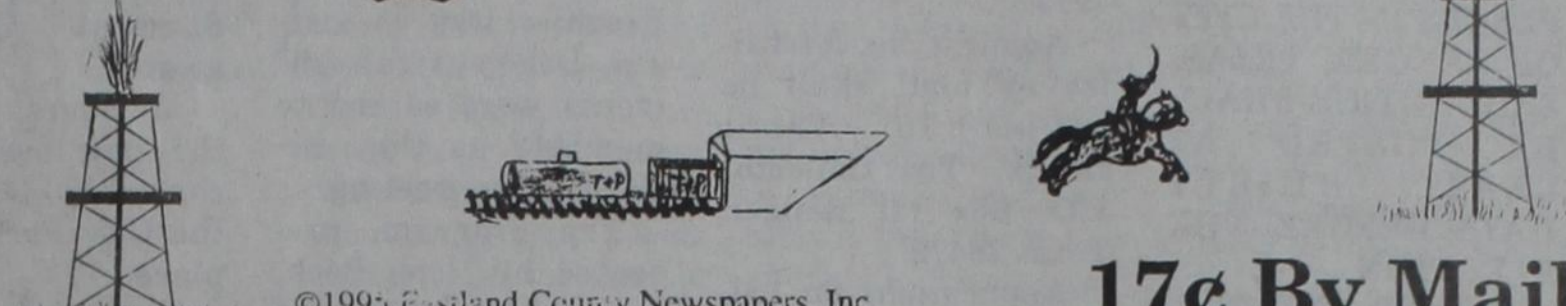

## County Commissioners Discuss Finance, Law Enforcement, Other Matters

Eastland County Commissioners Monday began their meeting with a tribute by County Judge Scott Bailey to former Pct. 4 Commissioner C. B. Dill, who died last week.

Bailey recalled that Comm. Dill served the County from 1963 to 1987, when he retired. He was remembered as a dedicated Commissioner, and sympathy was expressed for his family.

Sympathy was also stated for victims of the Oklahoma City bombing disaster, and their families.

In other matters, Judge Bailey shared a letter from Earl Bradley, founder and one of the owners of EBAA Iron, Inc.

Bradley said, in part, that he thanked the County Commissioners for their input on a recent site selection project by EBAA.

Recently the Commissioners voted to set up Enterprise Zones in the County, with tax abatement and certain benefits.

Last Friday EBAA announced that it would set up an expansion plant in Shackelford County, not Eastland.

Bradley wrote that although County was not chosen for the outlying plant, "EBAA Iron will continue to be a good neighbor in Eastland County.

"Prospects for more growth and more jobs in our county are extremely positive," Bradley concluded.

Turning to the agenda, the Commissioners approved a request to relinquish some unopened streets and alleys in Olden townsite.

A title insurance company made request so that a land title could be cleared for a sale. The streets were described as being on the extreme east side of Olden, and never part of the town.

The Commissioners asked Attorney Tommy Warford to draw up an order for the County to

sign. Commissioners were glad to learn that the jail population was still down, with 20 in the facility Monday. Five had gone to TDC that morning.

Sheriff Ronnie White said that all repairs had been made at the jail now, so it should pass inspection.

Pct. 1 Commissioner Ken Lyerla said that State Jail Commission officials needed to be called so they would come and inspect the jail and see if it was in compliance.

The regular schedule for the next jail inspection is Feb., 1996.

Lyerla remarked that "everybody working together" had helped bring down the jail population.

On another item, Pct. 4 Comm. Reggie Pittman requested that County road mileage in Pcts. 1, 4, and 3 be equalized - by taking mileage from Pct. 3 and dividing it.

The distribution of road maintenance funds is determined by mileage, and Pct. 3 has the most of both.

The Commissioners approved this new policy, with the stipulation that voting precinct lines will not change.

Pct. 4 will pick up 25 miles toward Rising Star, and Pct. 1 will pick up 38 miles in the Carbon-Gorman area.

Pct. 3 Commissioner L. T. Owen, who is giving up the road mileage, requested that the minutes state that both roads will continue to be maintained well.

"They're in fantastic shape now," Lyerla agreed.

"I'm getting 25 miles of the most beautiful road in the State of Texas," Comm. Pittman remarked.

On another matter, Treasurer Ruth Hart told the court that the cost analysis of accounts by Eastland National Bank will not be ready until Wednesday. The matter of moving TexPool funds to the Bank

would need to be deferred until May 8, the next Commissioners meeting.

