Most families were on FDR's relief rolls...there were many who literally believed in a flat earth and the haunting presense of ghosts; if the community contained any individual who failed to believe that eternal damnation was a fair reward for the sinner, he never came forward to declare it." WOW! The headline bothers us most: "Precious Little Changed Here." Don't know whether King or Flemmons wrote that. Pox on the one who did. But rather than sermonizing on "going back on your raisin'," we'd just invite Flemmons and King to come look at us today. Things have changed.

Watson Gets Key State Board Post

Eastland Countian Richard Watson was sworn in as a member of the State Board of Education in Austin on Thursday, Nov. 12. Watson represents District 14 which includes Eastland County and 55 other counties in west and north central Texas.

The fifteen member board has four new members, three Republicans and one Democrat. The Republicans are Watson, Donna Ballard from The Woodlands, and Randy Stevenson of Tyler. The new Democrat member is Dr. Rosie Sorrels from Dallas.

Governor Bush has appointed Dr. Jack Christie (R) from Houston as Chairman. Mr. Montie Hasie (R) of Lubbock was elected by the Board as Vice-Chairman, and Mrs. Mary Helen Berlanga (D) of Corpus Christi was elected Secretary. Watson was named to serve on the Long Range Planning Committee and the Personnel Committee for the first two years of his four year term.

The Board will be dealing with many important issues in the coming months. One of the first

responsibilities of the Board will be to nominate to the Governor a successor to Lionel "Skip" Meno as Commissioner of Education. Commissioner Meno's term will expire March 1.

The Board took action on several items in their meeting last week. Among them was the rejection of an environmental science textbook that was judged by the majority of the Board to portray agriculture in a biased fashion as an enemy of the environment. One of the major issues that will be discussed by the Board in coming months is whether the Board will set a statewide policy on health education and health services in the schools.

Mrs. Norma Gabler, textbook reviewer from Longview, brought some problems to the Board's attention concerning the fifth grade history textbook standards that the Board had approved in November of 1994. Those standards stated, "The instructional materials shall include... Little Emphasis on factual recognition or retrieval." This issue will be an agenda item in the February meeting of the Board.

Prayer Vigil, Memorial Service At Courthouse

On January 21, 1973, the Supreme Court nullified all laws controlling abortion in all 50 states. Since that time, approximately 1.6 million unborn babies a year have lost their lives to abortion. In Texas each week, approximately 430 abortions are performed, many of those on minors who must have their parents' consent to have their ears pierced yet can have an abortion without anyone's knowledge or consent.

Around our nation this week, concerned people will gather in various

activities in an effort to focus attention, not on the abortionist, who only kills for profit, but on the millions of unborn children who never had a chance to live and become all God had intended them to be. In Eastland County, for the third year, an interdenominational memorial service will be held on the north steps of the court- (Cont. on Focus pg.)

Food Pantry, Other Reports At County Resources Meeting

The Eastland County Resources Association met Thursday, Jan. 12 at Eastland Memorial Library. Director Patricia Hardin led out with the discussions.

Mrs. Hardin reported that several people had offered to serve as volunteers at a Senior Day Care Center, in the event such a facility could be set up.

After some discussion, it was decided to pursue the matter of the Day Care Center. Information will be obtained from personnel working with the new center in Abilene. A survey as to local need will also be made.

Ruth Cowley, a volunteer at the Eastland County Food Pantry and Clothes Closet, brought news from that facility.

She said she wished to thank the public for responding to the need for blankets. A large amount of bedding was brought in and distributed to people who need it.

Also, Mrs. Cowley said that 31 families were given emergency food in December. Most of these families have

three members or more.

The previous Monday, Jan. 9, five families were served in one day, she said.

Mrs. Cowley reported that the Pantry was short of certain foods right now: peanut butter, canned meats, and pastas.

In the adjoining Clothes Closet, children's clothing is in short supply, she said. This type of clothing seems to be needed at all times.

