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Oklahoma City... Anguish For Our Neighbors

Former Ciscoan Mark Kurklin, a resident of Oklahoma City, was on his way to work on a recent morning. He had taken his son, Bryan, to school early that morning as he was involved in history quiz competition, and had dropped his wife, Joanne off at her office building.

As he started driving his car into the parking garage of the state office building where he works, he felt pain in his ears and heard the sound of a muffled explosion even though his car windows were rolled up. He thought it might be from nearby construction work, but as he went to the top of the garage to see, he saw a mushroom cloud from 12 to 15 blocks away. He thought at first it might be the I.R.S. Building, but then saw that it was the Federal Building. He could then see the smoke boiling up from burning cars around the building as the great heat ignited the cars and their fuel tanks.

Investigators say an explosion, equal to 5,000 pounds of dynamite, blew away half of the building, which had an estimated 900 people inside.

The explosive force was believed to have come from a fertilizer and fuel oil mixture in a Ryder rental truck which exploded within five minutes of its approach to the building. The explosion threw the truck's axle two blocks, blasted out a large hole in the ground, turned glass and metal in the area into deadly flying shrapnel, and the blew the nine floors of the Federal Building upward. The floors then fell, compacting what was under them. People on the sidewalks and in nearby buildings were killed and injured by flying objects and intense heat.

The busy Social Security area and the nursery were on the first two floors, and after the floors fell, there was only about 18 inches between those floors. And that is very little space for maybe a 100 plus people trapped inside for a week. Possibly only three people escaped from the Social Security area.

Mark and Joanne were familiar with the area and building. Both had worked in buildings across the street which were in the blast area. The explosion blew windows out of the building in the area and blew a heavy plate glass window out of the building 12 to 15 blocks away where Mark's office is located. The buildings where Joanne's office had been only last year, and where Mark had once worked, were gutted inside. Two people were killed and others were

injured where Mark had once worked. Hundreds were injured, often with cuts from flying glass and with busted and bleeding ear drums. It was horrible and without warning, and the damage was devastating. A friend was forced to abandon a now windowless downtown high-rise, leaving his possessions behind. But the damage at the Federal Building, where Mark and Joanne used the credit union and had sometimes left Bryan in the nursery when he was younger, was an awesome problem for rescuers.

And a fellow employee from Mark's office had been in the destroyed building the morning before.

Much of the good news, since the blast that so badly damaged 14 buildings near the destroyed Federal Building that they have been condemned, has been of the many people who were spared.

Three or four people who attend church with Mark and Joanne were in the Federal Building and survived, or were kept away from work by unusual circumstances that morning. One lady was in the Social Security area and was blown against a wall. She screamed as everything in front of her fell, then climbed over a five foot wall to escape.

The husband of a teacher in Bryan's school stepped into the restroom and was saved as the area where he had been was destroyed. It seemed as if God intervened to spare certain people, and they instantly went to work helping others. One man was blown out a window and fell four floors, but he was busy helping others until he was taken to a hospital.

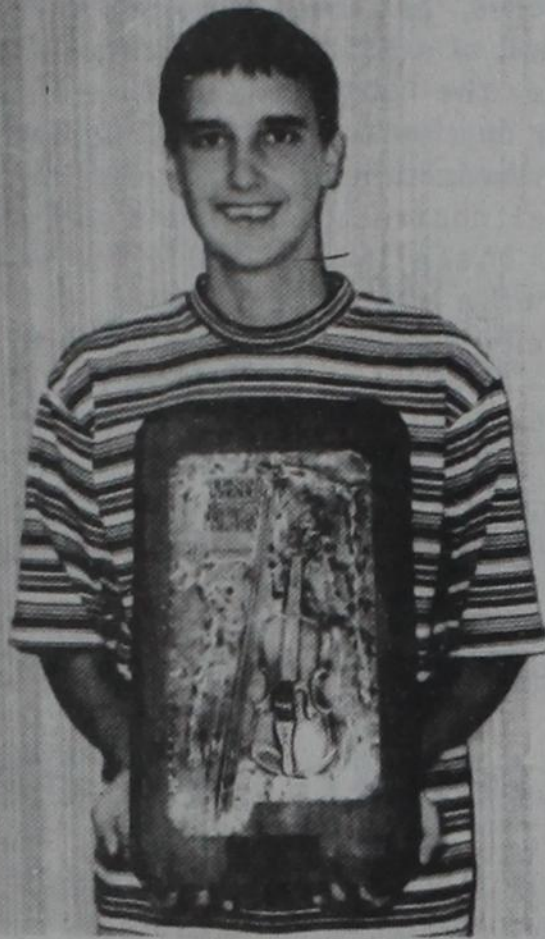
The people of Oklahoma felt insulted when Connie Chung said that they could not handle the situation without the help of specialized people from the Northeast.

