

Game Warden Reviews Local Hunting, Fishing

Spring turkey season, Sixty percent of deer killed which has just closed, is here are does and forty about thirty days long now and is becoming popular, Game Warden Kenneth Payne told members of the Cisco Rotary Club at their Thursday noon luncheon. "Many turkeys are being killed here," he said. In addition to a hunting license, a \$5 turkey stamps is required. Payne, a Game Warden for 29 years, 26 in Eastland County, reported that 18 inch flat head yellow cat and 9 to 12 inch channel cat may be caught at Lake Cisco. But you must have a Coast Guard approved wearable life jacket when fishing from a boat even if it is less than 16 feet long. Dove season opens September 1, and he says that there is good cover and he is seeing lots of dove. But too much hunting will make local doves moves south. All day hunting also makes it hard for Game Wardens to check hunters and enforce game laws, as it must be done morning and evening both. In Eastland County, hunters may kill 1 buck and 2 antlerless deer, but they can't be killed in bow season and gun season both. Bow season is from September 30 to Oct. 31, and gun season is from Nov. 4 through Jan. 7

percent bucks. At present hunters from Fort Worth are paying \$5 to \$10 a day to hunt here, and are overhunting the deer, Payne says he believes. Killing two does and four turkey are too much. Quail hunting was poor last year, but should be better this year as there are more quail. Fire ants are destroying the quail and hurting hunting in much of Texas. But motels are usually full in Eastland County during quail season. Three hundred licenses were sold in Eastland County last year to out-of-state quail hunters, mostly from Louisiana. Only two or three percent of the hunting is illegal says Payne, and meat from illegally or accidentally killed animals is given to the needy. Game Wardens have been having fun with a deer decoy. It seems that some who hunt illegally just can't resist shooting at it, and it has been hit many times. Of course it is being watched, and some hunters are still taking illegal shots at it as the Game Warden arrives. As much as \$500 in fines have been collected in a day. Hunters who are trespassing with a gun may be fined two or three



What Is Pentecost?

Many have been the occasions when someone has enquired of me, "What does the word 'Pentecost' mean? Why is the word Pentecostal incorporated into the name of your church?"

This, I hope, from a historical view will help solve some of the questions.

The word "Pentecost" is found on three different occasions in the bible, all in the New Testament.

We first discover the word "Pentecost" in Acts 2:1-4, "And when mithe day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance."

The day of Pentecost was one of the three major feast days on the Jewish calendar. The day of Pentecost or the "Feast of first-fruits", as it was often called by the Hebrews, was a celebration of the giving of the Mosaic Law to Israel in Sinai. Every Jew was obligated by the law to make the annual pilgrimage to Jerusalem for the observance of this most hallowed day. It is estimated by scholars that anywhere from two to three million Jewish pilgrims were within the gates of Jerusalem on the particular "day of Pentecost" as recorded by Luke in the book of Acts. It is most significant that God chose the day of Pentecost to bring birth to the New Testament Church. The law, given to Moses, after the exodus from Egypt, was the beginning of the old covenant, which was limited to the Jews alone. The day of Pentecost, held fifty days after the most sacred of Jewish days, the Passover, was in celebration of the giving of

the law of Moses, or the old covenant. God chose, that on the exact day when man would be celebrating the old covenant, to usher in the New Testament of grace in the birth of the

church on Pentecost. Every student of the Bible will unanimously agree, that the church was born and brought to life on Pentecost.

What happen on Pentecost? One-hun-

dred and twenty, including the twelve apostles, and Mary, the mother of Jesus, were gathered in an upper room in Jerusalem, waiting for the promise of the father. All of a sudden they began to speak in an unknown, unlearned language, or tongue, as the evidence of the Spirit baptism. People around them, who had quickly gathered upon hearing the great commotion, were amazed, because that all those who were speaking in these unknown tongues were Galileans, yet they were speaking clearly and distinctly in foreign or unfamiliar languages.

Some have futilely tried to explain this supernatural occurance by saying that the only reason the one-hundred and twenty spoke in tongues was so that God could speak to every man present in his native tongue. This claim is erroneous for three reasons. First, all Jews, no matter where they lived were required to be fluent in the Hebrew tongue, therefore varied tongues wouldn't have been necessary. Secondly, Peter the disciple to whom Christ gave the keys to the kingdom, preached an impromptu sermon to all those gathered. They all must have been able to understand, for the third reason which I will explain. Lastly, they all asked, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?. . . " (Acts 2:37) Tongues was not given for the purpose of spiritual instruction, but was the evidence of the Holy Spirit infilling. When Peter told them what they must do

AUSTIN - House and Senate negotiators gave final approval last week to a bill that would increase local control of schools, offer parents new school choices and require more days of class for most students.

The measure, which rewrites the state's education laws, is expected to pass both houses before the legislative session ends May 29.

Conference committee members said the reduction in state regulations and the increased authority for local school districts should prompt districts to develop better academic programs.

