ESTIMATES SHOW MORE THAN 1 MILLION IN DAMAGES TO COUNTY'S RURAL AREAS

Figures released by County Judge Scott Bailey's Office Thursday estimate that damages to rural areas of the County from recent rains total \$1,021,750.00. This estimate is for areas outside the Incorporated limits of the cities. There has been additional damage reported inside some of the cities. The rural estimate includes road and bridge damage, private home damage, crops and fencing. Judge Bailey says that no estimate on livestock is presently available. Although some people are reporting lost cattle, they are still hoping these will be found or return home. A rough breakdown of the estimates in Precincts is: Precinct 1, \$8,000, Pct. 2, \$640,750 to homes and property around Lake Leon. An additional \$100,000 in Pct. 2 road damage is estimated. In Precinct 3, \$100,000 is estimated in damage to roads and bridges. Pct. 4 has \$175,000 in damages to roads and bridges, according to estimates. Peanut damage is also estimated in figures from some of the precincts. Judge Bailey is forwarding a request to the U.S. Department of Agriculture through the office of Congressman Charles Stenholm, asking for aid in this disaster. Ron Bailey, Head of the Eastland County ASCS office, is assisting the County in this request. A new Department of Agriculture provision gives help on watershed and drainage damage. Judge Bailey and other officials are also seeking to have Eastland County declared a Disaster Area.

