the family unit together. But finally, when the situation grows dangerous, the law, Crisis Center, or both is called in.

In 1995 percent of the cases, "family violence" means that a man is beating his wife. Children are often involved, and here the Crisis Center feels a special need to break the cycle of abuse.

"Abuse is an attempt to control, whether it be physical or mental abuse," Mrs. Mehaffey states. "Usually abusers are intelligent, clever people who learn how to manipulate.

"Many times drugs or alcohol also play a part." Crisis Center volunteers are always available for counseling, and try to work out the best way to handle a situation.

Mrs. Mehaffey and Free have been visiting school campuses recently, meeting with principals and faculty. More school visits are anticipated in the future.

And at the March meeting of the Crisis Center, volunteers will tour the

Noah project in Abilene. This facility is a shelter for battered women and children. Other Noah projects are located in Brownwood, Snyder and Haskell.

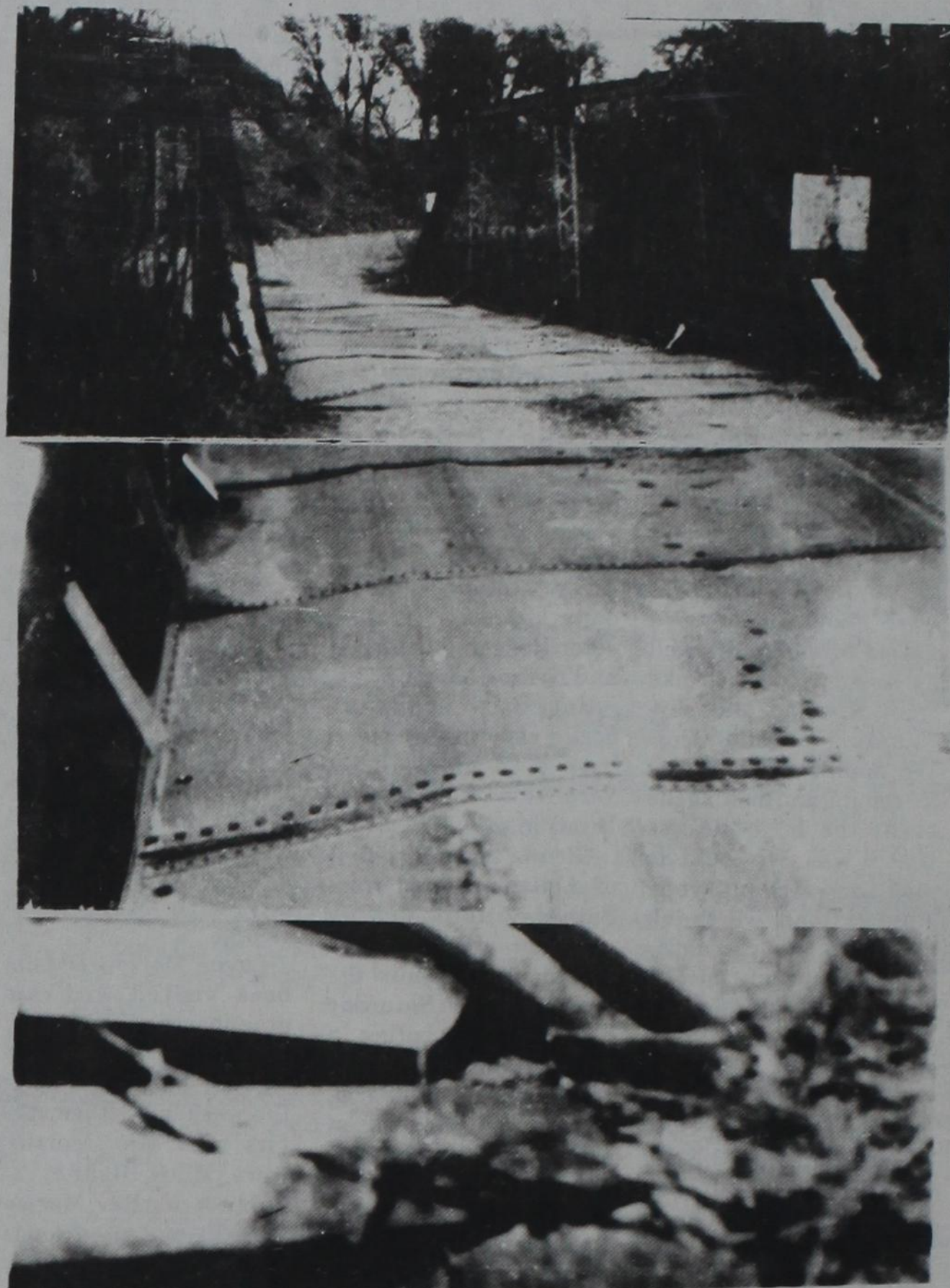
Police Chief Funderburgh states: "The Eastland County Crisis Center has been a great help to us and to crime victims. The volunteers have been very active - the need has been greater than anticipated.

