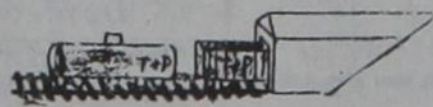

Funding Looking Good For Connellee Re-Birth

Funding prospects appear very bright for the proposed \$3.2 million renovation of the historic Connellee Hotel to provide some 42 living units, commercial and meeting space for downtown Eastland, reported Sally Loveland Tuesday.

She is director for National Development Council, the Ford Foundation-sponsored, non-profit organization working with the Economic Development Board, the Industrial Foundation and the City of Eastland in attempting to reclaim the beloved Connellee.

"Our applications are scoring high and we've not hit any major roadblocks so far, so we're very optimistic," she said, as she explained that the application should go to the board for funding by late March or early April. The application for \$1.244 million was made in late December, and another application for another grant is in the amount of probably \$250,000.00 is due by the end of March, she said.

The Windsor Hotel in Abilene has just reopened under a similar redevelopment program handled by Ms. Loveland and the National Development Council.

Navy Chief Petty Officer Robert J. Richardson, a 1976 graduate of Cisco High School of Cisco, participated in the 50th anniversary of the liberation of Guam with the guided missile cruiser USS Mobile Bay.

While aboard the USS Mobile Bay, Richardson took part in several ceremonies including a wreath-laying ceremony off the coast of Guam in honor of those who died in the battle. Richardson also participated in a sunset parade aboard the ship and attended a reception for more than 1,200 veterans. General Carl Mundy, Command of the U.S. Marine Corps, also attended the reception.

After the liberation, Guam became the forward headquarters of Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz for the rest of the war.

In addition to the ceremonies in Guam, Richardson also participated in several exercises designed to test the special capabilities of the Navy-Marine Corps team. As one of 364 crew members aboard the guided missile cruiser, Richardson is playing a vital role in supporting forward deployed naval operations.

Richardson's involvement in the deployment is an example of how the Navy and Marine Corps operate forward deployed as a team, projecting a positive American image while building international coalitions and demonstrating U.S. power and resolve from the sea. These forces are uniquely capable of conducting sustained operations in remote areas of the world. He joined the Navy in May, 1976.

Eastland Lions Hear About Disaster Relief

What kind of help would be provided if a tornado hit Eastland County?

Max Barton, Pastor and Community Services worker, on Feb. 28 gave the Eastland Lions Club information about this and other aspects of Disaster and Relief work.

Barton is Pastor of the Breckenridge Seventh-day Adventist Church. His District also includes Eastland and Erath Counties.

He was introduced at the meeting by Tom Loggins, member of the Eastland Lions Club.

Club President Jayne Jones opened the noon program, which was held at Grandma's Kitchen. The meeting also included reports of local activities of the Club.

Barton said that for a number of years he has been interested in Disaster Assistance, considering it a basic part of "Love Thy Neighbor."

In addition to regional community services, he is a member of a National organization of volunteers called VOID, and also a supporter of ADRA (Ad-

ventist Development and Relief Agency).

He said that last week he attended a state-wide Disaster Conference in Austin. There was much information on how to deliver speedy assistance to victims of floods and tornadoes.

With tornado season just ahead, the Disaster Agencies were especially concerned about victims of this type of calamity, Barton said.

Last year Barton was one of the first to assist after tornadoes hit in an area south of De Leon and in Hamilton County. Last fall he was also with a Disaster Van for some days at the flood in Houston.

Along with telling of his own experiences, Barton also showed a video to the Eastland Lions. This was mostly narrated by George Schram, who is head of the Disaster Relief work over a 5-state area for the Adventist Church.

The video showed large Emergency Service Disaster Vans, which have their headquarters at

Keene, Texas, 9 miles east of Cleburne. These huge vans are stocked with clothing and other necessities, and can move out at any time to a disaster area.

"Community Services in Keene would cover the Eastland area in case of a tornado," Pastor Barton said. "We would check with local authorities and see if we were needed. Then we would coordinate our activities with others."

"At the present time the work from these vans is focused on distributing clothing to people who have lost everything," Barton said.

"The vans are stocked with good clothing - including new undergarments - for all ages and sizes. Blankets and sheets are also provided."

The Disaster Relief area at Keene does keep food and bottled water, but much of the mass feeding at disasters has been done by Baptists, Barton said.

He described the general plan as this: The Red Cross sets up a command post and screens people for needs, giving relief available. The Salvation Army begins relief work, and the Baptist men begin mass feeding. Then the Adventists start supplying clothing from the vans.

If a warehouse is available, they also start receiving donated supplies and distributing from there.

