She guides through the type of needles, fabrics, threads, silk ribbons, and hoops, then gives instructions on transferring designs, changing design sizes and even laundering tips. Sprial-bound, it looks handy.

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
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Gerry Zummer Attends TAFCE 1995 Spring Board Meeting

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
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Harbin-Butler-Cook-Thompson Reunion To Be Held June 24 At Lake Cedar Country Club

BOOK REVIEW

SUPERSTITIONS AROUND IN FUN **NEW BOOK**

We all know about common superstitions such as finding a fourleaf clover and carrying a rabbit's foot. But why do we do such things? And where did these superstitions come from?

In Knock On Wood (Rutledge Hill Press, \$7.95 paperback) author Linda Spencer reveals all kinds of ordinary and obscure superstitions, and discusses in witty passages why and how they came about. Even in these modern times, we still carry some ancient beliefs about ways we can improve our lives, ward off evil spirits, or even predict the future. Love, Money, and Health are just a few of the things many superstitions revolve around, and in Knock On Wood, Linda Spencer discusses these often bizarre

Superstitions at length. For instance, did you know that if a man want to know who he will marry, he should take a pair of socks and name each sock after a lady he knows, and then put them both under his pillow. He should then get into bed over the footboard. The lady he dreams about that night is the one he will marry. By the way, Spencer recommends not using sweaty gym socks for his activity.

Women can also predict who they will marry by counting white horses. After a

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woman has counted ninty-nine white horses, the next man she shakes hands with will be the one she marries (Spencer suggests counting white cars instead since white horses aren't exactly plenti-

clovers the focus of superstitions? Spencer says legend has it that when Adam and Eve were dismissed from the Garden of Eden. Eve grabbed a four-leaf clover. Ever since, four-leaf clovers have signified good luck. And what about the old superstition of carrying a rabbit's foot for good luck? Well, you must carry the right kind of rabbit's foot, the left hind foot of a rabbit killed at the full of the moon by a cross-eyed person. Such a rabbit's foot is guaranteed to bring good luck, that is. if you can find one!

But many superstitions travel far from the beaten path. Obscure superstitions include the following unusual beliefs:

*Once upon a time, old shoes were thrown at a newly-married couple by the bride's family, indicating they gave up possession of

*It is bad luck to lean a broom against 'a bed because the evil spirits in the broom will somehow cast an evil spell on the bed.

*If a man has a mole on his nose it means he is rich.

*Ancients believed in a number of talismans to avoid a toothache. One was to split open a nutshell and dig out the meat. Put a dead spider in one half and close up the shell. Hang it around your neck on a string and you will never have another toothache.

Blind Trumpet Player Brings Scouts Message Of Persistence

Special Contributor to the Dallas Morning News GARLAND- Trumpet player Stacy Blair has performed at Kennedy Center, the Royal Albert Hall, for RCA Records, on television and in 52 countries around the world. These days his audience is just as likely to wear Boy Scout uniforms as tuxedos, and his concert halls often have the delightful acoustics of an elementary classroom or a church fellowship hall.

After more than 25 years of performing, Mr. Blair, 40, has reduced his concert schedule to share time with local youths. In talks with Scouts and other youngsters, he stresses the values of perseverance and faith and of pursuing dreams despite disabilities or high odds of failure.

Mr. Blair, who has lived in Garland for seven years, knows his subject. He has been blind since infancy as a result of receiving too much oxygen in an incubator after being born prematurely. His twin brother, Steve, also is visually impaired, but not as severely as Stacy.

At a recent meeting of Scout Troop 580 in Garland, some two dozen teenagers sat quietly enthralled as Mr. Blair talked about his life and showed off Guthrie, his Golden Retriever guide

"The love and joy of Scouting is something that's stayed with me my whole life," said Mr. Blair, who became an Eagle Scout in 1971. "Scouting taught me how important it is to be dedicated to whatever you do, like my trumpet playing. I practice every day, and if stop for even one day, l can tell the difference. If I stop for two days, my friends can tell. And after three days, the whole world can tell . . . and that's not good!

"You kids are dedicated too, and that's so important," he continued. "We hear about gangs all the time, but you all are the good young men that we don't hear about, who are doing some really positive things for the community.

The Scouts seemed especially intrigued with Guthrie, who remained

quietly at his master's side throughout the talk. seemingly oblivious to the squirming, whispering boys just a few feet away.

"When he's got his guide harness on, he's on the job and he's very serious about it," Mr. Blair explained. "But the minute that harness comes off at home, he's all dog."

This became evident a few minutes later, when a harness-free Guthrie transformed into a wiggling, 75-pound puppy, valiantly trying to win a reporter's affections by eating her notebook.

After the meeting, Scoutmaster Gene Wenzel said Mr. Blair was "one of the better speakers we've had - I think it was very beneficial for the boys to see someone who has overcome a disability the way he has. They think, Well, if this guy can do it, maybe I can, too.'