Some of the County's TexPool funds are expected to be needed to raise local deposit levels to a point where there will be no service charges.

On a related item, Mrs. Hart requested that an Investment Committee be set up to look at investments and advise the court.

"It's the going thing, since investment problems have come up in various places," she explained.

The Commissioners approved her request. They suggested that the Committee include the County Judge, one Commissioner, the County Auditor, and the Treasurer.

On another matter, the Commissioners discussed ways to empower the County's Vicious Dog Officer so he can legally take care of situations such as one that happened in Olden recently.

Comm. Pittman reported that an Olden woman called the Dispatch and said a stray dog in her yard was foaming at the mouth. Later the dog was reportedly killed.

Sheriff White said the County needed to implement the Animal Control authority county-wide. Otherwise, the officers can't do anything about a dog that has not attacked anyone, the Sheriff explained.

He said he has calls weekly about dogs that have been dumped outside the city limits, but has no way to pick up dogs. Once a dog attacks, however, an officer can legally shoot him.

The subject was tabled for more research.

There was a good report from the recent 9-1-1 request published in the Eastland County Newspapers. Judge Bailey said that 12 people had filled out the newspaper forms, giving their names and lo-

cations to be placed in the 9-1-1 system.

At noon members of the Commissioners Court attended a luncheon hosted by the County Extension Service.

They heard David F. Scott, consultant for West Texas Utilities Company, speak about the Texas Rural Leadership Program.

This type of training is expected to be available in the county this year.

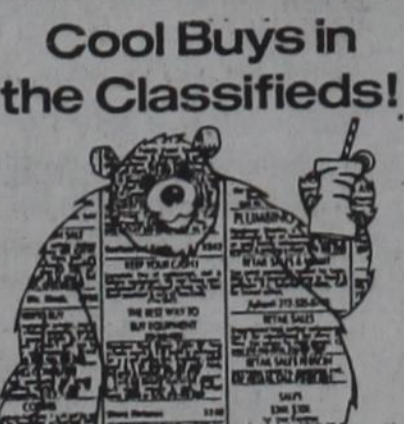

## EBAA Iron To Build Satellite Plant At Albany

EBAA Iron Inc. of Eastland announced Friday, April 21, it will expand its manufacturing plant to Shackelford County as soon as permit application is made and approved by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission.

"We're happy to go there," owner and founder Earl Bradley said.

Folks in Shackelford County are happy too.

Eastland Countians had hoped that the expansion of the Lake Olden firms would be in this county.

An inducement package was offered here.

The company, which started in the Dallas area in March 1964, manufactures underground pipe joint restraints for water and sewer systems. It sells to municipalities nationwide.

The Shackelford County plant will be located about five miles south of Albany on Highway 6. It will employ 25-30 people originally and more probably will be added, Bradley said. Initial payroll will be \$8,000-\$10,000 a week.

The county also will benefit in taxes provided by the plant, which is expected to cost several million dollars to build, Bradley said. The molding machine alone used in the manufacturing process costs \$4 million, he said.

Bradley said Shackelford County was chosen over other sites "so we can draw from that labor

market up there." He said he hopes the plant will be operational in September 1996. Bradley moved the family-owned operation from the Dallas area to Eastland in 1973. Another plant is located in Cordele, Ga.

