THE LAST FEW weeks, the news on the national and global scale has been highlighted by numerous incidents of death in mass numbers. So much so that you sometimes wonder what's going wrong on our planet.

In our own country, we've had the mass killings at the post office in Edmond, Oklahoma, and the plane crash in Los Angeles which have been news-makers.

Overseas, we have heard in rapid succession stories about the thousands of people dying in Africa from the mysterious poisonous gas from the volcanic lake; and the sinking of the huge Russian ship that left scores (or hundreds) of people dead.

Then there has been the hijacking of the Pan-Am jetliner in Pakistan, in which 18 people were killed and scores injured; and the incident in Turkey in which 21 worshippers were killed in a synagogue.

South Africa continues to make the news with its black-white confrontation, with reports almost on a daily basis of killings in regard to the apartheid problem.

Earlier this year, we all remember the concern following the nuclear tragedy in the Soviet Union, which killed a number of people and may cause thousands (or millions) of others to have health problems the rest of their lives.

Of course you can't control such things as poisonous gas seeping up from an ancient lake, but the terrorist situation has caused a feeling of outrage among leaders in the Western world.

One U.S. congressman has sent a message to President Reagan urging him to call for a special United Nations meeting to address the subject of terrorism.

It would be nice if the United States could isolate itself from all of this trouble, but the fact remains that virtually every time a terrorist act is committed, U.S. citizens are involved.

Whether the United Nations can be a factor in the reduction of the terrorism remains to be seen. However, leaders must do all within their power to attempt to halt this man-made destruction.

Routine Business For Commission

Mostly routine items were on the agenda at the County Commissioners' meeting August 28 at the courthouse.

Bills were approved from the Ninth Administrative Judicial District for \$386.83 for the county's annual assessment and \$24.84 for a visiting judge.

Bills from the Department of Human Services for the county foster children were also approved. Boarding care bills amounted to \$3,689, which amount will be recovered by the county. Another bill was \$26.75 for hospital expenses.

The county approved its annual support payment to the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center, in the amount of \$3,050.

Having recently voted to join the Panhandle Health Care Coalition, a motion was passed to pay the county's share in this program, \$6,635.

Kim Hanks of Midland met with the court regarding bidding on mineral leases on the county's school land, but due to a technical error in the first bid advertisements, it was decided to seek new bids.

DPS Trooper Craig Hunt met with the court asking it to purchase four walkie-talkie radios for Highway Patrol use, at an estimated cost of \$3,500. After considerable discussion, the court voted against the matter.

Tom Nichols, president of the Farwell Hospital District, met with the court and presented an agreement for the county to care for indigents in the Farwell Hospital District up to the county "cap" as set by legislation. A motion was passed to accept the agreement.

Janette Pierce, County Extension Agent for Home Economics, reported to the court on the Home Day Care Provider program she has been working on. Parmer County is one of 29 counties in the state working on this pilot program.

The program teaches health and safety, nutrition, child development and the managing of their home business to people caring for other people's children in their homes.

Gary Patterson, County Extension Agent for Agriculture, reported on the bucket calf program, the commercial steer program and the crop test plots he is watching.

Rites Held For Former Resident

Graveside funeral services for Bob Finley, 59, of Amarillo, were held Tuesday, September 9, at 11 a.m. in the Friona Cemetery with Leland Hutson, minister of the Tenth Street Church of Christ, officiating.

Born December 21, 1926 in Farwell, he married Violet Mahurin February 24, 1952 in Portales, New Mexico. He had lived in Amarillo for the past four years, moving there from Friona. He had attended Bovina Schools. He was a feed mill operator at the Randall County Feed Yard.

Finley died Sunday, September 7, at the Parkland Memorial Hospital Burn Unit. Finley and another man, Steve Bentley, were badly burned July 29, when grain dust in a Randall County Feed Yard elevator caught fire and then exploded. The two men were attempting to put out a fire which had started in the elevator, but when they opened a door at the bottom of the elevator, the dust exploded.

Finley suffered burns over 90 per cent of his body. He and Bentley, who was less critically injured, were airlifted to Parkland Burn Unit after initial treatment at Northwest Texas Hospital.

Survivors include his wife, Violet of the home, 4010 S. Tyler, Amarillo; two sons, J.V. Finley of Cleburne and Maron F. Finley of Amarillo; one sister, Ruby Finley of San Angelo; one brother, Woodrow Finley of Amarillo; and five grandchildren.

A lack of consistency both on offense and defense proved costly to the Bovina Mustangs in their season-opening football game here last Friday, as the Happy Cowboys scored a 36-0 win.

"We played better than the score indicated, but we just didn't play consistently. We moved the ball well, but just couldn't sustain a drive. Then, we'd have Happy in a hole and let them get out of it," said Mustang Coach Bill Talley.

Happy scored a pair of touchdowns in both the first and second quarters for a 28-0 halftime lead. They added six points in the third quarter for the victory margin.

Bovina, meanwhile, rolled up 170 yards offense, which wasn't too bad, but just couldn't keep a scoring drive alive.

Todd Ware picked up 64 yards to lead the Mustang offense, and Homer Renteria added 59 yards. Vincente Munoz had a pair of pass receptions, and Bud Venable one, as Bovina completed three of nine attempts.

