She said that special thanks were due to Rhonda Pipkin, R.N., Instructor, and the Eastland Memorial Hospital E.M.T.'s who assisted her.

More than 100 High School students enrolled in the classes. Sixteen of these also attended a

night class, which enabled them to receive CPR Certification. Mrs. Hardin said she considered this a very successful program.

Three trucks and twelve or fifteen Cisco Volunteer Fire Dept. firemen arrived around 1 p.m. to find the wood frame and rock house completely ablaze. With the flames so completely consuming the

home and no hydrant nearby for trucks to connect to, firemen had no choice but to watch the fire burn itself down.

The family stayed overnight at the Oak Motel.

Pre-Kindergarten And Kindergarten Registration

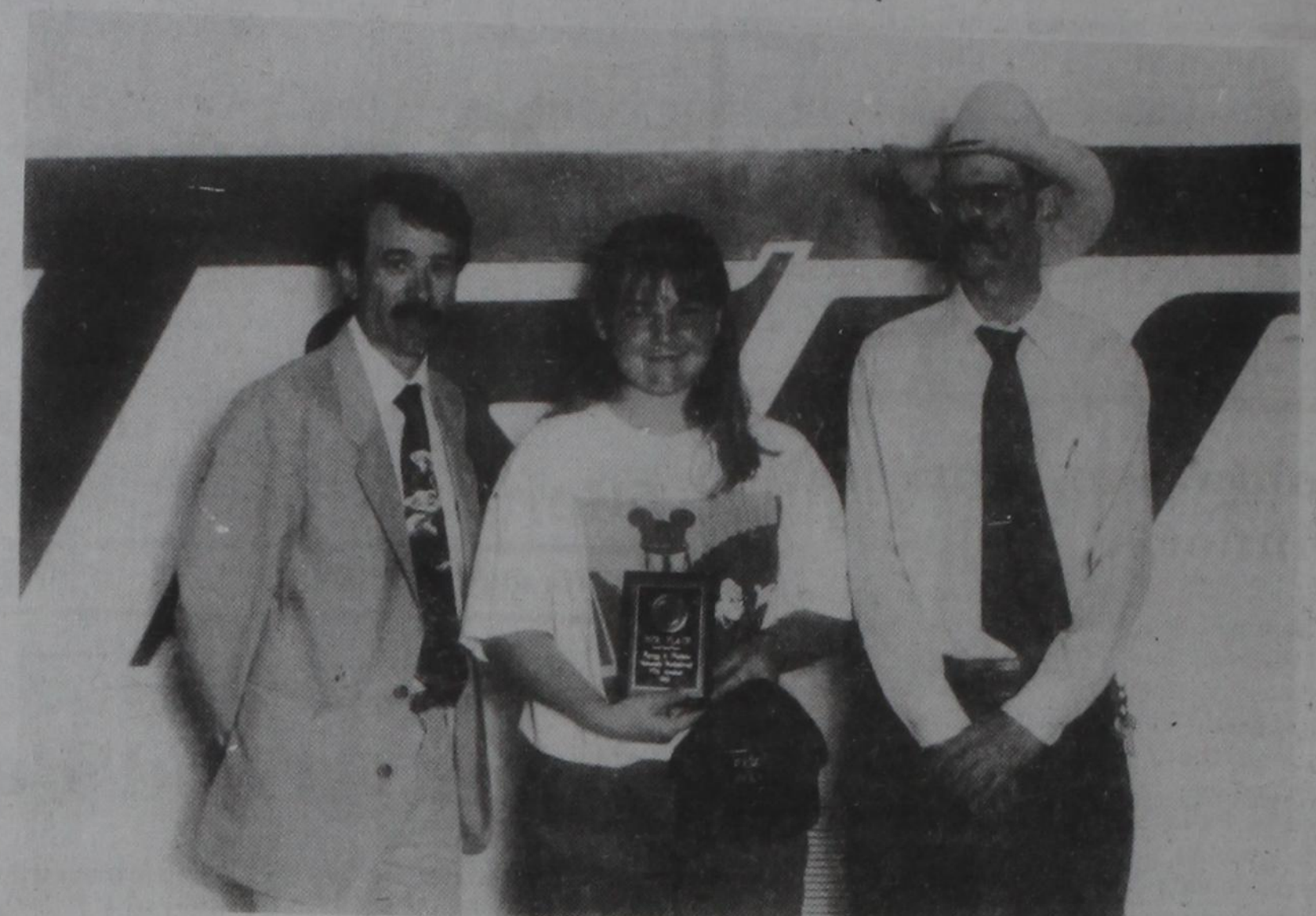
Ranger Elementary School will register Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten students for the 1995-96 school year on Thursday, April 27, 1995. Students who are presently enrolled in Pre-Kindergarten class will register for Kindergarten at home at a later date.