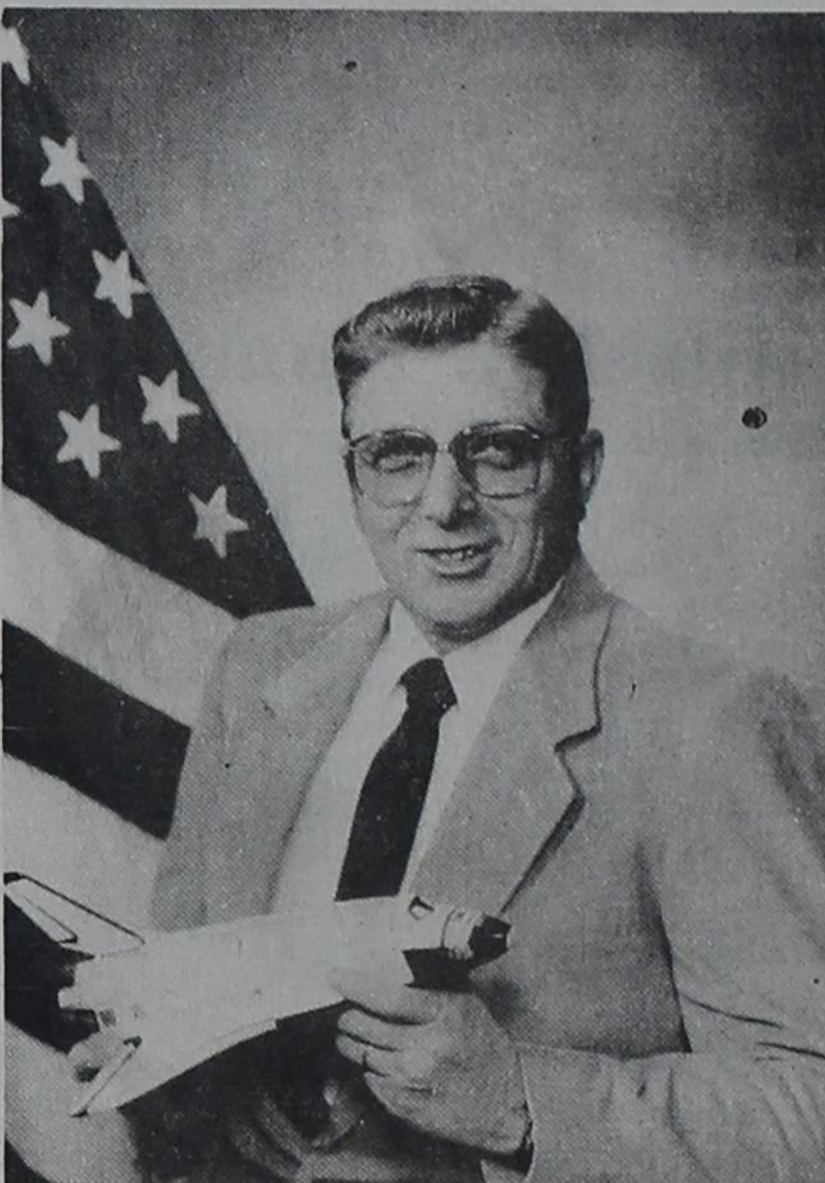
POINTS TO PONDER

Grandparents have to share grandchildren with other grandparents, so this Christmas they were with their other grandparents. Soon like others all the decorations will be packed away for next year. But before we get on with new years resolutions I would like to share one more thought on the Christmas season, for I believe it might have some bearing on the new year. There was a cartoon that appeared in one of the magazines. A man was seated on the floor wrapping gifts for Christmas. It seemed all of the gifts were wrapped, standing behind him is Jesus, as he asks himself the question, "Have I forgot someone?" I hope that you in your celebrations didn't forget to worship the one for whom Christmas was set aside. If Christmas becomes a total secular holiday it is because we have allowed the real reason for the season to be pushed aside. If Jesus Christ is not a vital part of your life and my life, the 1992 may be a meaningless year. I believe the events that are taking place in Russia, and other countries should make us stop and consider the blessings we have enjoyed as Americans for so long, may in fact be soon lost to us because of our lack of interest. All people interested in getting something done about the flooding are welcome and urged to attend.

Eastland County citizens are urged to attend a meeting Saturday, January 4 1992 at 7 p.m. at the Lake Leon Baptist Church. This will be the first meeting of citizens seeking action to prevent flooding around Lake Leon. Lake Leon residents and supporters are joining together to form an organized group whose main objective will be to convince the water board, city and county officials to take immediate steps toward getting the emergency spillway at Lake Leon lowered. Resent floodwater got approximately 7 feet over the normal spillway. It is estimated that the lake waters would have to rise an additional 6 feet before water would begin to run around the emergency spillway. Approximately 60 percent of the homes around the lake were damaged by the flood. Many of the home owners that escaped damage from this flood were only inches from disaster. The realization that the water could have gotten 6 feet deeper before the emergency spillway could begin to help ease the situations has many homeowners outraged. If you are a homeowner around Lake Leon or you would like to show support for your friends or this cause, you are strongly encouraged to attend, said Spokesperson Wanda Kellar.

I read with interest the November 21 Word & Way article regarding the public schools and how they deal with various religious and moral issues in the classroom. Granted, many of these issues are highly sensitive in nature, and teachers have to be extremely careful how they approach them. Much of the material I have read recently has led me to believe that many people outside of public education think that God is never mentioned in the classroom.

There seems to be a feeling that teachers are working quietly to circumvent God by subtly moving their students toward secular humanism and New Age thought. Somewhere there may be schools who subscribe to these philosophies, but I don't think they can be found in southwest Missouri. It is deplorable when teachers have to "tip-toe" around religious and moral issues because they don't know where they stand in relation to federal laws pertaining to religion. Our country was, after all,

founded on religious principles and ideals, and one cannot ignore the influence of Christianity on our forefathers.

Many Webb City R-7 school employees are active in church, and it is obvious that some are very strong Christians. All of our administrators attend church, and our high school principal teaches a first grade Sunday School class with his wife. I have served as Sunday School Director at Webb City First Baptist for 18 years and am presently chairman of deacons. I find it difficult to believe that there are those who think that we are permitting the teaching of philosophies con-

Burr-headed lad, maybe 8, with his Italian family on train to Venice for All Saints Day holiday weekend, asked us in vestibule in passable English: "You British?" No, American. "Where?" Texas, near Dallas. The Italians beamed big friendly smiles and the boy and his siblings went "Bang, bang," using index fingers as six-shooters. Later an elderly German man did the same thing in Oberammergau, Germany. Texans do have a distinct travel advantage.

Beautiful, ornate, old and cold Venice, sitting on 120 little islands, held together by 450 bridges, called the heart of the world and it is truly unique. We caught the water taxi outside the train station, and counted off 13 stops on the beautifully night-lit Grand Canal, to find a narrow little alley-street which took us to our Hotel Ala.

Amy and Vince had been here before so she had no problem guiding us through the maze of little streets,

canals and archways to the city's famous St. Mark's Square. The Italians don't mark Halloween but Nov. 1st is a major holiday and the town was packed. Along one street we were greeted by hordes of vendors offering what probably were "knockoff" designer purses and other finery displayed on sheets spread on the cobblestones. No sooner were we through the portable shops, than we heard shrill whistles, admonitions and the clatter of many running feet as the Venice police arrived and scattered the sellers who bundled their wares in the sheets and vanished into the alleys and dark recesses of that strange unique city.