"Abused people have an option - they can talk to counselors at the Crisis Center even before going to law enforcement officers."

Old Bridge To Be Replaced

Here are some pictures of the old wood and metal bridge on the Sabanno River on the Brown Cemetery Road - a structure due to be replaced.

The bridge is located on CR 408 in Pct. 3 south and east of Carbon. To get there you follow the paved

road from Carbon toward Okra, then turn left on a dirt road. About 2 1/2 miles east this road crosses the Sabanno.

Around a curve is this picturesque old bridge, constructed in the 1920's. Called a truss bridge, it has high metal sides and only one lane for traffic.

Now the braces appear to be broken at one end, and the water in the Sabanno is almost up to the flooring.

A spokesman at the Texas Department of Transportation office in

Eastland says it will probably be 1996 before a contract is let on construction of a new bridge there. And it may not be constructed at the exact site, but will probably be a realignment.

The total cost of the new bridge is projected at \$165,000, with \$35,840 of that to be paid by the County.

Blue Monday: the risk of heart attack is higher then, German researchers found. They suggest that the stress of switching from weekend leisure back to work could trigger the attack.
How good is that specialist? Call 800-776-CERT to reach the American Board of Medical Specialties, which can tell you if the doctor is board-certified in his or her field.
Instead of a drill, some dentists are using kinetic cavity preparation, a new system that blasts decay with a stream of a white, powdery substance. It's said to be more pleasant for the patient and less tooth mass is lost. (A drill is still needed for fine work, though.)
Researchers at Wayne State University are working with a marker found in women newly diagnosed with breast cancer, hoping to devise a blood test that might spot the disease at a very early stage.

Romantic Comedy "I.Q." Showing At Majestic This Weekend

The really funny and warm-hearted "I.Q." is showing at the Majestic Theatre in Eastland this weekend. Curtain time is 7:30 nightly through Monday, Feb. 27. Admission is the usual \$3.50 at the box office, with balcony seats available at \$5 to persons over 21.

In the story, brilliant, bemused and disheveled scientist Albert Einstein (Walter Matthau) is at the center of the romantic comedy. Set in post-war Princetown, N.J., this is a tale of small-town romance engineered by Einstein himself.

Einstein has spent twenty years teaching and researching in Princeton's Halls of Ivy after fleeing persecution in Europe. His brainy niece Catherine (Meg Ryan) is engaged to an equally scholarly but conniving psychologist (Stephen Fry).

Foreseeing an unfulfilling future for Catherine if she goes through with the marriage, Einstein takes it upon himself to find her a new object of affection.

And although Catherine is determined to marry a genius like her Uncle Albert, it is Ed (Tim Robbins) a mechanic at the local garage, who strikes Einstein as his niece's Knight In Shining Overalls.

Ed lacks only the scientific brilliance

Catherine seems to demand. But with Uncle Albert pulling the strings, perhaps at least an illusion of genius can be concocted!

Director Fred Schepisi says that a number of elements attracted him to "I.Q."

"I liked the romance, the comedy," he ex-

plains, "And the whimsy of the fact that Einstein, who lived in his own head for so much of his life, is suddenly trying to calculate how to put two people together! I liked the notion that Einstein doesn't want his niece, who is also living in her head, to make the same mistakes in life that he did."

The casting of Einstein was understandably a critical element, and Schepisi says that in Walter Matthau he found the perfect actor.

"We looked at a lot of people for the part, but Walter was suggested early on. You can see how much he looks like Einstein, even without wig and makeup. He's also got the ability, the experience and age to play a part like this."

...JOURNALS of the HOUSE of BURGESSES of VIRGINIA 1727-1734, 1736-1740. Edited by H.R. McLwaine.

The journals contain the names of the burgesses as well as the names of the citizens who had grievances or petitions to present, or for whom some judgement was being made. They are a record of the early law-making process in this country and offer a glimpse of the issues that faced the Colony in those days. These issues sparked the desire for independence that smoldered in the hearts of our forefathers: tobacco taxes, tithables, committees, the building of defensive installations, speeches by Governor Gooch and the King's representative, and matters of law and justice.

