



the family unit together. But finally, when the situation grows dangerous, the law, Crisis Center, or both is called in.

In 1995 percent of the cases, "family violence" means that a man is beating his wife. Children are often involved, and here the Crisis Center feels a special need to break the cycle of abuse.

"Abuse is an attempt to control, whether it be physical or mental abuse," Mrs. Mehaffey states. "Usually abusers are intelligent, clever people who learn how to manipulate.

"Many times drugs or alcohol also play a part." Crisis Center volunteers are always available for counseling, and try to work out the best way to handle a situation.

Mrs. Mehaffey and Free have been visiting school campuses recently, meeting with principals and faculty. More school visits are anticipated in the future.

And at the March meeting of the Crisis Center, volunteers will tour the

admirer. Nor was he very enthusiastic about the Nazi regime in Germany. As a matter of fact he did give through limited channels at his disposal for contact with allied officers considerable information that was valuable to our side in this war. Canaris managed to escape detection until after the attempt was made on the life of Hitler in the late summer of 1944 at his East Prussia headquarters. In the investigation that followed this attempt on Hitler's life Canaris' name drew some suspicion and he was arrested. This failed attempt on

Hitler's life so infuriated Hitler and his henceforth that anyone arrested in this investigation was. considered guilty and all attempts to get a fair trial for the accused when down the drain. Actually Admiral Canaris was

slated to be executed on a certain day. The man who marked the cells of those who were to be disposed of marked the admiral's cell but in his case door was opened when it should have been closed, or vice versa, and the next morning the execution squad did not finish him off. He lived some time after this incident, but before the war was over the Germans had disposed of him.

Homer was a brother-in-law to Curley Maynard and he is the man I was referring to in one of these pieces when I said he had a street named for him. This came about after Homer served

on the city commission of either Euless, Bedford, or Hurst. I don't know which of these three towns he worked with but in gratitude for his services they named a street after him.

Weldon Rains, Ione's brother, finished EHS a year before she did. She finished in my class. Weldon was active in the Homecoming association in its early years and I remember talking to him one day and asked him where he worked. He told me he was a salesman for Olin Mills. I do not know then who Olin Mills was and for a long time I thought it was a milling concern in the food industry. I later found out that it was a competitor of Mr. Canaris as developer of fine photography.

And here is another strange coincidence that developed in this relationship with events in World War II. You remember I said the chief of German intelligence was a man by the name of Canaris. It also happens that a prominent intelligence officer in the Pacific area of operation was the American naval office, who I think was the chief intelligence
