Ranger Banker To Celebrate 50th Year

On Tuesday, July 2 Tom Dunn, President of People's State Bank of Ranger, will have completed 50 years in banking.

The employees of the bank have scheduled a two-day celebration in recognition of this achievement. Tuesday, July 2, a reception will be held where his friends in the banking community will have an opportunity to drop in and share this moment with him.

On Wednesday, July 3, a come-and-go open house will be from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. where the bank's customers will have an opportunity to participate in the celebration.

Refreshments will be served throughout the day.

In the spring of 1946, when Tom Dunn graduated from Huckaby High School, it wasn't easy for a young man fresh off the farm to find a job that didn't involve farming in one way or another.

"At that time I had no idea the direction my life was going to take. I knew how to work. I had been working, it seemed, most of my life so I went looking for a job," he said in response to a question regarding the beginning of his career as a banker.

By July he was working for a road crew "tamping bridges." This involved using a hand tool to pack the dirt along the edges of the road leading onto a newly constructed bridge.

One day he was tamping bridges, the next day he was in the bookkeeping department of the First National Bank of Stephenville, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Fred McCleskey, a vice president of the Stephenville bank, went to visit the superintendent of Huckaby

High School in search of a bright young man who was good at math. The superintendent recommended Tom Dunn and Mr. McCleskey went to his home and invited him to come work at the bank. Tom accepted and worked there for the next eleven years.

He worked his way up to Loan Teller there when W. G. Kirk, President of the Farmer's National Bank of Gorman hired him as Vice President and Loan Officer.

He worked in the Gorman bank for four years and when Mr. Kirk bought the Citizen's National Bank in Brownwood, moved there with him as Vice President, Loan Officer, and Personnel Director.

When Mr. Kirk sold the Brownwood bank to B. C. Drinkard and bought another one in Grand Prairie, Tom made the decision to stay on with the Citizen's National Bank where he worked for a total of eleven years.

In 1971 Tom Wilson, Chairman of the board of Ranger's First State Bank, called Tom and invited him to move to Ranger as president of the bank and he accepted.

The Board of Directors at that time consisted of Tom Wilson, Chairman, Glenn Gilliam, President, J. P. McCracken, James Ratliff and Morris Newnham.

This is a year of half-century markers for Tom. Earlier this spring, he went back to celebrate the 50th anniversary of his graduating class at Huckaby High School, on July 2, he will celebrate his 50th year as a banker, and when he retires the last of December, he and Sammie will have celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary. Tom and Sammie

Pack, also a Huckaby High School product, were married on December 28, 1946. They have four children: Dianne Blair, the Principal of a 900 student junior high school in Denton. Her husband Tom is the head baseball coach at Denton High School.

Alicia Whitfield lives in Austin and works for an advertising agency.

Brenda Anderson and her family live in Weatherford. Her husband Rex is a pilot for Delta Airlines.

Tommy teaches school and coaches football in Stephenville. He is married to Vicki Gibson, who is also a teacher.

Tom, the youngest of ten children born to a share-crop farmer, summed up his 50 years as a banker: "My daddy always said to get a good job and stay with it. That nobody ever amounted to anything bouncing around from job to job." "I guess I have just been following my daddy's advice."