In 1910, these archives were published in their entirety for the first time. In fact, it was the first time that the journals for the years previous to 1732 had ever appeared in printed form, existing before then only in manuscript. The collection was issued in a beautifully typeset, limited edition of 500, which Heritage Books, Inc. now presents in facsimile. The first volume we offer contains the Journals of the House of Burgesses for eight sessions, -- all the sessions of the Assembly of 1727-34 and the Assembly of 1736-40.

The value of this edition lies in the authenticity of the information. The transcriptions which were used were not amended or altered in any way. The text for the first two sessions was obtained from transcripts of the manuscript copies in the Public Records Office, London; that of the remaining sessions, from the collection of printed journals belonging to the heirs of the late Mrs. C.W. Coleman, of Williamsburg,

All Texas soils require nitrogen fertilization for economic pecan production. Sandy upland soils as well as alluvial river bottom soils require nitrogen. Upland orchards on sandy soils require a minimum of 120 pounds of elemental nitrogen per acre. River bottom orchards require 90 pounds of elemental nitrogen per acre. Native timber requires 60 units. Many orchards, if not most, require more than this minimum level.

When considering application amounts from a per tree standpoint use the following recommendation:

1 pound of actual nitrogen per inch of diameter of the tree. Example: 12 inch tree would require 12 pounds of nitrogen or 45 pounds of 21-0-0. Remember that 21-0-0 is

only 21% nitrogen so in order to apply 12 pounds of actual nitrogen you would apply 45 pounds of actual material.

Application dates for nitrogen fertilizer should be in late winter or early spring before pecan buds begin to break. Split applications of 50 percent in March, and 50 percent in May are recommended. Pecans should not be fertilized after June in Texas. This practice encourages late season growth and increases the probability of early winter freeze injury.

Application method should be broadcast around the dripline of the tree. Nitrogen fertilizer will move into the soil with water so irrigate where possible.

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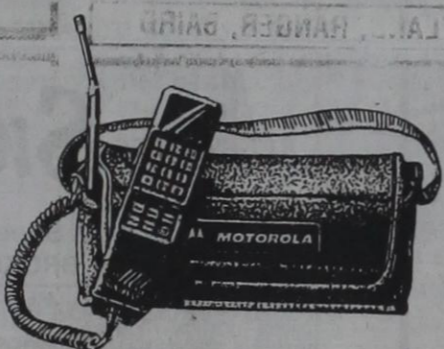
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Letter To The Editor

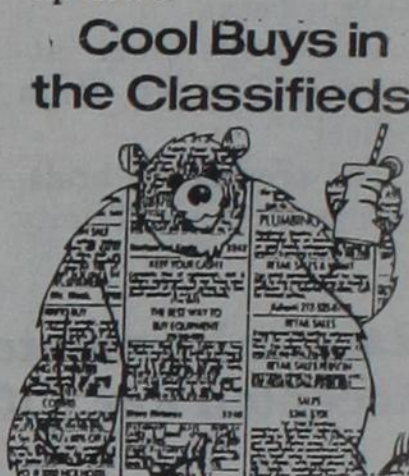
Another year has passed away,

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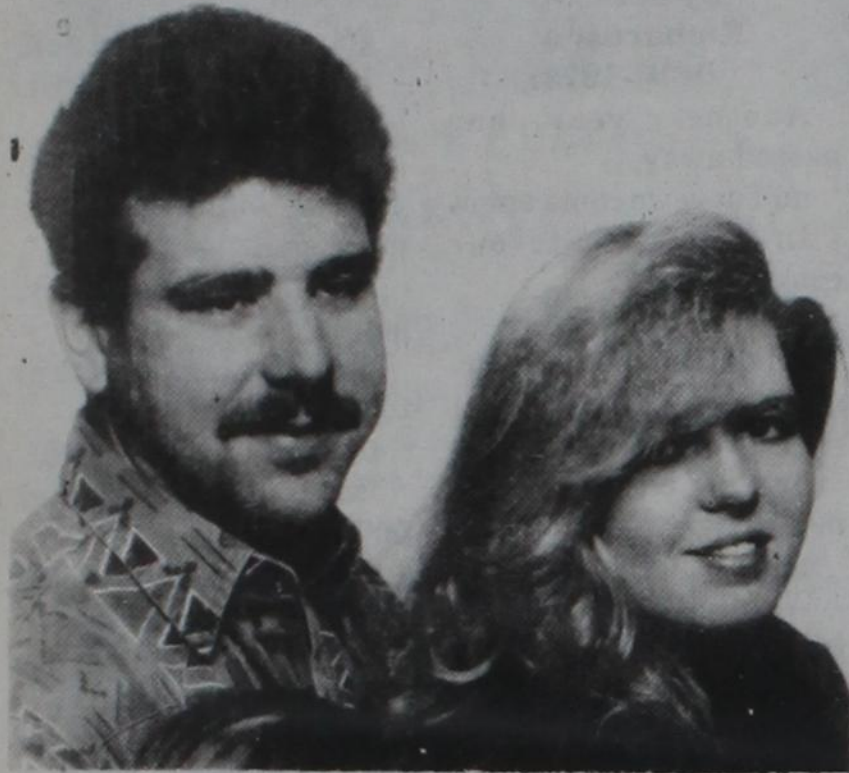