How will I remember the city? Beautifully lit but cold. The night wind across that water perfected a sore throat, chest cold and voice-loss for me; but heck you don't slow down when you've come so far to see so much. The tour books warn: the combination of wet and cold "lay siege to the heartiest respiratory system, giving you a cold where you never knew colds could reach."

Unbelievably beautiful buildings,

plazas, shops, and of course the canals with their signature gondolas all make for a dream-like cityscape on the Adriatic Sea. Could it not just be an artificial movie set, fixed just to entertain the tourists? Do people really live here? Get up and go to work like other people? Indeed they do, and have for centuries. A different kind of place.

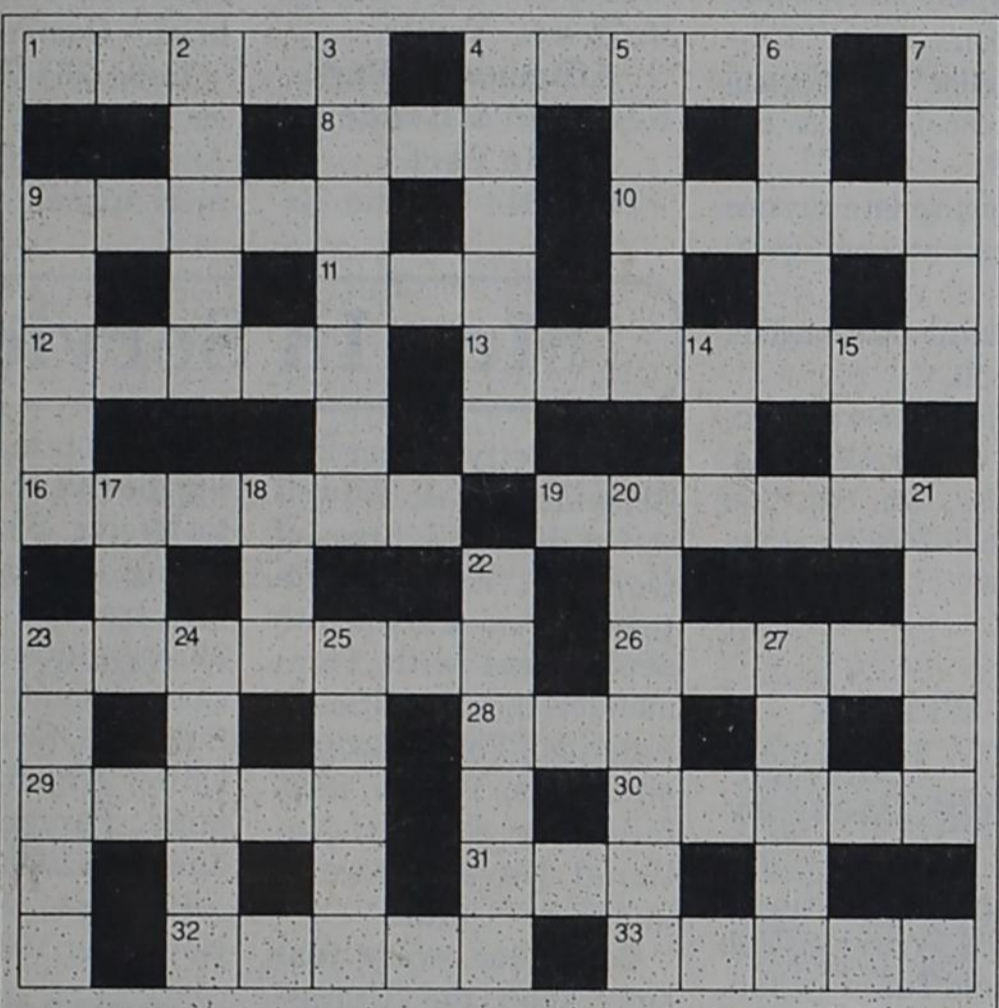
Legend has it that in 828 A.D. four Venetians conspired to smuggle the remains of St. Mark from Alexandria, thus Saint Mark's is the gilded church of the Square and he the patron saint of Venice. The square is beautiful and the interior of the church is gilded and every inch covered in colorful mosaics. Venice was the crossroads of Byzantine and Roman worlds for centuries. Today, it is the tourist mecca of Italy, and the world, for that matter. Prices are double and it's not the cleanest city, but it is Venice. It is quite, and it's hard for any of us to even envision a place without automobiles: no horns, no sirens and what a contrast to Rome. Walk or go waterway.