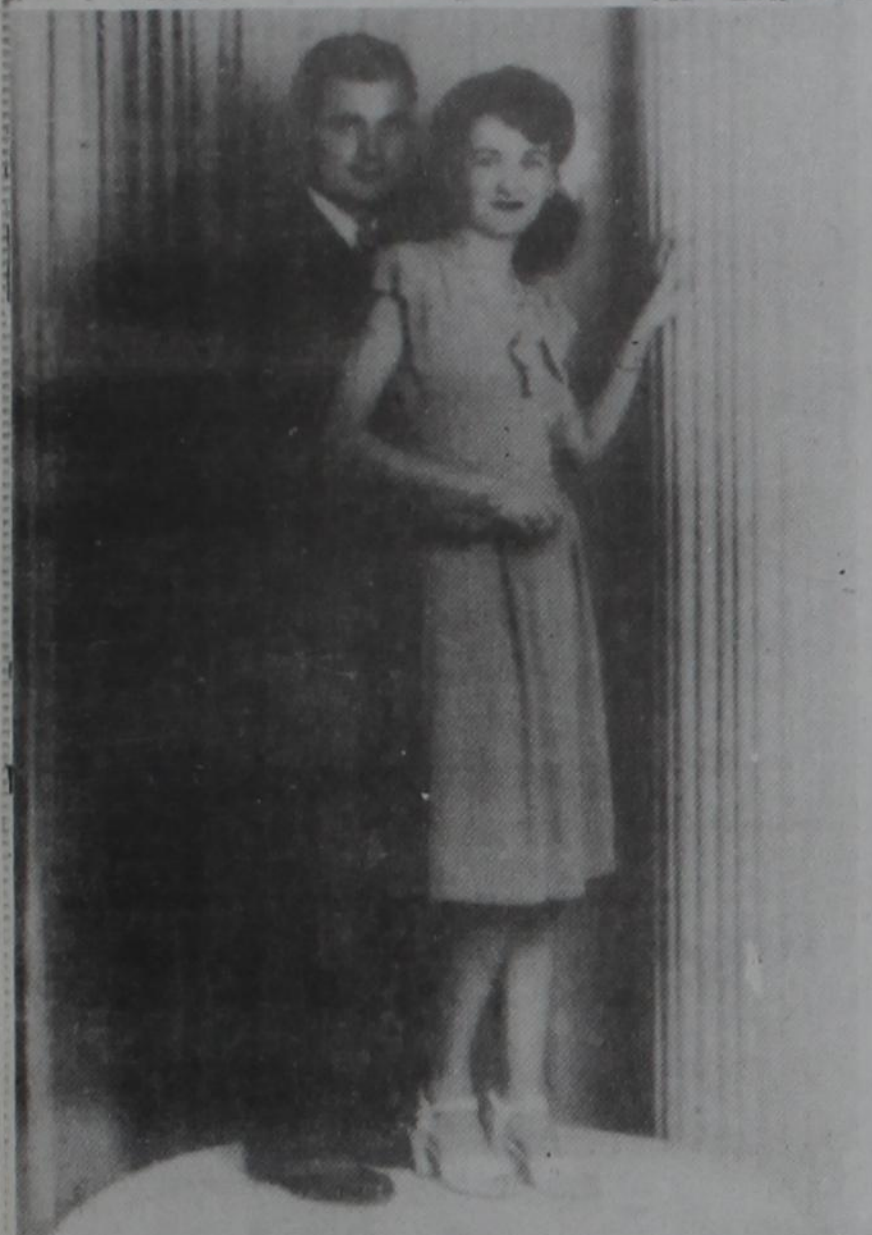

LIFE INSURANCE CAN HELP - AND HURT

Life insurance helps people cope with the financial strain that accompanies the death of a loved one. Insurance can provide for dependents, pay funeral costs, and keep a family business alive. But without proper planning, life insurance can also trigger a large estate tax bill.

That's because the estate tax starts at 37% and quickly reaches 55%. It applies to any property a person owns at death, whether held in a living trust, included in the probate estate, or paid directly to a beneficiary. While the first \$600,000 of estate value escapes taxation, thanks to the unified credit, many estates exceed that amount when insurance policies are part of the total value.

Is it possible to keep the government from taxing insurance benefits meant for your heirs? Fortunately, it is. Life insurance will not be included in your taxable estate if you don't own the policy at the time of death. To avoid losing life insurance proceeds to estate tax, consider arranging for another party to own your policy.

One technique is to establish a trust that holds your life insurance policy until your death. The trust pays the premiums, collects the benefits, then distributes proceeds to the beneficiaries of the trust. As with any trust, an attorney's assistance is essential in setting up a life insurance trust.

