

### County Commissioners: Lengthy Agenda, Number Of Decisions

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Eastland County Commissioners Monday had one of the longest agendas on record - 25 items. But they managed to get through them before the end of the day.

One of the major discussions revolved around jail overcrowding and different ways of eliminating the problem. The current report showed 33 prisoners in the facility, which was built for a capacity of 24 prisoners.

Pct. 4 Commissioner Reggie Pittman said that the jail had been running 152 percent of capacity for several years now. He passed around copies of the latest letter from the State Jail Commission, in which Jack E. Crump, Executive Director, inquired as to what measures the county planned to take to correct the prob-

At the last State Jail inspection on January 5, 1994, the facility had been "conditionally certified."

County Judge Scott Bailey told the Court, "When we built the jail (in 1980) no one could have foreseen what drugs would to to our nation, state and community."

Another part of the problem, several Commissioners observed, is a backlog of inmates who are already sentenced to the State Prison, but who haven't been carried to Huntsville because the facility there is over-

crowded too. Sheriff Ronnie White said that the State paid the County \$20 per day per inmate to keep this backlog of prisoners, but that the cost to the County is \$30 per day. It would

cost Eastland County \$45 per day to house extra prisoners in other counties, White remarked.

The Sheriff outlined several ways the county could deal with the overcrowding: Build a new jail, add on to the present jail, or pay the cost of putting inmates in other counties.

He said it would cost approximately 3.1 million to build a new jail at or below a 48-bed capacity.

It would cost \$300,000-\$400,000 to add on the jail, doubling the 24-bed capacity to 48 beds. This plan wouldn't call for additional jailers, he said.

Pct. Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth asked the Sheriff about five people who had been kept in jail 90 days without

Sheriff White replied that he didn't know when those would be tried - he did not decide when people came to trial.

"There's quite a backlog of cases at the District Attorney's office," he said. County Clerk JoAnn Johnson said that the County Court was very active - 57 cases went through that Court last month.

The Commissioners expressed hope that the backlog of cases would be able to move through the Court system soon.

The Sheriff was asked if the new State Jails would help on local overcrowding.

Sheriff White replied that he didn't see how that would provide more space - that the closest State Jail might be in Gatesville.

hope that the local crime rate would go down either.

The Commissioners voted to table any decision on jail expansion until after the next inspection by the State Jail Standards Commission. Sheriff White said he was looking for this inspection "any day now".

The Commissioners also discussed Courthouse Security. They voted to go ahead with the State Security for the Courthouse as presented by Sheriff White.

This plan will include a metal detector on the third floor, keyed access to the 11th Court of Appeals, telephones and a full-time security guard.

The 11th Court of Appeals will share grant money for the system. Certain fees collected by the County and District Clerk's offices will also help pay for equipment and personnel.

Ir other matters, the Commissioners heard a proposal from Steve Evans, Sales Representative of West Texas Equipment Co., Abilene, for the lease-purchase of new road graders.

Evans said the Commissioners could make monthly payments, with a "balloon" payment at the end of the contract if they decided they wanted to own the equipment. Total cost of the graders would run from \$98,000 to \$118,000 each, less trade-

Radio communications system for all of Eastland County was discussed, and will be taken into consideration. Commissioner Ains-

worth expressed concern about the number of electrical conduits running around the Courthouse, including the outside.

"The work we're getting done is not the best way of doing things - boring holes in the Courthouse," he said.

The Commissioners agreed on more uniformity and planning on electrical conduits around the building.

On another meeting, the Commissioners considered the legality of regulating the installation of underground cables on County roads.

Judge Bailey said that the Attorney General had ruled that the States has the County roads - the County uses them. Utility companies evidentially don't have to get prior permission from the County before installing


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
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

We went through Saint - Vith in the last of January, or we tried. The town was completely destroyed. We could not get down the treet for the knocked out tann and the debris.

The buildings were leveled and had the streets blocked. We had to go around the town. The ground was frozen and we could go anywhere we wanted to.

The British had run the Germans out in September, then the Germans came back through, and closed the British out in December. We, the 3rd Army, went north from the south feank, and chased the Germans out in January.

So in a matter of four months, the town of St. Vith had been the site of much fighting and destruction of property and loss of life.

The town of St. Vith was the most destroyed town I saw in Europe.

We went on north into Holland and then came back through St. Vith in early February. The Army engineers had cleared the streets enough for us to get through town.

I did not see a building

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diers to this day, fifty standing. The town was totally destroyed.

The Bulge was over on the 29th of January and we started a push to the east. There was still a lot

of war to be fought. On January 31, 1945, the U.S. Army executed a soldier by the name of Pvt. Eddie Slavac, by firing squad. The first soldier to be shot by a firing squad since the Civil War.

The crime Slovac committed was to throw down his rifle, and say, "I will fight no more."

For this the army tied Slovac to a post and shot him. He was buried along with about 90 American soldiers hanged for other crimes. Slovacs body was exhumed sometime in the 1980's and buried in his home town of Detroit, along side of his wife.

His wife had tried to get his body back home, but died before she could get it home.