Everybody worked together, and when requests went out for needed items, those items would quickly appear. When batteries were needed for lights, a battery salesman delivered a load of them to workers within minutes.

Tinker Air Force Base supplied equipment, and rescue teams came from almost everywhere. Teams from Mark and Joanne's church started feeding the rescue workers, who worked in two hour shifts, removing concrete and steel by hand, in an attempt to find more survivors.

But most of the survivors were gotten out the first day. As time wore on, bad weather and the smell of dead bodies became problems.

Mark thought it would

Robert was presented a cash award, a large and beautiful bronze plaque set in polished wood, and a custom-made jacket.

His name will be placed in the Texas Fiddler's Hall of Fame in Hallettsville, the youngest person ever to be so honored.

Both Robert and Brandy have won prizes before in the 0-15 age Division at Hallettsville. Their sister, Rebekah, placed in that age group Sunday.

Robert is a senior at Eastland High School, and will soon be 18 years old. In 1994 he won the Texas State FFA Talent Competition, and played at the National Convention in Kansas City.

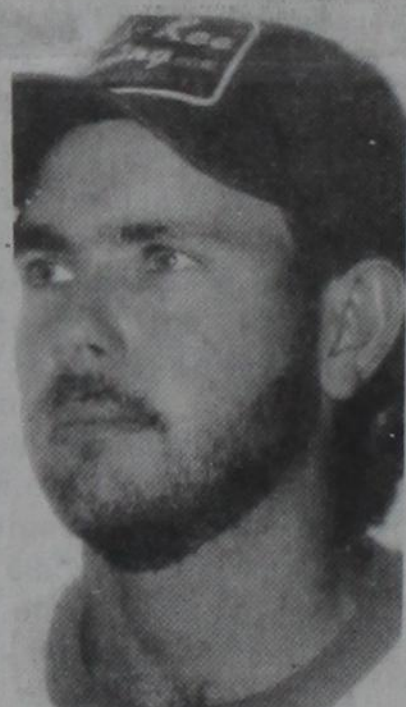

Facts from Rangers Mayor, not Rumor.

My statement is in reference to the delay of the water tap for Loves Truck Stop.

Certain individuals have made statements that the delay has been the result of my lack of interest in the Truck Stop, which is not true. My concern is for the future of Ranger!!!

Due to prior agreements by individuals are not in connection with the City of Ranger, or familiar with City procedures, has been the result of a \$950.00 loss to the city of Ranger, on a sewer tap, which was installed by outside contractors. The installation should have been done by the city. The city of

Ranger furnished Loves Truck Stop a temporary residential water meter for working conditions. This meter has been installed for the past 4

months.

A special 2 inch turbine meter and connections, which the city does not keep in stock, had to be ordered. When the meter arrived, the connection parts were not included, and had to be back ordered.

The connections did arrive Wed. Afternoon, April 19th. Because of a sewer problem allowing sewer to overflow in a residential area, a new sewer main was required to be installed, which was a # 1 priority. After 5 and one half working days, city employees had the tap made, and water available for Loves Truck Stop.

I want to especially thank Kay Dobbs on all her efforts, and other dedicated individuals who are responsible for Loves being located in our city.