Lace and glassware are big, and tourists are lured into glass-blowing studios for demonstration,

AND gift shop shelves. Pretty glass.

From the boats, one can admire the splendor of the canals, palaces, large squares, and foundations. And oh, yes, the doves in St. Mark's Square: legend says they were brought from Cyprus in homage to the wife of the Doge. They are a tradition, fed twice daily by the city and constantly by the tourists. Birdy!

The Bridge of Sighs: this is a dainty suspended bridge that crosses the Rio di Palazzo, in baroque style and unites the Ducal Palace with that of the Prisons. The prisoners who were to appear before the court passed over this bridge, it was their only and maybe last chance to see the Lagoon from the three lighted windows and to sigh for their lost liberty. And yes, this city which reportedly is sinking, does flood with high tides and St. Mark's Square seems especially vulnerable, sometimes getting as much as a foot and a half underwater. At those times, boats ply it and pedestrians walk on portable wooden sidewalks, but not while we were there. Beautiful place.

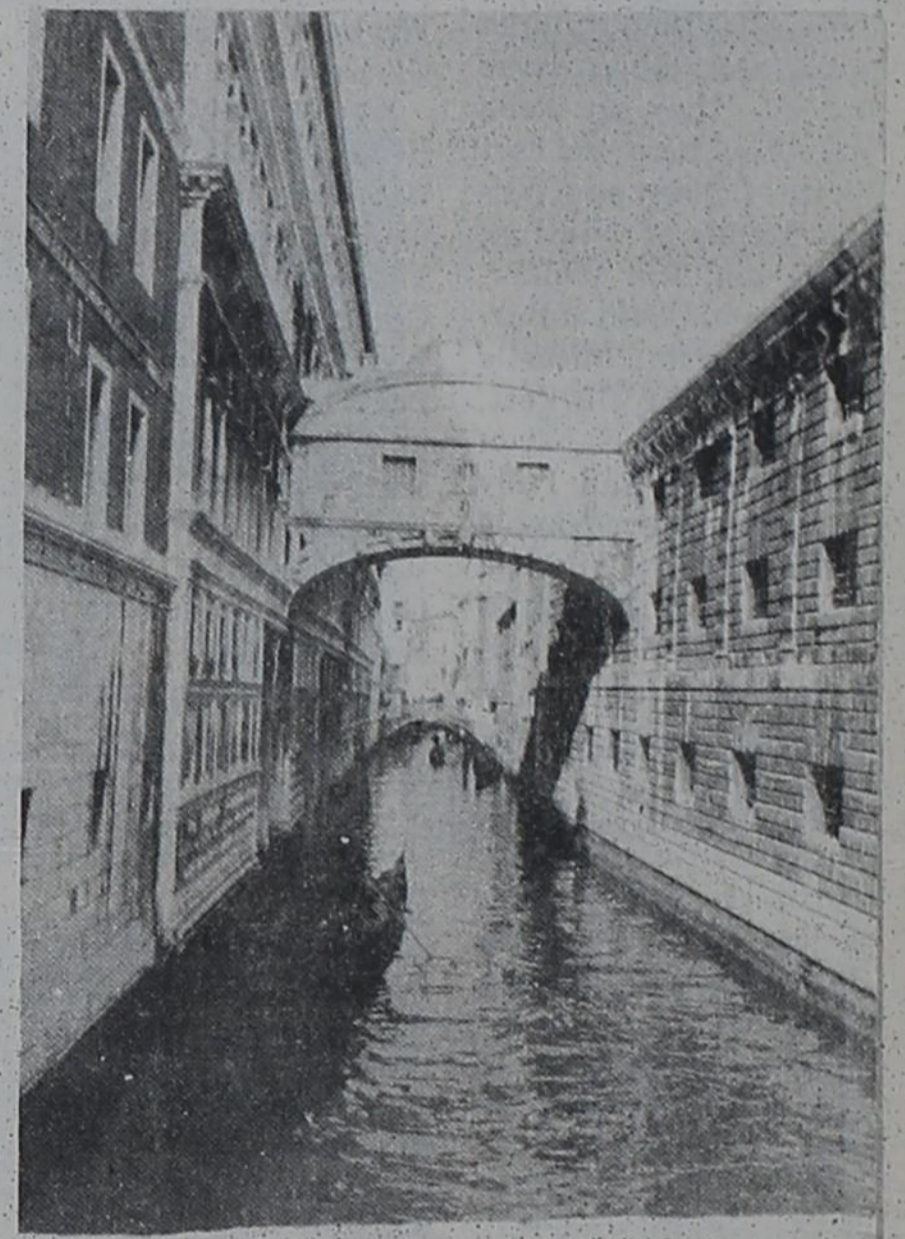

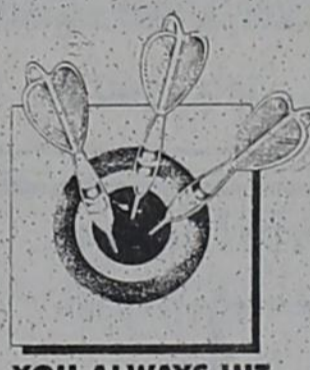

Cancer Unit To Be In Eastland On January 6

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which services Eastland, Texas today received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation

Program.

Breast cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. If further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39.

A mammogram every one or two years between age 40 and 49.

An annual mammogram from age 50.

The Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Eastland, on Monday, Jan. 6th. You may call 629-2601 for an appointment.