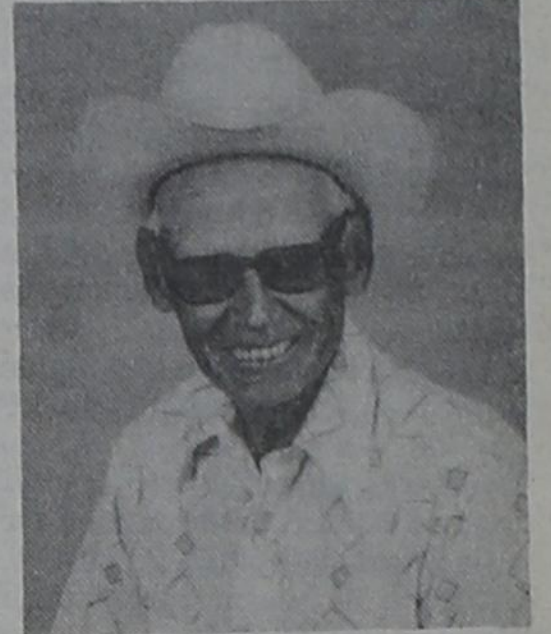
"Our offensive line played well most of the game. We're just going to have to get consistent if we're going to win," Coach Talley said.

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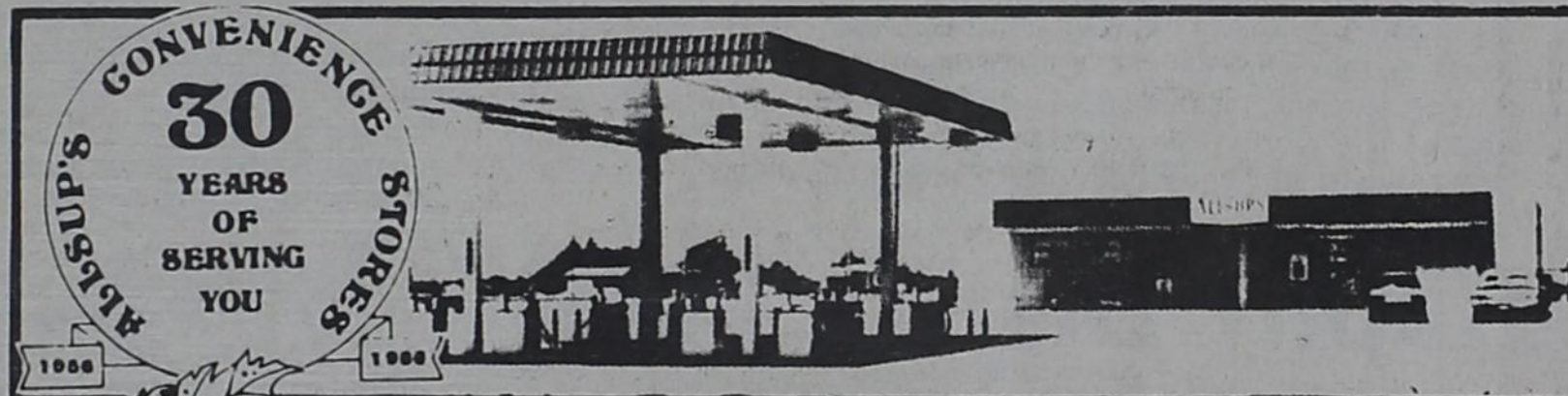

Sesquicentennial Notes

This is the conclusion of the history of St. Ann's Catholic Church in Bovina:
"Fr. Claver Giblin replaced him. He was installed as pastor January 21, 1963. Fr. Claver noticed the need for classrooms of religious instruction, suggested that the parish convert the parish hall into a school and build a new and larger parish hall.

Construction began June 1965, and was completed September, 1965. The first activity in the new facility was the annual Mexican Dinner in September, the new hall and the Catechetical school was dedicated January 23, 1966, by Bishop Lawrence M. Defalco of Amarillo.

June 1966, Fr. Claver formed a parish council with members from both St. Ann's and St. Teresa's. Planning for the future needs of the growing parish, he suggested to the members that the parish start a building fund for a new church.

August, 1968, Fr. Claver was released from his duties at St. Ann's. Father Richard Roth was assigned to St. Ann's and was installed the first week of August, 1968. Arriving from Cumberland, Rhode Island, where he had been superior of St. Joseph's Juniorate, he promptly announced that he expected to have an assistant. Soon thereafter, Fr. Gerald Dunford came to Bovina. April 7, 1969, Fr. Richard, because of bad health, was forced to return to New York. May 1969, Bro. Bernard Palka

arrived to assist Father Gerald, who had assumed the duties of pastor after the departure of Father Richard. After a few months, Bro. Bernard was assigned to Hereford and was replaced by Bro. Lawrence Gorman. Fr. Gerald left St. Ann's parish January 1970 at which time Fr. Norman Boyd arrived to be installed as pastor. Ground breaking ceremonies for the new church were conducted May 16, 1971, with Bishop Defalco officiating.

November 7, 1971 the final mass was celebrated in the old church—a church rich in memories. As was true with the first mass celebrated in that same church, there was no heat once again. The standing room only congregation from all over the Panhandle—must have been reminded of those first days, cold, but peaceful and friendly.

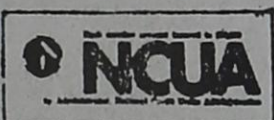

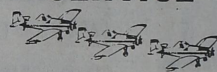
