Let's look at the west side of the square, facing west. The south end of the west side according to my earliest memory of it was the two story Rust Building, owned by Judge Rust. The ground floor in the boom days housed a dry goods, or as some people liked to describe them as a department store. The later word seems to be a little more impressive. Although a lot of the earlier citizens here thought Mr. Boaz was Jewish, I don't think he was. It seems to me that he was a Christian by religion and he was Lebanese. While I was still a youngster he moved his firm to Jacksboro and the last time I was through that town I noticed his firm was still in business there.

Then there was a long period when this site was the location of five and dime stores as many people refer to them as a variety store. Mr. J.W. Miller operated on the west side for years and years. He occupied this corner site and then later he occupied the south half of the department store y's later occupied.

ween these two sites various stores have occupied the building. Pipkin once had a grocery store in this building. Dr. Madden, who at one time had three drug stores on the square, two on the west side and one on the northside, had a store in this building. And it was in this building that I learned a noble lesson in proper conduct and relationship with my fellow

Harkrider. In 1938 or 1939 I was working in Odessa and Mr. Harkrider was a pharmacist for the L. and H. Drug Store in Odessa. He and I often had lunch at the little cafe whose name I think was Best Yet, that was right next door to the entrance of the Lyric Theater, so one day I told him of my experience. He did not remember it at all he said. But I did and still do.

The south half of the Dakan Building at one time was occupied by Jack Williamson Hardware Company. He in turn sold out to Jim Sherril who operated here for some years, moved the south side of the square sold to Curtis Kimbrell. The north half of this

building was J.W. Miller's variety store for a long time. Mr. Miller had two children, a boy and a girl. The boy was a good baseball player and later worked for Texas Electric Service Company. He married the youngest of the Everette girls of Olden. But he died a few years ago and she did live many years longer than he did. They did not have any children. Next on the west side

was Campbell and Fagg Department Store with a 75 foot front. This was the largest store in Eastland for years and was the store that sold all of the old famous brand of clothes. Florsheim shoes, for example, Arrow and Manhattan shirts, Jockey underware. If it was a popular brand name Campbell and Fagg usually handled it. However, by the time the depression hit Eastland the store had closed out. As I understand it Mr. Campbell lived in Abilene and he had a fair-sized department store in that town Mr. Fagg lived here on South Seaman Street in the block just north of Sadosa. The store building had more space than any other in town and by this time the Connellee Theater was having a little trouble with accustics in its building with the advent of sound pictures. Also the cost of heating and cooling that large a building was something for the entrepreneur to think about. So the theater people and the Campbell and Faggpeople got together.

As a kid I remember that the Eastland Telegram before it built its own building on East Plummer had an office of some sort next door to the barber shop. I was so small than that I did not know what this office was. I am sure where the Telegram, which then was a weekly paper, was printed. After their Plummer Street building as completed the Eastland Telegram became daily. That is it was a five-day afternoon paper and then on Sundays it was published in the mornings. I am not sure whether the connection had been made with the

Ranger Times then or not. At one time the Ranger Times was sort of the major paper of these two papers. And at this time there were two Eastland papers. The other being the Eastland Chronicle. I do not remember who published this paper.

But this piece was not supposed to be about the two newspapers in Eastland and the only way I got onto the subject was to mention that one of them had an office of some sort on the west side of the square in the early days following the Oil Boom. The other half of this building was a barber shop.

My earliest recollection of this barber shop was that it was a four or five man barber shop operated by a Mr. Joe Laurant. Mr. Lauranthad two boys and a daughter. His daughter later became the personal secretary to Attorney Allen D. Dabney and worked for him for years and years. I think she worked for him until her death. I remember that Judge Earl Conner, Jr. and I were pallbearers at her funeral. 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Ranger Commissioners Roundup

Monday, January 23 1995.

Mayor Ainsworth called the commissioners to order. Comm. Britt gave the invocation. The financial reby Comm. Tankersley showed the General Fund to be \$13,495.89; Water Sewer & Sanitation \$13.944.14; Hotel Motel \$455.69; Police Special \$123.29; Ambulance Fund \$4,088.71; Sewer Line Reserve \$797.51.

The first item on the agenda was the discussion of Buck Schlumbohm's job termination. Comm. Wells stated there had been some written complaints and a lot of people calling in complaints, as well as other reasons. At this point Mayor Ainsworth ask Mr. Achlumbohm if he had any questions. Mr. Schlumbohm (Buck) took the floor and ask who had made the complaints. Comm. Wells

explained that other officers as well as citizens had been complaining about his behavior on the job.

Buck went on to read a letter written by a lady from Weatherford who was in support of him. Mayor Ainsworth read the letter making some notes. The Mayor told Mr. Schlumbohm that was all Comm. Wells was going to bring out in open ses-

Buck thanked the Commissioners and expressed his desire to help the city in any way he could in the future.

Second item of business was the installation of cross arms at the Wayland crossing by Brenda Wells. Mrs. Wells gave statistics on a number of accidents at this location.

The commissioners lent their names to a petition and agreed to send a letter to the Railroad and Hwy. Dept. to help get flashing lights and cross arms at the location. Anyone interested in signing the petition should contact Mrs. Wells.

Third on the agenda was a request by Doyle

Russell to have the utilities at the scout hut turned on. Adam Lopez stated their desire to start clean-up and renovation on the building. Comm. Tankersley assured the Scouts that work had already begun and the utility work would soon be complete.