If the locality is declared a Disaster Area, the FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) comes in and works on needs such as emergency housing and the like. And obviously in

Williams House

Shortly after Mrs. Jesse Williams died, Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins, my next door neighbor, asked me if I wasn't the senior resident living on Seaman Street now. By senior resident she meant to ask if I had not been living on Seaman longer than anyone else. My answer to her then and I think it is still true that I felt sure that when we moved out to Seaman back in 1920

the John Fehl family was already living in a home located in the 1300 block of Seaman.

And as far as I now know Johnnie Fehl is still living at this address. At the time the Fehls moved in I think there were three boys and at least one daughter in their family. There was a boy named Sherman, who was a little older than I, and I think there was one who was older than Sherman whose first name I don't recall. There was Johnnie who was a grade or two behind me in South Ward and I also think there was a girl in their family who,

if memory serves, was married to a man by the name of John Allen.

Sherman Fehl owned the first Model T Ford I ever saw that wasn't black. He had a roadster that was painted in pastel colors and I think he might have repainted it himself when he took delivery of the car. It was one of the most popular cars around the South Ward area of Seaman Street then.

John Fehl came to Eastland with the oil boom an established residence in the house I have mentioned. As the years passed Leonard Hightower, who lived across the street from the Fehl's, died and the Hightower house later turned up as the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Marshall, both of whom taught in the Eastland school system. The Marshall's had a couple of lively boys who contributed much to this neighborhood as young fellows of the area.

Mr. John Fehl, when the weather was good, liked to sit out in his front yard and watch the world go by while he visited with the passersby.

At the corner of Burkett and Seaman, at the point where the street narrowed down a little, there was a combination grocery store and filling station. This is the station where we kids used to air up our bicycle tires every time we needed a little free air.

The Marshall boys, John and Charles were favorites of the neighborhood and both of them were good friends of Mr. John Fehl. John loved to tell the story of one day he tried to get Charles, the older of the two Marshall boys to come across and visit with him one afternoon.

But Charles would not budge. He said he had to go to corner store and get a loaf of bread for his brother as his brother was at home and was starving to death if Charles did not get back with the bread immediately. Mr. Fehl got a bang out of Charles' determination to get bread back to his young brother.

I mentioned Mrs. Jesse Williams at the opening of this piece. Mrs. Williams' place was at the corner of Seaman and the street that ran down to the cemetery. This was the home of the Jesse Williams family, which consisted the parents, one son, Bert and two daughters, Aileen and Fay.

Many of the boys in this area thought Aileen was the prettiest girl in town and I certainly won't disagree. One block south of Jesse Williams' place was Wyatt Williams' place. These two men were brothers. And according to my information the two houses of theirs were identical houses, built at the same time. I have been told that they were built by Mr. Jim Sherill. This would be the grandfather of the Jim Sherill we now have living in Eastland and the father of Guy Sherill, who by the way was my source of information about these two houses. They were built in 1907, a year than went into the history books as a panic year and is usually referred to by historians as the Panic of 1907.

Mr. Sherill took the measurements of the space these two houses were to occupy, then went to Arkansas to a lumber mill and bought the lumber needed for this endeavor and came back to Eastland on the same train the lumber came in on.

According to Pete Parker, after these two houses were completed there was not enough lumber to take out as trash to fill a small wheelbarrow. Pete Parker always told that he thought Jim Sherill was the best estimator of how much lumber would be needed in a house he knew.

And as to the selling price of these two houses then. Hold on to your hat.

The turnkey price of each of these two houses in 1907 was \$1,500.00 and that included all of the hardware.

A handful of Texas cities have discovered that charging households by how much they throw away - rather than a flat garbage fee - can put a major dent in what goes to the landfill.

"This system treats our garbage just like your gas or electric bill and is an effective way to reduce solid waste going to landfills," said Mark Everts, community recycling specialist at the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. "If you put out less garbage, you pay less. This 'pay-as-you-throw' system has helped communities around the country reduce their residential waste by 20 to 60 percent."

As disposal costs go up and as siting new landfills becomes more difficult, Texas cities are looking for new ways to cut down on what must be taken to the landfill.

At least five Texas cities - College Station, Weimar, Hallettsville, Plano and Austin - either have or are phasing in pay-as-you-throw programs. Four of the five cities have committed to reduce solid waste by 50 percent by the year 2000 as members of the TNRCC's Clean Cities 2000 program.

Cities around the country have found that by charging more for increasing quantities of waste, residences and businesses are encouraged to cut back on their garbage - both by participating in recycling programs and by cutting waste at its source.

"After some initial resistance, this has turned into the greatest thing since peanut butter," said Hallettsville City Secretary David Drury. "I don't think you could pull it away from the people here or the city council now that

it's established." Hallettsville, which has already cut its solid waste by roughly one-third, uses one of several common variable rate structures. Residents purchase specially marked garbage bags that are priced to reflect disposal costs. The bag fee is their garbage fee - there's no monthly bill.