Registration will be in the hallway outside the elementary office from 9:30-11:30 and 12:30-2:30. Parents will need to bring Kindergarten students with them. Pre-Kindergarten students need not be present. Parents should provide a copy of the students birth certificate, complete immunization records, and a social security number.

To be eligible for Pre-Kindergarten a child must be four years of age on or before September 1, 1995, and qualify for the free and reduced lunch program or be unable to speak and comprehend the English language.

To be eligible for Kindergarten a student must be five years of age on or before September 1, 1995.

The health department immunization clinic will offer immunizations in Ranger at the Community Clubhouse on May 2 for students who need immunizations.

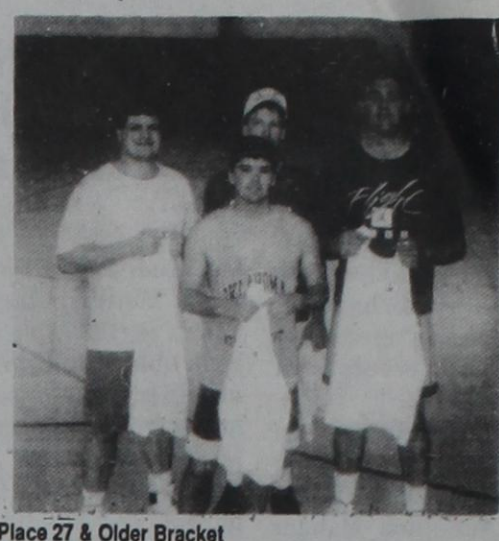

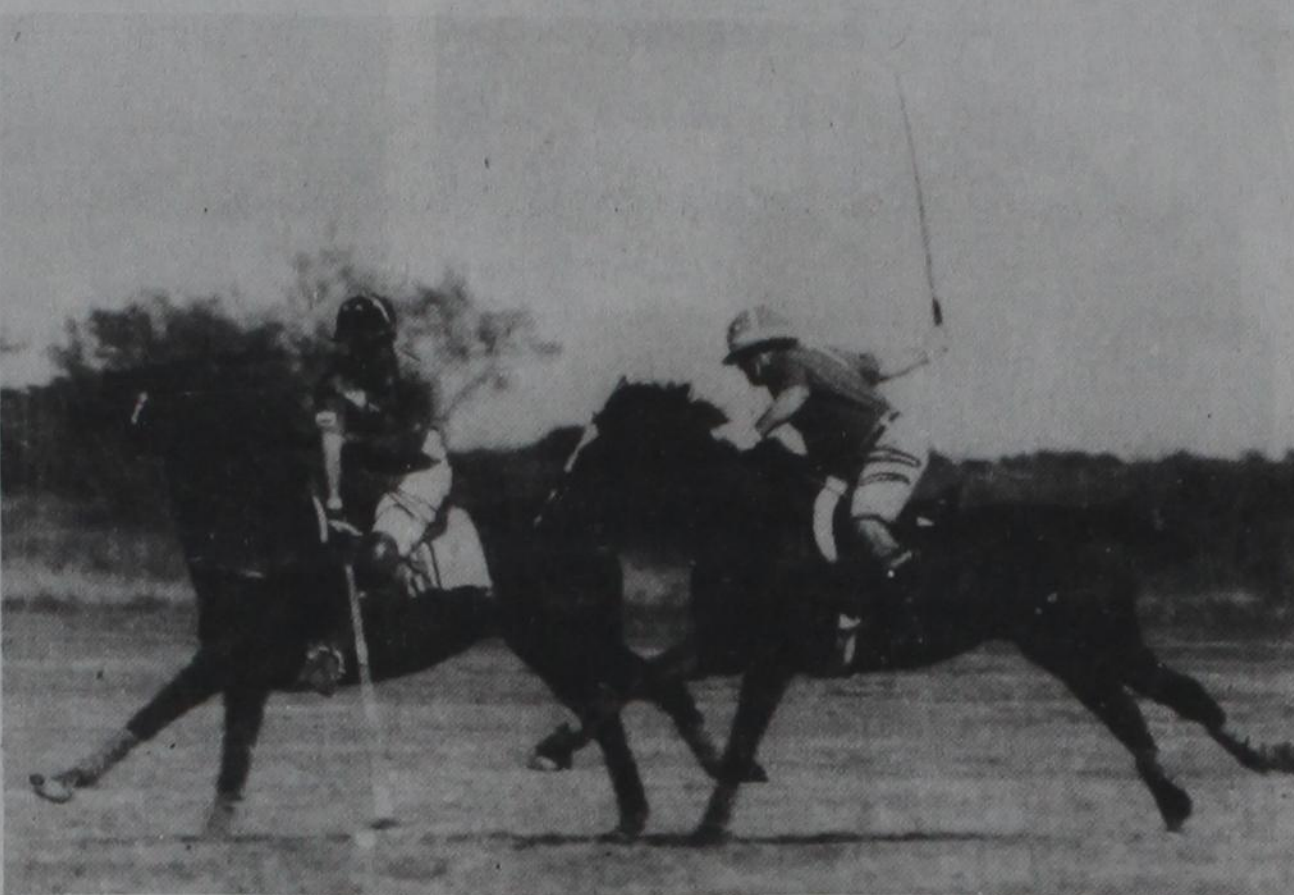
final polo match will be followed by a barbecue dinner and country western dance.