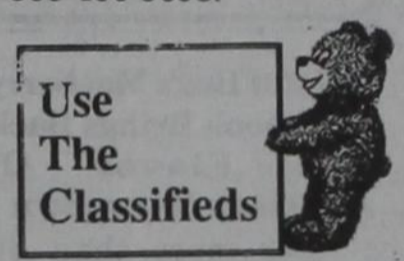

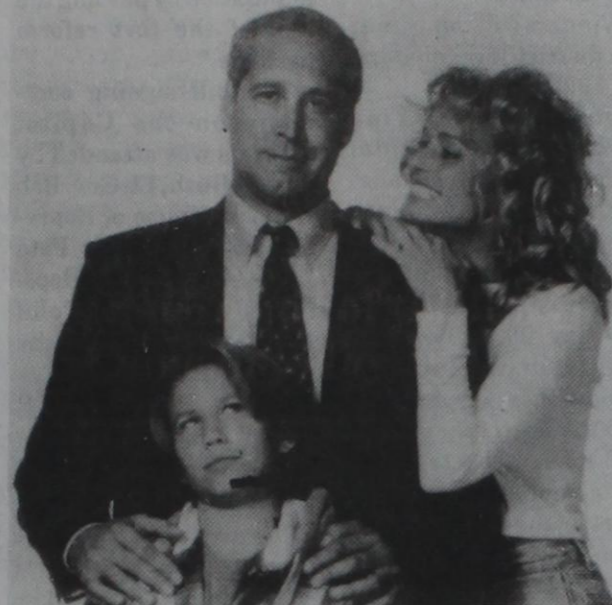

## Governor Bush Signs Punitive Damages Bill

A bill to cap punitive damage awards was signed in a Capitol ceremony Thursday by Gov. George W. Bush. Senate Bill 25 by State Sen. David Sibley is the first piece of tort reform legislation to reach the governor's desk.

"With the signing of this bill, we've laid a cornerstone for strong but fair reform of the civil justice system," Sibley said. "Now we must build on that foundation by passing the rest of the tort reform package."

The bill signing ceremony on the Capitol grounds was attended by Sibley, Bush, Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, House of Representatives Speaker Pete Laney, and State Reps. Rob Junell and Todd Hunter. Tort reform was declared a legislative emergency by Bush. SB 25 was carried in the Texas House by Junell, D-San Angelo.

"Limiting punitive damages is just the first of several steps the Legislature will take to curb lawsuit abuse," Sibley said. "Texans can expect other strong bills to be passed before the Legislature adjourns May 29."

SB 25 makes it more difficult for plaintiffs to win punitive damage awards. Plaintiffs who are legitimately injured will still be able, however, to recover economic losses,

such as lost wages and medical bills, and non-economic losses, such as pain and suffering.

The new law applies to cases that accrue on or after Sept. 1, 1995. Cases that accrue before that date will be governed by law in effect immediately prior to Sept. 1.

Other provisions of SB 25:

—Cap on punitive damages is lowered to two times economic damages plus no more than \$750,000 in non economic damages OR \$200,000, whichever is greater.

—Specified international torts (for example, murder, aggravated assault) are exempt from the cap. A House amendment added "intoxication assault" and "intoxication manslaughter" to the list of exempt torts.

—A plaintiff must prove fraud or malice.

—The burden of proof must be "clear and convincing" evidence, instead of the preponderance of the evidence required under current law.

—Ten of 12 jurors must vote to award punitive damages (the same margin as in other civil cases).

