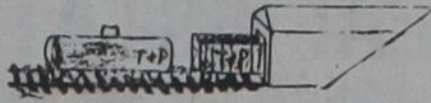

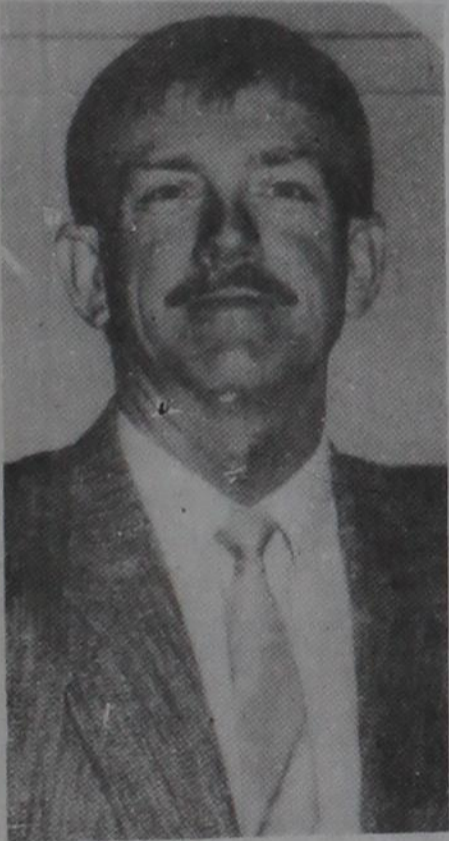
She reported that the necessary paperwork for the restoration of the Connellee has been submitted to the necessary agencies in Austin. Many others have applied for some of the same funds, but Sally believes that Eastland stands an excellent chance for approval; because it meets

The Connellee renovation should provide apartments for lower and middle income seniors, restore a landmark of our area and provide some much needed business space on the lower floor. The top floor should be a community center or meeting area for local and area organizations.

The survey will probably be completed in March of 1995 and Eastland should then know if this renovation will proceed. If approved, construction and cleanup should begin by fall.

Coach Ronnie Hearne Earns 500th Win

The Lady Wranglers win over Southwest Christian last Saturday landed Coach Ronnie Hearne his 500th career win coaching girls basketball.

Before Coach Hearne came to CJC, he coached high school girls in Millsap for four years and Jacksboro for six years. During those ten years he tallied 240 victories. His last team at Jacksboro held a 30-3 record and

went to the Regional Tournament. Since coming to CJC, Hearne's Lady Wranglers have won three conference championships, advanced to the Regional Tournament every year, and racked up a grand total of 260 wins to date.

Coach Hearne has added coaching the CJC mens team to his duties this year after stepping in the second semester last year for Coach Doug Galyean, who left for an administrative position. He coached boys earlier in his career at Millsap High School and took three teams to the playoffs in four years. A total of 106 victories are a credit to Hearne's career coaching both college and high school boys.

Coach Hearne is looking forward to adding wins to both men and women career totals as CJC's conference schedule has yet to reach the half-way point. He had high hopes for both teams to advance to the Regional Tournament.

County Commissioners: Lengthy Agenda, Number Of Decisions

Eastland County Commissioners Monday had one of the longest agendas on record - 25 items. But they managed to get through them before the end of the day.

One of the major discussions revolved around jail overcrowding and different ways of eliminating the problem. The current report showed 33 prisoners in the facility, which was built for a capacity of 24 prisoners.

Pct. 4 Commissioner Reggie Pittman said that the jail had been running 152 percent of capacity for several years now. He passed around copies of the latest letter from the State Jail Commission, in which Jack E. Crump, Executive Director, inquired as to what measures the county planned to take to correct the problem.

At the last State Jail inspection on January 5, 1994, the facility had been "conditionally certified."

County Judge Scott Bailey told the Court, "When we built the jail (in 1980) no one could have foreseen what drugs would do to our nation, state and community."

Another part of the problem, several Commissioners observed, is a backlog of inmates who are already sentenced to the State Prison, but who haven't been carried to Huntsville because the facility there is overcrowded too.

