TEXAS VOTERS last November okayed a \$1.1 billion bond proposal to build new prison beds. The facilities will be divided between three 2,250-bed maximum security units, a minimum of six 1,000-bed regional centers housing minimum-medium security prisoners and an undetermined number of substance abuse and felony punishment units. Construction costs are estimated at \$80 million for the large units which will employ about 800 employees with an annual payroll of more than \$16 million. The smaller units are expected to cost \$28 million to build and will employ 317 people with an annual payroll about \$6.3 million. **WOW!**

Ranger's proposal is on the short list for consideration by the state prison officials for one of these facilities. Can you imagine the impact on the county's economy if Ranger is chosen? And there is every reason to believe that if selections are made **ON MERIT**, Ranger will be chosen. **RANGER IS THE RIGHT SITE!** You'll be hearing that and you're asked to join in sharing that word. Write, call and speak to those who make the decisions and remind them that the Ranger Site Is Right. If enough are vocal enough, it could happen, and bring a surge of jobs.

It's a big-stakes game, and the competition is fierce. Most folks refuse to believe that choices are made based on **WHAT IS OFFERED**, and some are offering **BIG** inducements. For example: Abilene (which already has a big unit under construction) is asking for another and has offered as much as \$6.6 million, cash, on a sliding scale based on what type of facility is awarded, to be paid through the use of money collected on its 1-cent sales tax; Big Spring has offered up to \$2.9 million; Breckenridge, up to \$5.8 million; Brownwood up to \$2.8 million; and Mitchell County, up to \$6 million. Snyder's offer wasn't made public and Stamford wasn't picked for the short list.

Ranger offers \$600,000 plus utilities, for the site which is a half mile north of I-20, near Ranger Junior College. The Ideal Location. Originally 63 communities submitted 67 site proposals to TDCJ headquarters for staff review and site visits. Ranger's in the race.

The **MAJOR PUBLIC HEARING** will be held in Ranger at the High School Cafeteria on Monday, March 30th, and an all-out large attendance, expressing enthusiastic support would go a long, long way toward helping convince the prison folks that the facility would be welcomed and supported by the entire population of this county. They want to be wanted.

Folks, a prison facility might or might not, be one's first choice of wishes for economic development -- but so far as is known now, there are no other prospects looming on the horizon. And until there are others, it might behoove us all to pitch in and support this distinct possibility. Not only would it provide immediate construction jobs, longrange employment opportunities, it would serve as a magnet to attract other facilities (related and unrelated), to help provide further employment, and generally broaden the economic base of this entire area, which needs diversification.

In 1990-91 school trustees budgeted 30 percent more for operating high schools than for elementary sites, says a Texas Research League report. Public Urged To Attend Prison Official To Be In Ranger At Public Meeting March 30, 1992

Ranger has made the 'Short List' and it's time to once again prepare ourselves for one last visit by the TDCJ before final prison site selections are made.

The local visit is scheduled for Monday, March 30, 1992, 7:00 p.m. at the Ranger school cafeteria.

At that time, TDCJ will have a monitor present to record the meeting and tally the supporters and opposition to a prison site in Ranger.

It is very important that every citizen of Eastland County attend this meeting!!! The more people that we can get to come out and show their support the better. TDCJ wants to know just how bad we want this prison and this will be your chance to show your support to Ranger and Eastland County.

Baby sitters will be available for those with young children and transportation will be provided for the elderly and those without vehicles.

Letter writing needs to be once again stressed to our local state representatives, senators and gov-

ernors.

Addresses are available on flyers around the county and also in the local newspapers. It takes just a few minutes to jot down a few sentences telling them that Ranger and Eastland County need TDCJ and we support TDCJ. They will write you back, so it is not in vain.

Local newspaper owner, H.V. O'Brien has offered to print postcards and distribute them to be mailed. If you read last week's paper, you saw Mr. O'Brien's logo "Ranger is the Right Site" and that will be the official slogan of Ranger. On the back of the cards, there will be 10 reasons why Ranger is the right site and places for your name, address, and town so they can write back. Postcards are being printed and should be available Monday.

Agenda for the public meeting should go as follows:

1. Comments from elected officials-Senator Bob Glasgow, Rep. Bob Turner, Rep. John Cook, Judge Scott Bailey, Judge Jim Wright, DA Leslie Vance, Mayor Ronnie Ainsworth, Mayor Dub Hoffman, and Mayor Joe Wheatley.

2. Proposal summary presented by Delbert Cozart-this will be a brief overview of proposal, exact location of site, etc.

3. Hospital officials will give a brief summation.

4. Junior College officials, Dr. Joe Mills, Leonard Marusak and James McDonald from R.J.C.

5. Proposal opposition, minimum of 15 minutes for a brief presentation reasons for opposition.

6. Public input of support-minimum of 15 minutes of reasons for support.

There will be cards at the registration table for everyone to sign as they arrive. They will be either for or against a prison site and everyone is asked to please fill in one or the other and leave it at the desk. These cards will go back with the TDCJ official to be reviewed along with other material gathered.