Texas Gardener Tips

Few elements in the landscape complement one another as much as fences and plants. Fences form a pleasing backdrop for plants and can be designed to showcase espaliers or flowering vines.

Plants on the other hand, soften fences by subduing their angular, hard lines and by blending them with the landscape.

There are several factors to keep in mind when pairing plants and fences. First, plants that are scattered throughout the yard interfere with activity and diminish the roominess of the landscape. Maintain an open, spacious feeling by clustering flowers and shrubs as near to

the fence as possible. Select varieties that are proportional to maturity to their surroundings. A tree, or even a vigorous vine, can grow into a problem instead of an asset. Position plants far enough away from fences and their corners, so that they will develop symmetrically.

Choose vines that accent the fence, not camouflage it. Wisteria and other fast, heavy growers can overpower and damage light or medium weight fences. Make sure the structure is equal to the challenge.

be a good idea to give blood, but the line of donors was already too long. A line two or three abreast stretched for 50 yards, and it kept growing. Some work was delayed until the possibility of additional explosives was ruled out.

The Governor was at the site daily to support the rescue workers, and his wife organized the prayer service. President Clinton came and Billy Graham came even though he was sick. The Oklahoma people were praised for the way they handled the situation, and Oklahoma is being talked about as a standard for others to try to live up to.

The downtown area of Oklahoma City was quickly fenced off and guarded, and tight security was imposed.

Workers had to have Red Cross and F.B.I. clearance to enter the area. Photographers who tried to enter the area dressed as firemen and etc. were arrested. A morgue was set up by the building which housed Mark's office and he had to show his state identification to go on that side of the building.

National Guard soldiers guarded the area, and coverings were placed over building windows to keep people from seeing the many dead bodies.

The bodies were placed in refrigerated vans, and the bodies were x-rayed for any bits of evidence, such as a scrap of metal from an explosive device.

Since the Federal Building housed F.B.I. and A.T.F. offices, some evidence was recorded by security cameras around the building. The cameras reportedly helped to "finger" suspects.

People were not confirmed dead until they arrived at this morgue, and 94 were reported by last Wednesday. But rescuers hadn't been able to remove the bodies from the heavily populated floors of the Federal Building. A long job still faced rescuers with little hope that anyone else was alive.

Local television was dominated by almost constant news from the disaster area for about a week. The blast had registered on the Oklahoma Geological Survey's instruments at Norman like an earthquake.

People were turning on their headlights to show support for the rescuers and the families of victims.

It was reported that about 80 percent of the headlights in the city were on and about 99 percent toward Texas.

The damage to downtown Oklahoma City was estimated at \$50 to \$60 million, and maybe much more. The F.B.I. is saving and inspecting the debris for evidence, so the investigative and rescue costs are also becoming huge. It will take a long time for the city to recover, and some may never recover.

As far as Mark and Joanne know, their friends are still alive, but no one knows just who is

still in the rubble. A suspect, who is being held in El Reno Prison, reportedly had traces of explosive materials on his clothing when arrested, and reportedly told a man that something big was going to happen on the day of the explosion. Whoever did this is crazy, Mark insisted. And he asked that the people here pray for the people in Oklahoma who have suffered, lost, and endured so much.

Mark Kurklin is the son of the Walter Kurklins and brother of Richard Kurklin and Jean White, all of Cisco, and Travis Kurklin of Abilene.

But there has also been an ugly side shown by some Americans, who have stoned the houses of suspects later proven to be innocent and even caused the death of an unborn child. Such suspects and their homes were pointed out by the national media. And some may be trying to connect this horrible crime to innocent people for political gain or because they don't like them. And that is an equally horrible crime.

Oklahoma - The Blast Touched Us All

About 9:20 a.m. last Wednesday I had a call from Caroline Harris of Rising Star, the mother of my daughter-in-law, Kimberly Payne. She said Kim had just called from Oklahoma City, saying there had been a large explosion - but that she and my son, Marvin were alright. I knew that meant the two boys were fine too, for they would be near their family home in Norman, about 17 miles south.

