



Farwell Home Named Historical Landmark

One of Farwell's oldest homes has been designated a Texas Historic Landmark by the Texas Historical Commission.

Known locally as the Aldridge house, it is recorded by the Commission as the Hopping-Altridge house in honor of the two previous owners. Located at 710 4th St., the structure is currently owned by Mack Heald.

between 1915-1917 for R.C. "Coke" Hopping, Parmer County's sheriff from 1910-1918. It was purchased by James and Minnie Aldridge in 1918. Aldridge succeeded Hopping as the sheriff, with his term starting in 1919.

John, grew up in the house. After John married Lillian Orr, they moved into the house with his parents. Their two daughters, Mary Bell Aldridge Washington and Nancy Aldridge Mehler, grew up in the home, and it remained in the Aldridge family until selling to Heald in 1981.

Architectually, the house is a two-story, foursquare design-frame structure with two coats of wire and stucco applied over the wood siding. This technique was sometimes practiced in this part of Texas, with the resulting structure of this type called a Prairie Style building. The Hopping-Aldridge house is one of the few homes of this style to be found in this part of the Texas Panhandle.

In 1984, the house received an exterior restoration that consisted of replacing the bannisters that had previously been removed. All wood and stucco surfaces were painted in colors that were used in the era that the house was built.

The Hopping-Aldridge house is the first residence in Parmer County to receive a state medallion. Two buildings -- the Parmer County Courthouse and the old First National Bank building (currently part construction class will be offered of the Aldridge, Harding, Aycock and Actkinson law firm office on Third Sreet) -- in Farwell have been designated Texas Historical Landmarks in the past.

Interesting and often unusual highlights of Texas history can be found on more than 8,000 historical markers that dot the state. These familiar markers are the results of a joint local-state program. Markers are initiated, researched, and funded by county historical com- reservations, at 481-3619.

A systematic program of historical markers began in 1936, in conjunction with the state's centennial. Granite markers, often containing brass plates, were placed to honor counties' roles in the state's first 100 years

In 1962 the placement of official The house was built at this site historical Medallion building markers began under the auspices of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, forerunner of the Texas Historical Commission. These markers are awarded to structures worthy of preservation because of their historical, cultural, and/or architec-The Aldridge's two sons, Sam and tural value. Structures receiving the building markers are known as Recorded Texas Historic Landmarks and are afforded a measure of protection from demolition or alteration under state law. Currently there are approximately 2,000 of these building markers in Texas.

Soon after the placement of Medallions began, the marker program expanded to include interpretive plates with all Medallions. Subject and grave markers were also developed. With these additions, the program came to encompass a wide vareity of historical subjects, including events, persons, institutions, cemeteries, archeological sites, ethnic groups, churches, and communities.

The current contract which requires Energas to take its full requirements from Westar will be amended to provide that Energas will take a minimum monthly quantity equal to 80 per cent of Energas West Texas requirements. This release will allow Energas to seek the lowest possible priced gas to the benefit of its ratepayers. Under present market conditions, the release could result in reduced gas cost of between \$4 million to \$8 million.

2. Westar and Energas will enter into a transportation agreement providing for 'firm transportation for up to 20 per cent of the requirements of Energas' West Texas system.

3. The price per mcf under the contract for a given calendar year will equal Westar's approved margin plus a weighted average cost of gas. The present margin is 28.58° per mcf and the initial weighted average cost of gas will be \$2.95 per mcf. The weighted average cost of gas will be estimated for a given calendar year and will be adjusted annually for over or under recoveries.

4. Westar will refund \$6 million for the benefit of Energas' and Andrews Gas Company Inc.'s burnertip customers. Energas will distribute the settlement proceeds plus all accrued interest, by reducing customer bills over an approved period of time as necessary to fairly benefit all classes of customers. Additionally, Westar will reduce its approved margin by two cents per mcf for all gas sold to Energas for its West Texas system customers for a oneyear period.