Some taxpayers save the cost of a trust by transferring the policy to another person, totally relinquishing ownership. Since the recipient of the policy obtains all rights of ownership, including the right to change the beneficiary, it is essential that the parties trust each other.

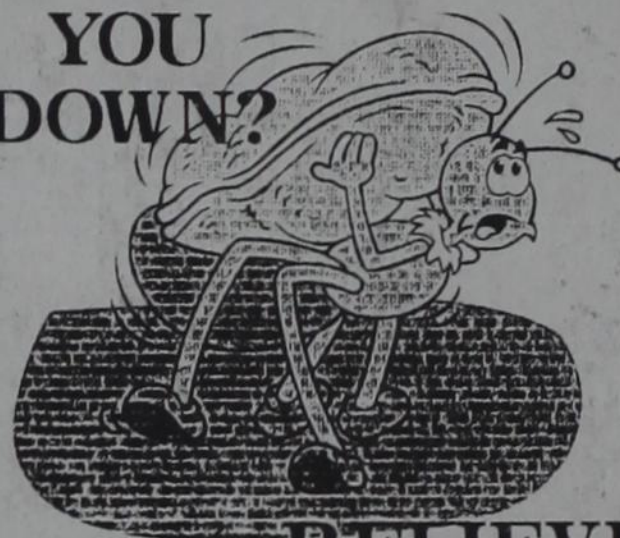

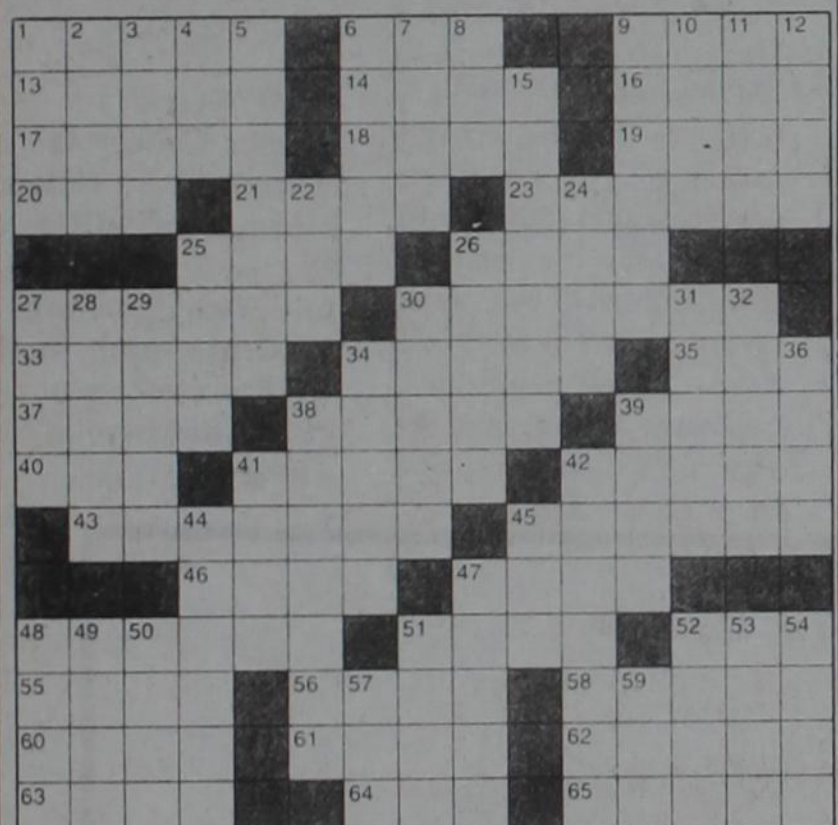

Morales Appoints Bill Miars To Child Support Task Force

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales appointed Eastland County District Clerk Bill Miars to his Integrated Child Support System Advisory Council to assist his office in implementing an automated information sharing system between state and county governments.

Morales asked county judges, county commissioners, district clerks, county auditors, employers, members of the private sector and law enforcement, all of whom are involved in the child support process, to lend counsel and direction in the implementation of this system.