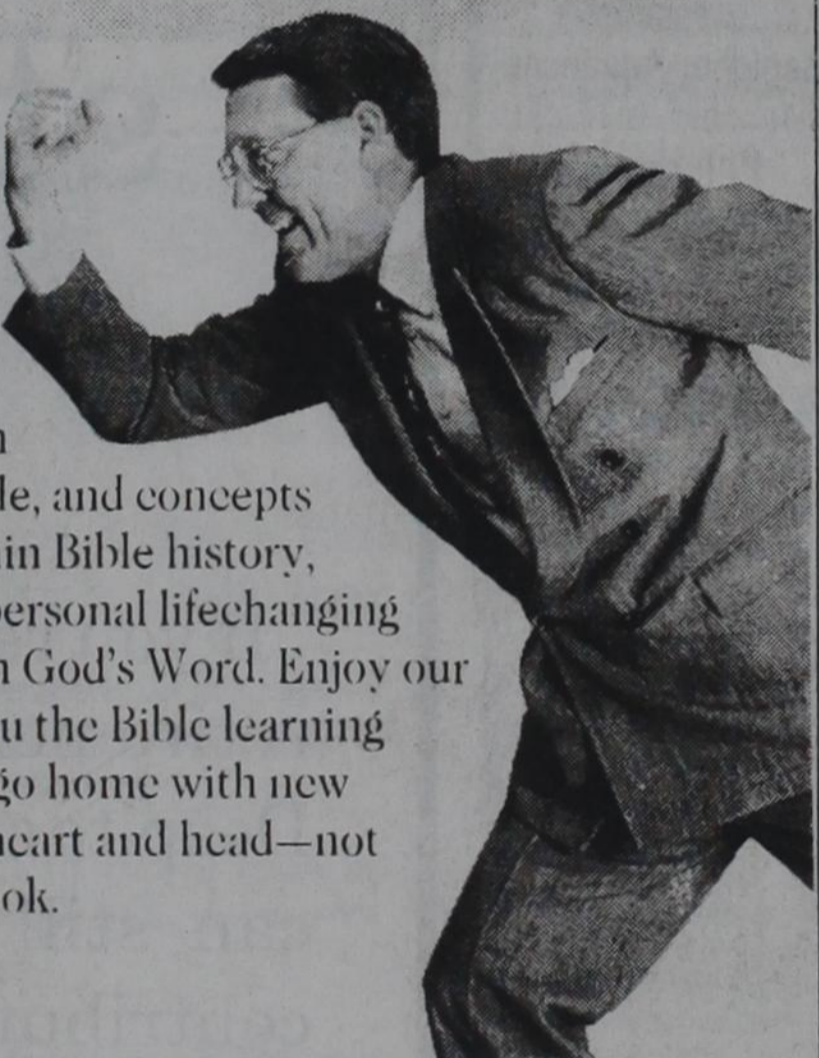

# Guest Slot by HVO

OK, C&W fans, eat your hearts out and maybe get our autographs. We've performed on the stage of the Grand Ole Opry. Well, not really on stage, but maybe backstage, sorta. Here's the way it happened: before we left for Nashville to spend Easter with Levi, Vince and Amy, we called Friend Roy (Fingerless Fiddler) Thackerson to ask to whom we should say "Hay." Roy insisted that we call his good friends, the Melvin Sloans. And what a treat that turned out to be. Since 1952, the Sloan name has been synonymous with Tennessee-style square dancing at the Grand Ole Opry. Melvin took over the tradition at the death of his brother Ralph in 1980, and the Sloan Dancers have not missed a scheduled performance at the Opry. If you've been to the Opry or seen it on T.V., you know that the dancers help open both Saturday Night shows and do a feature turn later; 4 times out front. Their style is uniquely middle-Tennessee (named the state dance by the legislature there), and best des-

cribed as "HIGH ENERGY." With over 5,000 Opry performances, over 400 T.V. appearances (including all the big shows), the Sloan Dancers were invited by President Reagan in '83 to perform at the Kennedy Center in a special salute to the "King of Country Music," the late Roy Acuff. In 1989, the Country Music foundation inducted Sloan into the Walkway of stars and the Country Music Hall of Fame. In '90 his shoes and costume were presented to the Foundation. Born in a log house, the last of six children of a sharecropper's family, Melvin was introduced to music early; his mother was the church pianist and had him singing before the congregation at age three, and church song leader at 13. Brother Ralph gave him his first guitar and they soon had string bands to win talent contests and performed throughout the Southeast. They worked as road bands for stars including Crystal Gayle and others. After Ralph's death, Melvin combined the two groups and has continued to entertain audiences at fairs, parks, conventions, Blue Grass Festivals, on television and as regular cast members of the Grand Ole Opry. On stage, Melvin is a

highly talented human dynamo; face to face, a man you feel you've known for ever and a man who speaks warmly of Acuff, Thackerson and Al and Nell Anderson of Cisco, all close friends.

WE WERE last at the Opry in '82; much has changed (Acuff is dead, as is Del Wood ["South"] and Minnie Pearl is in a retirement center; but much is just as it's always been: good, clean family entertainment. Most of us were raised on it; (a Monkey-Ward Airline radio with the antenna hooked to the window screen 'usually' could bring it in, not always. Some 'stars,' we heard on the five-cent-a-play juke box at John's Cafe in Carbon are still around from those '40s days (Hank Snow). Most are gone (Hank Williams).

Radio's longest-running show, the Opry is now in its 70th year, broadcast live on AM 650 WSM. There'll be weekday matinees during 'high tourist' season, but now they do a 7:30 show on Friday and a 6:30 and 9:30 on Saturday nights. Tickets at \$16.50, \$14.50 plus tax is a 2 1/2-hour BARGAIN! Who'd we see/hear: Grandpa Jones, Bill Carlisle, Bill Monroe (getting long in the tooth), Stonewall Jackson, Little Jimmy Dickens, The 4 Guys, Jack Greene, Osborne Brothers, Jean Shepard, Bill Anderson, Jan Howard, J.S. Sumner & The Stamps (Wow!), the Charlie Dan-

iels Band, Porter Wagoner (?), Charlie Louvin, Jimmy C. Newman (the Cajan), Jeannie Seely, Opry Squaredance Band and the Melvin Sloan Dancers, Hank Snow (80+?), Jeanne Pruett, Ricky Skaggs and Mike Snider. Picks? Greene from Earnest Tubbs band, many others.