At a short meeting on Thursday evening, several Ranger citizens were on hand to fill committees and start back 24 hour work on the public meeting. They were divided into Telephone committees, Transportation committees, Letter writing committees and clean up committees. Cisco and Eastland chambers will handle informing those towns by telephone and letters. Each service organization (Kiwanis, Lions, Rotary) will be contacted to have every member at this meeting.

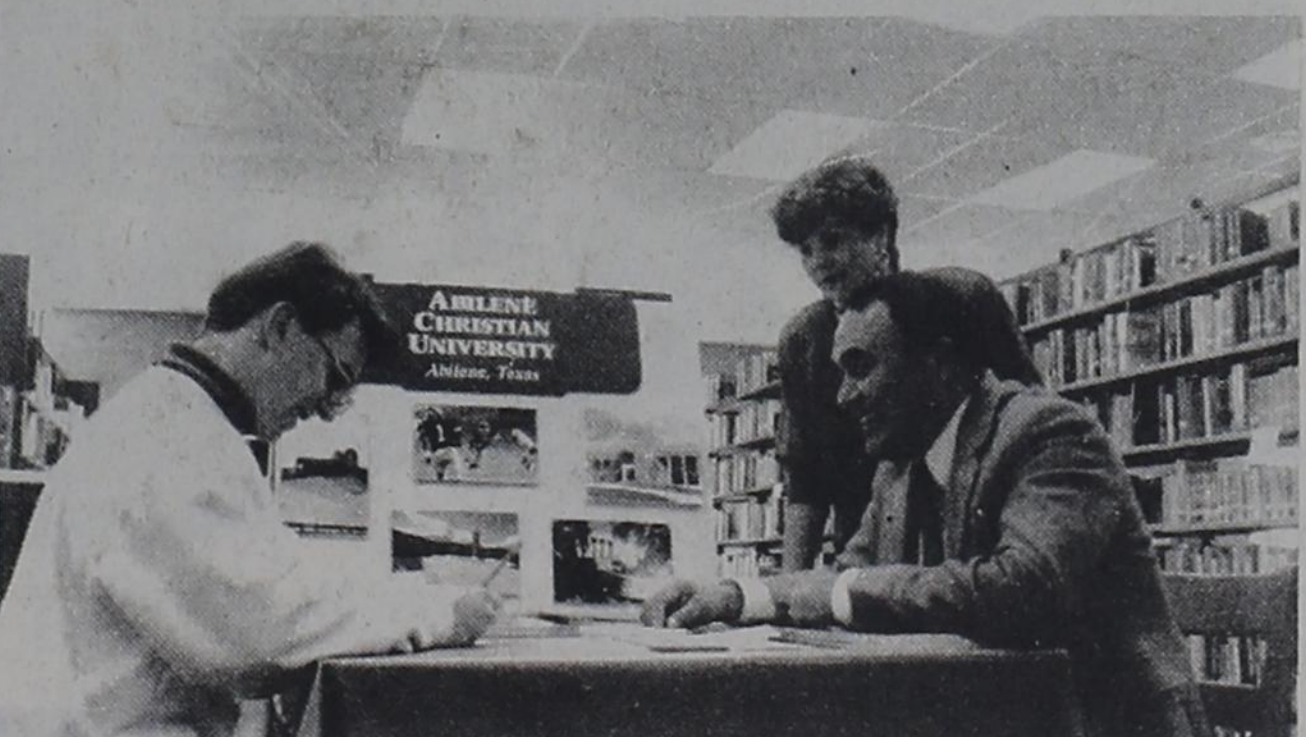
The Academic Challenge Round 2 matches will feature 15 schools from across the Big Country, who have won their 1st round matches and are making a move for the championship title and trophy.

Community Clothes Closet will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. on Saturday.

