

LEADERSHIP IN SHORT SUPPLY IN POLITICS, TURNER SAYS

Before his speech at the Annual Extension Program Council meeting in Cisco Oct. 15 State Representative Bob Turner joked that he had his notes on a styrofoam cup he was holding.

He didn't have to refer to any messages on the styrofoam, for obviously the Representative is one of those people who can give a good talk without

This quality is all too rare in Austin, judging from Turner's remarks. He appeared a little sadder and certainly more analytical than during those days in the 1980's when he was a Farm Bureau leader.

But that was before he won the Special Runoff Election last spring for State Representative, 65th District.

In Cisco Turner told the crowd of Program Council members, County officials and special guests that what was needed in Austin was "Leadership and communication abil-

"We are starved for capable leadership in the health care system, however, for he had seen how that works in Germany and Canada.

"Those who can afford it go buy private care," he said.

Turner also remarked that Insurance Companies in this country are going to have to make changes in the way they write policies.

"Large groups are having to pay for drug and alcohol abuse, maternity care - we cannot sell that as a bare-bones policy."

On another subject, Turner said the only one of the proposed amendments he was urging people to vote "Yes" on

Turner summed up his speech by saying that he felt sort of like an Old Testament Prophet - but he hoped no one would throw him down a well! Then the sheep-rancher, soldier, Farm Bureau worker and now State politician said he saw a lot of trouble ahead in this country if things didn't

The trouble was not in the political system, he explained, but in people who take advantage of it.

"There seems to be two classes of people around the trees and the mistletoe," he stated. "The trees work hard, pay taxes - and the mistletoe fastens on them. The mistletoe blooms, it is leafy and green - but it does noth-

"Have you ever seen so many mistletoe on a tree that it died? I'm not sure how many more 'Mistletoe folks' our country can stand?"

Turner went on to say that a lot of mistletoe United States today!" He declared. "I find that in Austin many of the State Legislators can not even stand up and address a crowd. I don't know how they got elected!

"There should be special training in leadership for young people."

He listed the 4-H Clubs as one of the best places for young people to develop leadership ability. "Did you know that in

the 72nd Session of the Texas Legislature we almost lost the 4-H and Extension Service work? he asked. "Funding was almost cut. You never

know what is going to happen in Austin - and it usually happens quick. That is, why we must all be involved in politics."

Turner then discussed other major issues facing Texans today. He included the environment, health and health care, economic development in rural areas, and public education. To these he added the crime rate, saying it was "Horrible."

He said it was necessary to build more prison space, but that was no answer to the underlying problem. It was like taking an aspirin for a pinched nerve, he added.

"We need to do something to head off crime," he said. "We need to do something about alcoholism, offer alternative, continuing education teach people to be selfsupporting."

On education Turner said he believed schools should go back to local control.

Regarding health care, Turner said he regretted the loss of rural hospitals. He said they had been inadequately paid through government funding. He indicated he was not fond of governmental control of the shows up in Austin, demanding things.

COMPTROLLER'S INDEX OF LEADING TEXAS ECONOMIC INDICATORS HITS ALL-TIME HIGH

"The Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators hit an all-time high in August, surpassing its previous record of September 1990," Comptroller John Sharp said.

"Rising stock prices of Texas-based companies, an increase in new business incorporations and a longer workweek for manufacturingemployees combined to push the Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators to an all-time high of 116.4 in August, a .7 percent increase from August 1990," Sharp said.

The previous record high for the Texas Index, set in September of last year, was 116.2.

The Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators was developed by the Comptroller's Office to predict future changes in the national and state economies. The Index is useful because it helps forecast significant economic upturns and downturns several months in advance. It is comprised of 10 different components, including con-

Three issues that have Members with overdrafts been heavily reported in the past few weeks are overdrafts at the House of Representatives Bank, unpaid bills at the Congressional dining rooms, and "fixed" parking tickets. I would like to discuss these issues in greater detail.

The Government Accounting Office (GAO) recently reported that 134 Members of Congress had overdrafts at the House of Representatives Bank in the first half of 1990. Unfortunately, and to my surprise, I was on that drafts could have been

When the report was my monthly House Bank statements which showed no overdrafts. I publicly commented on that fact and also publicly supported House Speaker Tom Foley's plans to start assessing a penalty for overdrafts.

In the following days, I decided to review the GAO report on my own. That's when I first learned my account had incurred overdrafts. The bank had not notified me, nor noted the overdrafts on my monthly statements. Even without receiving notification, my overdrafts were covered in less than three days. I regret failing to transfer funds from my bank accounts in Virginia and Stamford, Texas, in a timely fashion. Had I known of the overdrafts, there would have been no repeats. It is an understatement when I say I was shocked and embarrassed. 
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

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

> County jails are backed up with state inmates, and our State penitentiaries operate like a revolving door-sending violent criminals back out onto the streets after they have served only a fraction of their sentence.

tion of their sentence.

