

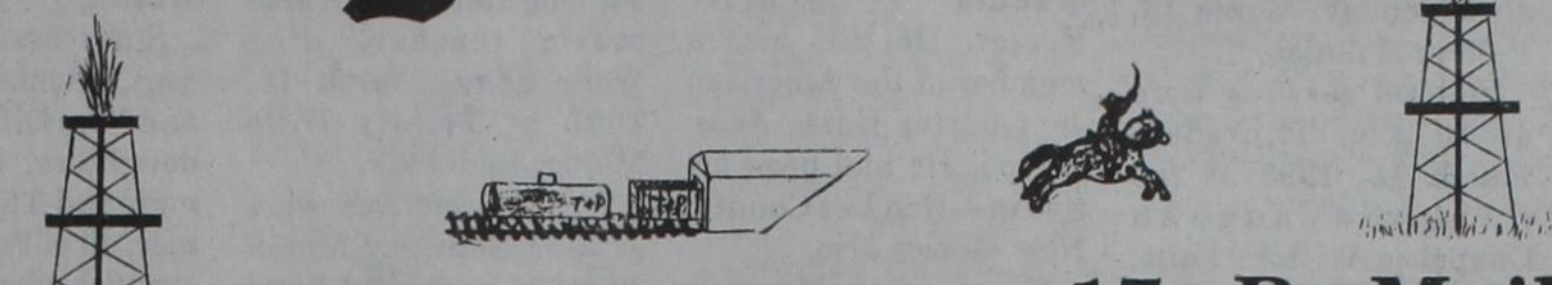

**YOU FIGURE** the odds: in Eastland County since the state's "Pick 3" game began, \$173,754 worth of tickets have been bought; \$68,350 paid in prizes... Comanche, \$227,303, \$97,310; Callahan, \$107,438, \$48,440; Coleman, \$79,905, \$47,470; Erath, \$161,889, \$78,630.

**BRIGHTER:** COUNTY registered a big 26.1% increase in retails sales, and 20.7% increase for all industry sales in third quarter of last year over the same period year earlier. ## County Commissioners Hire Wheeler As Jail Consultant

On Monday afternoon, March 13, the Eastland County Commissioners voted to retain architect James H. Wheeler of Abilene as a consultant on the jail. He will be engaged in jail planning/or construction.

Wheeler and another architect, Tom Harris of Houston, each discussed jail expansion during a session that morning.

Wheeler was the architect of the present jail, which was completed in 1980. It cost around \$850,000, with a capacity of 24 beds.

At various times the facility has been overcrowded. During the past year it has had an average of 38-40 inmates daily.

On Feb. 28 Texas Jail Standards Commission inspector Bob Patterson visited the jail and failed it on 9 points - many of them due to overcrowding.

Sheriff Ronnie White and County Judge Scott Bailey received letters from the Commission stating that failure to correct the defects might lead to a remedial order.

Wheeler estimated Monday that the present jail could be expanded by 24 single cells for about \$1,300,000.

The Commissioners said they were aware that more beds are only part of the problem. Monday's jail report showed that 26 inmates were awaiting trial out of the 40 held in jail.

The Commissioners questioned why the trial process couldn't be speeded up.

Of the current prisoners, 8 were "paper ready" for the Texas Department of Corrections, which is also overcrowded.

When inmates are held for TDC the Jail Commission does not include them in the local jail population count.

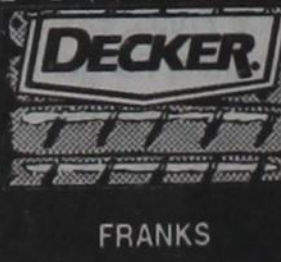

## Morgan Moylan Sweeps Really Big Houston Win

A winning streak continued for Morgan Moylan of Eastland, and Shoop, her Chianina steer, when Dr. Harlan Richie chose the Grand Champion Steer at the 1995 Houston Livestock Show.

The judge walked cautiously around the 30 contenders in the center of the Astrodome before choosing the winning steer. Richie, a cattle specialist with the Michigan Cooperative Extension Service, finally decided on Moylan's 1,243-lb. mediumweight steer with a candid slap on the steer's hind end.

Moylan, a 14 year old member of both FFA and 4-H, said Shoop has won Grand Champion titles in both San Antonio and San Angelo as well as a Reserve Grand Champion title in El Paso.

