City Commissioners Meet

Ranger City Commissioner's met Tuesday evening. Dr. Paul Riffle from the Ranger Economic Development Corporation said the Economic Development Corporation will pay the Mott's 5 and 10 stores taxes, about \$2,261 for two years, providing the store will stay open.

Mott's can use the tax money to fix its roof. Commissioners agreed to the plan to keep the longtime store in business.

Commissioners agreed to borrow about \$100,000 to operate the city. Finance commissioner Margaret Green said Tom Dunn, president of People's Bank agreed to the loan.

Don Enix will continue as acting police chief until a chief is named. A former officer Jason Foster was also hired as a patrolman.

City workers will have to do the mowing this summer as they find time. Bids for the mowing were to costly.

San Angelo Woman Killed, Three Injured In Head On Collision In Ranger



A San Angelo woman died in a head-on collision on Interstate 20 in Ranger about 2:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Sandy Ranchod, a passenger in a car driven by Mahendralal Ranchod, died after the vehicle collided with another driven by

Michael Ostroski, 57, of Graden City, Michigan.

The Ranchod vehicle had drifted to the left of the inside west bound lane before becoming airborne when the driver apparently tried to overcorrect.

The vehicle flipped on its top and slid into

the eastbound lane, where it collided with the Ostroski vehicle, and the impact landed the Ranchod vehicle back on its wheels.

The three injured were, Mahendralal Ranchod and Michael and Shirley Ostroski, they were taken to the hospital.

County Commissioners Consider Jail Matters, Courthouse Square Parking, Other Items

Eastland County Commissioners had a lengthy agenda Tuesday, and the meetings lasted until mid-afternoon.

County Judge Scott Bailey opened the morning session with a statement of how Memorial Day reminds us of the sacrifices made by members of the Armed Forces.

"Without their willingness to lay down their lives for their country we wouldn't have the freedom we enjoy today," the Judge remarked.

The agenda items began with a report from Melissa Jeniches and Rhonda Long of the Texas Jail Standards Commission. They discussed jail staffing, personnel, and various matters related to law enforcement.

The analysts said that the jail building was clean and well kept, but they had concerns about the number of personnel in the Sheriff's Department.

They also said that the jail population (currently 27) was above the amount (24) that the jail was equipped for.

The Jail Standards representatives also said that the number of prisoners being held awaiting trial was surprisingly high, and suggested that the Commissioners focus on ways to speed the process in the Court system.

Turning to other matters, the Commissioners heard a request from Child Protective Services members for financial assistance in placing a 10-year-old boy in a Resident home.

The boy is presently being held in a Juvenile Detention Center in Abilene.

It was reported that the boy's own home could offer little help for him. The cost of a Residential Home would be \$100 per day, Board members said.

The Juvenile Probation Department would pay \$25 per day on this cost, with the Child Protective Services \$10 and MHMR \$10. The Commissioners were asked to do what they

could.

The Commissioners tabled any recommendation until afternoon. But, before the Court sessions closed, they voted to pay \$15 per day, lasting up to six months, to assist with residential care for the boy.

Commissioners said they hoped the funds could be taken from proceeds from the county farm. This farm is located south of Eastland on Highway 6.

Another item Tuesday dealt again with Courthouse parking. Attorney Russ Thomason and Eastland City Manager Paul Catoe discussed various aspects of the problem.

Catoe indicated that the City would consider another arrangement on parking, if details were outlined in a formal letter from the Commissioners Court. Judge Bailey agreed to draft the proposal.

Later that afternoon, Judge Bailey outlined some things that would be included in his letter: that management of parking around the Courthouse would be turned back to the City, with provision that the east side of the Square (fronting Highway 6) would be reserved for law officers, governmental vehicles and disabled persons. Parking would be limited to one hour on the remaining spaces.

On another matter, the Commissioners approved a request to nominate County Road 327 as part of the Department of Transportation Farm-To-Market program. This is about three miles of road from Highway 6

north to the Kokomo road. A number of people in the area are attempting to get that road upgraded.

Also approved was a request of Ranger Gathering Corporation to place a gas pipeline in the county right-of-way, on CR 441, in the Olden area.

Brad Stephenson, speaking for the company, said this would be a gathering system for independent producers. Another approval

was on a request for easements by Comanche County Electric Cooperative.

Kent Parker, who made the request, explained that over the years there had been line easements in the county for the Co-op. But he said that some kind of definite agreement was needed on County right-of-ways.

Also granted was a request to Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. to bury a cable along County Road 181 west of CR 169 in Pct. 4, in the Cisco area.