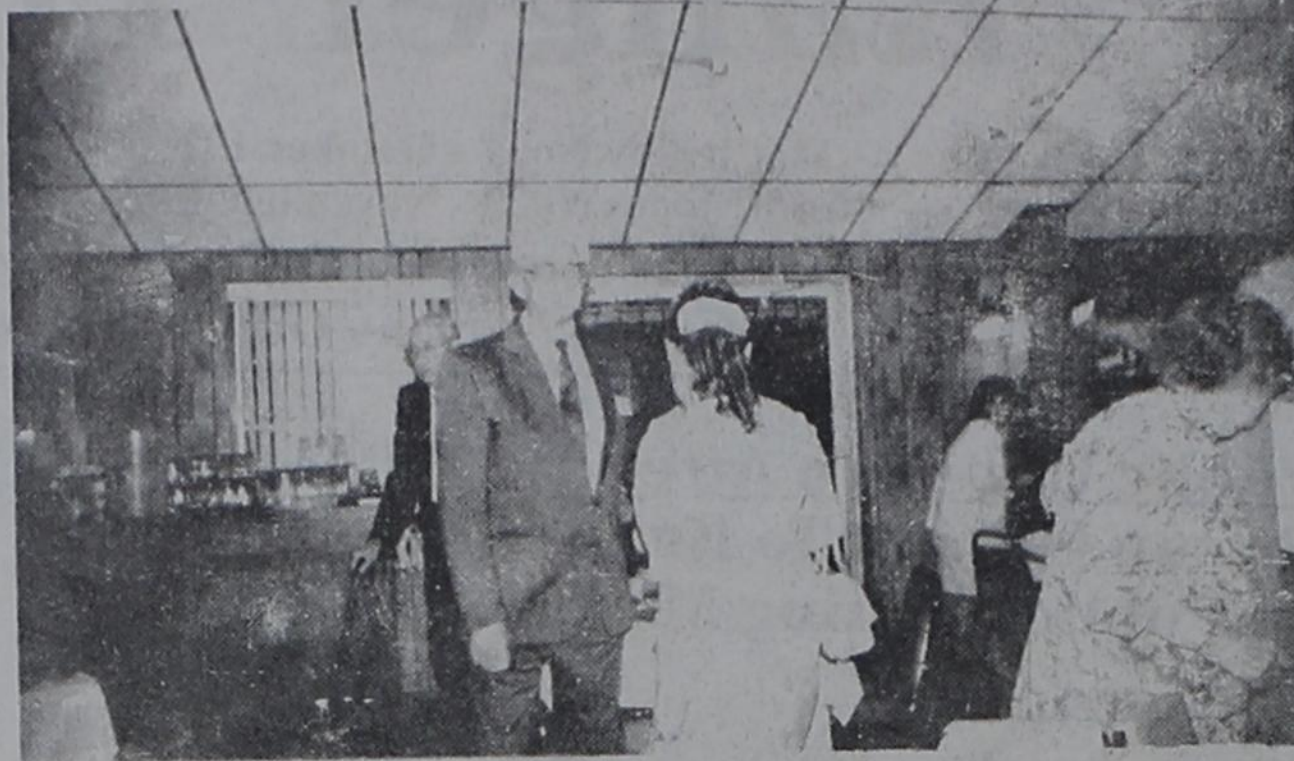

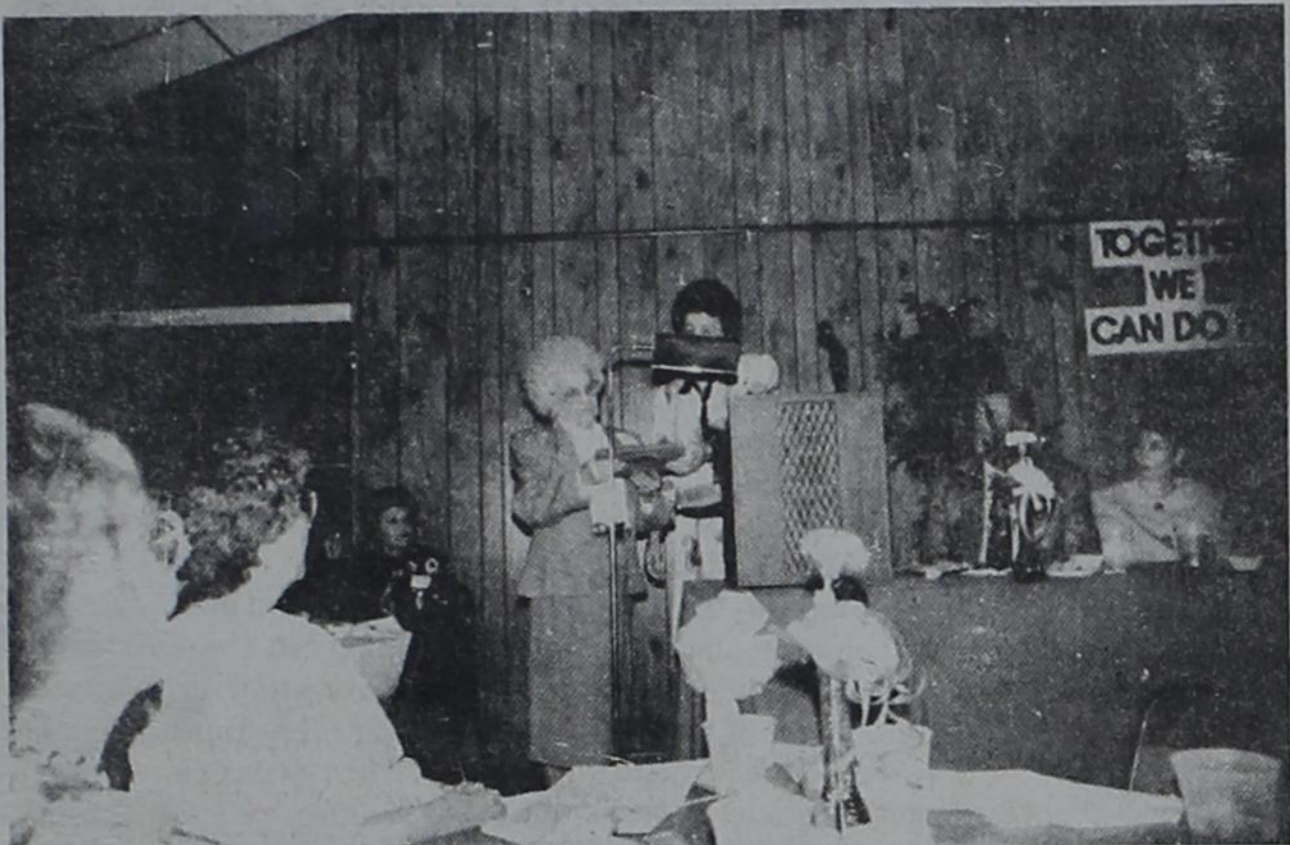

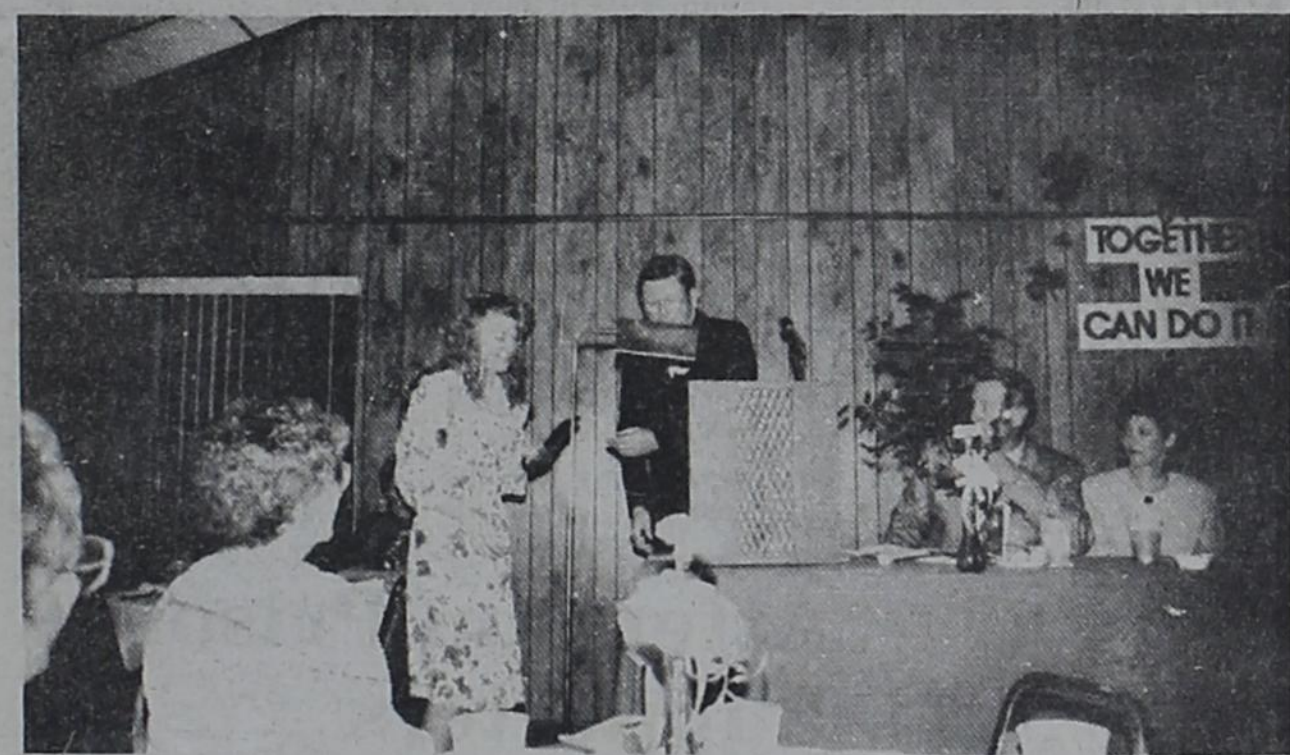

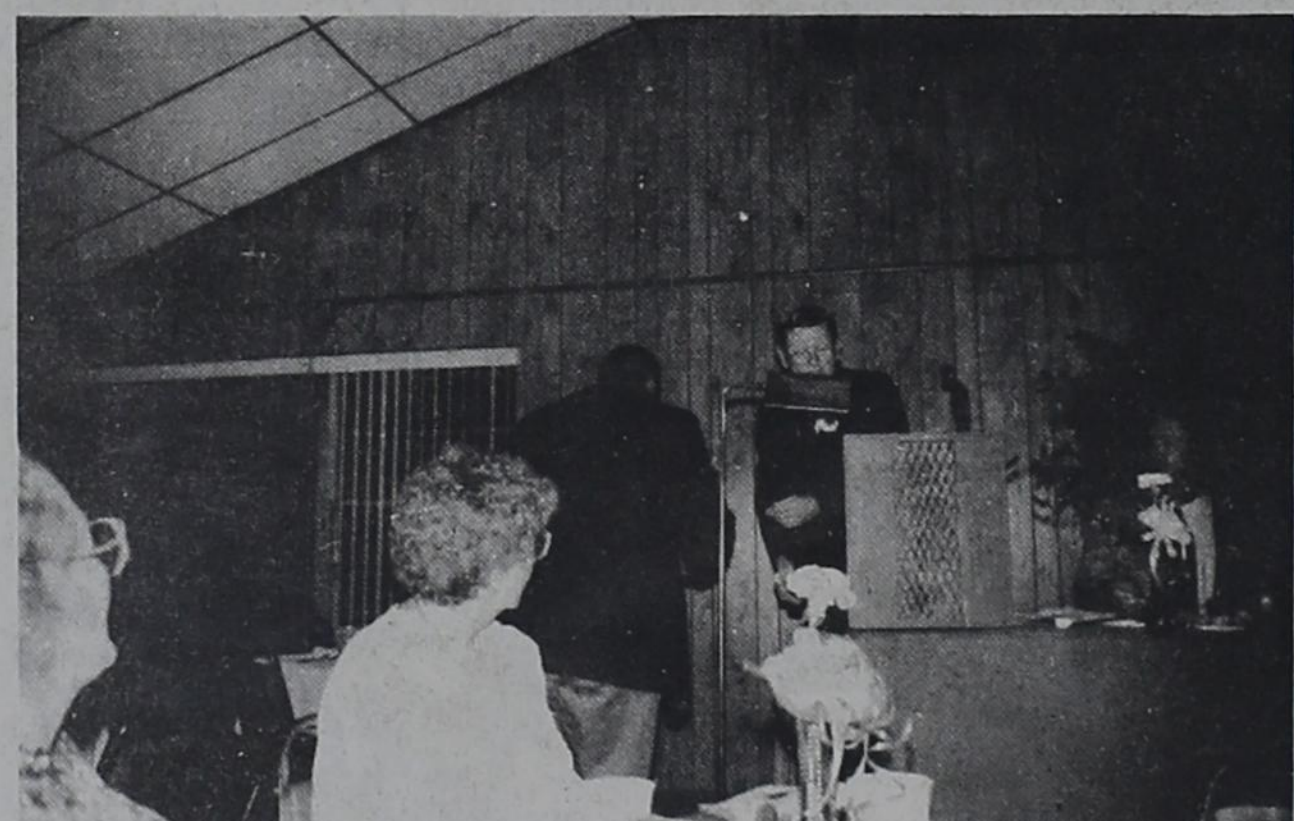

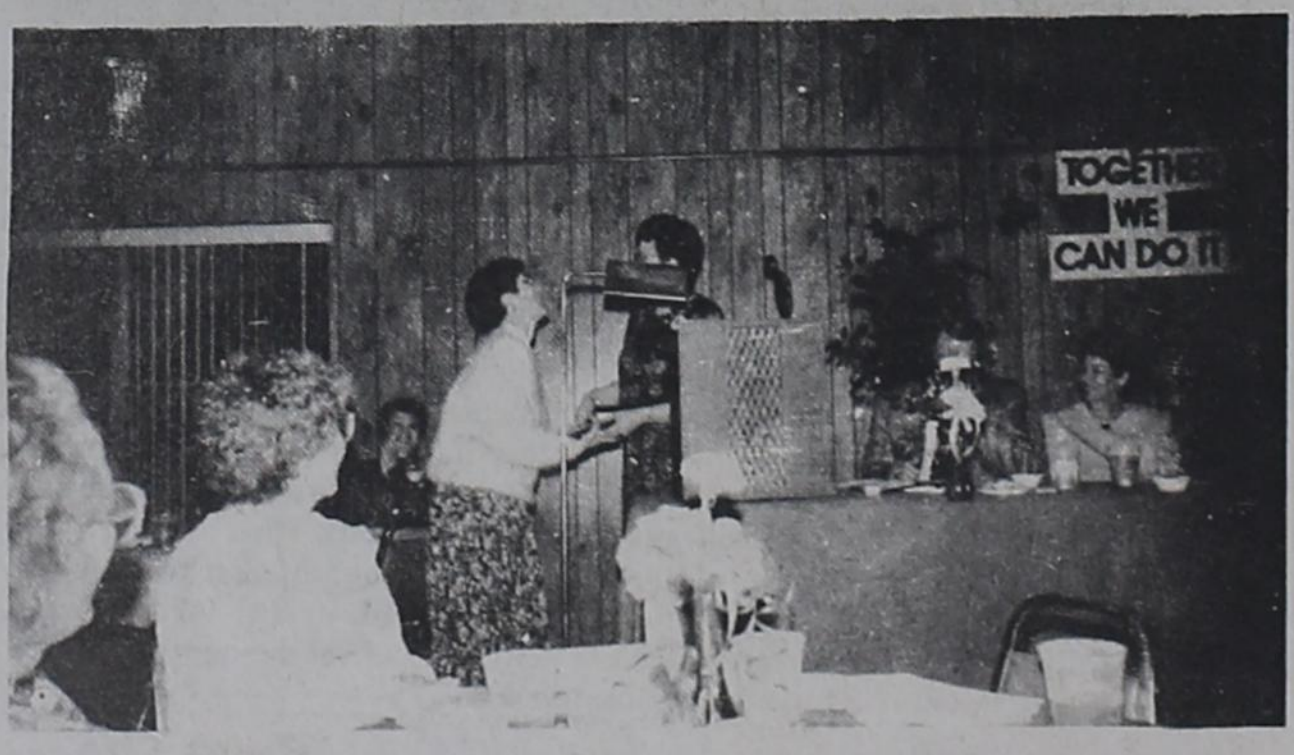

MILDEW PREVENTION
Mildew flourishes in warm, humid weather - just the kind we have been having in Texas. Mildew grows best wherever it is damp, warm, poorly aired and poorly lighted, such as in closets, bathrooms and laundry rooms.

Several things help prevent mildew growth. Provide adequate ventilation throughout the house, especially in enclosed spaces. For example, run an electric fan in places that cannot be exposed to outside air easily such as linen and storage closets.

