Students Tour Bindery, See Books Being Made

How do you make a

County Home School Association (ECHSA) found out recently. They

By Ruth V. York toured the manufacturing plant of H.V. Chapman

square-paned windows and doors reminiscent of colonial shops, ECHSA students met owner Stan Chapman. He pointed out two antique pieces of binding equipment amid the chairs and tropical plants.

Chapman began, "someone must first write the manuscript. Then someone (usually a printing company) prints, folds, and collates the pages. Then they bring it to us. We bind it."

He does it much as his grandfather did fifty years ago - basically, the way it's been done for centuries. There are concessions to the speed and muscle of machinery, but his employees (including his father and uncle) still do a lot of work by hand.

"Books are assembled in sixteen-page sections called 'signatures," Chapman explains. "We sew each signature at the fold with nylon thread on a smything machine. The machine sort of crochets the signatures together as it goes."

Chapman continues. "Like people, books must have a strong, health spine. So, after we add front and back end sheets of heavier paper, we coat the spine with five coats of a flexible white glue containing resin. That secures the stitches that hold the signatures together.


"We also attach a square of woven 'supermaterial' to the spine. This cheesecloth-like fabric, with the end sheets and covers, forms the book's 'hinges."

Next, fascinating ECHSA students, comes The Guillotine - a supersharp trimmer with a massive blade. It ensures the book's pages are all precisely even.

"That completes the 'heart' of the book," says

Chapman. For hardbacks, cutting the selected cover material and the cardboard forms is next. Rollers apply a dark glue to the inside of the soft cover, and skilled hands fold it around the front, back and

He will have to serve at least half of his 25-year sentence before he is eligible for parole.

Starr and Light resemble each other, which might have led to the mixup in identity by some witnesses of the robbery.

Starr had been held in the Erath County Jail for 133 days. Representatives for Starr said they felt their client was innocent, and urged the police to pursue leads which might link Wheat to the crime.

She had made an audio tape of Wheat telling about the robbery. The quality of the tape was poor, but a transcription of it was made for the jury.

Let Us Not Forget By Cecil Copeland

The Third Army, 5th Infantry Division, European Theater of Operation, or ETO.

Let Us Not Forget I, Cecil Copeland, was in the 737th Tank Battalion, part of the 5th Infantry.

We crossed the Danube River at Passau, Germany, into Austria about the end of April, 1944.

We went East into Austria and then turned North into Czechoslovakia.

The 5th Infantry liberated the town of Volary. The people pronounced the name, "Wollern." In this town we liberated approximately 140 Jewish women or girls, from 20 to 30 years of age. From this point on, I will refer to them as the girls.

The girls were the rehains of 4000 that started the death march of 500 Kilometers.

The march started at Grunberg, Germany on January 25, 1945 and ended March 15, 1945 at Helmbrechts, 300 Kilome-

After a month of waiting at Helmbrechts to see how the War was progressing, the march right on down the line.

The ones that got too where they fell.

The second march started April 13th and ended May 5th. When the 3rd Army liberated the town of Volary, there was 200 more Kilometers walking for the girls.

Forty nine girls died at Volary from malnutrition and murder by the German guards. Several died after the United States Army liberated them. Some of them had lost weight down to 70 or 80 pounds. The human body can stand only so much.

The purpose of the march was to get a bunch of slave labor into Austria. Hitler thought he would pull his army back into Austria and make a last ditch stand. He thought the Allies would let him have a country to start over in, but that did not happen.

In 1994 I wrote a letter to the Mayor of Vollaryand asked for the true story of what happened. About a month later, I received a phone call from Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Robinson. They sent me a copy of her scrap book or album. She was a survivor of the death march. She was born Amalia Mary Reichmann in Bielitz, Poland. The only crime this person committed was being born a Jew.

The Nazi gave her a number of 63905 which was tattooed on her arm.

I asked the Mayor for a true story of the town of Lidice. This town was West of Prague. The capitol of Czechoslovakia. He told me the town was not rebuilt, but the Four Powers, England, France, Russia and The United States, constructed a memorial, with a lot of flowers and memorials to honor the dead. I will let the letter from the survivor speak for itself.

I mentioned this thing with the girls in my book, 'War As I Saw It."

Under a program then called the War Bride Program, I arranged to bring Mary to the US (I lived in Provincetown, Massachusetts at the time.) We've been married since 17 June 1947 and have two children and three grandchil-

There is a great deal to tell you about the events which brought the young women (ages from 16 to 34, but concentrated in the 20-24 age group) to be liberated by units of the 5th Infantry Division on 6 May 45. Mary and I have tried to put what happened to the girls behind and concentrate on being normal American parents. However, in the last three years, we've decided that we should piece together what happened and leave a story behind for our grandchildren.

We've spent a lot of time trying to track down as many of the girls who survived as we can (there were perhaps 200 of the original 1,500 who began the Death Marches on 29 January 45 alive and scattered on May 6, 1945 when the first contact was made with American boys). There may be 100 still alive; we've contacted about 35. All express a wish to leave a recounting of the events 29 January - 6 May 1945.

