TWO LETTERS shared to us by Eastland County Native J. C. Poe tells a poignant story of interstate cooperation and patriotic pride in honoring those who helped establish our country long ago. Excerpts unfold the saga:

From Thomas P. When we contacted the Registrar of the Alabama Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, we learned that you had established your eligibility for membership upon the service of your ancestor, Major James Poe...Ne had informed that Major Poe had been traveled with his son, Simon, around 1925 from Anson County North Carolina, to Tuscaloose County, Alabama, and that he died a few years after his arrival in Alabama." If you know Mr. Poe, then you know that he is a very meticulous historian so he was certainly the one to provide information on his ancestor. You may remember that Mr. Poe did a book on another ancestor who was a survivor of the Civil War. So you can know that he furnished plenty of information, and in March of this year, he received the following letter from Mr. Shumaker:

Firemen continued to put water on smoldering hot spots which the wind would fan into flames, and take a break when possible, as they knew it was going to be a long day. And there is always the danger that something might explode or give off a gas, or that the chimney or a wall might fall. And the log walls, without a roof, continued to smolder.

"For the past several months we have been working on a project to identify and mark the final resting place of Major James Poe, Senior, who served as a soldier and hero

the Revolutionary Nar. He was in associated with the South Carolina Militia, likely for the duration of the War, rising the rank of Major. During one crucial year of the War, in 1730, he served with General Francis Marion's highly effective guerilla force, which was the only active Revolutionary organization left in the South ... The Poe Family Cemetery --long neglected--had been lost in the second-growth woods with no boundary, no markers, no identification remained. Genealogical records have it...With the location described verified, we proceeded to secure, through the Veterans Administration, a granite grave marker, with Major James Poe, Sr.'s years of birth and death, his Revolutionary War Organization and a symbol of his Christian af filiation. We ordered a bronze enblem of the 'National Society, Sons of the American Revolution' and have fastened it to the granite marker. On March, 1995, the assembled marker was placed in an appropriate place in the cemetery. There is will remain as a permanent memorial to this Patriot and Soldier, to whom much is owed... 



Monday William E. Franz of Fort Worth, with the firm of Franz, Jeanes, Lazo, Cora and Associates, told the **Commissioners** about his firm's experience in planning jails.

With Franz was Shilo Garmon, former Sheriff of Comanche County. Garmon said that this firm had planned the new modular jail in Comanche, and how pleased he had been with their work and the jail.

Franz said that the present Eastland County jail could be modified and used in an expansion. One or more new structures could be added on to it.

He said that a new wing providing room

Senator Sibley Speaks At Gorman



In five to seven years, small town student will be the best prepared, he summed up.





Section 33.06 of the **Texas Property Tax Code** requires the following information concerning the Deferral of Certain **Property Taxes to be** publicized.

Property taxes on the residence homestead property of those persons sixty-five(65)years of age or older may be deferred or abated if they satisfy the requirements of the Texas Property Tax Code.

The property owner must (in most cases) occupy the residence homestead on which the tax is being levied or on which a ... type of affidavit. suit has been filed for

collection of delinquent taxes.

Toobtain a deferral, the or forced collections individual must file with the Chief Appraiser for the Appraisal District in which the property is located; an affidavit stating that he or she is sixty-five (65) years of age or older and that he or she does own and reside in the residence that the tax is being levied on.

If a suit has already been filed by a tax unit, the individual must file with the court in which the suit was filed the same

with the proper authority, the payment of taxes

through suit is postponed and occupies the property as a residence homestead. the tax is only deferred; it is not canceled. A tax lien remains on the property and interest in the amount





Eugene "Bub" Lob- ,, wellbores that, even stein December 22, 1930 - March 22, 1995 Eugene "Bub" Lobstein

started his career with the Railroad Commission of Texas in 1968 as an Engineering Technician III in the Midland District Office. Mr. Lobstein transferred to the Abilene District Office in 1971 and by 1978 was supervising the State Funded Plugging Program in Abilene. House Bill 1970, passed by the Texas Legislature in 1984, established the State Funded Plugging Program that currently exists today. Bub headed a three man crew in Fiscal Year 1993 (September 1992-August 1993) that accomplished the plugging of 324 wells for the Abilene District. This number was and still is a record number of wells since no other district in the State had or has plugged over 300 wells in one fiscal year period. As of this date (April 1995), the record that Bub contributed to still holds.

The wells that are plugged by the Railroad Commission of Texas utilizing State Funds have to meet guidelines established by the state. This includes old cable tool

though plugged by the regulations in effect for that time period, have either:

1) Caved in and pose safety hazards and/or

2) Exhibit signs of leaking drilling fluids, oil gas, or saltwater.

The operator of the well must be inactive and no longer available to plug or replug the well(s). The State also bears the responsibility of plugging wells that are abandoned by non-compliant operators.

Before his retirement in 1993, Bub Lobstein performed above and beyond the call of duty in his work. He was instrumental in establishing a







Ranger Clay and his wife is the city Librarian. Before moving here Mr. Stott was employed by Valley of the Sun Schools where he worked with handicapped children.


The major portion of Mr. Stott's working years have been spent operating heavy equip-