Sheriff Ronnie White said that the State paid the County \$20 per day per inmate to keep this backlog of prisoners, but that the cost to the County is \$30 per day. It would

cost Eastland County \$45 per day to house extra prisoners in other counties, White remarked.

The Sheriff outlined several ways the county could deal with the overcrowding: Build a new jail, add on to the present jail, or pay the cost of putting inmates in other counties.

He said it would cost approximately 3.1 million to build a new jail at or below a 48-bed capacity. It would cost \$300,000-\$400,000 to add on to the jail, doubling the 24-bed capacity to 48 beds. This plan wouldn't call for additional jailers, he said.

Pct. Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth asked the Sheriff about five people who had been kept in jail 90 days without trials.

Sheriff White replied that he didn't know when those would be tried - he didn't decide when people came to trial.

"There's quite a backlog of cases at the District Attorney's office," he said. County Clerk JoAnn Johnson said that the County Court was very active - 57 cases went through that Court last month.

The Commissioners expressed hope that the backlog of cases would be able to move through the Court system soon.

The Sheriff was asked if the new State Jails would help on local overcrowding.

Sheriff White replied that he didn't see how that would provide more space - that the closest State Jail might be in Gatesville.

The Sheriff didn't appear to hold out much

hope that the local crime rate would go down either.

The Commissioners voted to table any decision on jail expansion until after the next inspection by the State Jail Standards Commission. Sheriff White said he was looking for this inspection "any day now".

The Commissioners also discussed Courthouse Security. They voted to go ahead with the State Security for the Courthouse as presented by Sheriff White.

This plan will include a metal detector on the third floor, keyed access to the 11th Court of Appeals, telephones and a full-time security guard.

The 11th Court of Appeals will share grant money for the system. Certain fees collected by the County and District Clerk's offices will also help pay for equipment and personnel.

In other matters, the Commissioners heard a proposal from Steve Evans, Sales Representative of West Texas Equipment Co., Abilene, for the lease-purchase of new road graders.

Evans said the Commissioners could make monthly payments, with a "balloon" payment at the end of the contract if they decided they wanted to own the equipment. Total cost of the graders would run from \$98,000 to \$118,000 each, less trade-ins.

The Commissioners said they would study the proposal.

A number of agenda items were approved at the meeting. This in-

cluded the selection of four vendors for the purchase of bulk fuel, petroleum, lubricants etc.

Also approved: A bid from EBAA Iron Inc. to purchase a 1979 Ford Dump Truck for \$300, and a bid from Charlie Truck and Trailer of Cross Plains

to purchase a 1981 Ford Dump Truck for \$900.

Bids were opened to buy a heavy duty dump truck with trade-in for Precinct 3. The bid accepted was from Truck Town in Abilene for \$2105. Permission was granted for the purchase of a pickup for Precinct 3.

The Commissioners reviewed the new policy for bulk material purchases, and approved the policy. This will include changes with purchasing orders.

Also approved was a Budget Amendment policy recommended by Ken Parker, the new County Auditor.

The Commissioners accepted an offer to install a Court Recording system which includes a mike on the table and an outside mike in the audience. The cost of the basic until will be \$891. Outside noise from the street and courthouse is supposed to be tuned out.

Radio communications system for all of Eastland County was discussed, and will be taken into consideration.

Commissioner Ainsworth expressed concern about the number of electrical conduits running around the Courthouse, including the outside.

"The work we're getting done is not the best way of doing things - boring holes in the Courthouse," he said.

The Commissioners agreed on more uniformity and planning on electrical conduits around the building.

On another meeting, the Commissioners considered the legality of regulating the installation of underground cables on County roads.

Judge Bailey said that the Attorney General had ruled that the States has the County uses them. Utility companies evidently don't have to get prior permission from the County before installing lines.

The Court approved a Resolution authorizing the County's Execution of Agreement for the use of State Automation Equipment in the office of Nancy Trout, County Tax Assessor/Collector.