We've proposed that in exchange for getting together with the "girls" as I still call them and videotaping their recollections and copying any photos they might have, Mary

and I will write an accounting with photos and share it with the girls for their families. We've met with groups of 5 to 6 girls in Los Angeles, Israel, New York and interviewed by phone a number more.

We've located and visited with Captain Charles Fraser and T/4 Melvin Jackfert of the 5th Medical Battalion who were with the girls from the liberation through the first critical three weeks. During that time and despite heroic action by the boys of the 5th Medical Battalion, eighteen of the liberated girls died in addition to those who were lying dead when the boys arrived.

We've also located and spoken on the phone with T/4 Harry Morgan of Yonkers NY who was the jeep driver of the first contact with the girls. Major Harry Hooper of Cincinnati who was the officer with Morgan has since died. We've also spoken with Major Frank Anker of Chicago and Captain Nathan Knoll of Miami who worked with Captain Fraser at the Volary hospital.

I'm pleased to have seen the commendation Dr. Fraser, Melvin Jackfert and eight other medical personnel were awarded for their work in Volary

with the survivors. All girls with whom I spoke remember the GI's with deep, deep emotion as "angels."

I enclose some photos taken by the Signal Corps the day after (May 8, 1945) the surviving girls were taken to the hospital. You can see that some of the photos have the Signal Corps insignia in the bottom corners of the photos. Also, I send on Mary's album which we put together for our children and grandchildren. You can see that the article about liberating the girls was written up in the 5th Infantry Division's newspaper (pages 44-45 of Mary's album) of May 25, 1945 and the photo of the forced walk past by German civilians (page 43) of the reburial of twenty two girls who died in Volary between 3 May when they were forced there by the SS and 7 May 1945 when the 5th Med Btn boys removed the survivors to a woodworking school converted into an emergency hospital.

As for Lidice, it's also a long story, but the essence is that it was a town of about 1,000 working-class persons about 15 miles west of Prague.

In May 1942, Reinhard Heydrich, Hitler's personally-selected head of the German-occupied Czech

lands was assassinated. A reprisal was the eradication of the entire vilyear Reich. lage of Lidice as well as numerous other acts of

reprisal. On 10 June 1942 on personal orders of Hitler, the town was surrounded without notice by SS; all men over the age of 14 were shot to death (about 585), all women were sent to the concentration camp Ravensbruck (about 220 of the approximately 500 women survived) all children were arrested and sent in Gestapo care in Lodz, Poland. There about 15 were deemed fit to be "Germanized" and were sent to SS families to be reared as Germans. Every one of the 200 or so you served? other children (infants to age 14) were gassed and to hear from you. cremated in nearby KL Very best regards Auschwitz, specifically in the gas chambers and

I have maps of the march of the girls made, towns, and places where the German guards shot the prisoners, and cemetery lot numbers where they are buried.

A lot of the bodies were left on the side of the road. Some were covered with trash or brush and later found by the Americans and buried.

S.S. Lt. Alois Dorr was in charge of this march. Dorr was born January

14, 1911 in Hapfinger, Germany. I have a copy of his sentence to life imprisonment in the penitentiary at the Nurenburg War Crimes trials.

Dorr served ten years of a life sentence and was released. All other guards did not serve any time. They said they were following orders from the man in charge.

The girls were given a bowl of potato soup, once a day. Some days they got nothing at all.

Mr. Robinson told me that his wife was very emotional about the American flag and the American soldiers. As time went on, she prayed to God; "Give me one more day, Lord, one more day."

Her best friend was shot by one of our air planes. She told Amelia as she was dying, "We are so close to the Americans, Lord do not let me die now!" Some of the guards were killed from the same strafing.

Some people think the atrocities did not happen. If anyone wants to check the authenticity of this death march, I have telephone numbers, army records, and War Crimes Trial records.

We must not let something like this happen again.

· Gender - You chances of developing osteoporosis are greater if you are a woman. Women have less bone tissue and lose bone more rapidly than men because of the changes involved in menopause.

· Race - Caucasian Age - The older you and Asian women are more likely to develop osteoporosis. However, African American and Hispanic women are at significant risk for de-

 Bone Structure and Body Weight - Smallboned and thin women are at greater risk.

 Menopause and Menstrual History -Normal or early menopause (brought about naturally or because of surgery) increases your risk of developing osteoporosis. In addition, women who stop menstrating before menopause because of conditions such as anorexia or bulimia, or because of excessive physical exercise, may also lose bone tissue and develop osteopor-

Lifestyle - By smoking, drinking too much alcohol, consuming an inadequate

amount of calcium or getting little or no weight-bearing exercise, you increase your chances of developing osteoporosis.

· Medications and Disease - Osteoporosis is associated with certain medications (e.g. cortisone-like drugs) and is a recognized complication of a number of medical conditions, including endocrine disorders (having an overactive thyroid), rheumatoid arthritis, and immobilization.

· Family History -Susceptibility to fracture may be in part, hereditary. Young women whose mothers have a history of vertebral fractures also seem to have a reduced bone mass.



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
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