"The freedom that is given to local school districts to adapt to the educational needs of their children is probably the most meaningful change in this bill," said Paul Sadler, D-Henderson, chairman of the House Public Education Committee.

"We're trying to create a new mindset that local districts have the freedom to innovate and be creative, and not have to turn to the state for permission to do everything," Ratliff said.

While vouchers were rejected, the committee did adopt a public school choice program that would allow students in low-performing schools to transfer to another school in their district or a neighboring district using "public education grants" from the state.

Meanwhile, Gov. Bush, who had been critical of a welfare bill that emerged from conference committee, said he is pleased that lawmakers changed the bill to require a five-year wait before reapplying for welfare benefits.

The bill was voted out of conference committee with a three-year wait, but Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Kerrville, persuaded some lawmakers to change the wait to five

Food Stamp **Card Launched**

State Comptroller John Sharp last week formerly initiated a new system of electronic welfare benefits for Dallas. Sharp, Mayor-elect Ron

Kirk and other Dallas officials formally launched the new Lone Star card system at a grocery store in Lakewood, near Dallas.

The Lone Star card works like a charge card, allowing welfare recipients to purchase food without stamps and to receive monthly cash benefits without waiting for a check from Aid to Families with Dependent

Children. Officials believe all Dallas welfare recipients will have received their cards by June 1, when more than 200,000 families in the Dallas area will switch to the cards.

Some 58 deaths and 240 injuries could easily have been prevented last year if Texans had only heeded warning signs and signals at highway-railroad crossings, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Barry Williamson and Commis-

•The Senate has sent Gov. Bush a bill that would deregulate the state trucking industry to conform with federal law and transfer regulatory authority over registration and safety from the Texas Railroad Commission to the state departments of Transportation and Public Safety.

•The House gave final approval to a major anticrime bill, but an amendment by Rep. Clyde Alexander, D-Athens, to legalize police checkpoints to catch drunken drivers, failed, 84-57, 10 votes short of passage.

•A package of Medicaid overhaul bills were unanimously approved by the Senate and sent to Gov. Bush's desk. Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, told lawmakers the measures will save the state \$6 bil-

lion in the next five years.

Eastland, Callahan, and Comanche Counties each had one crash during 1994, with one injured in each. Brown County had grade crossing crash with no injuries.

The commissioners urged motorists to focus on the danger and play it safe as they cross railroad tracks during National Transportation Safety week, May 14-20. If more people realize how deadly cartrain crashes are, they might keep themselves from becoming part of the statistics that boosted Texas to the top of the crossing crash list in 1994, the commissioners said.

"Stop, look, listen, and live, it's as simple as that," Chairman Williamson said. "Please do not try to beat a train. You can't. The train will beat you, and it will beat you badly."

Texas led the nation with 553 rail crossing crashes in 1994, followed by Illinois (335), Indiana (281), Ohio (238), and Louisiana (225). Within the state, Harris County topped the car-train crash list with 65, followed by Tarrant (29), Dallas (25), Webb (21), and Bexar (18).

"We can't just hope for safety at rail crossings, we must plan for it," Commissioner Rylander said. "The next time you come to a rail crossing remember, a few extra seconds is not too long to wait for a train when the alternative can be fatal."

Rail crossing crashes took 58 lives and caused injuries to 240 others in 1994. Another 48 people died on Texas tracks while illegally

walking on, fishing from, or crossing railroad right-of-way. Sixty-two were injured in trespass incidents. Most of the victims didn't understand the danger, or ignored warning signs, signals, or safety gates, the commissioners said.

"Far too frequently we receive reports of preventable accidents and deaths at railroad crossings," Commissioner Matthews said. "Like any other area of public safety, education is the key. The goal of our bilingual public awarness campaign is to reduce these senseless tragedies by alterting Texans to the dangerous - often deadly consequences of ignor-

ing the warning signs." Railroad Commission efforts to increase awareness of rail crossing dangers include presenting crossing safety programs to schools and other groups across the state, distributing school bus




Damage to the Federal Building in Oklahoma City: these pictures were taken with telephoto lens from two angles by former Ciscolan Mark Kurklin to show damage caused by the explosion which killed 167 or more people. Mark had driven within five blocks of the Federal Building that morning but was more than twelve blocks away when he heard the explosion, which hurt his ears. Two more people are believed to be under the pile of rubble shown around the bottom of one footing. The building was to be demolished Tuesday so that the pile of rubble could be removed safely to gain access to the bodies. The extensive damage to the massive masonry and steel components of the building point out that it was truly a miracle that 170 or fewer people were killed. Usually more than 900 people would be in the building at that time, but fewer than 600 were present due to a number of unusual happenings. Several of those killed were in other buildings nearby. The blast blew out both near side and far side windows in buildings within two blocks including a very tall one. The insides of the nearby buildings were wrecked also. A large lady who was friends with Mark and Joanne Kurklin was in the Social Security office and was one of probably only three there who survived. She had to climb over a five foot high wall to escape, ordinary an impossible feat for her, but she reportedly cleared it with plenty of room to spare. Several buildings now have plywood replacing broken window glass.