On another matter, they appointed Commissioner Calvin Ainsworth to represent Eastland County on the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Appraisal District for 1995-96.

Bills, claims and accounts concluded the open meeting.

Reeves Home Burns

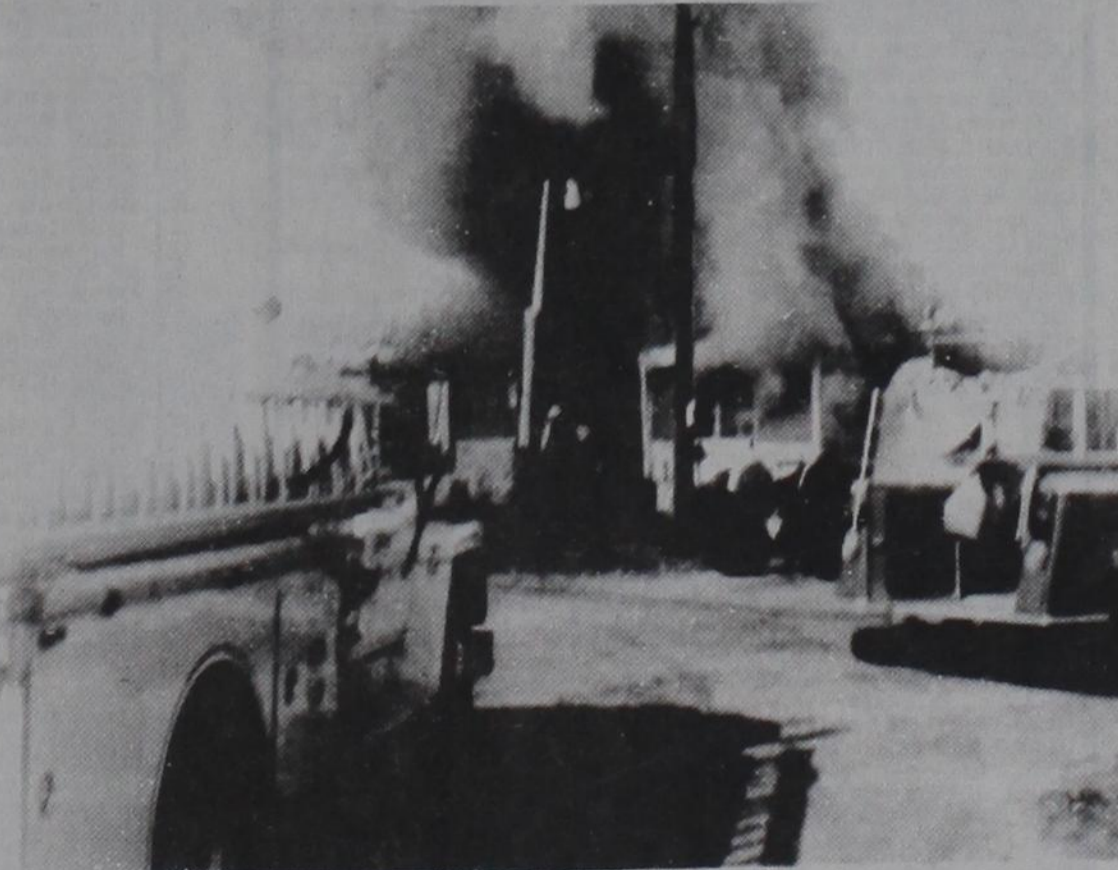

Local Group Involved In War Against Cancer

A local group has been involved in the war against cancer in Stephens, Eastland and Comanche counties. The group is a part of a larger organization of volunteers known as the Big Country Cancer Coalition. The Coalition is funded by the Texas Cancer Council in Austin and coordinated by the West Central Texas Council of Governments in Abilene.

The WCTCOG received a grant from the TCC to survey the residents of the 19-county region known as the Big Country. The survey identified the needs of the residents of

the Big Country as they relate to cancer and the issues surrounding it. The overall cancer incidence rate for the 19-county area was 12.9%; that is about the average compared to the numbers across the state. However, one of the counties in your sub-region has a figure substantially higher than that: Stephens County 30.0%.