Leave closets and dresser drawers open occasionally to allow moisture to escape. Burning a small electric light bulb in a closed closet will help dry it out. So will heating it with a small, electric heater placed on the floor of the closet. When heating the closet, be sure to follow the directions for safe operation of the heater.

Hang clothes loosely so air can circulate around them. Keep shoes and other articles on shelves, preferably perforated ones, to maintain better air circulation. Be sure things are clean and dry before putting them away.

Dry shower curtains and walls after each shower to reduce moisture in bathrooms. Leave shower curtains open to allow air to circulate in the shower or tub area. Hang wet towels to dry immediately after use or place them in the dryer on air dry to speed drying time and to vent moisture out of the house through the dryer vent.

Commercial products are available that remove moisture from the air in enclosed spaces.

Silica gel, activated alumina and calcium chloride absorb moisture from the air. Silica gel and alumina can be dried and reused once they have

absorbed as much as they can hold. Calcium chloride is converted to a liquid as it absorbs moisture and must be discarded when it is completely liquefied. These products may be available from building supply centers, variety stores, or through catalog stores.

Keeping all surfaces clean and dry will help prevent mildew, too. Washing walls, floors, tile, and other hard surfaces with a chlorine bleach solution will get rid of musty odors and prevent mold spores from growing. Use one-half cup to one cup of liquid chlorine bleach to a gallon of water. Use only on surfaces that are safe to bleach. Rinse with clear water and wipe as dry as possible. Fungicidal products also control mildew effectively.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK
14-Karat Cake

2 cups flour
4 eggs
2 t. baking powder
2 cups grated carrots
1 1/2 t. soda
8.5 ozs. crushed pineapple, drained
1 1/2 t. salt
2 t. cinnamon
1/2 cup nuts
2 cups sugar
3 1/2 ozs. coconut
1 1/2 cups oil

Sift together dry ingredients. Add oil and eggs; mix well. Add remaining 4 ingredients. Bake in 39-inch cake pans at 350 degrees F. for 35-40 minutes. Cool.

Frosting
1/2 cup margarine
1 t. vanilla
8 ozs. cream cheese
1 lb. powdered sugar
Mix margarine, cream cheese, and vanilla until smooth. Add powdered sugar. Spread on cooled cake.

Department of Archives and History in Columbia. They have not been microfilmed to date.

Clues to marriages may appear in estate papers other than wills. Evidence may be found in the form of an estate division or settlement. A husband may have signed a receipt for his wife's legacy. A widow may have married during the action on her deceased husband's estate. A legal petition of heirs to an estate may show kinships to the deceased and thus provide that long searched for maiden name.

The book is self-indexed in two sections, Men and Women. In each section the man's or woman's name is followed by the spouse, the estate file in which the reference is found and the year one or both were living. The year is usually the date of the document in which the couple is mentioned, but in a few cases the actual date of marriage was discovered. The name of the woman's father or former husband may be given as well as vital statistics for some of the individuals.

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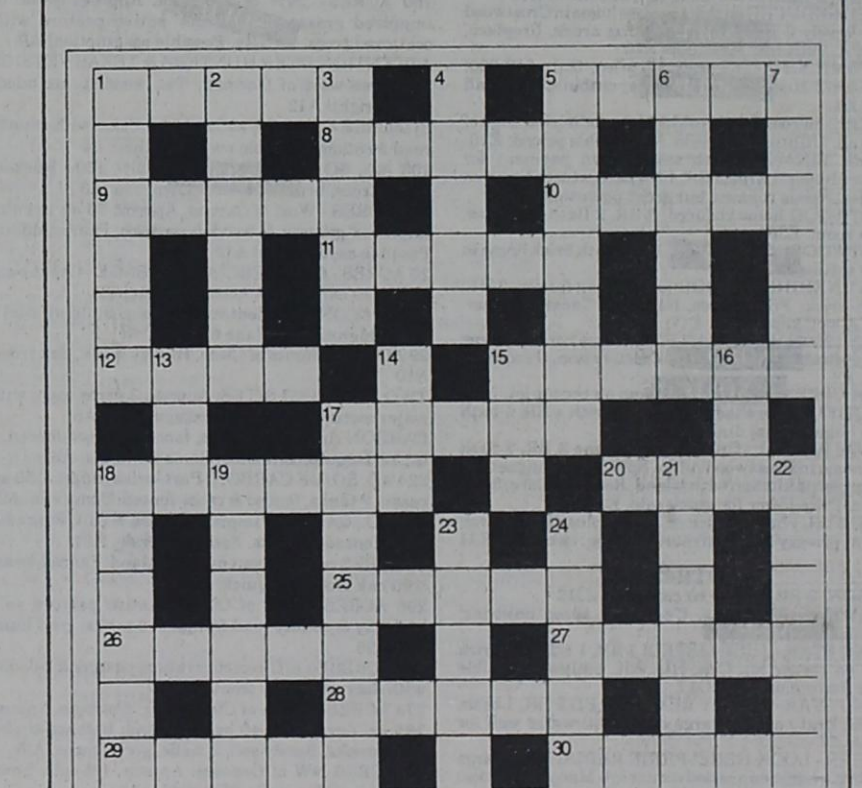

Mutual-Fund Industry Proposes Steps To Attract Foreign Investment

Here's a dilemma that recently has been keeping economists busy. The United States needs foreign investment, but as foreign investments here increase, so does foreign control of U.S. business. Is there a workable solution?