The Commissioners heard of plans of the Department of Transportation to measure the rural roads in all Precincts. These measurements will be used to determine a more accurate county road mileage.

The following piece was written by Tony Tucci: **TPWD Prepares 35 Cadets To Serve As Game Wardens** Members of the 44th Game Warden Academy of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department listened intently as their instructor began the demonstrations on cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). "As a game warden, you're going to have to perform CPR, sometime, in some way or another,"

the instructor said. The cadets then took turns practicing CPR on dummies created for that purpose.

Whether they're in the classroom, or running the obstacle course, the 35 cadets take their training seriously. "It took me three tries to get here," one of the cadets said, illustrating the fierce competition involved.

The selection process began in December 1994 with 800 applicants who took an entry level test. Only 284 applicants were picked for regional interviews, and only 155 made it to final interviews and a physical aptitude test. The group then was narrowed to 49 applicants who underwent background investigations, after which 35 were selected for the cadet class.

Now it's seven months of training for the cadets before they graduate July 31 as a game warden, trained and ready to enter the field, not only to enforce fish and wildlife, water safety and other natural resource and conservation laws, but also to serve as a regular peace officer whenever it's required.

"We've got one of the longer law enforcement academies in terms of time compared with other agencies," said TPWD Law Enforcement Division Director Charles Hensley. "The reason is that our cadets have to learn everything that other peace officers learn, as well as all the Parks and Wildlife regulations.

That's a vast amount of knowledge they have to absorb."

Game warden cadets will take the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education test the same as any other peace officer in the state. The commission also requires 40 hours of formal in-service training every two years, and game wardens exceed that requirement.

"After graduation, they will have the basic education," said Game Warden Commander Royce Wells, head of the academy. "We don't expect them to leave and be a full-fledged game warden, but they can go out and effectively and safely begin their field training."

This year's class includes a Coast Guard helicopter pilot, a California harbor patrol officer, a dentist and two TPWD summer law enforcement interns. Most members are in their 30s, but they range in age from 22 to 45. There are no age, height or weight requirements, but all of them have to pass certain physical standards.

The cadets are following traditions that started with the first class in 1946. But there are some differences. This is the first class that has had a full college degree requirement. Previous game wardens could have a college degree or the equivalent in work experience. It also is the first class with members from other states - one each from Kansas, Florida and Cali-

fornia. Wells said the educational background of the cadets is almost evenly split, with about half holding degrees in criminal justice, and half with degrees in fisheries and wildlife biology.

Training at the academy concentrates on academics, physical exercise and dealing with psychological stress. Wells said the classroom study is the equivalent of 36 semester hours - all in seven months. "It's a pretty heavy academic load, but they go from 8 to 5, Monday through Friday," he said.

The cadets also will take five field trips, including a week on the shooting range, a week at Lake Walter E. Long in Austin, an East Texas river patrol trip, two weeks at Parrie Haynes Youth Camp, and two weeks on the coast.

The academy training staff includes Lt. Joe McClure, cadet class coordinator; Lt. Alfonso Campos, instructor/recruiter; Lt. Rod Chalmers, instructor/in service coordinator, and Sgt. Cinda Brooks, instructor/health fitness coordinator. In addition, game wardens from field or division offices and personnel from other divisions often serve as classroom instructors.

Wells said the cadet training is regimented, but it is not the same as military boot camp. "Our job is to entice them, not to break them. We build them up and instill pride in the fact that they are going to be game wardens."

Cadets live at the academy for seven months, but can go home on weekends. They furnish their own meals, khaki cadet uniforms and shoes, but almost everything else is provided. That includes a winter coat, insulated coveralls, leather equipment, firearms and vehicles.

"It costs \$68,000 to hire, train and equip a game warden cadet and send him (or her) to his duty station," Hensley said. "That includes the cost of a vehicle."

Hensley said the cadet class will help replenish a dwindling number of game wardens reduced by retirements over the past several years.

EMS Trauma Teams Called To Action

April 4th, 1996 marked two important firsts for EMH emergency teams. A moving vehicle accident spurred the use of the Emergency Medical Services' MICU (Mobile Intensive Care Unit) for the first time and upon arrival at the hospital that patient was treated by the newly designed Trauma Team.