The Eastland County Food Pantry and Clothes Closet is located at 204 N. Lamar in Eastland, at the trailer east of the jail. It is manned by volunteers like Mrs. Cowley, and open Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons. Donations of food and clothing are always gratefully received, and distributed to needy people who live in Eastland County.

On another project, Patricia Hardin announced that the County Resources Association would sponsor a CPR Course at Eastland High School next month. More details of this will be announced in the local newspapers.

Eastland Siebert Elementary Students Perform Well On Scores

Recently Lionel R. Meno, Texas Commissioner of Education, wrote a letter of commendation to Loys Allmand, principal of Siebert Elementary School. The letter praised the performance of Siebert Elementary children on the 1994 TAAS scores. It said, in part:

"Upon analyzing 1994 TAAS scores, I have found that Siebert Elementary met the TAAS accountability indicator at 65 percent or above...It must be noted that this is a truly commendable level of performance. I congratulate you on your accomplishment.

Your school community should be proud of their efforts to achieve excellence and equity for all students. This level did not come easily, and I encourage you to continue your hard work...The dedication and commitment of the educators at your campus has served your student well..."

When asked about the letter, Mrs. Allmand said "We were real pleased and honored to get this letter. This is something new. In the past we've not gotten a report card

Mrs. Allmand says that people are growing more conscious of TAAS scores. Sometimes she gets calls from people who are considering moving to Eastland, but want to know how the school rates before they come here and enroll children.

"We want our school to reflect our community in a positive way," she says.

Thank goodness it's Friday with Tournament Fishing Association or any other day that you can cast a bait on the water and have a chance to win \$25,000.00 for a new qualified lake record largemouth bass.

For a charter membership fee of \$25.00 every individual, eighteen years or older, may join TFA for a twelve month period. If any paid and active member should catch an eligible Lake

Record largemouth bass which exceeds the existing record on any eligible Texas public lake or reservoir, that member will win \$25,000.00 from TFA.

There are a few special conditions that apply:

sporting manner for example: rod, reel, pole line and only artificial baits are eligible.

7. All federal, state, and local laws must be observed.

8. TFA offers a thirty-day money back guarantee if you are not fully satisfied.

9. You must be 18 years or older.

writer - handy knowledge to have if you are going to discuss the work of others.

Born near New York City, Roger Walton Jones was educated in the east, midwest and Texas. Now an Instructor of English at Ranger College, he lives in Eastland.

"Living here while revising the book gave me a feel for the rural area of Texas," he says.

"Larry McMurtry and the Victorian Novel" is based on a dissertation Jones wrote for his PhD. in English at Texas A & M University in 1989. His specialty is modern American and British Victorian literature.

The material in the dissertation was revised somewhat for style, Jones says. Also McMurtry, by correspondence, granted permission for the inclusion of some unpublished letters and a short story. This adds to the interest of the book.

The volume came off the Press at Texas A & M University on December 26, 1994. It is a handsome publication, 94 pages, with an attractive bronze cover.

In his study of McMurtry's work Jones examines his lifelong interest in Victorian authors and their influence on his novels. Once this comparison is outlined, it

becomes so obvious that the reader wonders why someone hasn't thought of this idea before!

Out of Jones' condensation emerges a portrait of the illusive writer McMurtry as much as his work. For McMurtry's ranch background, his early years in Archer County, his education and travels and fame are all colored by his world-view.

Much of his life has included efforts to either escape Archer County or return to it. But whether he lives in the southwest or some undisclosed spot, McMurtry's material has an inescapable grounding in North Texas.

Yet there are subliminal hints - deeper concepts reaching back to the British Isles and the grand manner of epics. These themes place McMurtry in a totally different class from most western writers, Jones indicates.

The recurring themes include the conflict between civilization and nature, and the search for transcendence.

In his study Jones deals particularly with McMurtry's "The Last Picture Show" and "Lonesome Dove."

Early works, such as the Picture Show novel, were glimpses of rural people and small towns caught in the post WW II agricultural revolution. McMurtry held no gentle candle to illumine the all-too-obvious "Thalia." The locale was hit with some high-voltage stabs.