Sloan invited us back stage after that 1st show, and the program showed that the second show was the same performers in a different order. Lineups are announced on Thursdays, and yes, you still hear the commercials that radio listeners do and the sets are geared to the 15/30-minute time slots. Our performance? Well, after the good visit with Sloan, on our way out thru the stage door, we hummed a few bars of "Elvira." The security guard smiled --he either liked our voice or knew that we were doing it to be able to always say "When I sang at the Opry."

The first plot of land, 70 by 80 varas, was purchased by the citizens of the "Chrysal Springs School Community", for the "Chrysal Springs Graveyard", the purchase price being twelve dollars and fifty cents (\$12.50). The title was vested in the trustees of this School Community and their successors in office. The grantors of this plot of land was a Mr. J.S. Jones and wife, R.A. Jones. The date of the transaction was January 28, 1880.

The record further sets out, by Volume 563, Page 106, that on April 28, 1965, the cemetery was enlarged by the purchase of two acres of land from

the H.H. Williams estate joining the old cemetery on the west. This addition as well as a new cyclone fence that encloses the entire cemetery was made possible by donations from the people of Desdemona and vicinity, relatives and friends of those buried there.

The entire citizenship of this community labor together in harmony and one accord, with the officials of the cemetery association working under their direction and supervision in caring for the last home of the deceased and always keeping it in presentable condition.

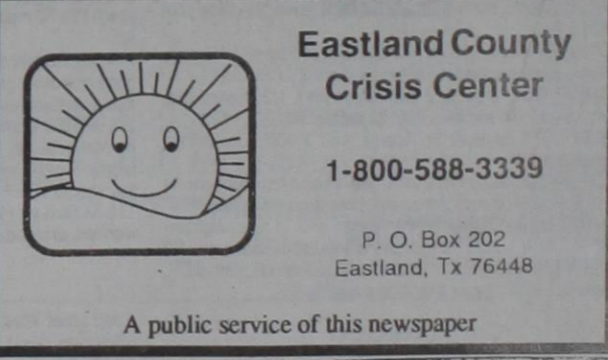

# Stephens County Frontier Days Offers 'Something For Everyone'

Rattlesnakes, horses, cattle, gunfights and cavalry maneuvers...those are all something one might expect to see in a movie about "the Old West," but during the last week of this month all those things will be common sights in Breckenridge as the second annual

Stephens County Frontier Days are held April 27-30.

Frontier Days activities will be held in three main vicinities of the community this year: downtown Breckenridge; Breckenridge Park; and, Stephens County Agriculture and Community Center

(Ag Center).

The Ag Center will be open for its activities - including a Gun and Knife Show, Bit and Spur Show, and Rattlesnake Show/Round-up - from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m., Saturday, and from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Sunday. One ticket will provide en-

trance for all activities planned inside the ag center on either day. Advance ticket prices are \$3 for adults and \$2 for children, ages five to twelve years, and they are available at the Breckenridge Chamber of Commerce Office and all banking institutions in Breckenridge. Tickets at the door will be \$4 for adults and \$3 for children.

Outside the Ag Center, in the Stephens County Rodeo Arena, a presentation of cavalry flags - reflecting a 22-year history of Texas statehood will be presented - at the beginning of the ninth annual Stephens County Ranch Rodeo, set for 11 a.m., Saturday. Following the presentation of the flags, a brief cavalry performance with sabers and jumps will be performed by members of Tom Green's 5th Texas Confederate Cavalry regiment, of Breckenridge.

The ranch rodeo features teams from Stephens County ranches with team members being actual working ranch hands. They will compete in a variety of contests.

Hollywood stuntman Dean Smith will be performing with his trained trick/stunt horse about midway through the ranch rodeo. Born in Breckenridge and raised in Eliasville, Smith worked for years in Hollywood as a stuntman in motion pictures and television. In 1992, he and his wife returned to live in Stephens County.

On Sunday, the Stephens County Young Cowboys Ranch Rodeo

will get underway at 1 p.m., in the rodeo arena. That contest will feature teenage contestants from all over the state.

The Breckenridge Fine Arts Center, located in downtown Breckenridge, will actually kick off the Frontier Days activities on Thursday with the opening of its Western Art Exhibit and Auction. The fine arts center exhibit will continue on Friday and Saturday.