The Big Country Cancer Coalition has been charged with the responsibility of developing and initiating a plan of action for your region to address the needs of cancer patients, their families, and the general public. This

plan focuses primarily on education and prevention. The reasoning behind this is that while we do not know all the causes of cancer, we do know some of the behaviors that place people at a higher than normal risk for developing cancer. The survey also showed that about 75% of the people in the Big Country are not aware of the "seven warning signs" of cancer.

While some efforts have been made in developing this plan so it can be implemented in your community, due to wanting support, it has been extremely difficult to make the kind of progress needed to ensure that the plan makes a difference in your community. Remember, the TCC is a

state agency. That means that state tax dollars have been set aside to be used in the efforts to address the needs of your community. Wouldn't it be a

shame if those funds were used elsewhere because there is a lack of support in your community? You can change all that, by getting involved!

does not mean you must send in a donation or knock on doors in your neighborhood. Each of you has something to offer your community in this effort; it may be providing one hour of your time each month, volunteering to be listed in a speakers' bureau directory available to organizations who need speakers, or simply serving on a planning committee that meets monthly. The point is, for any community-based action plan, community involvement is needed.

Please, do not let this opportunity to impact your community for the better slip away without asking yourself how you can help. The Big Country Coalition needs the support of many more residents in your community. Belgium, January 1945

The Battle of the Bulge War was tough on the soldiers on both sides.

Hitler told his Army Commander not to retreat but to fight and die.

Patton told the 3rd Army when you take ground and you think you

are too weak to hold, for the want of men to replace the dead and wounded, and the shortage of ammunition, attack, regroup and attack! He said it will surprise and disrupt the enemy.

The people of Belgium find the remains of sol-

diers to this day, fifty years later.

But as bad as it was on the soldiers, it was worse on the civilians.

We went through Saint-Vith in the last of January, or we tried. The town was completely destroyed. We could not get down the street for the knocked out tanks and the debris.

The buildings were leveled and had the streets blocked. We had to go around the town. The ground was frozen and we could go anywhere we wanted to.

The British had run the Germans out in September, then the Germans came back through, and closed the British out in December. We, the 3rd Army, went north from the south flank, and chased the Germans out in January.

So in a matter of four months, the town of St. Vith had been the site of much fighting and destruction of property and loss of life.

The town of St. Vith was the most destroyed town I saw in Europe.

We went north into Holland and then came back through St. Vith in early February. The Army engineers had cleared the streets enough for us to get through town.

I did not see a building

standing. The town was totally destroyed.

The Bulge was over on the 29th of January and we started a push to the east. There was still a lot of war to be fought.

On January 31, 1945, the U.S. Army executed a soldier by the name of Pvt. Eddie Slavac, by firing squad. The first soldier to be shot by a firing squad since the Civil War.

The crime Slovak committed was to throw down his rifle, and say, "I will fight no more." For this the army tied Slovak to a post and shot him. He was buried along with about 90 American soldiers hanged for other crimes. Slovak's body was exhumed sometime in the 1980's and buried in his home town of Detroit, along side of his wife.

His wife had tried to get his body back home, but died before she could get it home.

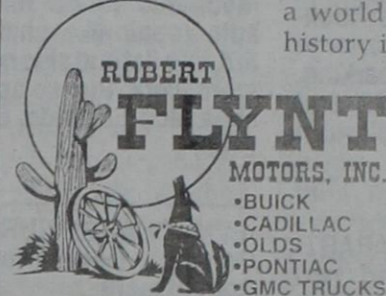

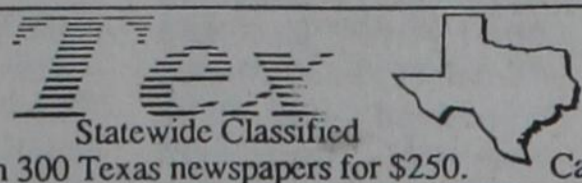
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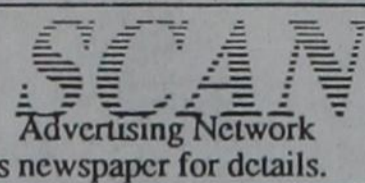