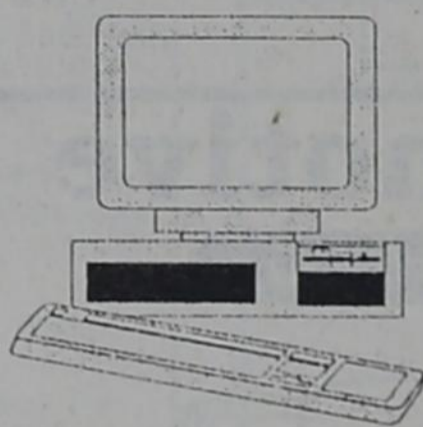

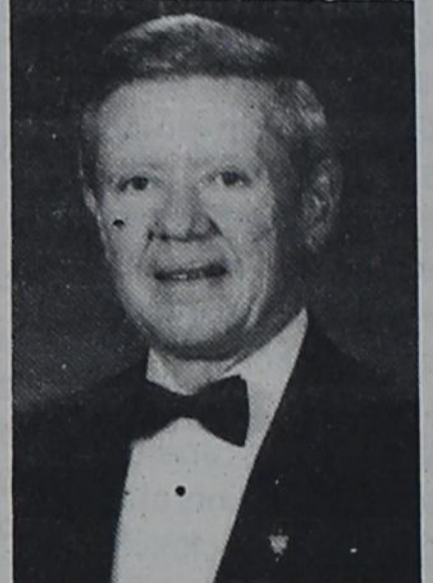

The power of positive thinking... audio tape that told patients the operation was going well and that they should be calm and relaxed helped them stay comfortable after surgery with less morphine than those who didn't hear the suggestions, British research reports.

Active exercise -- one or more hours a day -- doubles protection against hip fractures, according to a study of older adults at the University of Southern California School of Medicine. Vigorous walking and jogging were more beneficial than golf and fishing.

Experimental procedure, reported in the journal Obstetrics and Gynecology, permits women in labor to control the amount of anesthetic given during the birth process.

For patients with chronic sinus problems, new surgery utilizes a thin fiber-optic scope passed through the nose to view the ethmoid sinus and scrape away any excess tissue very precisely without making incisions. Procedure involves minimal blood loss.

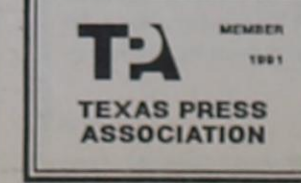

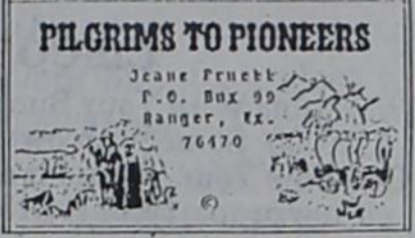

Medicare Costs Increase

The "out of pocket" costs that Medicare beneficiaries pay for Medicare coverage increased as of January 1, 1992, according to Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene. The basic medical insurance premium - sometimes called "Part B" - increased by \$1.90 - from \$29.90 to \$31.80. However, the \$100.00 Medicare medical insurance deductible will remain unchanged, Hammons said. The amount the patient pays for the Medicare hospital insurance - sometimes called "Part A" - deductible and coinsurance amounts increased as follows:

- from \$628.00 to \$652.00 for the first 60 days of inpatient care in a benefit period,
- from \$157.00 to \$163.00 a day for the 61st through the 90th day of inpatient care,
- from \$314.00 to \$326.00 a day for the 60

hospital reserve days, - from \$78.50 to \$81.50 for the 21st through the 100th day of care in a skilled nursing facility. The monthly Medicare hospital insurance premium for people who are not insured under the Social Security or the Railroad Retirement Act increases from \$177.00 to \$192.00. The beneficiary share of the cost of Medicare is figured each year based on the increases in the cost of the program during the year before. People with limited income may qualify for help with payment of these costs under the "Qualified Medicare Beneficiary" program available from their State welfare or public assistance agencies.

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



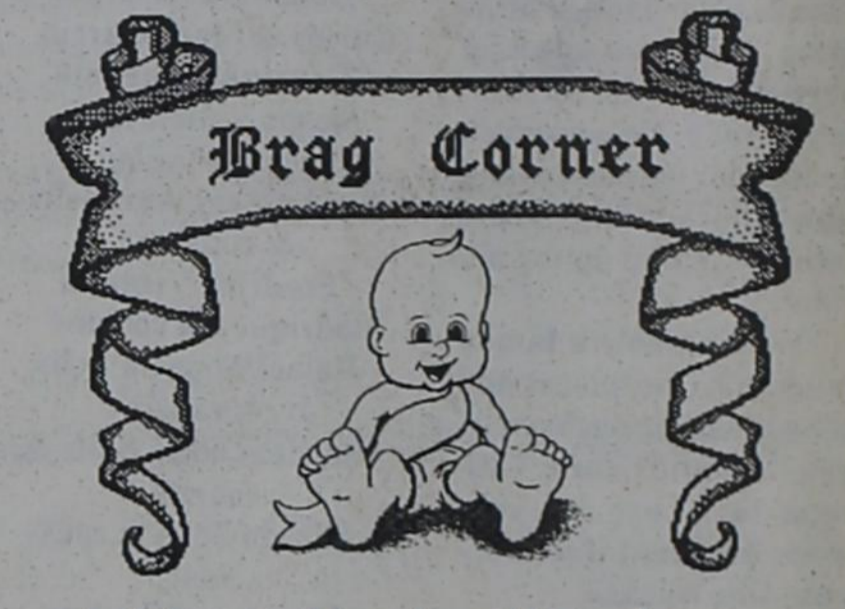

Irregular Heartbeat Cure May Be On The Horizon

A non-surgical cure for life-threatening irregular heartbeats may be on the horizon, thanks to a computerized cardiac mapping system being developed at The DeBakey Heart Center.

The 1,000-channel system will replace a 128-channel system developed earlier at the heart center and should be ready for testing in humans in early 1992, according to Dr. Antonio Pacifico, assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Computerized cardiac mapping is used to pinpoint areas of the heart where electrical disturbances affecting the beating rhythm originate. When the irregular beating, called arrhythmia, is severe, it can cause sudden cardiac death.

The new system will provide scientists with a more powerful tool to study ventricular tachycardia, a type of life-threatening arrhythmia involving the heart's pumping chambers. Knowledge gained from that study should lead to a non-surgical cure.

"Increased understanding of the cause and effects of tachycardia will eventually enable us to treat patients using a

catheter threaded into the heart through a vein," Pacifico said. "The new catheter will make it possible to identify the origin of the problem and to cure it with either microwave or laser energy."

Now, the mapping is done by slipping an electrode-studded sock over the heart during surgery. The computer map shows the problem areas and the surgeon destroys them with a laser or by freezing the tissue.

The new system will improve the surgeon's accuracy in identifying the source of the irregular heartbeats, decrease the patient's time on a heart-lung machine and in the operating room, and allow better understanding of the tachycardia's mechanism, Pacifico said.

The promise of a non-surgical therapy also offers hope for improved lifestyles for patients whose irregular heart rhythms are not cured surgically, he added.

"If we can offer these people a less invasive cure than open-heart surgery, they can go back to a normal life without having to worry about their heartbeat and without having to see doctors all the time," Pacifico said.

