## **4 Abilenians Face Cisco Charges After Fracas**


Lt. Kenneth Preston directed the investigation, and Rashad was arrested

by Viola Payne Memorial Day is a time to honor our fallen heroes, especially those who have died in wars. But the 10th Anniversary of the May 24 train crossing disaster in Eastland has reminded me of another thing that it is good to remember our living heroes

May 24, 1985 was a most unlikely day for a disaster - clear and bright, renewed by spring. As I drove into Eastland the main thought I had was a 10 a.m. appointment at the Eastland Telegram, 215 S. Seaman, with Joe Gray. Mr. Gray was to give some history on the Eastland Schools material we wanted for the upcoming EHS Reunion.

On time, I walked through the front door of the Telegram and spoke to Mr. Gray. But when we started toward my office there was a dull rumble toward the north of the building, and he said: "Sounds like there's been an accident or something."

I shook my head: "Oh, they're probably just moving something around in the pressroom. There are all kinds of sounds around here on press day. I don't worry about them."

tion of one - - himself - could be the toughest ministry of his long life. But it isn't.

It's true that Veteran Preacher Lee Fields often losses patience with himself for not being able to do the things he's always done for the Lord and others. It bothers him that he has to use three pieces of magnifying glass to be able to read his beloved Bible. It bothers him that he has to rely on two walking sticks to help support the worn-out legs that won't let him do all the things he used to do.

He accepts all that. He only regrets the he didn't do more and can't do more for others today.

And he's still got his remarkable sense of humor. He'll celebrate his 89th on May 30th, Memorial Day. "The banks always close for my birthday," he chuckles.

There is no counting the number of lives that Lee Fields has affected posi-

tively, and he is remembered affectionately by the many he witnesses to, baptized, married, buried and comforted at times of loss.

Sally and Jim Fields came from Tennessee to Carbon in 1905. Lee was born the next year. Later the young farm boy at age 15, alone with his dog in a pasture, surrendered himself to the Lord and felt almost immediately that more was expected of him. But he fought it. Times were hard. His father was not well. Work came first. Education,

At 34 he was ordained a deacon on Sept. 29, 1940, at the First Baptist Church in Carbon. Lee first believed that took care of his commitment to the Lord. It didn't. He still wrestled with himself, knowing deep down that he was expected to preach. But how could a farmer/ carpenter with limited education serve the Lord?

the area where the newspaper was located. So I crawled into my

jeep pickup, feeling sort of guilty. I was supposed to be writing stories, yet I was leaving the action - while somewhere Duke Dixon and Terry Simmons were out risking their hides!

I decided to see if I could sneak around town and get back into the area around North Seaman. But I soon found I couldn't even get close.

People were pouring from the downtown area and Courthouse Square, some on foot, some trying to use vehicles. All roads were apparently blocked into the North Seaman Street vicinity, with only emergency personnel and vehicles moving through.

I caught glimpses of law officers headed into the thick of things, firemen, personnel coming in from Eastland, Cisco, Ranger and other places. Suddenly I realized how much all these people meant to the community.

It was that pallor of gray-black smoke above the scene that convinced me I didn't want to stay around long. It reminded me

too much of a Biblestory picture of the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah!

Worse than that, it had an acrid smell - a hint of fumigation.

You need clean air to live, I decided. So I made my way out to the country, and the air never smelled sweeter. But I knew that while I relaxed at home in safety there were workers in Eastland risking everything to contain that fire, direct traffic, and care for the injured. I realized they were all very special

As the day wore on I learned, by telephone and radio, the extent of the disaster.

The tanker of propylene gas that exploded had blown up into the air. If it had blown sideways it would have probably set off a number of other derailed tank cars, including a hydrofluoric tank car beside it. As it was, the tanker that exploded did not burn itself out until about 3:15 p.m. Monday.