Our Ambulance service is registered with the Texas Department of Human Services as BSL (Basic Life Support) with MICU capabilities any time a Paramedic is present (in this case, Richard Bird, EMS manager). The ambulance crew (which also included Mike Powell of the Ranger Fire Dept., Tommy Johnson, and Scott Brinkley) utilized the MICU protocol for cardiac drugs and use of the defibrillator while in constant communication with Dr. Matthews over the radio. It is the opinion of several medical personnel that the patient would not have made it to the hospital had it not been for these capabilities.

The patient was brought to the emergency room which had

been designated a Basic Trauma Facility as of March 29, 1996. Once again First Flight was on hand to continue emergency care on route to Harris Methodist Hospital. A letter from First Flight crew-member Jarret Wharton includes these encouraging words:

"We would, however like to commend everyone's efforts from the Eastland EMS, to your wonderful E.R. staff, to Dr. Matthews in all your work and genuine concern. It was inspiring to see everyone work so hard and efficiently to resuscitate the patient. You are all a great group of professionals that we are proud to be associated with."

This patient, of course, is far from the first trauma case to receive this intensive treatment at our facility. But in order to finally be designated a Basic Trauma Facility, the ER department underwent extensive survey and review of past trauma records as well as showing active participation in the Regional Trauma Advisory Council.

During the survey it was noted that

Eastland Memorial evaluated approximately 1,436 trauma patients in ER over the past 12 months. The Emergency Room is designed to accommodate 2 serious or critical patients at one time with measures to provide care to additional less critical patients. The area is stocked with essential equipment necessary to provide resuscitation and stabilization care to geriatric, adult and pediatric trauma patients.

Some of the strengths of this hospital were noted in the survey and were listed as follows:

1. The commitments focus, energy and resources of the physician is excellent. He is to be commended. The institutional commitment and the dedication of DeVonna Wheeler, RN are impressive. Their efforts to improve and ensure all patients receive quality care by choosing designation as a Basic Trauma Facility demonstrates a commitment to the community and citizens served.

2. The commitment of the administrative staff to provide educational opportunities and foster hospital staff's continuing education is a strength. Although a new administrator is on board the leadership and

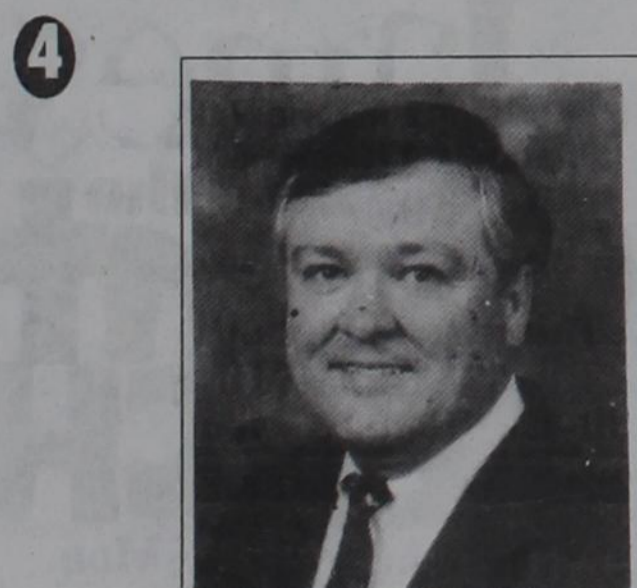

AUSTIN — Gov. George W. Bush said he will oppose any effort to alter the 1995 school reform law when the state Legislature convenes in January.

Though he said he was addressing no group in particular, Bush made the statement after a group of 21 House members asked the State Board of Education to continue screening textbooks despite provisions in the new law that put textbook selection under the authority of local school districts.

Members of the group told reporters they may seek to change the law in the 1997 legislative session.

Bush urged lawmakers to give the new law a chance to work before putting the state's public schools through more sweeping changes.

"Last year we passed one of the most far-reaching reform packages in the United States. ... We need to give people a chance to adjust to the new environment. I will frown on anything that tries to structurally change Senate Bill 1."

"The worse message we could send to educators in Texas is we will pass a law and two years later we will fundamentally change it again," Bush said.

Despite his caution against tinkering with S.B. 1, Bush told reporters certain provisions in the law need fine-tuning. In particular, he said, the student disciplinary policy ought to be clarified in the legislative session.

LIMITED LIABILITY COMPANIES: A NEW CHOICE FOR BUSINESSES

Corporation. Partnership. Sole proprietorship. For many years, these were the only choices for legal structure of your business. Now almost all states allow another choice, the *limited liability company*.

A limited liability company (LLC) is a cross between a corporation and a partnership. Owners of an LLC are shielded from legal liability if their company goes bankrupt or loses a lawsuit, just like the shareholders of a corporation. However, as in a partnership, profits and losses pass through directly to the LLC members.