Other downtown activities include a beard-growing contest and Frontier Fashion Show scheduled for 6 p.m., Friday. A Texas Old Time Fiddler's Contest also will be held Friday evening, at 7:15 p.m., immediately following the fashion show and beard judging contest. All those events will be held at the east door of Stephens County Courthouse.

Most other downtown activities will be held on Saturday, including food and craft booths featuring handmade, quality, craft items. The Craft Show and Sale at the courthouse and city park will be underway from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m., Saturday, and on Sunday, at the park only, from 12 noon to 6 p.m.

Also planned downtown on Saturday, will be a Civil War camp and gunfighting reenactments, beginning at 11:30 a.m. A telegraph demonstration booth will be set up in operation. Local merchants will be holding sidewalk sales on that day.

Poetry, stories, and music will fill the air at Breckenridge Park on Saturday. Poets and

fiddlers will take the entertainment stage from 10 a.m. until 12 noon. There are five cowboy poets and one storyteller scheduled: Fran Hedrick, Buster McClovery; Cheryl McClovery, Tiffany McClovery, and Larry McWhorter, cowboy poets; and, Rusty Nichols, of Albany, storyteller.

From 12 noon until 1 p.m., Anjanette Sanderson will sing country-western songs. Square dancers will perform between 1 and 2 p.m.

Brittney Hoffman and 8 Seconds will perform a concert from 2 until 4 p.m. Hoffman, a student at Abilene Wylie High School, was winner of the recent KEAN Radio Talent Contest held in Abilene.

Brittney Hoffman and 8 Seconds also will be the band providing live music for the Western Street Dance planned from 8 p.m. until 12 midnight, Saturday, at the park. There will be no charge to those attending.

Following Hoffman's afternoon concert, the poets and fiddlers will again take to the stage, from 4 until 6 p.m., to conclude the entertainment portion of the day's activities, prior to the street dance.

In addition to the Saturday entertainment listed above, other activities planned in the park will include: a 10K run and 1.5 mile walk, at 9 a.m., Saturday; a CASI-sanctioned chili cook-off, on Saturday; cowboy church services, at 8:30 a.m., Sunday; and, Miss Breckenridge Pageants, begin-

ning at 2:30 p.m., Sunday.