The hydrofluoric tank car was leaking, and that continued to pose a threat. A patch was finally welded onto it about 7 p.m. Saturday night, and then the city evacuation

could be lifted. The final welding was done by Ken Chapman of Ken's Motorcycle Shop, who completed the job when personnel from an out-oftown firm collapsed because of the heat.

Eastland County Sheriff Don Underwood and Police Chief Lyndell Underwood later stated that the hazard was greater than could possibly be imagined.

"Had the tank car of hydrofluoric acid been exploded by the LPG explosion," they said, "It would have completely wiped out an area of at least two miles in diameter!"

Eastland Volunteer Fire Chief Jack Graham (now J. P., Pct. 1) summed it up this way: "I always knew we had a great Volunteer Fire Department. Now everyone knows it. And the Volunteer Fire Departments from the adjoining towns, the law enforcement offices, the D.P.S., all coordinated their efforts in the best way possible.

"Yes, I was real proud of our crew for staying at their posts," he reflected. "For if even one more train car had gone up Eastland and much of Eastland County would have no longer had

The debris was finally cleared up, and life slowly returned to normal around Eastland. But I knew it would never be quite the same. For many of us had been reminded that hazardous materials are carried by rail and highway right through our area almost every day. We were also reminded of the dedication of individuals who put their lives on the line for other people.

Two more derailments (not involving crossing accidents) have kept these impressions alive. One derailment was only last year, northwest of Eastland.

Local law enforcement officers and firemen responded to these potential dangers in

their usual way. It was no surprise when two Eastland citizens, Volunteer Fire Chief Philip Arther and Terry Edwards, were called to the Oklahoma disaster to give assistance. They, like others around, have already proved what they can

Far from the marbled edificises and stainedglass temples, he served, always in the heart of where people were hurtingfor the word and pleading for ministering. Lee was there. At the bedside. At the graveside. At the sad times, the good times.

Typical of so many small church preachers, he was (and still is) the People Preacher. The man of kind words, encouragement, concern and Christian admonition.

The roll-call of his ministries is almanac-long and because memories are frail, hopelessly incomplete:

Pleasant Hill, Mitchell, Staff, Long Branch, Cook, Mangum, Olden, Downing, Odessa, Midway, Beatty, Calvary (Cisco), Ranger, Carbon, Gorman, Kansas City, Arizona, Tennessee.

In the Sesquicentennial year of 1986, Mangum Baptist Church presented him its coveted Love and Appreciation Award. He treasures the plaque today.

Somewhat like Paul the tent-maker, Lee was a skilled builder and is known for the quality and craftsmanship of the homes he's built, the cabinets he's installed and the other construction projects he's done. One man for whom he built a home, says of him, "You can tell him what you want, trust your billfold to him and you won't be disappointed."

Because he knew how small congregations struggle with finances, he pretty much paid his own way because he could and wanted to do this part in contributing. He was and is a giver, not a taker.

He's preached hundreds of revivals and many of these were back during the "protracted two-week" varieties which are virtually unknown today.

Lee suffered a sad, sad birthday in 1982 when Gene, his beloved wife of many years, died following a lengthy illness just hours before the May 30th date.

Limited physically, Lee today is still a fountain of positive witness. He wishes he could have done more. It hurts when he's asked to assist today and can't, but time has taken its toll.

He gloriously accepts one day at a time, and when he talks about the future, it's still his same important witness.

He will tell you that he is excited about what God has to offer, and he sure doesn't want any of his family and friends to be

After his long and full life, Lee now looks forward to God's beautiful gift to





Arteries, not age, may be the key to mental acuity, a Netherlands study suggests. Clogged arteries in the brain affect mental performance. Doctors recommend exercise, careful diet, regular checkups - even aspirin - to keep arteries clear.

Treatment with bright, full-spectrum light seems to be effective against PMS-associated depression. Researchers at San Diego State University suggest that light therapy helps restore normal circadian rhythms.

No-needle dental anesthesia uses TENS (transcutaneous electronic nerve stimulation) to block pain signals to the brain. It's said to work for 80 to 90 percent of patients, especially for minor procedures.