In "The Lonesome Dove" McMurtry re-

treated to a not-too-distant past inhabited with characters who have out-run civilization - and are generally glad of it.

McMurtry's vivid descriptions of terrain, weather, plants, animals and southwestern people are things he could not have learned in journalism classes. They come only from an intimate knowledge of the land and those who live on it.

Jones displays a number of interesting excerpts of McMurtry's work, including some of his swats at "organized religion," social mores and anything else which runs afoul of an unconventional spirit.

There seem to be only a few things which McMurtry actually admires - honesty, courage, and the ability to endure, dream and hope.

Always known as something of a "loner," Larry McMurtry was set apart early by his birth to landed ranchers, by his intellectual bent, and then his education.

But once educated and admired for his writing, the Archer County native did not feel a part of that world either. Even as early as McMurtry's College days he looked on success with suspicion and a sense of loss.

In a previously unpublished letter, dated Dec. 3, 1955 he wrote: "I'm more of a social agnostic than anything, because I despise social or intellectual elite to such a terrifying degree. I want no part of that kind of brains or that kind of money. As


Ranger Author Explores Themes Used By McMurtry

Growing Up On Country Weekly Newspaper

(ED. NOTE: This article by the son of an Eastland County Pioneer Newspaper man came to us by way of another area news pioneer, Jack Scott of Cross Plains. Sellers wrote the piece for the American Printing History Society, and it says so much about the early days of newspapering and closeness of those in the trade in those days. The names of Jack Scott and Wayne Sellers are legendary in Texas newspaper circles. They were very friendly competitors.)

M.S. (Doc) Sellers, my father, was publisher of two West Texas weekly newspapers during his career. He started work as a printer's devil on the Brady Sentinel, ulti-

mately saving \$300.00 to buy out his employer. This was in 1911. Dad had started his career a few years earlier with money he had saved working on the farm so he could pay his room and board in town and learn the trade.

In 1924, after he and my mother were married and my sister and I had come into the world, we moved to Rising Star where he purchased the Record.

Dad was well known and respected in newspaper circles. To him his work was more than a career; it was a calling.

With this background, I had no choice. I had to be a newspaperman. But to be a newspaperman, I first had to be a printer. Dad had definite ideas about this and the way a "devil" should embark on his

training program.

Although Dad had a Linotype machine, he had kept a type stand with a case of worn-out 12 pt. Century. "You have to learn your cases before you can do anything else," Dad would say as I pegged away at the 12 pt.

I learned the meaning of "upper case." Capital letters are in the upper case on the right side. On the left side are the small capitals.

Dad would tell us how he would stand at the case all day long, setting 10 pt. for the Sentinel. On a good day, he could set six galleys, starting to work at 7 a.m. and quitting at 6 p.m. On some nights, he and others would go back to work, sticking candles in the upper cases for light as they reached for the individual pieces of type.

When the type was all set, and the pages made up, the paper was printed on a George Washington hand press which could do 400 pages an hour with hard work.

After the paper was out, all the type had to be "thrown in," one letter at a time, back in the cases.

Even though he didn't graduate from high school, Dad was a crack

speller. He would turn over in his grave if he could see how words are divided these days.

I didn't enjoy working in the yard with my mother, so when I was 10 I started out with dad. I stood on a box to feed the 10 x 15 Chandler & Price job press. When Dad told me there were presses which fed the paper automatically, my response was that it was impossible.

Through high school, I didn't take my work too seriously until one Sunday afternoon Dad said, "Let's go down to the office for a talk." This was in 1932 in the depths of the depression. He showed me the financial condition he was in and asked me if I could arrange to get out of school at noon and be his Linotype operator. This was when I really learned to get type out of the high base Model 8 with three magazines. Eight point Century with 9 pt. Clarendon bold, 14 pt. Century light and bold, and 24 pt. Cheltenham light.