Gray Matter By Joe Gray

When I last mentioned that Scotty's Body Shop occupied the old Panhandle building and service station on West Commerce I failed to mention that after Scotty retired Sam Beggs took over the operation of this shop. I think he still operates it. However he may be doing what a lot of fathers do, and let his son run the place after he learns the trade.
These body shop people do such a good job now-a-days that it is almost impossible to tell where an automobile

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has been repaired after it has been in a wreck. But staying on Commerce just west of Beggs' shop was a building that has been vacant, at least on the ground floor, for years. I do remember that when I was a kid our boys Sunday School class used to meet in the upstairs of this building while the present church was being built. And immediately west of this building was farm implement store.

The lot in the next block west was the original school lot. When the old building was built on this lot all of the Eastland school system from the first grade to the graduation class used this building. But the explosive increase in population here brought on by the oil boom caused the school board to have to build some temporary buildings on the north side of the school lot. These temporary buildings have since been replaced by Dr. Treadwell's Clinic and later the ice company put in a delivery store for drive up customers. I think a part of this building is still standing and in use. For some time Jim Wortman operated out of this building. Before him it was used by the distributor for the Fort Worth Star Telegram as an assembly point for his activities. And also at one time Banner Creamery used it as local delivery station for this area.

Across the street north on what is now Victor Cornelius' parking lot were two filling stations and a boarding house. On the corner of Commerce and Daugherty one of the oil companies put in a small station. It did not have a grease rack and did not operate too long as a station. Terrell Coleman ran it for the company for a while. It was a deal where the employees of the station wore a uniform. In this case it was black or dark gray uniform. The shirt was made of some sort of light weight leather and Terrell wore a small leather bow tie to complete his one-the-job wardrobe. At the east end of this block was another filling station. Although the one I have just described sat squarely on the corner the one at the east end of the block was a sort of reverse situation.

In those days most of the people responsible for our being there came by to see how we were getting along and by way of conversation asked if we were getting hungry. I never will forget the answer a member our group named Claude Myers gave him. He said, "I am so hungry that I could eat salted horsecollar."

Sometime after this a Mickie family came to our city. Mr. Mickie had a hardware store in this building for years. He was a rather religious man and had a small sign on his front door, "Absolutely no

filling stations occupied the corner of a lot with the driveways running across the corner at a fort-five degree angle. The office part of the station was to the interior of the lot. But in the case we are now discussing the office which was a small brick building was at the extreme corner and the service lanes on the inside of the building. As far as I know this was the only case where the layout on the ground was on this order.

This place was not a filling station for too long. Ansil Owen converted it into a fruit stand, then he made a grocery store out of it and he seemed to do a pretty good business in this little grocery store. He handled most of the items found in the regular groceries except for the meat counter.

To the west of this building was a two-story frame building that was a rooming house. I don't know who operated this house but I do know that she served a good boarding house meal and I remember my family used to go there for Sunday dinner from time to time. She got a lot of church trade on Sundays.

Now we come to the Victor Cornelius building. My first recollection of this building was that it was the L.B. Wright Furniture Company, a firm that offered two floors of furniture bargains. After the Wright people moved out this building stood vacant for several years. I don't know who owned this building at this time but it was used as a sort of civic center.

There were various social activities here and I remember one time a group of us high school kids from the band had been invited to some sort of an activity there. Of course we were to furnish music for this occasion and it seemed to be getting behind schedule. One of the people responsible for our being there came by to see how we were getting along and by way of conversation asked if we were getting hungry. I never will forget the answer a member our group named Claude Myers gave him. He said, "I am so hungry that I could eat salted horsecollar."

Sometime after this a Mickie family came to our city. Mr. Mickie had a hardware store in this building for years. He was a rather religious man and had a small sign on his front door, "Absolutely no

business transacted here on Sunday." Later some wag placed a type-written sign on this one saying, "And very damned little during the rest of the week." As soon as Mr. Mickie saw this second sign he took it down.