I didn't quite understand what Kim's phone call was all about, but a wave of thankfulness flooded me. This family had been spared some sort of tragedy.

Marvin and Kim worked each day in the Health and Science Department, University of Oklahoma, not far from downtown Oklahoma City. My memories of that City were of a vigorous and sunny place, where new high-rise complexes stand beside the carefully preserved downtown sec-

tion.

As soon as I hung up the phone I turned on the television set. From that time on that day I was transfixed by the horror of the images and reports from Oklahoma City. I tried to quit looking and work, but I was always drawn back to the painful reality of what had happened. My prayers for the victims mingled with a prayer of thankfulness for the sparing of my family.

How could anyone be evil and unbalanced enough to execute such a diabolical plot? I felt this bombing must be the work of foreign terrorists. Surely no American could ever treat innocent countrymen in such a fiendish way! I also felt it was the work of a large group - sophisticated people who had a lot of money to travel around and carry this out.

The phone lines to Norman, Oklahoma were tied up, and I could not reach there until Friday. But on Wednesday I had many calls from concerned friends and family members. My son John called from Santa Barbara, California, and on Wednesday night my daughter Margaret called from her home in Germany.

It was Thursday morning there, and the news was flooding television stations. We live in a global community now. She was obviously shaken, and wanted to know if Kim, Marvin, Ben and Jonathon were alright. We spoke of the happy time last Thanksgiving, when we were all together in Oklahoma.

I didn't have many more details until Saturday, when Marvin came to Eastland County. He explained that he and Kim were running a little late to work the Wednesday morning of the blast. At 9:02 a.m. they were on I-35, three miles south of the city, instead of in the Labs or near downtown.

They saw what appeared to be two blasts - first a huge gray puff, then another distinct black cloud. Then as they approached the downtown area they realized this was a major disaster.

"It looked a lot worse in person than it did on T.V.," Marvin said. "A lot of glass was blown out over a wide area."

He said the laboratories at the Health and Science Center were not damaged, but a lot of medical per-

sonnel hurried to the blast site. Then the injured began to be carried to the hospitals. Many people who were not injured donated blood.

The rescue workers at the site had a very hard and dangerous job, Marvin said. On Thursday night a thunderstorm with high winds and lightning made things especially hazardous. And by Saturday the temperature was 35 degrees, with cold adding to the misery.

As he spoke I realized again how irreplaceable human life is. The people who wrecked that building destroyed whole families - and hopes and dreams as well. I knew I would never be able to understand how anyone could do that.

April 19th has become to be like Friday the 13th or a nightmare.

After reading all the headline stories of the bombing and hearing it on all T.V. stations it makes me feel sad, mad, and I guess a little scared.

The headline that struck me the most that I read was the one where the firefighter has the little girl in his arm right after the bombing on Thursday's paper and in Tuesday's paper this week it says "The tiny child cradled by a firefighter in worldwide photo is now in God's hands." (Baylee Almon was buried in a tiny pink casket, under a blue Oklahoma sky).

And as I sit here and write this, the death toll continues to rise. The nation mourns for the families of the victims and the kids we have heard called all week the "Children of America."

The one thing everyone wants to know is WHY? Will we ever know?

DUCK NESTING CONDITIONS FAVORABLE IN 1995

The fourth of seven events in the Anglers Choice West Team Circuit was held at Lake Proctor April 23, in what Anglers called "The Ice Bowl."

High cold north wind gusting to 35 miles per hour greeted the 28 teams at the 7:00 a.m. take off. Proctor's lake level had been three feet above full and was dropping during the tournament.

For the second straight month Tom Oliver and Faron McCain of Sweetwater took top honors with five fish 14.87 and big bass of 6.34. Berkley Power Worms in 2 to 4 feet of water was reported as the winning way.

Second place Randy Hudgins and Dick Thomas of Burleson kept a spinner bait in the water for five fish 11.87.

Our third place team hails from Breckenridge and Cisco. Richard Lan-

caster and Bobby Rains put five fish in the boat for 11.52.

