Early voting by personal tion. appearance in the March 10 Democratic and Republican Primaries for Eastland County began Wednesday, February 19,1992 and will end March 6,1992. This is being held in the office of the County Clerk during regular office hours, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Senate Bill1136, was enacted last year to change the term in the Election Code from "Absentee Voting" to "Early Voting." It allows any voter to cast their ballot early, regardless of his or her absence from the county at the time of the regularly scheduled elec-

Anyone who wishes to vote by mail must apply for an application to vote by mail, Eastland County Clerk JoAnn Johnson says. There are still certain restrictions concerning voting by mail. An individual may call the County Clerk's office for information regarding an application by mail to be voted early. Individuals may also go by the office and pick up the application to be returned by

Asthma is often triggered by allergies to pollen, ragweed, house dust, pets, food and other irritants. Common non-allergic triggers are smoke, perfumes, air pollution, stress, sudden weather changes, exercise and colds and other respiratory infections.

Spring 1992 could be remembered as the time when vehicles that run on natural gas first started "Most of an adult's that run on natural " troit.

General Motors, 1 and Chrysler all are moving toward production of cars, trucks and vans that run exclusively on clean burning natural gas, according to the American Gas Association (A.G.A.).

"Vehicle emissions are the single biggest cause of urban air pollution," says A.G.A. President Michael Baly III. "So if the nation is going to get serious about cleaner air, special emphasis will have to be placed on cleaner cars, trucks and buses. Building or converting vehicles to run on natural gas -

the cleanest alternative fuel currently available is a good way to start."

Natural gas has a number of other advantages, too, Baly says.

It's an abundant domesic resource, it's available _ in all major urban areas, it has proven safety record and it costs less than gasoline — about 70 to 80 cents per equivalent gal-

Currently, about 30,000 vehicles in the United States are running on natural gas, served by about 350 natural gas filling stations. On average, about two new natural gas stations are opening every week, Baly says. Major oil companies involved in natural gas refueling facilities include Amoco, Chevron, FINA, Phillips 66, Texaco and Unocal.

Pharmacy Topics

Using a straw may protect dental enamel from attack by sweet and/or acidic drinks. Academy of General Dentistry reports say that many kinds of drinks can erode enamel, leaving teeth open to cavities and sensitive to cold.

Taking time-release niacin in high doses may lead to hepatitis symptoms, doctors at the Mayo Clinic found. Niacin should be taken under a doctor's supervision; frequent liver exams are advised.

Exercise programs helped previously inactive people to improve their reaction time, grip strength, flexibility and balance. Study at California State University in Fullerton found exercise helped participants to drive more safely, too.

Experimental program to treat patients with advanced cancer with genetically altered antitumor genes passed its first test last summer at the National Cancer Institute. Patients remained alive after protent treatment, but its effectiveness was not immediately known.

Low-Income Working Families Eligible For Cash From The IRS

The Internal Revenue Service is giving up to \$2,000 to low-income families who qualify for Earned Income Credits (EIC) on their tax returns. The trouble is that many just don't apply.

"Many families miss the opportunity to receive this tax credit because they don't make enough money to owe taxes, so they don't file an income tax return," said Joyce Cavanagh, family economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Also, people don't know the EIC is available or how to file for it."

It is believed that more than 12 million families now qualify for the EIC. It is available to working parents who earned an adjusted gross income of less than \$21,250 in 1991, and who have at least one child who has been living at home for more than six months, Cavanagh said. Both married and single parents can qualify.

The EIC is a refundable credit, she said, which means that eligible working families can receive it even if they owe no federal income tax or have no income tax withheld from their paychecks. Those who owe no income credit.

"If a family does owe income tax, the EIC reduces the amount of taxes owed," Cavanagh said. "If the family's credit is greater than the taxes owed, the family's tax bill will be reduced to zero and the IRS will send the family a check for the remaining amount of its EIC."

To receive the EIC, a person must file a federal income tax return, either 1040 or 1040A, and a new form called "Schedule EIC." A taxpayer can fill out both sides of the form or fill out only the first side and allow the IRS to complete the rest and calculate the credit.

Cavanagh said that those families who use the "married couple filing separately" status should check with the IRS to see if they qualify to receive the EIC.

The amount of refund families receive, according to Cavanagh, depends on how much income was earned and whether they qualify for two extra EIC benefits that are now available:

• The basic EIC for 1991 for families with one child is worth a maximum of \$1,192. The maximum is \$1,235 for those with more than one child. Most families who earned between \$6,000 and \$13,000 last year should receive at least \$1,000.

• Families with a child born in 1991 can receive an extra benefit of up to \$357.

• Families that pay at least part of the premiums for a health insurance policy that includes health care coverage for a child may receive an extra credit of up to \$428. Low-income parents with a foster child also may

qualify for the EIC, Cavanagh said. However, the foster child must have lived with the family for that entire

More information on the EIC and free assistance is available in most areas at Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) clinics, Cavanagh said. Call the local IRS office or (800) 829-1040 to find out the location of the nearest VITA clinic in your area.