David Silver, president of the Investment Company Institute (ICI), the trade association of the mutual-fund industry, has suggested attracting foreign investment without increased foreign control of U.S. business by changing the tax treatment of foreign investors in U.S. funds.

Under current Internal Revenue Code requirements, foreign investors in U.S. mutual funds are subject to U.S. withholding tax on short-term capital gains and interest income distributed to them as dividends. On the other hand, withholding tax generally is not paid on interest income or capital gains when a foreigner invests through a foreign mutual fund.

In effect, foreign investors must pay home-country taxes on U.S. funds' income and capital gains. By investing in foreign funds, however, these home-country taxes can be delayed, or even avoided, until the fund shares are sold.

What's the answer? Silver has proposed the creation of an International Regulated Investment Company (IRIC) to be sold exclusively to foreign investors. Unlike U.S. mutual funds, IRICs would not

be required to distribute income or capital gains annually. This would allow them to build up income and gains, and thus be competitive with foreign

Kathy Heron, a spokesperson for the Investment Company Institute, explains that the proposal would have the immediate effect of eliminating taxes on mutual-fund dividends and capital gains now being collected from foreign investors. Nevertheless, it would be an economic plus in the long run because of the influx of foreign capital into domestic mutual-fund shares—without sacrificing control of U.S. business.

It is always difficult for politicians to accept anything that could reduce the income to federal coffers. On the other hand, with increased competition worldwide for investment dollars, this proposal, which could make U.S. mutual funds competitive with those of international money managers, makes sense. It could be the one small step that gives us the momentum needed to move forward.

Aspirin with caffeine was 23 to 44 percent more effective than aspirin alone for patients with sore throat due to acute tonsillitis, in a study reported in *Archives of Internal Medicine*.

The sweet smell of heliotropin, similar to vanilla, seems to relax patients so that they can more easily stay still for a magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) test, doctors found at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York.

Vitamins and minerals should be locked up, just like other drugs. Children are at risk for accidental-overdose poisonings from them.

Three ounces of oatmeal or two of oat bran a day - every day - do help cut cholesterol, when used as part of a low-fat, low-cholesterol diet, the *Journal of the American Medical Association* reports.