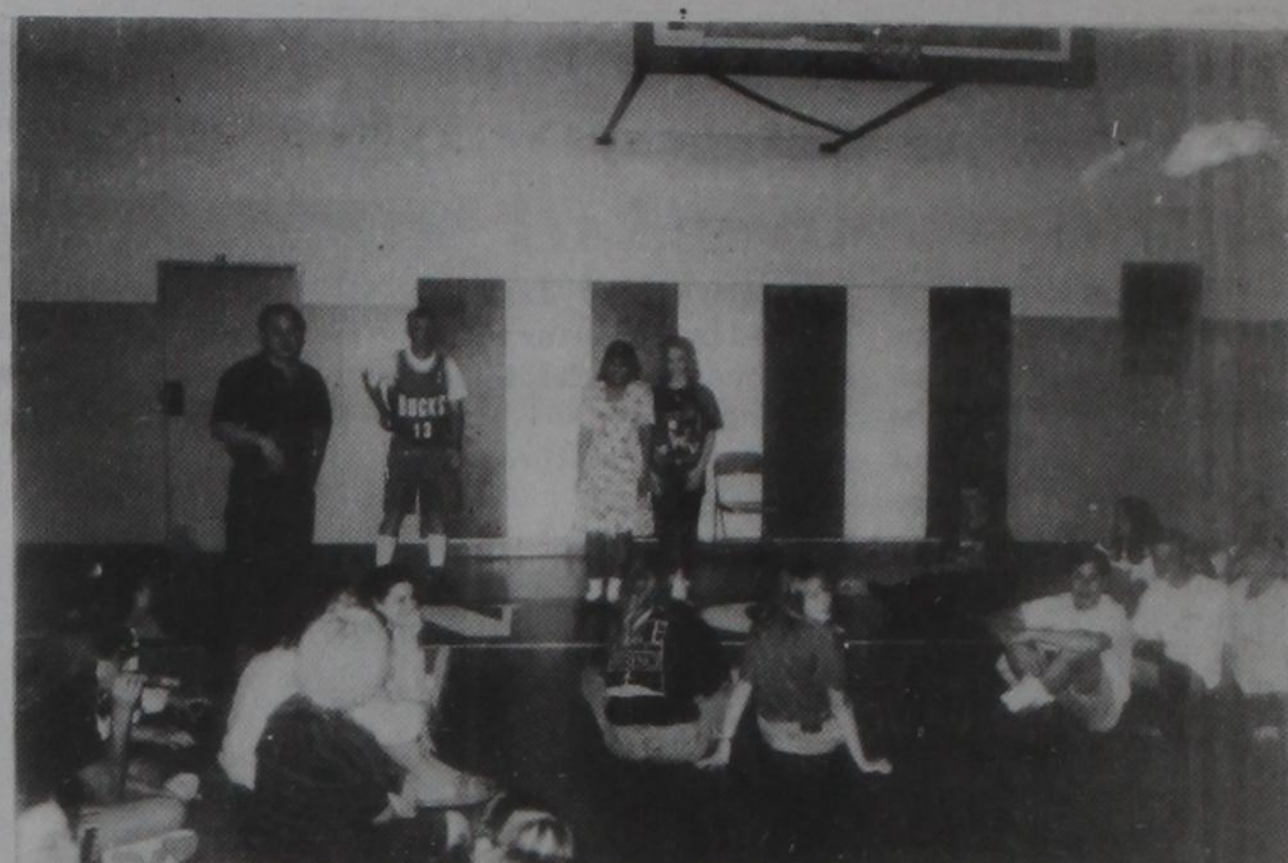

 Businesses depending on farmers and ranchers in Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Eastland, Jones, Shackelford and Taylor Counties can now apply for low interest. Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster. Tornadoes, excessive rain and

hail which occurred on May 29, 1994 caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had an adverse economic

effect on businesses depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies.