However, she said credit for this victory really belongs to her brother, who picked the winning steer.

"If it wasn't for him, I wouldn't be here," she said. "He got me interested in 4-H and FFA, and involved with showing steers."

Moylan said all of the money she earns through the sale of her steer will go into a college fund. She plans to attend Texas Tech University in Lubbock. She received \$60,000 for her steer.

Raising an exceptional steer proved to be worthwhile for Moylan, because Richie, considered the preeminent cattle judge at livestock shows, said her prize Chianina made his job easy.

"The Grand Champion was an obvious winner," he said. "It had length, muscle and strength with just the right amount of finishing."

The Reserve Grand Champion title went to Justin Stacener, 15, of Levelland, and his Limousin steer, Doc.

This year the Grand

Champion steer was chosen from 15 different breeds and almost 1,500 entries.

Four of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo's biggest benefactors joined forces to stun the cattle world, bidding an unprecedented \$500,000 for the Grand Champion Steer.

Tom and Mary Steele pooled their money together with LeRoy and Lucile Melcher and outbid Jim and Linda McIngvale for Shoop.

This half-million-dollar purchase surpasses the previous record set in 1993 when the Melchers bought the top steer for \$350,000.

Moylan, received \$60,000 from the purchase price as a result of the auction cap program initiated in 1992. The remainder of the money goes into the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo's Educational Fund.

The bidding for Shoop in front of a festive, standing-room-only crowd at the Astroarena Sales Pavilion began at \$50,000 and quickly escalated to a \$250,000 price tag with the Melcher-Steele team competing directly with the McIngvales. A third bidder, Virgil and June Waggoner, then raised the

ante to \$275,000. Waggoner, president and chief executive officer of the Sterling Chemical Co., later went on to purchase the Reserve Grand Champion for \$140,000, setting another world's record.

Moylan, who had to pay as much attention to her restless steer as she did the auction, said she had two very special people to thank.

"A year ago, my brother and sister picked this steer out, so I wouldn't be here without them," she told the audience.

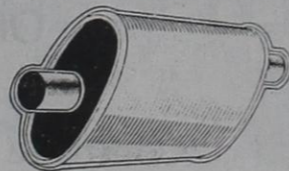
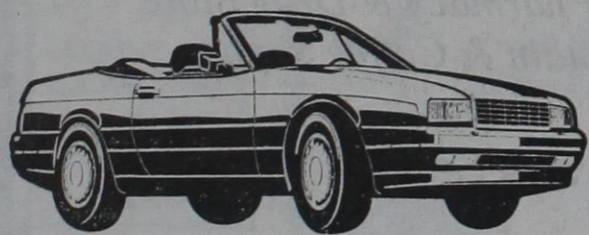

**TOM TRENNARY BARKER**; 850 E. River Road; Traverse City, MI 49686 is researching the **TRENNARY FAMILY**, and would like to hear from other researchers of this rare surname.

**OHIO TRENNARYS:** We know a TRENNARY family moved into the Clinton County area starting about 1810. We do not know who their parents are. Were they brothers and sisters or maybe cousins? John TRENNARY reported in Clinton Co. History in 1882, that his father Thomas came to Ohio when he was about sixteen years of age, about 1811.

Early Clinton\*, Highland\*\*, and Fayette\*\*\* County marriage records indicate this was a large TRENNARY family: Nov 15, 1810 Hannah TRINNERY m. Edward CURTIS \*\*; Sep 4, 1815 Mary TRENNARY m. James RUDE \*\*\*; Dec 11, 1817 Thomas TRENNARY m. Susannah ACRE \*; Dec 29, 1817 Thomas TRENNARY m. Fanny DAWSON \*; Dec 31, 1820 Jane TRENNARY m. Michael FREY \*; Nov 19, 1823 Richard TRENNARY m. Phebe DIXON \*; Jul 22, 1824 Honor TRENNARY m. Robert ELWOOD \*; Nov 15, 1827 Elizabeth TRENNARY m. John WILKINS \*; Nov 26, 1832 Richard TRENNARY m. Sarah ACRE \*; Sep 13, 1855 Jefferson TRENNARY m. Jemima WALKER \*; John B. TRENNARY, born in VA ca.1800, arrived in Texas in 1835 with his wife, two daughters and two slaves. His daughters were born in Ohio, Hannah ca. 1819 and Honor ca. 1825. He enlisted in the Texas Army on Mar 6, 1836, was in the Battle of San Jacinto.