How do you decide between an LLC and the other forms of business? If you need protection from legal liability, you should consider an LLC or one of the corporate forms - either a "C" or "S" corporation. If you expect your business to incur early operating losses and you want to claim those losses on your personal tax return, consider an LLC or S corporation. If you have co-owners and you want losses to pass through, you also might opt for one of the partnership forms, either "general" or "limited."

An LLC and an S corporation often seem quite similar. However, members of an LLC have considerably more flexibility when allocating profits and losses. Also, S corporations may have a maximum of only 35 shareholders. And nonresident aliens, corporations, partnerships, and many trusts may not own S corporation stock. None of these restrictions apply to an LLC.

The LLC is a relatively new legal concept, and there are still a number of unanswered tax, business, and legal questions. If you are starting a new business, or if you are dissatisfied with the structure of your existing business, we can help you weigh the pros and cons of an LLC.

Tips On What To Do Before EMS Arrives

Even if you don't have medical training, what you do before emergency medical technicians or paramedics arrive could prevent a death or disability. Texans are being urged to learn that minutes count in medical emergencies — and Texans can make a difference.

"Some of the most critical moments in a medical emergency are right after the problem has occurred, whether it's a car wreck or a heart attack," said Smith. "And now is the best time to learn what to do in an emergency. You may be the only person available to perform CPR on someone or to stop serious bleeding."

Smith added, "Calling EMS in non-emergencies can unnecessarily tie up the response system and make it harder for EMS personnel to do their job — which is responding to emergencies. But if you think it's an emergency, don't hesitate. Call EMS."

TDH's Bureau of Emergency Management offers these tips for what to do before EMS arrives:

Bleeding- Call EMS immediately for serious or spurting bleeding:
 *Have the person lie down and apply firm, direct pressure over the wound to stop the bleeding. Maintain pressure until EMS arrives.

*Evaluate the injured limb, but do not raise the person's feet higher than the head.

*Do not use tourniquets.
Broken Bones- Keep the injured limb or area from moving and do not move the person unless he or she is in immediate danger.

*Apply ice pack to minimize swelling.

*If a broken bone protrudes through the skin, cover with a dry dressing but do not try to push it back in. If excessive bleeding occurs, use direct pressure over the area to stop the bleeding.

Seizures- Protect the person from further injury by removing obstacles:
 *Turn the person onto one side.

*If a person has fallen or shows signs of head injury, do not move the person until EMS arrives.

*Do not force anything into the person's mouth.
 *Do not try to restrain the person's movements during the seizure.

Head, neck and back injuries- Do not move the person until EMS arrives unless absolutely necessary to save his or her life:
 *Cover severe, deep cuts on the head with a clean cloth but do not try to clean. Do not apply heavy pressure to bleeding areas as this could cause brain injuries.

*Do not prop up the person's head if you suspect neck or back injuries. This could cause further damage to the spinal cord.

Heart attack- A heart attack victim may feel pain or heavy pressure in the chest area or jaw, shoulder and arms:
 *Do not wait to see if the pain or discomfort goes away. Call EMS.

*Have the person sit or recline, and make him or her as comfortable as possible by loosening clothing at neck, chest and waist. Keep the person warm but not hot.

*If the victim suddenly collapses and loses consciousness, try to wake the person. If you cannot locate a breath or pulse,

begin CPR if you are trained.

"What you do before emergency medical help arrives could mean the difference between life and death for someone you love," said Smith. "And now is the best time to learn what to do in an emergency. You may be the only person available to perform CPR on someone or to stop serious bleeding."

Social Security

If you're age 65 or older — but not yet 70 — and still working, you can earn \$12,500 this year before your Social Security benefits are reduced \$1 for every \$3 in earnings. There is no limit for people age 70 and older.

A new law, signed March 29, increases the annual earnings limit from \$11,520 to \$12,500 in 1996 and gradually raises it to \$30,000 in 2002. In 1997, the limit will be \$13,500; 1998, \$14,500; 1999, \$15,500; 2000, \$17,000; 2001, \$25,000; 2002, \$30,000. After 2002, the annual exempt amount will be indexed to growth in average wages.

The new law does not change the earnings limit for workers who are age 62 but under age 65. That limit is \$8,280 in 1996 and will increase in future years with increases in average wages, as under present law.

Only your earnings are affected by Social Security's earnings limits. The law does not count non-work income such as investments, interest, pensions, annuities, capital gains, and other income not resulting from current work.
