Comptroller John Sharp. Sharp made this observation in a speech to Texas county judges and commissioners last week where he outlined his plan to replace paper food

stamps with a credit card system.

Instead of presenting food stamps at the grocery check-out, a person would use an "electronic benefits transfer card. "

The system would prevent certain types of fraud as well as eliminate enough paper to save thousands of trees, Sharp said.

Sharp thinks other savings would follow as the state reduced its 300 full-time fraud investigators plus the courier services which deliver stamps to local offices.

Meanwhile, Sharp warned voters that if they fail to approve the proposed state lottery on the Nov. S ballot, it will be necessary to cut \$462 million from the state budget.

The comptroller wants to begin an instant scratch-off game by July, which he predicts would generate \$462 million in 14 months.

Comptroller's Index Hits All-Time High

Texas Economic Indicators hit an all-time high in August, surpassing its previous record of September 1990," Comptroller John Sharp said.

"Rising stock prices of Texas-based companies, an increase in new business incorporations and a longer workweek for manufacturingemployees combined to push the Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators to an all-time high of 116.4 in August, a .7 percent increase from August 1990," Sharp said.

The previous record high for the Texas Index, set in September of last year, was 116.2.

The Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators was developed by the Comptroller's Office to predict future changes in the national and state economies. The Index is useful because it helps forecast significant economic upturns and downturns several months in advance. It is comprised of 10 different components, including consumer confidence, oil prices and unemployment insurance claims.

"The Index of Leading 4.5 percent from July to August and are now 15.4 percent above last year. The average of new business incorporations was also up by 48 percent from 2,945 in August 1990 to 3,085 in August 1991," Sharp said.

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"The average length of the workweek for manufacturing employees also was up in August from 41.9 hours a year ago to 42.25 hours today. Housing permits appear to have turned the corner, with the average 8.4 percent above a year ago. The number of permits issued in August reached 4,250, which improves the outlook for construction and real estate employment," Sharp said.

"Another reason for the increase is that the comparable national index is up by .7 percent to stand at 145.4, which is good news since the national economy now plays a more important role in the Texas economy," Sharp

"However, help-wanted advertising remains 11.3 percent below last year at this time, largely due to the national economic recession. And the number of initial claims for unemployment compensation rose in August to a seasonally adjusted 73,400, or 10.1 percent over last year," Sharp said.

Consumer confidence levels remain weak. The Consumer Confidence Index for the West South Central states was up in August, but still below August 1990. This particular gauge has bobbled up and down this year, falling with the Iraqi crisis, rising after Operation Desert Storm, but declining again in response to the national recession.

In addition, oil prices, which are 22 percent below their levels during the Kuwait crisis, have shown no sign of rising enough to stimulate new exploration by the state's energy in-



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

#### SUPPORT NEEDED FOR PRISON BONDS

Our criminal justice system is broken. Texans are fed up with the spectacle of violent offenders being released from prison after serving only a fraction of their sentence.

County jails are backed up with state inmates, and our state penitentiaries operate like a revolving door - sending violent criminals back out onto the streets after they have served only a fraction of their sentence.

Judging from the mail my office is receiving, I can assure you that most Texans recognize crime as the No.1 problem facing this state. And Texans want to keep violent offenders off the streets.

One way to do that is to vote on November 5.

Proposition 4 authorizes the state to issue up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds to finance the cost of new prison facilities that will lock up 25,300 new prisoners. Proposition 13, will be reconsidered by voters in the Nov. 5 election. This time the amount of the bonds will be clearly stated. I favor the issuance of these state bonds to fund the Hinson-Hazelwood College Student Loan Program. Beginning in 1993, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board says the entire program, including administrative costs, will be self-supporting.

This is not a new issue. Two years ago, voters approved nearly \$2 billion in state debt under the same confusing circum-

In that 1989 constitutional amendment election, one proposition read, "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the recovery and further development of the state's economy, with goals of increasing job opportunities and other benefits for Texas residents, through state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses.'

That proposition's passage led to the authorization of \$75 million in state debt.

On Nov. 5, we have the opportunity to make it mandatory that all future debt-authorizing measures be stated in plain English.

Passage of Proposition 8 will ensure that we never again are asked to by\_the State Legislature to support the issuance of state debt without knowing its future costs and from what source it will be paid. It would place the state under the same standards that now apply to local governmental enti-

Passage of Proposition 8 will help solve part of the problem Texas voters have faced in the past. But even with this policy in place, there still needs to be legislative leadership to assure that all ballot propositions-not just debt issues - be stated clearly.

It is imperative that we take this first step in the direction of good government and public policy by supporting and voting for Proposition 8. The outcome of this proposition and the other 12 issues on the Nov. 5 ballot could have a tremendous impact on the future of Texas.