Five teams were awarded cash prizes and one regional sponsor prizes furnished by Great Outdoors, Boxey Lures, Fullen Motor Co., Williamson Tire Center, D&B Marine.

Favorable nesting condition for ducks last year led to large population increases. Habitat conditions have changed since last year, but the potential for duck production should be similar.

"Last year, pond numbers in May in the North Central U.S. and Canada improved and were above the long-term average by 74 percent and 13 percent, respectively," said Brian Sullivan, waterfowl program leader at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "Pond numbers held up in July and were above the long-term average by 45 percent in the Canadian Prairies and 38 percent in the North Central U.S."

Rainfall in these areas was near normal during fall, he said. Snowfall during winter was normal in eastern areas but below normal in western areas. Snow and rain has continued this spring in eastern areas.

"This year the Dakotas, which were in excellent shape last year, will be even better. Some lakes in the eastern Dakotas are at their highest levels this century," Sullivan said. "Because of the excellent nesting cover in CRP (Conservation Reserve Program) fields, ducks should pull off a tremendous hatch in the Dakotas again in 1995. Montana did not get much snow and is drier than last year. Wetland conditions in Manitoba and eastern and central Saskatchewan are good, but western Saskatchewan

and Alberta are dry. Heavy spring rains would benefit western breeding areas."

Sullivan said harvest surveys from the 1994-95 hunting season showed substantially higher numbers of young ducks for most species. "Production of blue-winged teal in 1994 was the second highest on record and increased population of redheads and pintails also was notable."

"Good production last year combined with good habitat in many areas this year should lead to further improvements in breeding populations," he said.

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Agricultural Viewpoint

By Davy Vestal

Area cow/calf operators will have the opportunity to learn about a program that could help shape the future of their marketing strategies. The Eastland County Extension Livestock & Forage Committee is coordinating a meeting to be held on May 22 at 7 p.m. at the Eastland Livestock Auction Company. The program will focus on how cow/calf operators can better meet the demand of stocker operators and cattle buyers.

Dr. John McNeill, Associate Department Head of Animal Science at Texas A & M University will present information on a program called TEX-VAC 45. Basically the program will entail how cattlemen can better prepare their calves for marketing through proper vaccinations and handling. The TEX-VAC 45 Program is designed as a certification program.

Producers can have their calves certified through proper authorities for marketing as TEX-VAC 45 calves, this could mean a real plus for both the seller and buyer.

The advantages of the certification are that cattle buyers are more confident with the cattle they are purchasing and there by are more willing to pay a premium price.

The Eastland Livestock Auction Company and the Ranger Auction Company are interested in developing an area TEX-VAC program. These businesses, with participation from producers, have expressed an interest in having special segments of their sale designated as TEX-VAC 45 cattle. The special segments will possibly be held on a bi-monthly basis during the

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regular sale.

This is an interesting concept and a real opportunity for cow/calf producers to excel their marketing potential.

If you are interested, there will be a supper held on the evening of May 22 along with the program. TEXAS-VALUE ADDED CALF*

Texas-Value Added Calf (TEX-VAC) is a calf management, health, preconditioning, and backgrounding program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service designed to enhance quality, efficiency, and value of the beef calves. While all of the following procedures are beneficial, returns are directly related to the number of practices implemented.

and any calves to be stocked should receive a Clostridial booster here or at weaning. Heifers should receive Brucellosis vaccine.

1) Vaccinate with minimum 4-way Clostridial (blackleg-type) and others based on herd history and local veterinarian advice (Haemophilus, pasteurilla, lept, redwater, etc).

2) Castrate bulls.
3) Dehorn all calves.
4) Growth implant with approved nursing-calf products.
5) Permanently identify calves with correctly placed, properly registered brands, and individual i.d. if desired.

6) Under applicable conditions, treat for internal and external parasites.
7) Continue providing a free-choice mineral adequate in phosphorous, magnesium, and trace minerals, particularly copper, zinc, and selenium.

8) Provide a limit-fed, high protein creep feed to supplement low quality forage and teach calves to eat.

