#### **Eastland City Meet** Correction & Clarification...

Wording of an Eastland City Commission meeting report that appeared on the front page of the previous edition left incorrect impressions for which we apologize.

The following is a more accurate report of the meeting:

During a three and a half-hour meeting Monday night, commissioners discussed problems that have surfaced with the collection system. David Wilson was the successful bidder on laying sewer pipe to the location of a new wastewater treatment plant that is almost operational.

Wilson, project engineer Billy Jacobs and Eastland National Bank representatives attended the executive session.

From the official minutes:

"Commissioner Stephen Barry made a motion to instruct the interim City Attorney Tommy Warford to investigate any lawful claims which may have been filed

with the bonding company and to determine the status of such claims, and for Billy Jacob as the project engineer to examine the work to be completed on the punch list and to ascertain the estimated cost of such work and for said City Engineer to meet with the contractor and effected property owners to attempt to satisfy work requirements of the contract. Commissioner Stephen Barry also moved that upon execution of a properly drawn "affidavit of bills paid" by the contractor, and upon approval of the interim City Attorney Tommy Warford, and Project

Engineer Billy Jacob. After approval City Manager Paul Catoe is hereby authorized to make joint payment to the contractor, David Wilson and the Eastland National Bank in the amount of \$46,678.68. The motion was seconded by Commissioner James Fullen. The motion was voted on and the motion carried."

Ray was a local boy whose father had a movie house on the Main Street in Cisco. The building used to have an imprint at the top, Judia Building. I am not sure if that imprint is still there.

Raytoldmethathisfirst training or taking an interest in music was from an old player piano that his father had in the theater. In the days before sound pictures the movie

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industry used to send out a roll of music that was to accompany the movie. Ray told me he learned his first piece by following the keys on this player piano until he had it memorized.

The player piano was something in itself and as the roll of music was played, the keyboard activated with no one ingburned to the ground. around it.

I understand that Mrs. LaRue Boussard in Eastland still owns one of these player pianos.



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
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








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#### **New Seminar And Ministry** At First Baptist Gorman

Currently faculty members are referred to as instructors. One major component of the proposed policy is that all full-time faculty members would be-


Assistant Professors when it is given final approval. Through the policy and procedures for implimentation, some faculty would be promoted to Associate Professors and Professor within the year.