Other cities use difficult sized containers, charging a higher monthly fee for larger containers. Another method is to weigh each residence's garbage as it goes onto the truck. "If I put out 10 bags of trash every week and you put only one - and we both pay the same price for the service - there's no financial incentive to reduce waste by recycling," Everts said. "At the same time, you can't expect the pay-as-you-throw program to work just through a pricing structure. You have to provide alternatives such as home and centralized composting, and curbside or drop-off recycling programs."

Hallettsville, for instance, provides a free chipping service for yard waste and will soon begin other programs including community composting.

Technical assistance is available from TNRCC to help cities implement waste reduction programs, including pay-as-you-throw. For more information, call 512-239-6318.

The program is presented as a public service by the Family Psychology Center and as a result

there is no fee. It will be held every Thursday in Abilene Hall of the HSU campus.

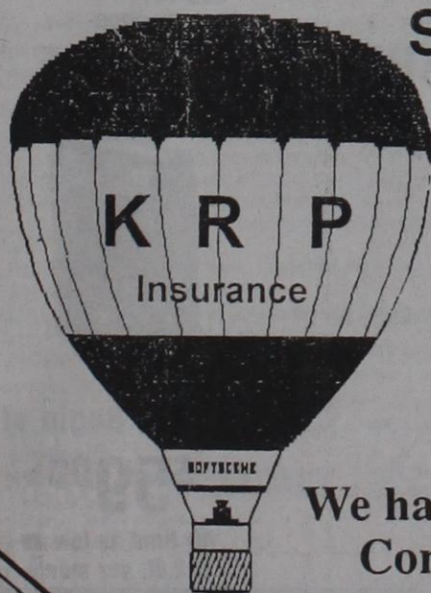

poinsettias and black baby's breath. Sherri Cooper of Plainview, Texas sister of the groom and Shannon Prather were members of the house party.

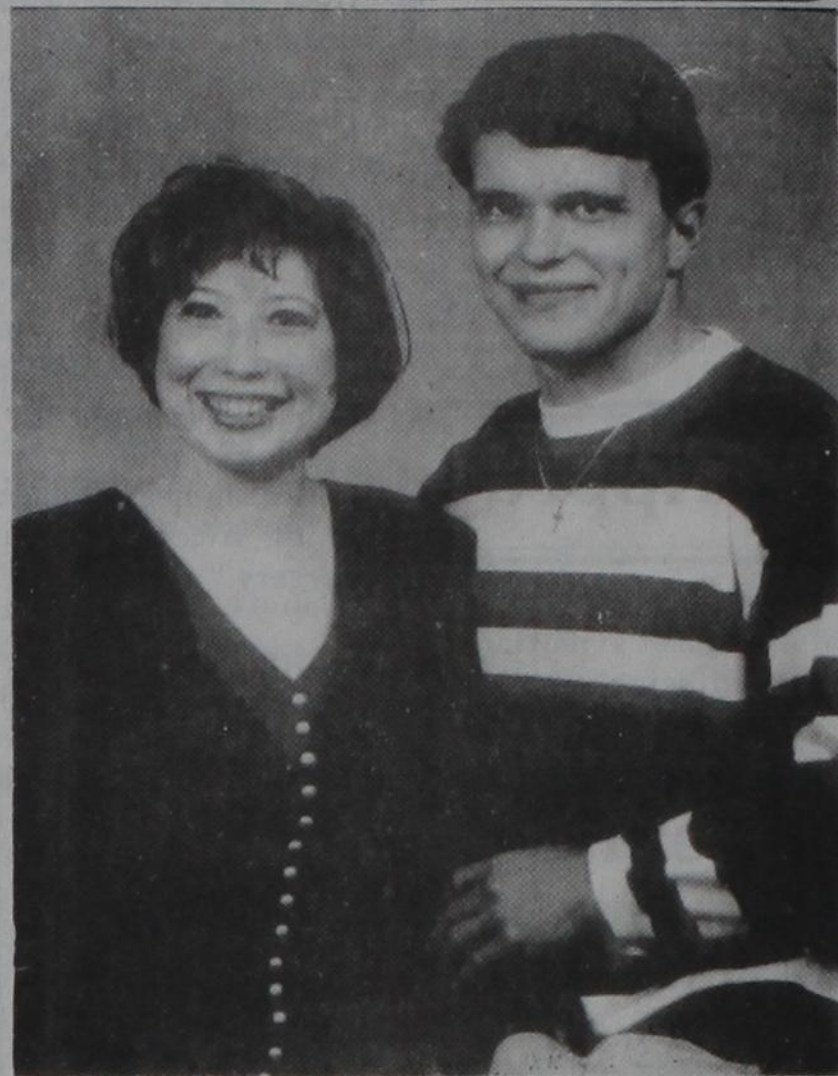