"Since Stacy talked to them, I don't think I've got a single kid who doesn't think he can make Eagle Scout. I've had four or five call me and say, "That's it. I'm going to be an Eagle," Mr. Wenzel said. They, like Mr. Blair, will be fighting the odds: In the Dallas area, only about 2 percent of Scouts ever become Eagles, Mr. Wenzel said.

Mr. Blair - a native of Eastland, Texas, a small town about 100 miles west of Fort Worth - has always adored music. He studied piano as a youngster, but switched to the picolo trumpet at 14 after hearing his older brother, Ed, play the instrument. Blind trumpet player "I just loved the sound of

Because Braille music Guthrie, at a recent was scarce - most of the meeting of Scout Troop piccolo trumpet repertoire dates from the Baroque era of the late 17th and early 18th centuries - Mr. Blair learned primarily by listening to recordings. he has memorized more than 140 trumpet concertos.

After graduating from Eastland High School, he earned a bachelor's degree

in music from Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene and followed that with a master's degree in music from the University of Louisville in Kentucky.

Mr. Blair was a repeat winner of the International Trumpet Guild Solo Competition, and in 1979 won a Fullbright Scholarship that allowed him to study in Paris for a year under the tutelage of famed trumpeter Maurice Andre. Mr. Blair's French sojourn culminated in his winning the grand prize in the Maurice Andre International Trumpet Competition, a careerlaunching feat that is comparable to a pianist winning the Van Cliburn competition.

Throughout the '80's and '90's, Mr. Blair's international acclaim has continued to swell. He has won more than 40 other trumpet competitions; recorded three albums of classical and gospel selections for RCA; performed as a soloist with orchestras including the Tel Aviv Symphony, International Orchestra of Mexico City, **Buenos Aires Symphony** and Dallas Symphony; and taught master classes at Juilliard, Tanglewood, Wolf Trap and the Aspen Music Festival, among others. Last summer he made his fourth appearance at the Salzburg Music Festival in Austria.

"I haven't really played that much in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, or even Texas," he said. "They always joke that a concert artist is an 'out-of-town' musician, and that's true. For some reason, you get more respect away from home. I haven't played with a symphony in Texas in 12 years." That situation will be rectified next March, when he will per form with the Garland and Las Colinas symphonies as part of their combined subscription series.

Guthrie, who has been Mr Blair's companion for about three years, accompanies his master on all tours and lies placidly at his feet when Mr. Blair performs. "I did a concert awhile back at First Baptist Church in New Orleans, and someone told me that during one number, Guthrie sort of looked around and yawned. He said he (Guthrie) looked like he'd heard that one before," Mr. Blair said with a chuckle.

To keep Guthrie prepared for the rigors of international travel, Mr. Blair takes him to D/FW Airport a couple of times a month for practice with escalators, revolving doors and security checkpoints.

Mr. Blair, who is single, recently reduced his concert appearances to about two a month, with volunteer activities filling his remaining time. He's coordinating the stage events for the Boy Scout Circle Ten Council's North Texas Outdoor Expo next month, and he frequently visits elementary schools. He also competes in a bowling league - "They just show me where the ball returners and gutters are, and I go to it" - and he volunteers for Gideons International, handing out small Bibles to college students and others.

Every October, Mr. Blair participates in the Guiding Eyes for the Blind Walk-a-thon in Yorktown Heights, N.Y. He got Guthrie from the Guiding Eyes school, where man and dog spent a month in boot camp-style training. Guthrie was the only longhaired dog in a class of black and yellow Labradors. "They said they gave me the longhaired dog because I was the musician," Mr. Blair said.

Children at Florence Elementary School in Mesquite recently "repaid" Mr. Blair for his visit with them. "They put a pickle jar at the end of the lunch line, and the kids threw in their extra change," said Bill Sefzik, principal of the school. "The money was donated to the guide dog school."

The children raised about \$100 for the non-profit school, Mr. Sefzik said.

Mr. Sefzik and his family have become good friends with Mr. Blair. "Our daughter, Mary Ann, is blind, and he's been such a good influence on her," Mr. Sefzik said. "It's great for her to be around blind adults who are independent." Mary Ann is

Mr. Blair's community contributions have earned him several local honors, including a Texas Heritage Award, Spirit of Texas Award from WFAA-TV, Channel 8, and KRLD Citizen of the Week Award in October 1994.

In addition to his volunteer and performing schedule, Mr. Blair also is working on a video of warm-up and practice exercises for brass instrument musicians, and a cookbook for the blind. which he plans to selfpublish on cassette tapes. "I call it 'Cooking Without Looking," he said with a wry grin.

His love of cuisine was fostered on his world travels where, he said, he collected tastes the way some tourists collect postcards. "I have to admit, though, that after a year in Paris, I was really looking forward to a McDonald's," he

His travels also have taught him to be thankful for his blessings. "We take so much for granted, the things we have as Americans," he said. "I remember being in Haiti and the Dominican Republic and other Third World countries doing foreign-mission work (through the Baptist Church), and need help."

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