The Integrated Child Support System Advisory Council is a workgroup that was created to determine a process and to develop a timetable for implementation of the registry, as well as identifying any barriers that may hinder the timely completion of the project.

"The information sharing system, called the Integrated Child Support System (ICSS), is designed to improve the communication between state and county govern-

ments regarding the enforcement of child support orders," Morales said. "These councils were formed to ensure that children receive child support while they are still children."

The ICSS will integrate the state and county child support systems so that all child support orders in the state are monitored for delinquency and swift enforcement action is taken. This system will allow either the Office of the Attorney General or the County to initiate col-

lection procedures immediately, without waiting for the custodial parent to apply for services.

Over time, this system will reduce redundancy of effort at the state and

county level, ensure that all orders are monitored for delinquency and make certain that custodial parents receive their payments in a more timely manner. This system, over time, will provide seamless service to Texas children and families in the area of child support collection.

Central Texas Hay Bale Off Monday

Hay producers and harvesters will have the opportunity to view top of the line cutting, raking and baling equipment in action at the Central Texas Hay Bale Off on July 1, 1996 in Eastland County. Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Brown, Callahan, Comanche, Erath and Eastland counties are coordinating this unique program designed to let equipment companies show off their machinery at work while allowing producers and harvesters to see firsthand how well the equipment performs.

Equipment from Vermeer, John Deere, New Holland and Hesston will be featured at the event. Also, we will feature educational programs and result demonstration plot tours over grass variety establishment, seed bed preparation, grassbur control, general weed control and economics of equipment purchases.

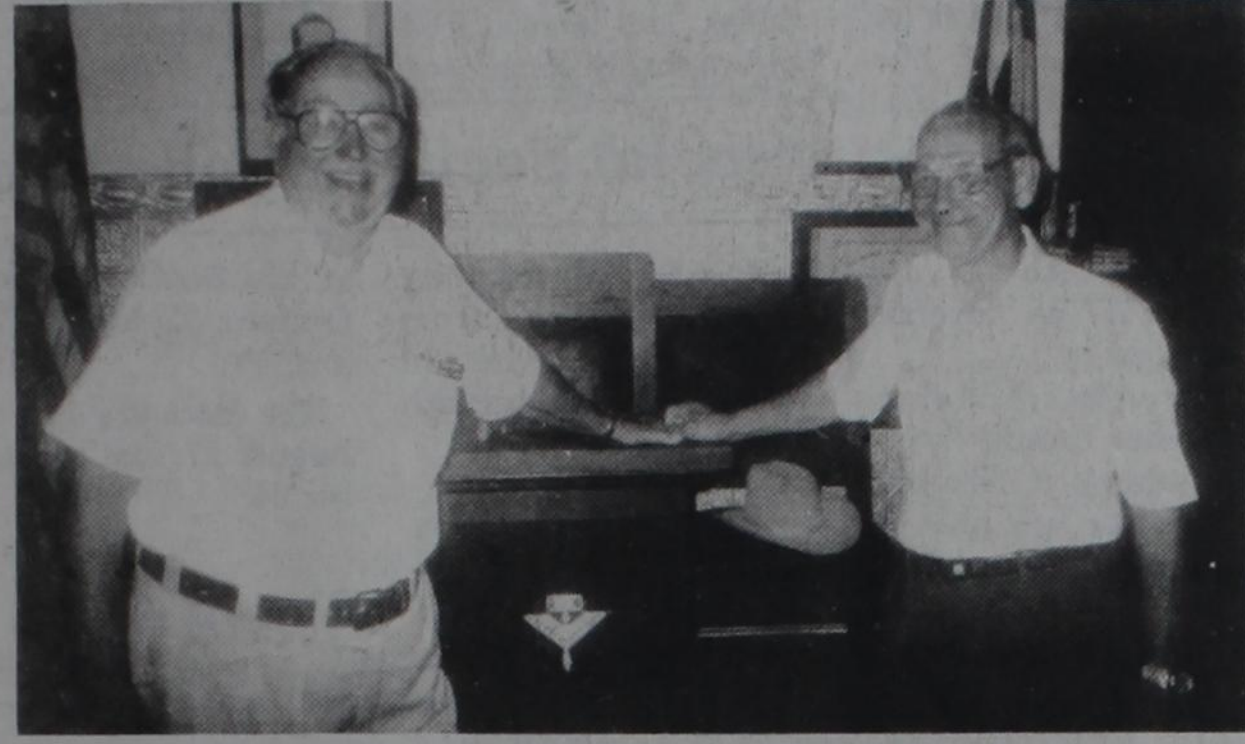
The event will be July 1, 1996 at the Jerry Mehaffey Farm operated by Bill and Kris Brown. The farm is located one-half mile north of Carbon or 8 miles south of Eastland on Highway 6.