Judging from the mail my office is receiving, can assure you that most state. And Texans want to keep violent offenders off the streets.

One way to do that is to vote on November 5.

Proposition 4 authorizes the state to issue up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds to finance the cost of new prison facilities that will lock up 25,300 new prisoners. When you consider that our current prison capacity is right at 50,000, you can see what a difference these 15 new prisons will make. If we are going to keep violent offenders incarcerated, we must

have the space for them. New crime control laws also create a substance abuse felony punishment and provide space for 12,000 inmates punished under this provision. The money raised from the \$1.1 billion bond issue can also be used in this effort to break the cycle of addiction and crime.

To ensure us additional prison space for violent criminals, we need you to vote yes on Proposition 4 on November 5.

There are other important items on the ballot. - Proposition 11is the constitutional amendment that would authorize a state lottery.

If approved, a state lottery will pump about \$500 million into the state treasury this biennium. That's half a billion dollars that can be put to good use educating our children, making our communities safe, creating jobs for Texas and providing health and human services to those Texans in need.

The lottery is that rar-

est of all beasts - a popular method of raising state revenue.

At this time in Texas history when we are making cuts in areas we never dreamed of cutting before - when we are faced with increasing federal court orders to spend more state dollars on human services - we cannot pass up this opportunity to bring in much-needed revenue.

Remember, every dollar a lottery raises for the state is one less dollar we have to raise in taxation.

- Proposition 12 authorizes the state to upgrade the living conditions of those Texans living in unincorporated neighborhoods, or Colonias, along the Texas-Mexico border. It grants the state the power to spend up to \$250 million on loans and grants for water and sewer projects in the Colo-

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
Disease is rampant in these communities where children are forced to drink untreated water and raw sewage stands in the streets. We must have these bond monies available to eradicate these unacceptable conditions.

-Proposition 13 would allow the state to continue issuing up to \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance higher education loans to students. Voters must approve this amendment if we are going to continue funding the Hinson-Hazelwood student loan program. Since 1965, the state has loaned \$580 million dollars to more than 200,000 Texas students through this program. It is one of the few state programs that is completely self-sufficient.

In fact, it's a moneymaker - because Texas students have a good record of repaying these loans. It is one of the few programs we can offer middle income students. Texas must maintain its investment in education if we are to be prepared for the century ahead.

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





of dollars in local revenue from property-rich districts to property-poor districts within the same county or region.





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

ACS Supports Use Of Breast Implants For Mastectomy Patients

The American Cancer Society, Texas Division is launching a state-wide letter-writing campaign among its 200,000 volunteers to urge Congress and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to allow the continued use of breast implants as an option for mastectomy patients seeking reconstructive surgery. The Society is also urging all Texans to get involved in letter-writing efforts.

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Volunteer leaders of the American Cancer Society in Texas are concerned about the potential ban of breast implants for the use of reconstruction in breast cancer patients. At its recent annual meeting, American Cancer Society volunteer leaders agreed to organize a letter-writing campaign to support the use of breast implants as part of a patient's healthcare choices.

The Society's Texas Division approved the following policy:

"The Texas Division does not support a ban on silicone breast implants for breast reconstructive surgery. We do support continued research, quality assurance of implant devices to maintain their safety. We feel women should be well-informed of risks and benefits of reconstructive surgery so that they may make an informed choice."

"We're afraid that women will delay treatment if breast implants are no longer part of their reconstruction options,"

says George Peters, M.D., President of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division. "Statistics show that early detection saves lives and for many women avoiding a change in body image is a motivation for immediately addressing breast cancer through surgery."

Concern about a potential ban of breast implants is building in anticipation of the mid-November meeting of the FDA General and Plastic Surgery Devices Panel. Some fear that the panel will ban the use of breast implants. An announcement about future use of breast implants is anticipated from the FDA in January.

American Cancer Society physician volunteer leaders in Texas recognize that scientific evidence documents a low health risk associated with breast implants and that implants are a significant benefit to breast cancer patients who are able to restore an amputated body part. It is estimated that 25 percent of the two million women who have breast implants are breast

cancer patients. "It scares me to think about the women walking around who won't have their breast cancer treated because reconstruction won't be an option," said Lynne Lofgren, a breast reconstruction patient and volunteer for the American Cancer Society in Dallas. "The FDA should not take away the option women have to be reconstructed after