Weaning Preparation (4-6 weeks pre-weaning)
1) Vaccinate for BRD complex (IBR-PI3-BVD-BRSV), with injectable chemically altered modified live (MLV) IBR and PI3, killed BVD, and MLV BRSV.
2) Replacement heifers

and any calves to be stocked should receive a Clostridial booster here or at weaning. Heifers should receive Brucellosis vaccine.

3) Vaccinate late or unvaccinated calves with "working" shots discussed above.
4) If this weaning preparation is not done, give BRD series, (1) above, at working, plus an intranasal modified live IBR-PI3 at working.

Weaning
1) Administer injectable BRD re-vaccination (IBR-PI3-BVD-BRSV), with MLV for IBR and PI3 and killed or MLV for BVD and BRSV.

2) Give any other vaccines recommended by local veterinarian.
3) Calves to be backgrounded on the ranch which did not receive the weaning preparation shots should get an intranasal IBR-PI3 and a BRD complex, see (1) above, at weaning, with a BRD re-vaccination of the same type 14-21 days later.

4) Wean and background calves for at least 45 days on excellent quality (11% C.P. or higher) hay or grazing and 1% of bodyweight of a 14-16% protein, high energy feed. If this ration is not feasible provide 2 lb. of 41% pellets or 4 lb. of 20%, low-fiber cubes. Gains should be highest with the 1% bodyweight ration, intermediate on 4 lb. of 20% cube, and lowest on 2 lb. of 41% pellets.

5) At this point, calves are well suited for stockers or replacement heifers, group marketing, direct feedlot use, or local auction marketing. Plan in advance with your marketing agent to receive maximum price benefit from these superior quality calves.

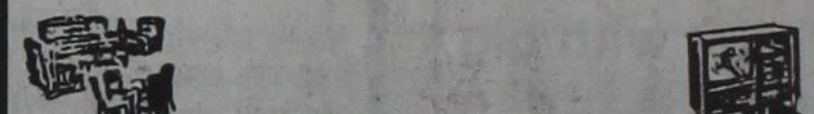

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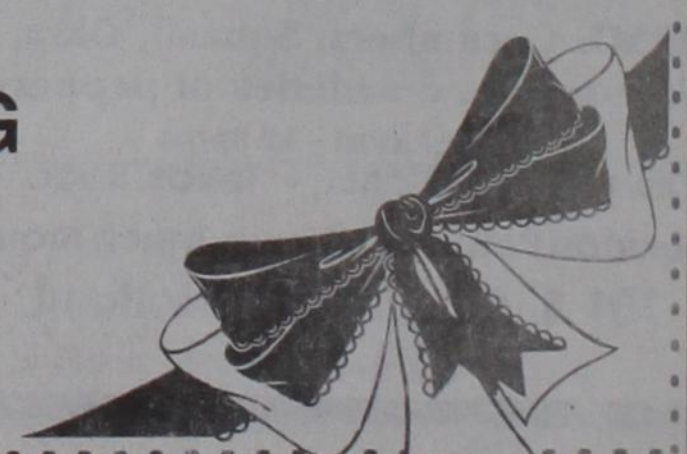


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1995 Legislative Agenda Summary

1. Abolish Outrageously High "Punitive Damage" Awards

Punitive damage awards must be limited to doubling the actual economic damages, and the same standard used in criminal cases ("proof beyond a reasonable doubt") should be used in civil punitive cases, as well. Multiple awards of punitive damages against the same defendant arising from identical sets of circumstances must be prohibited.

2. Make Consumer Protection Laws Apply To Consumers Again

The Deceptive Trade Practices Act (DTPA) was enacted in the early 1970's to give consumers legal recourse in small transactions. The DTPA has been expanded far beyond its original intent and is now abusively applied in pure business-to-business transactions and to professional service relationships. Parties with legal representation should be able to voluntarily waive the provisions of the Act.

3. Limit Liability To A Defendant's Own Percentage of Fault

In Texas, parties who are found even fractionally at fault can be forced to pay 100% of the award. This is not only patently unfair, it encourages the naming of numerous defendants (sometimes hundreds) by plaintiffs who are leveraging fear of this rule into expensive settlements, regardless of fault.