To obtain an application or receive additional information, interested business owners may call the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired. The deadline for filing applications is September 11, 1995.

Due to the tornadoes, excessive rain and hail, many producers experienced crop losses and were not able to purchase goods and services at normal levels. Businesses that are dependent upon these producers may have experienced decreased sales, reduced gross profit margins, increased accounts receivable or difficulty in moving inventories at normal levels. To the extent these problems have caused the business difficulty in meeting its normal obligations, these loans may be of assistance. The loan can help a

Interest rates are four percent (4%) and terms may extend to thirty (30) years, depending upon the repayment ability of the individual applicant. To qualify, businesses must be small by SBA's size standard. Businesses which can meet their financial needs through other sources are not eligible.

AUSTIN — The Texas House approved a bill that would retool the state's welfare system and establish alimony.

Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, said his bill creates time limits, requires responsibility in work and clamps down on benefits for those who have children out of wedlock while on welfare.

State Comptroller John Sharp praised Hilderbran's bill, saying the measure would "free Texas taxpayers from the upward spiral of public assistance costs and needy Texans from the downward cycle of dependency." Sharp's office helped develop the legislation.

Hilderbran's bill would:

- Require welfare recipients to work;
- Limit cash benefits paid under

Aid to Families With Dependent Children; and

Set a time limit on receiving AFDC benefits.

The bill moves on to the Senate, where a companion bill is being considered. The measure is expected to be fine-tuned in a House-Senate conference committee before the end of the legislative session.

Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, sponsor of the companion bill, said she would not object if an alimony amendment were added to the bill. Alimony bills have gained Senate approval during each of the past five legislative sessions, but each has failed in the House.

In the House bill, courts would be allowed to order payments to either spouse in a divorce case, provided they were married at least 10 years and the spouse seeking payments lacked the means to meet minimum needs.

Making Deadbeats Pay
The importance of being earnest about parental duties rose again in bills sponsored by Sen. Chris Harris, R-Arlington, which passed without debate in the Senate last week.

The bills would apply to a parent who is at least 90 days behind in paying child support, and who has failed to make good on past-due support under a payment plan, he

said. Judges presently only have the authority to jail non-paying parents, and this bill gives them an option, Harris added.

Drug Board Belly-Up
State legislators last week recommended dissolving the Texas Commission on Drug and Alcohol Abuse due to "gross mismanagement, waste and possible theft" of public funds.

Members of the House and Senate Investigative Committees voted 9-0 for receivership after Col. James Wilson, director of the Department of Public Safety told them that conditions at the agency warrant the move.

The agency which funds hundreds of local drug and alcohol treatment providers serves more than 61,000 Texans, employs 271 people and has an annual budget of about \$186 million.

In a letter to Gov. George W. Bush, Wilson noted an "absence of fiscal and management controls" in the agency and that audits of 23 treatment providers reveal widespread noncompliance with TCADA contracts.

The next step takes place this week, when the Legislative Audit Committee votes on the recommendation. If the committee votes in favor of receivership, the recommendation would be sent on to Gov. Bush for approval.

Budget Shuffling Begins
House and Senate members put their heads together last week, beginning the work in conference committee to find common ground on a state appropriations bill for 1996-97.

The Senate-approved version of the state budget, totaling \$80.2 billion, would pump more money into education and welfare, while the House's more conservative spending bill would come to \$77.6 billion and dedicate more funding

to the criminal justice system. Senate Finance Committee Chairman John Montford, D-Lubbock, conceded, "I am sure we are going to have to come down some."

Bush Snaps Back at EPA
If there was ever any doubt of Gov. Bush's belief that Texas can do a better job of regulating itself than the federal government, it was cradled last week.

Bush didn't take kindly to an EPA official's unsolicited comment regarding Texas' vehicle emissions testing program.

When Mary Nichols, the Environmental Protection Agency's assistant administrator for air and radiation, sent him a letter warning that an emissions-testing bill pending in the state Senate would not meet federal law, the governor fired back a letter saying it was "uncalled for and totally inappropriate ... for a federal agency to inject itself into our state legislative debate."

Other Highlights
The Senate approved a bill allowing doctors and dentists to make credit contracts with patients and charge up to 18 percent interest. The bill by Sen. Frank Madla, D-San Antonio, has moved to the House for consideration.

A bill requiring state health officials to notify, with or without consent, the partner of a person with the AIDS virus, has been tentatively approved by the House. The measure is by Rep. Paul Sadler, D-Henderson.