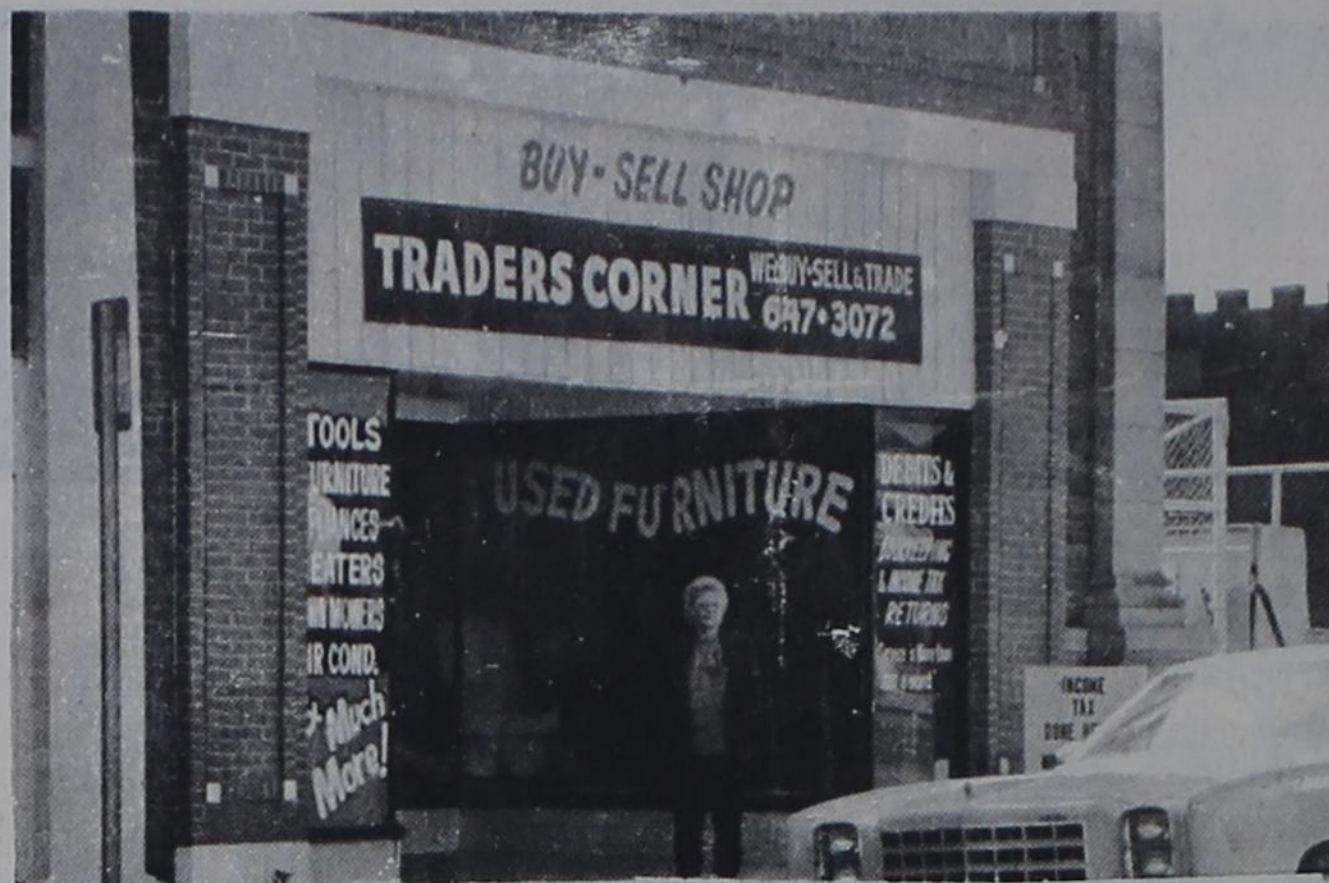

Fishing Outdoors

Driving Line
No it's not a new gimmick from New York City, it's an every day occurrence by anglers who cast and retrieve baits around the world. Basically it's guiding that spinner, crank, or other lure around through and over cover.

And thanks to the fine folks at Berkley, it's almost like running remote control baits. The quality of Berkley's line has long led the fishing industry to new horizons. While not new the XT Solar Line introduced by Berkley the past couple of years is often overlooked due to its bright fluorescent appearance in the package. Don't let it fool you, once immersed the solar

collectors close up shape and the line blends quite well even in demo tanks such as those used at boat shows and seminars.

The Freshwater Fishery Advisory Board has urged the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's inland fisheries staff to pursue a method for gathering as much information as possible from competitive fishermen who use public fresh water.

The board, during a meeting Feb. 13-14, agreed with department staff that information collected from competitive fishermen can be useful and the department should do whatever is needed to get that information.

Dennis Lee of the California Fish and Game Department, leader of a program to monitor competitive fishing in California since 1975, told the board how a permitting system has allowed that state to accumulate years of data from competitive fishing tournaments. The program has allowed Lee's department to develop a valuable database and has helped get positive information to the public concerning competitive fishing.

Tournament catch data is used in California to monitor the well-being of some California fisheries. Board members agreed that data collected from competitive fishing events in public fresh waters could be extremely valuable to resource management efforts in Texas.

"Permit systems and other data collection measures could benefit the department by giving biologists estimates of a catch-per-hour rate as

well as size and weight of fish," said Rudy Rosen, TPWD fisheries and wildlife division director. "Such information can help improve fishing by showing which management strategies work or might work best on a body of water."

A public hearing on gathering information from competitive fishermen has been scheduled for May 8 in Athens. The department wants public input on the best way to get information from competitive fishing events. Representatives from bass club organizations, professional fishing circuits and others who sponsor competitive fishing events on public fresh waters will be invited to attend.

Organizations that would like to have a representative at the public meeting should contact Phil Durocher, inland fisheries branch chief, at (512) 389-4643 or 1800-792-1112, ext. 4643.

Durocher said he hopes that these groups will agree on the best mechanism for getting their information to the department.

In other matters, the board also endorsed the department's proposed regulations changes and agreed that regulations may be needed soon for mussels. The department is reviewing alternatives for regulating the mussel industry and is preparing proposals for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission to consider.

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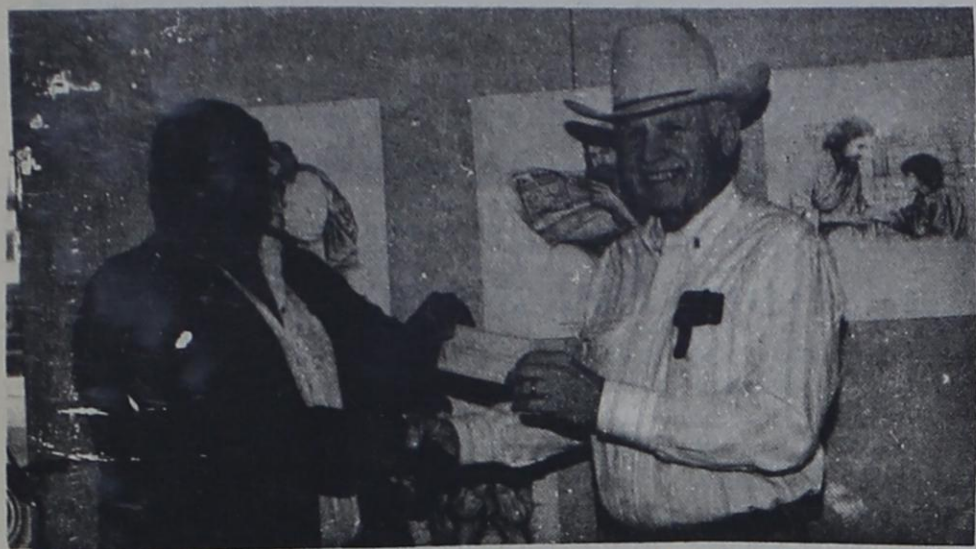