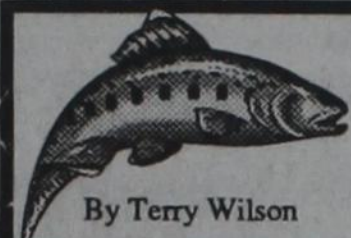

paid out over 9 places this month.

As we head towards our third event at Brady Lake these teams are picking up points towards a championship event September 27-30. Over \$150,000.00 in cash and prizes will be awarded this year at Lake Texoma

ShareLunker, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's program to accept bass larger than 13 pounds, topped the 200 career fish mark Feb. 27 with the addition of three lunkers

The three fish bring this year's total to 21. Last year, the program did not receive its 21st fish until March 19. Through Feb. 27, 1994, the department had received only 12 entries.

The newest entries into the program include two 14-pound fish from Lake Fork and a new lake record (14.35 pounds) from Lake Austin.

The program's 21 fish have come from eight lakes. Lake Fork leads the way with 13 entries, followed by Sam Rayburn with two and one each from Conroe, Gibbons Creek, Gladewater, Falcon, Austin and a private laker near Goldthwaite.

\*Lake Fork - Brian Duplechain of Alba, 14.25 pounds, 25 inches long, 22-inch girth, caught 8 a.m., Dec. 17 on an A.C. Plug.

\*Lake Fork - Richard McCarty of Alba, 14.07 pounds, 25.50 inches long, 21-inch girth, caught 3:30 p.m., Dec. 7 on a jiggling spoon. This is McCarty's second entry into the program. The first was caught from Fork on Feb. 25, 1989, and weighed 13.56 pounds.

The Share A Lunker program continues through April 30. Anglers lend their fish to the department for study and possible spawning. Entrants are given a fiber-

glass replica of their catch. Share A Lunker Inc. is under the auspices of the Parks and Wildlife Foundation of Texas Inc. The program is sponsored by Irving Marine, Outdoor Trails, Fin and Feather Marine and Professional Sporting Goods Inc. To enter the program, call (903) 592-7570. If no one answers, leave a message on the answering machine (it's monitored 24 hours daily) or get the pager number of a program employee from the machine.

Monday 6 May 1995. Mayor Ainsworth called the meeting to order. The financial report by Comm. Tankersley showed the General Fund to be \$44,115.81; Water Sewer & Sanitation \$6,655.64; Hotel-Motel \$96.43; Police Special \$91.87; Ambulance Fund \$426.68; Sewer Line Reserve \$802.51.

All minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

First item of business was the "Second Budget Presentation". A motion was made and second to postpone this to the next meeting of the Commissioners. The vote was unanimous.

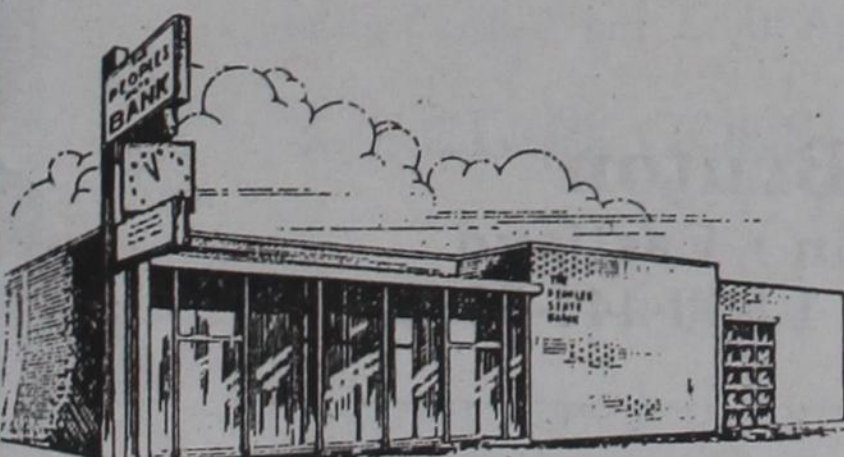