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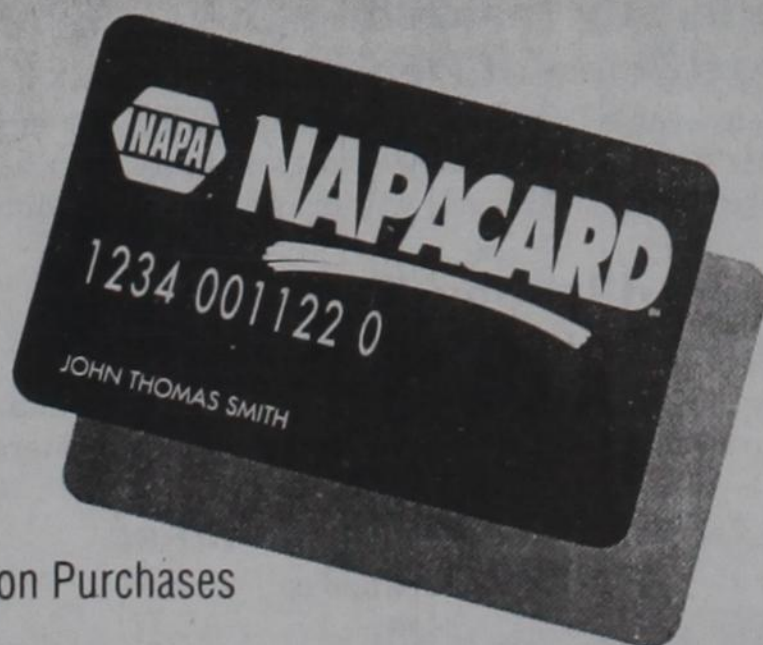

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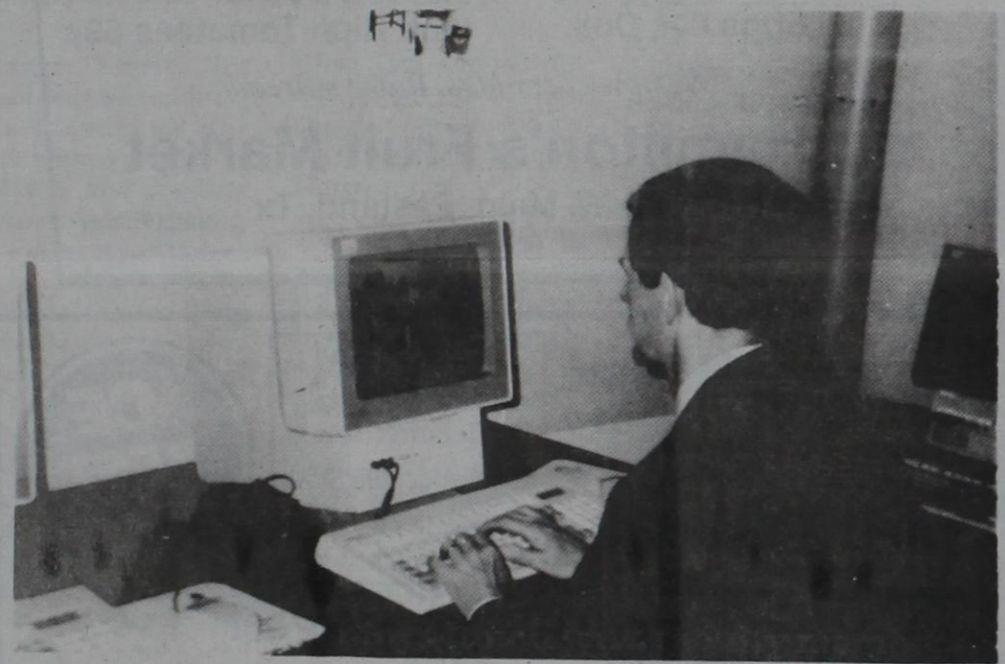