When we went out of town on a trip, we always stopped at the newspaper in any town which had one. In one shop I was

fascinated with the operator who was able to keep the machine turning as each line had to wait its turn. It was then when I learned the meaning of "hanging" the machine.

I became a "macho" operator who could "hang" the machine, who didn't raise the assembling elevator with the handle on his right and who lifted it up with his left hand. Just at the top of the keyboard on the right, I parked a cigarette, just like the "swifts."

Dad had said if I mastered the Linotype I could find a job to go to college, and if I would stay with him one year after high school, he would help me. He was as good as his word, so the Linotype machine saw me through four undergraduate years and one graduate year.

Dad could set by hand about half a galley an hour. I thought I was a pretty hot operator, and I could do two galleys an hour. Modern day computerized systems can do two galleys a minute.

Progress marches on, but duplication of the smell of Black Diamond ink on newsprint, and the aroma of Lava soap and dirty towels can never again be achieved.

Growing a patient's own cartilage cells in a test tube and then injecting the tissue into a knee or other damaged joint is getting promising results in tests in Sweden. Further studies are planned.

Researchers at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston have noted a link between megadoses of zinc and the formation of plaque on brain cells that is associated with Alzheimer's disease.

Scientists at Johns Hopkins University are studying the use of testosterone supplements for older men. Someday they may be as common as estrogen for women to reverse the effects of aging, doctors say.

"Candies" laced with hot pepper helped reduce pain in a number of patients with mouth sores caused by chemotherapy or radiation. Yale Cancer Center doctors plan a larger-scale test soon.

Coating ear tubes with silver oxide seems to reduce further ear infections in at-risk children, a study at the University of California/Davis found. The coating seems to act as a disinfectant.





Gray Matter

Talking about the Catholic Church building in the Southwest part of town in the residential section of our city, I will have to explain what little I know of their organization as it affected Eastland. The local church here has always had a deep relationship with the Ranger church. Actually pastor of the Ranger church as also the pastor of the Eastland church.

The Ranger Church had a parish or parochial school which I think taught through high school, which at that time was through the 11th grade. The school had its own bus that came to Eastland and picked up students from here who were students of that school. I don't really know if it went on over to Cisco and collected students there or not. But I do remember that my good friend John Leary, who lived in the same neighborhood as I did, went to school there at least part of his school years. John's father was an official with the Prairie Oil and Gas and lived in the company house that was the middle three of the houses it furnished for employees on South Seaman Street. That would be right next door north of the O'Brien place. The house was moved out years ago and now stands on the road north of Morton Valley just this side of the Stephens County line.

John was with me in the first grade in South Ward, that's the school that sat for years on the side of the Anderson home in 1100 block of Seaman Street. John came to our '85 homecoming. He was retired from Atlantic Richfield and living in Arlington. For some reason I did not know when he died and only found out about it when I mailed out a lot of homecoming material to my classmates for

the '90th homecoming. Another denomination just outside the business section of town is the Presbyterian. Their denomination is related to the John Knox revival that swept over Switzerland and Scotland in past years. The church of England is the official church of governmental functions for England and the monarch of England is the head of that church, or she as it now is, is not the head of the Church of Scotland. There it is the Presbyterian Church and just about everybody in Scotland is a member. However there must be some Anglicans in Scotland too. Several weeks ago I was listening to Diane Bish, I think her name is, the great organist who goes all over the world to perform on the Faith and Value Channel on the pipe organ.

On this occasion she was performing at the Episcopalian Cathedral in Edinburgh, Scotland. That announcement got me. I did not know that there was an Episcopalian, (which is just another name for the Church of England) Cathedral in all of Scotland. The local Episcopal church is on South Seaman. This building was a chapel at Camp Bowie (Brownwood) during the war. The pre-war local Episcopal Church was a much smaller building facing Green Street just off Hill Street.

The last time I had a talk with a minister of this church I think he told me this was not a self-supporting church but was classified as a mission and received outside help from the general organization.