4. Make It Safe For Doctors To Participate Medicine in Texas.

Doctors refusing to practice in Texas and doctors practicing expensive and unnecessary "defensive medicine" are only two of the negative side effects of lawsuits against physicians. Frivolous lawsuits must be deterred, and excessive recoveries must be curbed.

5. Reverse Texas' Reputation As Delivering Great Lawsuit Venues

Lawyers and plaintiffs from all across the nation exploit Texas' reputation for outrageous civil justice awards, and Texans' tax dollars are used to try every single case. Inside the state, loose venue rules permit personal injury lawyers to "forum shop" their cases into selected "killing field" coun-

ties having little or no connection to the case.

6. Deter Frivolous Lawsuits

Businesses - particularly small businesses - operate in constant fear of frivolous lawsuits costing thousands of dollars in legal fees to defend. A Litigation Accountability Act must be adopted which allows judges to penalize lawyers and parties who bring frivolous lawsuits.

7. Eliminate "Junk Science" In The Courts

Testimony of "professional witnesses" is given every day in Texas courts by people who are unqualified and who espouse theories that are unreliable and at odds with substantive science, medical, or technical knowledge. This element of the judicial system needs a complete overhaul.

8. Unclog The Texas Civil Court System

The litigation process is too cumbersome and costly. The Supreme Court should adopt rules to streamline the litigation process. Mediation should be encouraged, and abuse of pretrial discovery and trial procedures must be stopped.

9. Limit Contributions To Judicial Candidates

Current election practices give the appearance that wealthy attorneys purchase special status before judges when they make large campaign contributions to their

campaign funds. Limits should be placed on how much individuals can give to judges, and steps should be taken to lessen the appearance of impropriety that arises when attorneys practice before judges to whom they have given substantial campaign help.

10. Protect Public Servants Performing Their Official Duties

Lawsuit threats public servants degrade the quality of service to every Texan. We must give these employees - especially those in the public safety field - the confidence to do their jobs without the fear of personal liability.

11. Injured Parties Protection Act

It is unfair for a personal injury attorney to receive a 40% contingent fee on a case involving severely injured persons (e.g. \$400,000 on a \$1 million claim) if the plaintiff attorney only spends a few hours of time on the case. Contingent fees should not be charged on early settlement offers and then only on net recovery in excess of the settlement offer. This would reduce windfall attorney fees without affecting the injured party's access to the court, or reduce the incentive of attorneys to settle quickly or proceed to trial, if necessary, to vindicate a plaintiff's rights.

ARE OUR TOWNS PREPARED?
By Richard Kurklin

The explosion in Oklahoma City was a major disaster for that city and the country, and disasters can happen almost anywhere without warning. In Eastland County the more likely threat might be a tornado, a major fire or an accident. But since a major railroad route and an interstate highway run through our towns, and hazardous chemicals are transported regularly in large quantities, an explosion or deadly gases are always an accident possibility. An explosion can always kill people and do damage, but we don't have occupied tall buildings, large regular concentrations of people, or some other targets which may appeal to deranged people seeking attention, or which may increase the

scope of disasters. Some disasters have happened locally, but they have been limited to mostly property damage. Arson cases in our town, a railroad tank car explosion in Eastland, large of multiple range fires, and some large building burning and threatening other buildings come to mind. And local emergency personnel, and even the taxpayers, realized that we have to be more prepared than we usually were a generation back. Disasters of the past have served as training sessions and warnings. We are never ready for a disaster, but we can be prepared. The area cities have an emergency plan with sections of instructions for various possible emergencies. The Police Chief is the head of the local emergency team, which includes fire fighting and medical person-

nel, city and utility company service people, heavy equipment operators, police officers and others. And there are plans for making needed equipment available during an emergency. Cisco police offices, fire fighters and medical emergency people are more highly trained than the average, and the emergency people are well equipped. Emergency response to disasters not involving criminal activity are usually easier and quicker as less precautions have to be taken and there is not a crime scene to be guarded until evidence is collected. The security of emergency workers is a consideration sometimes. In our towns public buildings, school, churches and the former hospital building might be used as emergency centers, shelters or clinics. But if medical, equipment, or personnel needs become massive, or if highly specialized help is needed, requests for assistance may be made through the

Immunization Clinics

Texas Department of Health will hold immunization clinics in Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, and Gorman.