Compound Your Earnings With Dividend Reinvestment

Albert Einstein once observed that the most powerful force is not atomic energy but the compounding of money. Compounding occurs when investors put the interest and dividends earned on investments back into their investments. This technique allows investments to grow more quickly than if investors were to take their earnings in cash.

Compounding is familiar to many mutual fund shareholders, who often take advantage of a mutual fund service called automatic reinvestment. With this service, the mutual fund uses a fund's dividends and capital gains to purchase more fund shares for the investor's account. In essence, investors begin earning dividends and capital gains on top of dividends and capital gains.

However, many people who own common stock are unaware that they, too, can put the power of compounding to work through automatic reinvestment.

Typically, these investors simply pocket their quarterly dividend checks. What they may not know is that many publicly owned companies offer plans that allow shareholders to reinvest their dividends into additional shares of stock.

These plans are usually easy to join, requiring only the shareholder's approval. Investors typically must own at least one share of a company's stock to participate in dividend reinvestment, and some companies may charge a small fee for this service.

To illustrate how dividend reinvestment works, suppose you are due a \$100 dividend on stock that you own. Rather than sending

you a check, the company will use your dividend to purchase additional shares. To compute how many shares your dividend can buy, the company uses the average trading price of your stock on the dividend pay date. In this example, assume the average price is 10.1250. With dividend reinvestment, your dividend would be used to add 9.8765 shares to your account (\$100 divided by 10.1250). This is all handled automatically by the company.

It's not uncommon for individuals who reinvest dividends for years to accumulate more shares through reinvestment than they originally purchased. Not only is dividend reinvestment a great way to compound your investment, it's also a means of dollar-cost averaging. Put simply, dollar-cost averaging is regularly investing the same amount of money in a stock or mutual fund. In this way, investors continuously build their investment while averaging out the ups and downs in the price of a stock or mutual fund.

If dividend reinvestment interests you, first select a stock that you would like to own for a long time. Make sure the company has a favorable history of

dividend payments and find out if it offers dividend reinvestment. After you've made your purchase, call the company and ask for its dividend reinvestment package. Usually a simple application will start you on your way.

Remember, however, that even though you don't receive your dividends in cash, you still owe income tax on them. Be sure to keep accurate records of dividends reinvested. This will become part of your cost basis and is not taxed if you eventually sell your shares.

Reinvesting your mutual fund and stock earnings: You don't have to be Einstein to see how this basic technique can help compound the value of your financial future.

This information, which is updated weekly by TxDOT employees across the state, is also available at any of the department's 25 district offices or 12 travel information centers.

The travelers can also find out about bluebonnet driving trails, wildflower festivals and other spring

time events held across the state.

This reporting service gives the department a chance to show off the year-round work of TxDOT's maintenance crews, who plant thousands of pounds of wildflower seed annually and coordinate mowing schedules that allow the native plants to mature. Not only do these vegetation management techniques produce some of the most beautiful rights-of-way in the United States, they also prevent erosion, conserve water and save money.

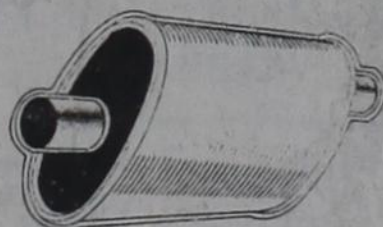

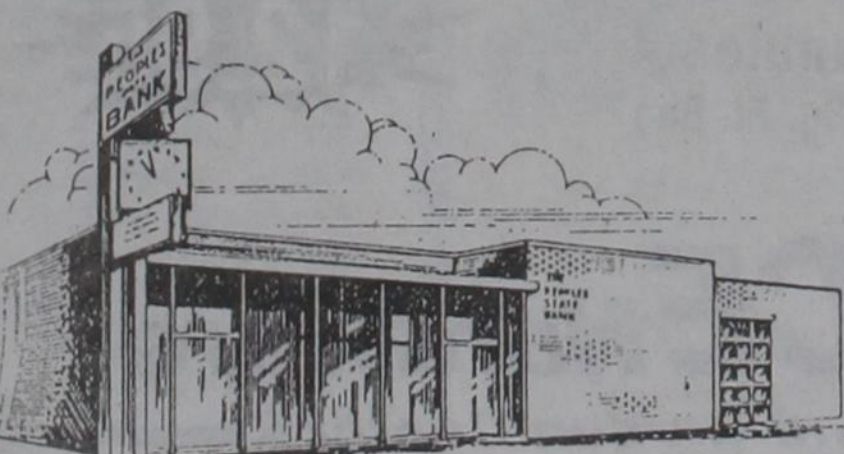