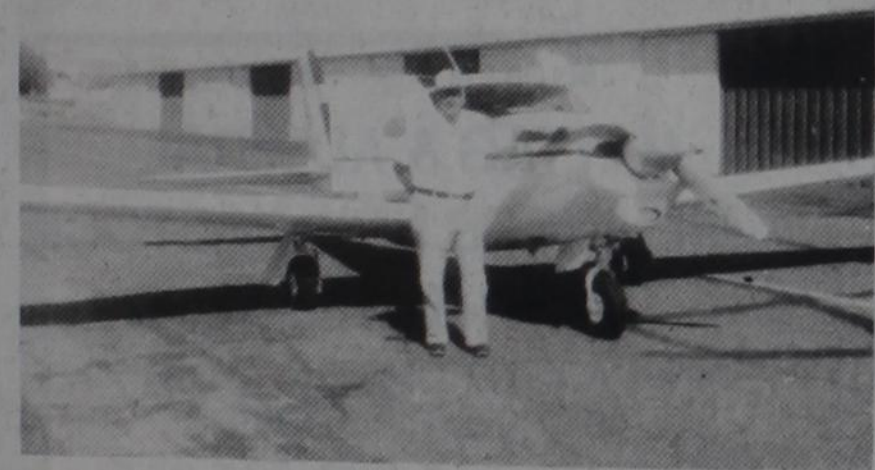

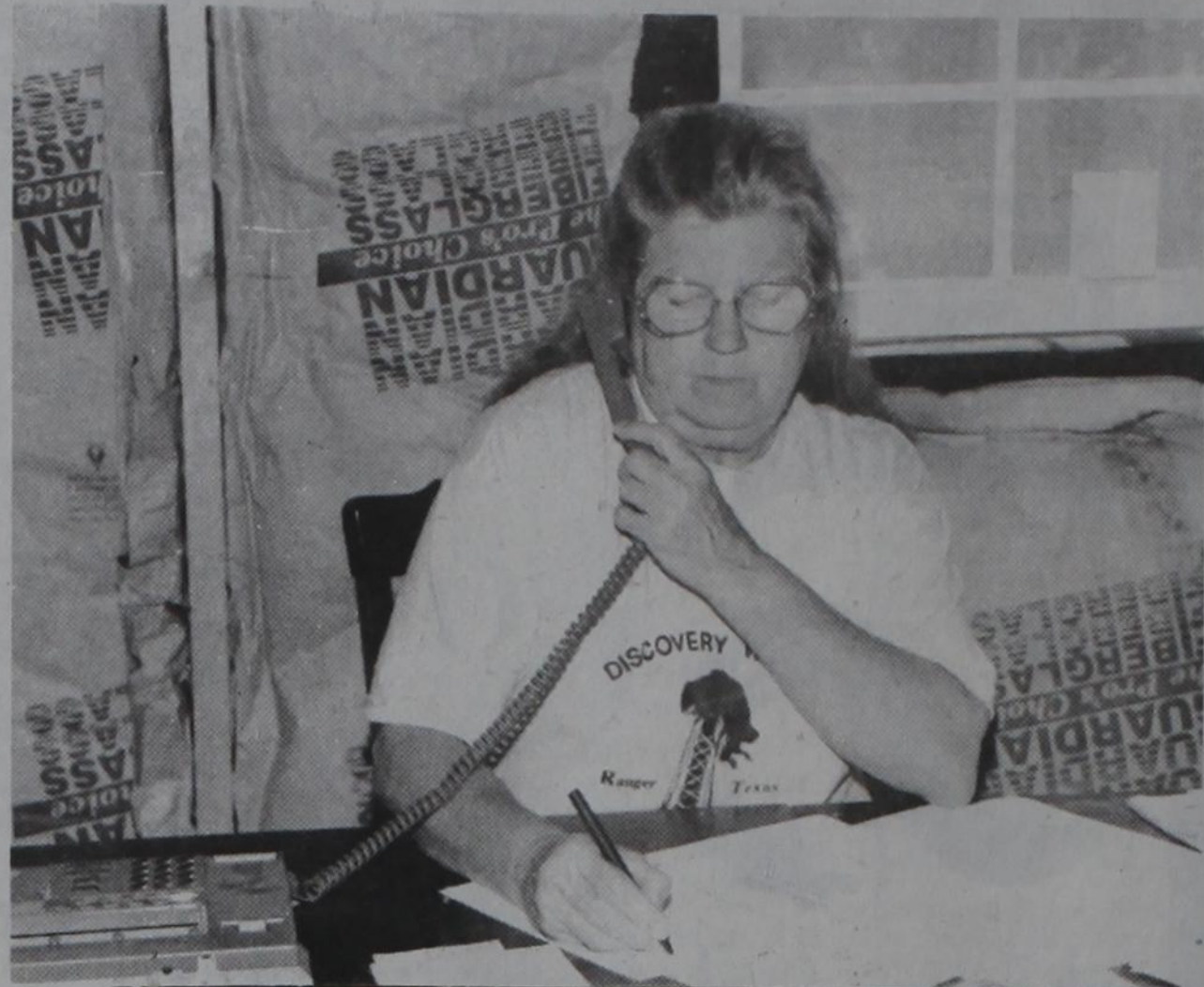

The House of Representatives Should Pass

Bipartisan Welfare Reform Legislation

The welfare system is broken and needs to be fixed. This point has been made to me time and time again in my visits with folks around the 17th District. But as important as it is to reform the welfare system, this won't happen without bipartisan cooperation.

During this Congress, I have been actively involved in the welfare reform process. In addition to setting up welfare reform task forces in Texas, I co-authored a bipartisan welfare reform proposal known as the Bipartisan Welfare Reform Act.

In writing this legislation, I worked to develop a common-sense welfare reform proposal that increases personal responsibility, moves welfare recipients into the work place, and increases state flexibility to administer the program.

This proposal provides states with the resources for work programs and child care to help achieve the goal of moving people from welfare to the workforce. Without these additional resources, work requirements are either an empty promise or a tremendous unfunded mandate on the states.

Our Texas State Legis-

lators passed, and the governor signed, an excellent welfare reform package. However, because of the federal funding involved, the Texas welfare overhaul plan required a "waiver" from certain federal requirements before it could be implemented.

I served as a liaison between Governor Bush and the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in order to move the waiver approval process forward. Fortunately, we were able to convince HHS officials of the value of these changes and the State of Texas did receive the necessary waiver.

The Texas welfare program now sets a 5-year window during which adult recipients who are required to participate in the JOBS program, but do not find a job after a certain period of time, would no longer be eligible for cash benefits.

The Texas waiver request embraced the principles of the Bipartisan Welfare Reform Act, and I think all Texans will ultimately benefit from the changes made in this law.

Here in the Congress, there is very strong support for passing legislation to reform the nation's welfare system. Members of both parties understand

that the nation wants reform. Unfortunately, partisan politics may once again rear its ugly head.

The House leadership has expressed its interest in combining welfare reform and Medicaid reform in one piece of legislation. While Democrats and Republicans are ready to reform welfare, Medicaid reform is another issue altogether.

If the House leadership ties these two complex issues together, they will