Now we come to the Victor Cornelius building. My first recollection of this building was that it was the L. B. Wright Furniture Company, a firm that offered two floors of furniture bargains. After the Wright people moved out this building stood vacant for several years. I don't know who owned this building at this time but it was used as a sort of civic center. There were various

social activities here and I remember one

time a group of us high school kids from the band had been invited to some sort of an activity there. Of course we were to furnish music for this occasion and it seemed to be getting behind schedule. One of the people responsible for our being there came by to see how we were getting along and by way of conversation asked if we were getting hungry. I never will forget the answer a member our group named Claude Myers gave him. He said, "I am so hungry that I could eat salted horsec-

Sometime after this a Mickie family came to our city. Mr. Mickle had a hardware store in this building for years. He was a rather religious man and had a door, "Absolutely no NAPA store. Squires

business transacted here on Sunday." Later some wag placed a typewritten sign on this one saying, "And very damned little during the rest of the week." As soon as Mr. Mickle saw this second sign he took it down. The Mickle family seemed to have a strong

religious leaning. Mr. Mickle had a son who was a missionary to Japan before the war.

I remember in the fall of 1941 a few weeks before Pearl Harbor I went to church at our local Methodist Church when the speaker was Mr. Mickle's missionary son, then home from Japan. He was a missionary of a different type. He was not a minister; he was, believe it or not, a certified public accountant.

I have read history of the accounting profession published by the State Board of Public Accounting and it mentions in this book that CPA's sometimes operate in strange manner. It mentioned that one of its group was a missionary to Japan. That was our Mr. Mickle.

After he came back from Japan Mr. Mickle went in as president of Centenary College at Shreveport. This is a Methodist school and I think Mr. Mickle retired from that institution as president.

In the meantime while all of this was going on Victor Cornelius was growing like a weed. He bought this building and it is still in operation.

Immediately east of Victor's place where an auto service place is now was the post office. At the time the post of fice was there the building extended all of the way to the sidewalk. And to the east of it was first a drug store operated by Bob Murray. And to the east of it Mr. Parker, Pete and Don's father, had a grocery

It was part of my family chores then to ride my bicycle down town to get the Star-Telegram. I remember I used to get it from the stack in front of Mr. Parker's grocery store. One morning during deer hunting season l remember opening up the front page of the paper and read that Marshall Ratliff had been lynched outside of the Eastland County jail. That was the first I had heard of it.

East of Parker's store was a garage with a service station front small sign on his front end. This is not the

CONSIDER THIS: a reliable source tells us that we can expect to soon learn about state legislation that would, if approved, give local option decision for concealed weapon laws. It'd work somewhat like the local option choices on alcoholic beverages, etc. It's expected to become law.

IT MAKES you wonder: The Texas Senate passed two bils -- SB4 repays the Dept. of Criminal Justice \$236.4 million that was spent last spring to expand the capacity of the prison sys-The money allowed the state to build 15,000 new cells and expand the Dallas county State Jail project The expansions were necessary to re lieve overcrowding in county jails. The repayment will come from General Obligation Bonds authorized for prison construction and approved by voters in 1993. Senate Bill3 rescinds a '93 law calling for the state to defer until upcoming fiscal year \$795.3 mil lion in payments to state universit ies, public schools and state retire ment systems. Of that total, \$772 million in general revenue dollars while the remaining \$23.8 million comes from other sources. Under the old law, state government would have put off paying the August '95 bills until Sept., shifting payments from one biennium to another. Because Texas will end the current biennium with an estimated \$3 billion dollar surplus the State Voted to rescind the deferrals and make the payments on schedule this year. Hope the surplus holds.

IN RESPONSE to a recent letter writing effort to public officials regarding a matter of great concern, the replies came in this order: U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm (Washington, D.C. 20510-4302); Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Austin, TX 78711-2068); State Rep. John Cook (Austin, TX 78768-2910); President Bill Clinton, who wrote, "I welcome your input and will keep your views in mind," among other things. Rep. Cook said: "I will definitely take your concerns into consideration ... " and thanked us for contacting his

office. Lt. Gov. Bullock was aware, from his letter, that we had written earlier about the same subject, so you understand that he's staying on top of things for the citizens. And

he added, "...welcome your input." Sen. Gramm said, "I appreciate having the benefit of your comments on this matter," " I will continue to monitor this situation," and "Thank you for taking the time to contact me."

Point? They or somebody in their offices read our letters. Positive action? It remains to be seen. But if they don't hear from us, they (1), may not know what we want and/or (2) think we don't care what they're doing. They need to be reminded, we think, that the citizens are watching what's going on and having a say in our representative form of government.

BEWARE: "ENDORSEMENT of this check switches your long distance service to AT&T." That's the small print warning on checks in the amount of \$25. being mailed to businesses by AT&T, in the national slug-fest to gain long distance telephone business. It's a dog-fight over the valued business. We are with an independent that costs us 18 cents a minute. We hear of one only charging 14 cents a minute. When you shop, make sure you get billed on a fractional-second basis. What are you paying per minute? More, less?

STAFF WATER system should be able to start making additioinal meters available judging from information from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission which suggests that "moratorium can now be lifted." Understand that the contract stand-off between Staff and City of Eastland is over the .6 gal per minute-per-meter guarantee. That figure, an outside maximum requirement, and very rarely ever necessary, we're told, is a fact when the Water District Pumps are running, so maybe progress's coming.



Speakers and topics include:



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
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
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
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### The Uniqueness Of **Our Inauguration**

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


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