The Mickie family seemed to have a strong religious leaning. Mr. Mickie had a son who was a missionary to Japan before the war. I remember in the fall of 1941 a few weeks before Pearl Harbor I went to church at our local Methodist Church when the speaker was Mr. Mickie's missionary son, then home from Japan. He was a missionary of a different type. He was not a minister; he was, believe it or not, a certified public accountant.

I have read history of the accounting profession published by the State Board of Public Accounting and it mentions in this book that CPA's sometimes operate in strange manner. It mentioned that one of its group was a missionary to Japan. That was our Mr. Mickie.

After he came back from Japan Mr. Mickie went in as president of Centenary College at Shreveport. This is a Methodist school and I think Mr. Mickie retired from that institution as president.

In the meantime while all of this was going on Victor Cornelius was growing like a weed. He bought this building and it is still in operation. Immediately east of Victor's place where an auto service place is now was the post office. At the time the post office was there the building extended all of the way to the sidewalk. And to the east of it was first a drug store operated by Bob Murray. And to the east of it Mr. Parker, Pete and Don's father, had a grocery store.

It was part of my family chores then to ride my bicycle down town to get the Star-Telegram. I remember I used to get it from the stack in front of Mr. Parker's grocery store. One morning during deer hunting season I remember opening up the front page of the paper and read that Marshall Ratliff had been lynched outside of the Eastland County jail. That was the first I had heard of it.

East of Parker's store was a garage with a service station front end. This is not the NAPA store.

CONSIDER THIS: a reliable source tells us that we can expect to soon learn about state legislation that would, if approved, give local option decision for concealed weapon laws. It'd work somewhat like the local option choices on alcoholic beverages, etc. It's expected to become law.

IT MAKES you wonder: The Texas Senate passed two bills -- SB4 repays the Dept. of Criminal Justice \$236.4 million that was spent last spring to expand the capacity of the prison system. The money allowed the state to build 15,000 new cells and expand the Dallas county State Jail project. The expansions were necessary to relieve overcrowding in county jails. The repayment will come from General Obligation Bonds authorized for prison construction and approved by voters in 1993. Senate Bill 3 rescinds a '93 law calling for the state to defer until upcoming fiscal year \$795.3 million in payments to state universities, public schools and state retirement systems. Of that total, \$772 million in general revenue dollars while the remaining \$23.8 million comes from other sources. Under the old law, state government would have put off paying the August '95 bills until Sept., shifting payments from one biennium to another. Because Texas will end the current biennium with an estimated \$3 billion dollar surplus the State Voted to rescind the deferrals and make the payments on schedule this year. Hope the surplus holds.

IN RESPONSE to a recent letter-writing effort to public officials regarding a matter of great concern, the replies came in this order: U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm (Washington, D.C. 20510-4302); Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Austin, TX 78711-2068; State Rep. John Cook (Austin, TX 78768-2910); President Bill Clinton, who wrote, "I welcome your input and will keep your views in mind," among other things. Rep. Cook said: "I will definitely take your concerns into consideration ..." and thanked us for contacting his office. Lt. Gov. Bullock was aware, from his letter, that we had written earlier about the same subject, so you understand that he's staying on top of things for the citizens. And

he added, "...welcome your input." Sen. Gramm said, "I appreciate having the benefit of your comments on this matter," "I will continue to monitor this situation," and "Thank you for taking the time to contact me."

Point? They or somebody in their offices read our letters. Positive action? It remains to be seen. But if they don't hear from us, they (1), may not know what we want and/or (2) think we don't care what they're doing. They need to be reminded, we think, that the citizens are watching what's going on and having a say in our representative form of government.

