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GIVEN A choice, which spot would we re-visit? Which was top choice? In a minute -- ROTHENBURG On The Tauber, Jewel of the Middle Ages: an absolute fairy-tale town; walled; compact; unbelievably unique. A real "let's come back here" place: "Disneyland for grown people."

West of Nuremberg, it's a short afternoon's drive, and we chose the rural, backroad route rather than the autobahn, so saw much more of Germany's farmland and tiny villages. We were using Frommer's, Fodor's Wives' "Never Officers and Amy's a Dull Minute" guides so were able to find the picks of the litter, in Rothenberg, we found the and absolute ultimate little guesthouse, just off the main square, on a little side street, and near the city wall. From our upper room the view across the little valley beyond the wall was fantastic. We walked the little streets on a cold and drippy night, and found a snug, cellar cafe with inviting dining room and warm, filling food. They knew we were tourists, but they treated us like regulars who lived down the street.

## Rothenburg

guide book says, "it's milking its best-preserved-medieval-town-in-Europe image for all its worth." There's really no other place like it, and the locals admit that the population (12,500) is dedicated to serving visitors: 19 hotels, 35 inns, 90 restaurants, taverns and cafes AND a few hundred, unique shops offering as much and more than all tourists would want -- but it's not brash. It's fun, and we relish the memories.

History abounds: The Thirty Years War 1618-48 (relate that to the settlement of Jamestown in 1620?); the town is besieged and taken by Tilly, and according to Legend, City Councilman Nusch's so-called Master Drink saved the city from wholesale destruction. The invaders challenged any to empty the tankard (six pints of brew); he did and saved the town, says the tale, and the city re-enacts. and thrives on the legend.

and the town is rebuilt in the old style, with the support of friends and well-wishers from all parts of world. One of the city's the churches, St. Wolfgang, is actually joined to the city walls, and was a part of the original fortification.

St. Jakob's (James) is the city's imposing church; it is beautiful and artwork abounds. It houses the Holy Blood Altar, a beautiful, gigantic carving in limewood, which was commissioned to house in a gold cross respository for a relic: "According to legend, it is said that 3 drops of Christ's blood is contained within a capsule of rock crystal in the gold cross." The carving of the Twelve, in which Christ confronts Judas, saying "One of you shall betray me," is ultra-fine detailing, even to latticed windows in the background. It is a beautiful piece of art. Stained glass abounds.

Fine, heavy wood furniture, including an unbelievalby detailed and heavy stand-alone wardrobes made our little double and single rooms really inviting. Power is 220 and you use your converter for electric razors, curling irons and hair dryers. Heat is from radiators, and lighting is on the dim side (40watts in little glass shades). The down pillows kinda let you down to nothing, but oh, those down comforters are s-o-o-o snuggly. We rose to a little quartz alarm clock, whose battery took care of us, up until the last day when it let us down, but more of that later.

After a genteel breakfast with what must have been home-made strawberry-light preserves, we took a horse-drawn carriage ride of the city and hit the shops again, including their trademark blue ironstone factory before pottery Goodbye reluctanly saying to Rothenberg, and heading to Wurtzburg to the north. -- (Next: Train to Rome)
