.

All scoring will be based upon Boone & Crockett Club guidelines utilizing net green scores. Entries must be scored by a Texas Big Game Awards certified scorer. More than 200 certified scorers will be available statewide. Entry into the ranked listing requires hunters to complete and sign an entry form and certified score sheet. Entries must meet minimum scores for the region of harvest.

Eight regions have been established for white-tailed deer, two for mule deer and three for pronghorn antelope. Minimum entry scores for white-tailed deer will vary with each region and range from 125-140 (typical) and 140-155 (non-typical). Mule deer minimum scores are 145 (typical) and 160 (non-typical). Pronghorn antelope score must be at least 70.

"Today's ever-changing land use, and wildlife population responses to these influences, have created a need for management of both habitat and wildlife populations," Synatzske said. "Proper habitat and population

management can result in an increased diversity of habitat and wildlife resources and healthier populations of wildlife within these habitats. In white-tailed deer and antelope, antler development may be used as an indicator of herd health. Recognition of the importance of proper habitat and population management is essential to the welfare of wildlife resources."

In addition, the TPWD will be able to gather valuable data on the status of regional management within the state. Annual recognition ceremonies will be held in each region, and the top three animals in each category will be recognized at a statewide ceremony.

"Land managers have the option through this program to be recognized for their management efforts," Synatzske said. "This is extremely important to the goal of promoting the wise use of wildlife and habitat resources within the state. The sponsors encourage participation in this program as a means of meeting this objective that is so critical to the welfare of habitat and wildlife resources in Texas."

The program is sponsored by TPWD, Texas Wildlife Association and Lone Star Brewing Company.

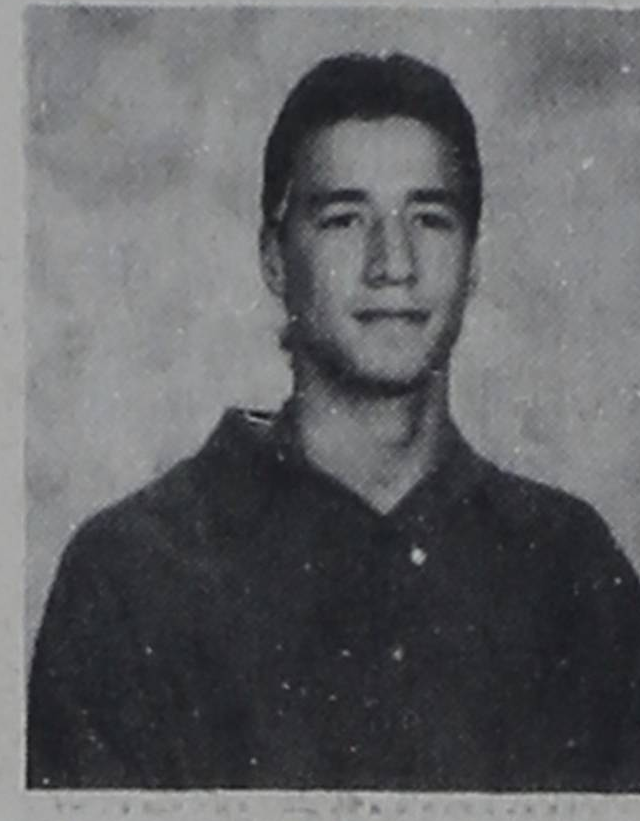

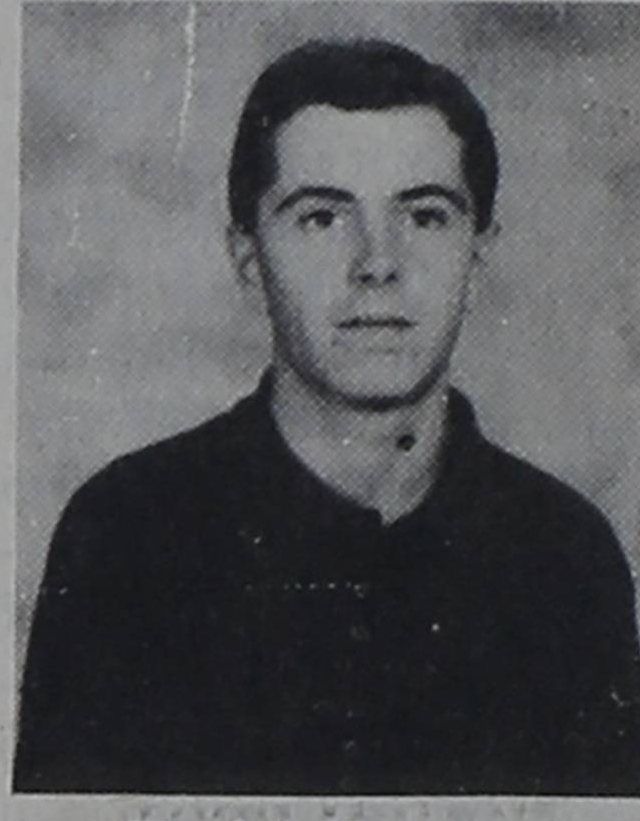