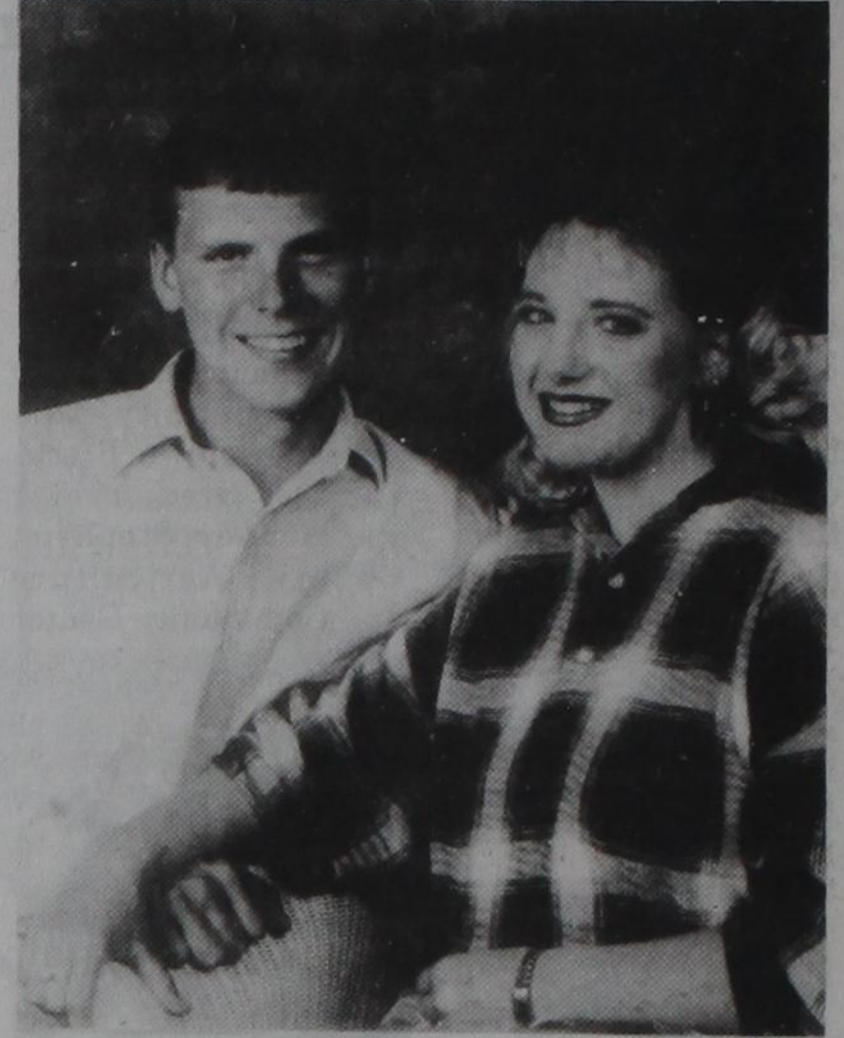

## Cisco Folklife Festival April 29-30

## Telling The Truth To Our Youth

"Our children are our future." How often have we heard that phrase? How often do we really think about it? And how often do we think about the tolls and information that children need to help them move forward to a healthy, successful future?

America's children and teenagers are growing up in a fast-paced, entertainment oriented culture that sends mixed messages about sexuality. Movies, Music, videos, and TV sometimes proffer sexual images that show neither precautions taken nor consequences of sexual activity. Parents wonder what they can do, and hope their kids will turn out OK. One of the solutions lies with the local schools, which can promote positive images and help young people make responsible decisions about sexuality. Medically accurate health textbooks and curricula are critical to this effort.

In 1993, the Texas State Board of Education prepared to consider the content and appropriateness of various new health textbooks in order to

recommend them to high schools. The selection process was drawn out for two years because of complaints lodged by individuals by the Religious Right. They pressured the Board to order changes in the texts, which, if made, would have falsified medical facts, denied young people lifesaving information about HIV/AIDS and condoms, and taught that sexuality leads ultimately to shame, fear, and death. Their list of 1,000 recommended edits was considered, and 300 changes were accepted. The Board then offered four approved texts to the local school district.

Although the rewritten texts acknowledged many of the Religious Right's demands, the changes were deemed insufficient by at least one member of the Board and the right-wing American Family Association of Texas (AFA). The Board member from District 8, Donna Ballard, then subverted the approval process by communicating her displeasure about the recommended texts directly to local school board presidents.

Ballard, a supporter of so-called abstinence-only health curricula, sent a letter to the local board presidents in March, urging them not to use the recommended texts in their districts. Even worse, she suggested that the district could purchase the books and then shelve them, wasting taxpayers' money. Along with her inappropriate suggestions, Ms. Ballard sent mis-

leading and inaccurate evaluations of the recommended textbooks that were prepared by the Texas AFA.

The Religious Right espouses the belief that textbook discussions of sexuality as a healthy aspect of life will encourage young people to "experiment." Having failed to outlaw sexuality education in the schools altogether, some Religious Right groups, such as Focus on the Family and Citizens for Excellence in Education, support "abstinence only" curricula that omit fundamental information on contraception and disease prevention and perpetuate medical misinformation.

As the truth behind these medically incorrect has become more widely known, right-wing groups have tried a different tack-encouraging the reintroduction into society of Victorian-style shame and guilt about sexuality. Those who support this idea fail to look to the future: They would prefer to go back to a time when shameful attitudes toward sexuality led to unhealthy and guilt-ridden adult and material relationships.

Every parent wants his or her children to grow up happy and healthy, and to be able to make mature decisions about the future. The notion that helping young people make informed decisions will cause them to become sexually active is misguided, and according to research, just plain wrong. A number of studies, including a 1993 World Health Organization report, have concluded that comprehensive health education programs

with a strong abstinence component can effectively prevent some teens from becoming sexually active. Young people are not confused when given information about both abstinence and contraception. And they understand that stigmatizing some kids in order to frighten others into certain behaviors is unfair and malicious.

Ignorance is not bliss. Kids think they know everything (remember those days?), but their knowledge about sexuality is muddled with myths and half-truths. People for the American Way has long supported quality education and provision of textbooks that give correct, comprehensive information about reproduction, contraception, and disease prevention. We encourage young people to think about their future and trust them to choose the best course for their lives.