For a couple of years or so there was a man we called Father Flagg, who was a retired Episcopalian minister. He was a former missionary to Liberia, on west coast of Africa, and a very interesting man to talk to.

I don't know much about the Pentecostal Church that occupies the old site the Christian Science Church so I will let my ignorance of that church speak itself by remaining silent.

There is a Baptist Church in the northeast part of town a couple of blocks north of Main Street. I don't think it is a member of the Southern Baptist Convention.

That is something the Baptists are good at. Some of them are conventional and some of them are not, but I don't guess it makes any difference to God.

The Baptists are probably the best of the denominations in disagreeing with themselves and their little

family arguments sometimes split a church right down the middle. I remember hearing a leading Baptist minister one time tell how why there were so many Baptist churches in the world. He said that when they split a church, it started growing and pretty soon it was larger than the church that did the splitting. I have never completely understood this line of reason, but makes a good story anyway.

I don't think there was a split involved here but the larger of the smaller churches of the Baptist here was the one on West Main seems to be the Bethel Baptist Church. It has grown by leaps and bounds and although a very young church itself, it now has built a new auditorium. We Methodists seem to want to use word "sanctuary" instead of the more common word for the chief assembly of church.

And I notice that one of its first pastors here as a very young minister, is now the pastor of, I think I am right on this, the First Baptist Church in Richmond Virginia, which is no small pickens of a church.





Texas Legislature

The Texas Legislature convened at 12:00 noon on Tuesday, January 10, with both Houses meeting in the newly restored State Capitol.

The first order of business was the swearing-in ceremony of the 31 newly elected senators by Chief Justice Tom Phillips of the Texas Supreme Court. New members of the Senate are David Cain of Dallas, Mario Gallegos of Houston, Michael Galloway of The Woodlands, Tom Haywood of Wichita Falls, and Drew Nixon of Carthage.

Austin State Senator Gonzalo Barrientos was elected president pro tempore of the Senate for the 74th regular session.

Senator Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi was of-

ficially named Dean of the Texas Senate. Senator Truan, Hispanic, has served in the Texas Senate since 1977, and spent 8 years in the Texas House prior to his election to the Senate.

The Senate drew lots to determine who would have 2-year and 4-year terms. Each decade after the federal census, Senate, House, and Congressional districts are redrawn to reflect population migration. The original Senate redistricting plan was challenged in the court system, and a federal court-ordered plan was used for the 1992 election.

Since that time, dis-

tricts established in a special session in January, 1992 were upheld in federal court and all 31 district elections were held again in 1994. Senators drawing 4-year terms are: Armbrister, Bivins, Brown, Ellis, Gallegos, Galloway, Haywood, Leedom, Madla, Montford, Patterson, Ratliff, Sibley, Truan, Turner and West. Members receiving 2-year terms are: Barrientos, Cain, Harris, Henderson, Lucio, Luna, Moncrief, Nelson, Nixon, Ross, Shapiro, Sims, Wentworth, Whitmire and Zaffirini.

Senator John Whitmire of Houston filed emergency legislation on Wednesday to address problems with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission's mandatory vehicle testing program. Complaints include location of the facilities and cost of compliance. The emergency leg-

islation suspends the program for 90 days from the date of passage. This stop-gap measure provides immediate relief to car owners scheduled for January renewal. Thirty senators signed on to co-sponsor the bill. Whitmire supports a two-year suspension of the program. The legislation, Senate Bill 19, was referred to the Senate Natural Resources Committee on Wednesday. The bill was heard in committee at 4 p.m. Wednesday, and was passed favorably by a vote of 9-0. Senate Bill 19 is expected to be debated next week.

Other news on Wednesday included an announcement by Lieutenant Governor Bob Bullock and Senator David Sibley of Waco that several pieces of legislation have been filed to address the civil justice system. Six bills were filed, including an omnibus bill containing the major components of tort reform.

First Flight is sponsored by Hendrick Medical Center of Abilene, and serves communities within a 120-mile radius of the hospital.