These clinics are for both adults and children. Adults should have a Tetanus booster every ten years. Cost is based on a sliding scale. Ranger Commissioners Roundup

Monday 24 April 1995

Mayor Ainsworth called the meeting to order. The financial report by Comm. Tankersley showed the General Fund to be \$51,075.07; Water Sewer & Sanitation \$12,970.96; Hotel-Motel \$6.40; Police Special \$91.87; Ambulance Fund \$4,525.95; Sewer Line Reserve \$802.51.

All minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

First item on the agenda was a presentation by Laura Wilson on the City of Ranger's standing in regard to the grant for the new sewer plant. The previous engineering firm underestimated the daily water flow by fifty percent. Ranger needs to hire a financial advisor to handle the F.H.A. loan requirements and a certified water well digger to plug a water well. There were also some federal forms that had to be signed by the Mayor. Consideration of approval for fix-price quotes and/or proposal on conducting archaeological survey by a certified archaeologist on Mr. S. Alan Skinner, CRD; Mr. Donald Alan Dorward, CRD; Mr. Joseph L. Yedlowski II, CRD were all approved in a motion by Comm. Wells and second by Comm. Tankersley. All ayes.

Second on the agenda was the approval of 1995 bad dept list. The commissioners discussed how when water is turned off at a location the residents will turn it back on. At this point it was brought to

the commissioners attention that anyone found turning their water on without paying their bill could be charged under law with 'Theft of Services' which is a felony. With that a motion was made and seconded with the vote all ayes.

Third item was old business by Commissioner Tankersley. His proposal was for senior citizens making five hundred dollars a month or less be given a ten percent discount on their water bills. This discount would only be given if the recipients were able to show they met the requirements by proving their income. This was tabled to get more information.

Commissioner Tankersley then went on to explain how the swimming pool was going to have to be closed this year because of a lack of funds to keep it open. Mayor Ainsworth tried to get the commissioners to wait until the new commissioners were sworn in pointing out that they may be able to come up with the money to open the pool. Comm. Tankersley went on to make a motion to not open the pool with Comm. Brett seconding. The majority voted to keep the pool closed.

The last order of business was the approval of the March bills. Comm. Brett made a motion to approve and Comm. Wells seconded. All ayes, with that Mayor Ainsworth adjourned the meeting.

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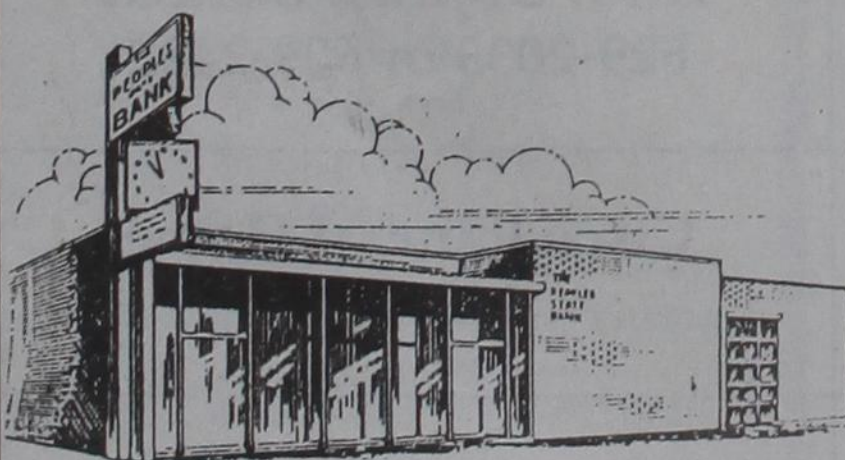
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