Comprehensive health education does not preclude parental guidance and the inculcation of family and cultural values. In fact, professional educators know that parents are the best sexuality educators for their children. But parents are often uncomfortable about the subject and are not always clear on the medical aspects themselves. In some cases, parents do not assume the responsibility for their children's health and safety and the school must take on that role.

Abstinence, of course, is the only 100-percent effective way to avoid pregnancy and sexually transmitted disease. And every responsible comprehensive health education curriculum emphasizes it. But to deny young people information that promotes good health and might save their lives is both cruel and unjust. Schools must give our children all the information and tools they need to move forward in life free of shame, fear, unwanted pregnancy, and deadly sexually transmitted diseases.

One of the most indelible memories of my childhood is the wonderful aroma of baking bread. I enjoyed that unforgettable fragrance every Friday as Mama baked six big, crusty, brown loaves for us to enjoy.

One summer day when our doors and windows were open, the smell of baking bread permeated the neighborhood, bringing friends and neighbors

to visit where they could expect to receive a warm slab of fresh bread to sample . . . and I mean a slab, not a slice, generously slathered with fresh, sweet butter.

For me, the heel was the choicest part of all. I always hurried home from school on Fridays lest someone beat me to that hot crusty morsel.

Baking was an all-day job for Mama. Early Friday morning I'd find her in the kitchen, sleeves rolled to her elbows and flour on her nose, preparing her bread dough.

She sang a little jingle as she stirred in the yeast,  
Rise, rise,

Lift our lives  
With taste and smell.

Mama always said that her bread wouldn't be good until the dough squeaked, so she kneaded until that dough "talked back." Her loaves were huge, making today's bread seem puny by comparison.

My mom loved life and her way of showing it was evident every Friday - in the aroma and great taste of her wonderful home-baked bread.

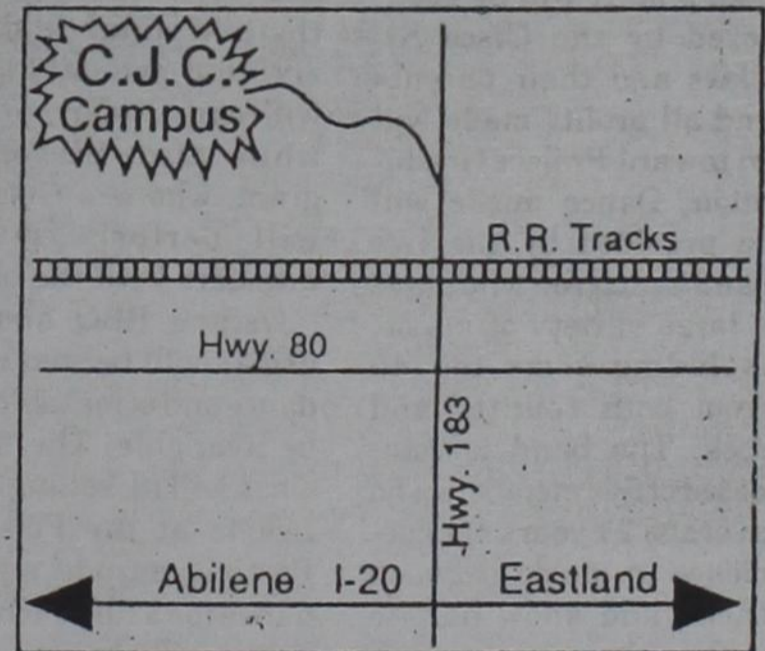
The CJC Rodeo Club participates in the Southwest Region National Intercollegiate Rodeo

Since our ancestors had a limited access to stores or money, many early Texas children played with cornhusk dolls. At the Festival, children have the opportunity to make their own dolls, assisted by Sarah Hounshell, Linda Campbell and Evelyn Kirk.

We are told that farm workers often made hoe cakes while working in the fields away from their kitchens. These hoe cakes will be made and cooked at the Festival, and onlookers will be encouraged to assist.

Other activities in which children and adults may participate include stone grinding wheat, corn grinding, apple peeling, and nail punch designs, directed by Susan Hanlon and Janice Ferguson.

Jane Ray's tatting and lace making is interesting as it demonstrates a once widely popular art, which is being revived.

Visitors may decorate their own cookies, and eat them also, at the Cisco PTO booth, and have their faces painted by Carroll Brown and students.

Those who wish to make their own hoe cakes at home may receive a sample of cornmeal from Ricky Watts at the power corn grinder.