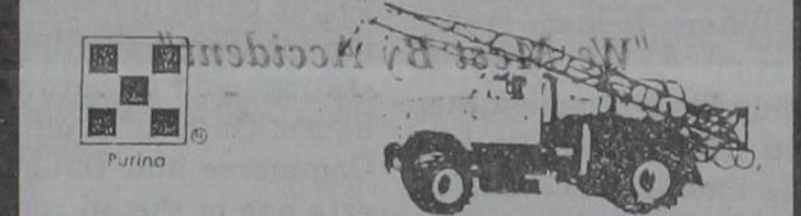

That's the small print warning on checks in the amount of \$25. being mailed to businesses by AT&T, in the national slug-fest to gain long distance telephone business. It's a dog-fight over the valued business. We are with an independent that costs us 13 cents a minute. We hear of one only charging 14 cents a minute. When you shop, make sure you get billed on a fractional-second basis. What are you paying per minute? More, less?

STAFF WATER system should be able to start making additional meters available judging from information from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission which suggests that "moratorium can now be lifted." Understand that the contract stand-off between Staff and City of Eastland is over the .6 gal.-per-minute-per-meter guarantee. That figure, an outside maximum requirement, and very rarely ever necessary, we're told, is a fact when the Water District Pumps are running, so maybe progress's coming.

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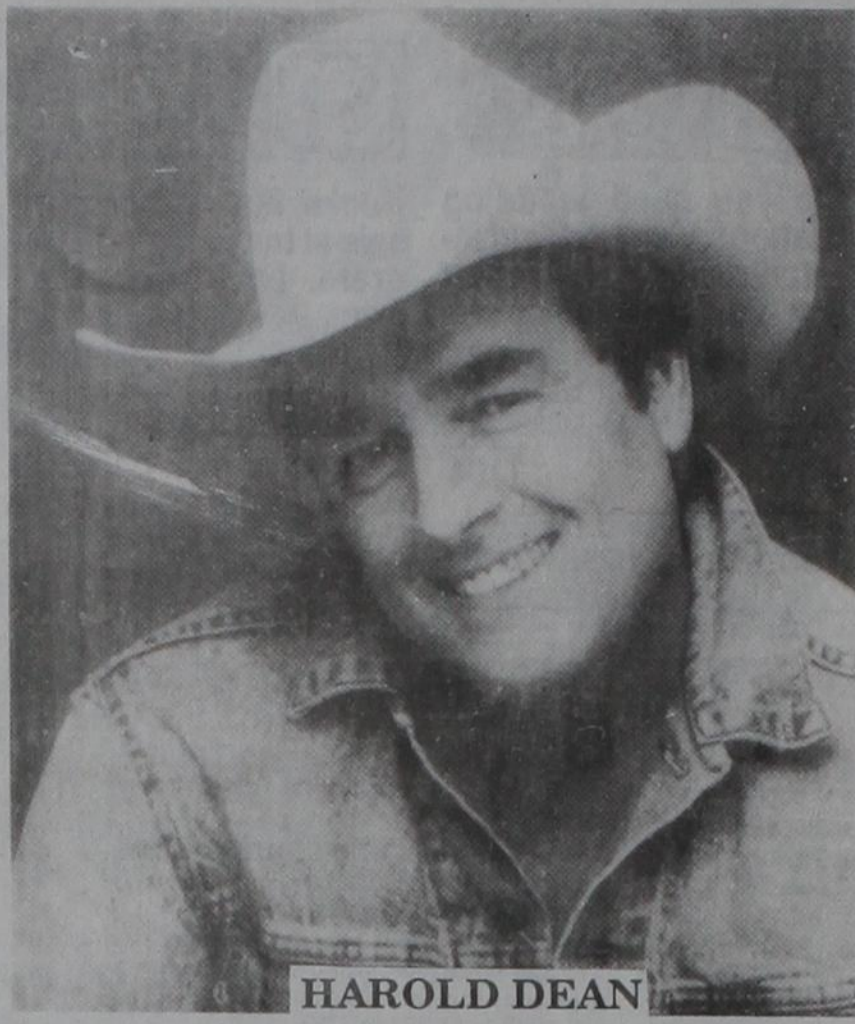

Democrat with a majority party in the legislative body different from the Governor should be very interesting.

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