Old Tires A New Texas Industry

How many people have come across a couple of old tires when cleaning out their garages or storerooms? Plenty, I'll bet. The tires may have some tread left, but you know you'll never use them again. The garbage pickup people won't take them in most cities. A call to a tire dealer tells you it costs him 50 cents apiece to dispose of old tires and soon the cost will go up.

Landfills charge \$1.50 plus per tire to take them to be cut up and buried. They have to be cut up; otherwise they work their way to the surface.

Disposing of old tires is one of the most exasperating environmental problems we face in Texas and elsewhere. Millions of discarded tires clog our landfills and overflow into vacant lots and roadsides. Many are dumped illegally on state lands.

Americans produce one waste tire each year for every man, woman and child in the United States — 260 million tires. There are an estimated 3 billion old tires scattered around the country.

This is economic nonsense when you consider all the energy and resources tied up in those tires.

It's in everybody's interest that we solve this problem, and solutions are in the works. I recently attended a demonstration of a process that recycles used tires into valuable components, including oil, steel, carbon black and methane. The machine, owned by Tire Recycling Technologies of Albuquerque and invented by Floyd Wallace of Michigan, uses a low-heat catalytic process to vaporize tire chips. In one day, a full scale machine can process 100

tons of tire chips (about 10,000 tires) to produce 300 barrels of oil, 8-10 tons of steel, 20-25 tons of carbon black and 200,000 cubic feet of methane gas, some of which is used to fuel the machine, the remainder to be sold to a gas utility. When you consider that the machine can produce 300 barrels of oil a day and oil is selling at \$20 a barrel, that's more than \$6,000 a day tied up in old tires. All that oil locked up in 3 billion tires amounts to a staggering 90 million barrels valued at \$1.8 billion. The machine is one heck of an oil well.

The omnibus recycling bill passed by the 72nd Legislature will help turn those lurking health hazards into a new Texas industry. The law provides that businesses that can recycle tires or other waste deal with them in a way that does not degrade the environment are entitled to 85 cents a tire.

The State Health Department will provide oversight. The money comes from a \$2 per new tire fee. That's only fair. Tires mean mobility which this society must have. Worn out and stacked in unsightly piles, they become fire hazards or breeding grounds for mosquitos and other pests. Proper disposal must be considered a part of the true cost of the tires. Now we have the means to recycle the tires and create economic growth. That's good news in anybody's book.

Medicare Costs Increase

The "out-of-pocket" costs that Medicare beneficiaries pay for Medicare coverage increased as of January 1, 1992, according to Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene.

The basic medical insurance premium — sometimes called "Part B" — increased by \$1.90 — from \$29.90 to \$31.80. However, the \$100.00 Medicare medical insurance deductible will remain unchanged, Hammons said.

The amount the patient pays for the Medicare hospital insurance — sometimes called "Part A" — deductible and coinsurance amounts increased as follows:

- from \$628.00 to \$652.00 for the first 60 days of inpatient care in a benefit period,
- from \$157.00 to \$163.00 a day for the 61st through the 90th day of inpatient care,
- from \$314.00 to \$326.00 a day for the 60

Natural Gas Replaces Oil

Natural gas could be substituted for as much as 1.7 million barrels of oil per day by the year 2000, according to the American Gas Association (A.G.A.).

"The United States has an abundant supply of natural gas that can be developed to meet consumer needs and help ensure American energy security, particularly in the area of reducing oil imports," says A.G.A. President Michael Baly III.

"Specifically, there are currently about 5 million homes, 375,000 commer-

Low Income Households May Be Eligible For Energy Assistance

Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying heating bills this winter through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Interim Commissioner Burton F. Raiford.

Raiford said the one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Applications for energy assistance were mailed to households that received food stamps. Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income in December. Other low-income individuals may request an application by calling the toll-free number 1-800-252-8060 during the enrollment period of Jan. 15 through Feb. 28.

Eligibility is determined by gross income and resources. Aid is available for a one-person household having less than \$662.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$876.49

for households of two persons, \$1,090.49 for three, \$1,304.49 for four, \$1,518.49 for five, and \$1,732.49 for six.

Households are eligible if the cost for heating is included in the rent payment or if the household pays part of its home energy costs.

Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy provider.

Someone receiving an energy assistance check should mail it or take it in person to the energy provider business office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy provider. If the check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the difference.