Learn To Grow A Better Tomato

What do tomato gardeners like better than anything? Besting their fellow gardeners!

Texas Agricultural Extension horticulturist William D. Adams knows this and has developed a program to help tomato gardeners improve their skills. Team Tomato is an intensive day-long program designed to prepare tomato enthusiasts with even greater potential to grow quality tomatoes.

ALR Is Widely Supported In Texas And Throughout The United States

A 1992 Texas Poll results revealed that: 68.6 percent of Texans favor ALR for drivers who refuse to take a test to determine their blood alcohol concentration level; 73 percent favor ALR for drivers who fail such a test.

A December 1990 Harris Poll revealed that 89 percent of American adults support ALR for drunk drivers.

How Does ALR Work

ALR is a civil remedy separate from a criminal proceeding. A drunk driver may also face charges in criminal court. Here is how the new law will work in Texas:

* A law enforcement officer determines that there is reasonable suspicion for the stop and probable cause for the arrest of a motorist for drunk driving.

* If the officer has reason to believe that the driver is impaired, a set of field sobriety tests is administered. If the driver performs poorly, the driver is arrested for DWI and is taken to the police station.

* Once there, the driver is asked to take a chemical test to measure his blood alcohol concentration (BAC) level. This is usually a breath test.

* The officer serves the offender with a notice that his driver's license will be suspended if the offender refuses to take the test or fails it (registering a .10 BAC or greater).

* The offender has 15 days from the date the notice of suspension is received to request a hearing. If no hearing is requested, the suspension goes into effect on the 40th day after no-

tice was served (which is usually 40 days after arrest).

* The driver pays a fee of \$100 to reinstate the suspended license after the period of suspension.

If the Offender Requests a Hearing

* The hearing is conducted within 75 miles of the county seat of the county of arrest; or in counties with over 300,000 people, the hearing is held in the county of arrest. The hearing may be conducted by telephone if both parties agree.

* If the offender fails the BAC test, a State Office of Administrative Hearings administrative law judge conducts a hearing to determine

whether the driver was operating a motor vehicle with an alcohol level at or above the legal limit, and whether there was reasonable suspicion to stop and probable cause to arrest the person. If the judge makes this determination, the license will be suspended. DPS has the burden of proof by a preponderance of the evidence.

* If the offender refuses the BAC test, the judge determines whether there was reasonable suspicion to stop the driver, whether there was probable cause to believe the person was driving a motor vehicle while intoxicated, and whether the person was given an opportunity to give a specimen, and the person refused to give the specimen DPS has the burden of proof by a preponderance of the

evidence.
* The offender's license is suspended for failing the BAC test for:

* 60 days, if a first offender;

* 120 days, if previously suspended for failing or refusing the test;

* 180 days, if previously suspended for DWI or intoxicated manslaughter conviction.

* The offender's license is suspended for refusing the BAC test for:

* 90 days, if a first offender;

* 180 days, if previously suspended for failing or refusing the test;

* One year, if previously suspended for a DWI or intoxication manslaughter conviction.

Notice Of Reward \$250

The U.S. Postal Service offers a reward of up to \$250 for information and services leading to the arrest and conviction of any person involved in mailbox vandalism.

Fort Worth, TX-The Postal Inspection Service is offering a reward of up to \$250.00 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for mail box vandalism occurring in and around Ranger, Texas. Rural area mailboxes are vulnerable to vandalism because they are usually isolated, located on public thoroughfares, and frequently not visible to the box owners from their homes. The residents of Ranger have been the target of recent vandalism in the form of mailbox bashing and destruction of delivered mail. Mailboxes are considered federal domain. Federal Law, (Title 18, United States Code, Section 1705), makes it a crime to vandalize, injure, deface, or destroy the mailboxes and any mail deposited in them. Violators can be fined up to \$1,000 or imprisoned for up to three years for each act of vandalism.

If you have information on mailbox vandalism or mail theft in your area, contact the United States Postal

Inspection Service. Your cooperation helps apprehend violators.
