## Make New Try For Courthouse Grant

Eastland County Commissioners Monday reviewed the proposed 1996-97 budget and the tax rate it would take to pay for it. They passed the first reading of the budget on Aug. 15, and are expected to finalize it on Sept. 9. Taxes will also be set at that time.

Budget totals of \$3.5 million are expected, with a new tax rate of 40.67 cents per \$100 valuation. Last year's tax rate was 38.09 cents, and this year's effective tax rate is listed as .3890 cents. The anticipated three percent raise is not enough to allow a tax rollback.

Bill Mears, District Clerk, discussed the budget with the Court. He said he was "just an observer" in the process, but in his opinion the county was falling behind in services and salaries.

He said that out of 46 counties in the state with a similar population, Eastland County has the smallest budget of anyone in that bracket.

"There are problems with salaries," Mears said. He stated that salaries in most averaged around \$29,340 per year. He did not give an average salary figure for Eastland County, but indicated it was below that.

"We're stretching ourselves too thin," Mears said. "Too much money out of reserves can be dangerous. We probably ought to be looking at

higher rates."

He added that he felt real sure there'll be more people filing salary grievances here.

Pct. 1 Comm. Ken Lyerla commented: "We're the most conservative county in the state." Mears remarked that people wanted the services - they just don't want to pay for them.

In another matter, County Auditor Don Hazel told the Commissioners that he was going to Austin this Wednesday to discuss a \$350,000 grant to repair the exterior of the Courthouse. He advised the Commissioners that under the Grant the Texas Department of Transportation would have to have a state architect - so the restoration might cost the county more than the \$70,000 originally stated.

He mentioned that a Courthouse restoration project in Jones County recently had turned out to be more expensive than planned, for the architect outlined more improvements than the county had expected.

The Commissioners indicated they would like to find out about the Grant anyway - and if it was even possible to get one.

On other items, the Court confirmed relinquishment of the county's interest in some unopened streets and alleyways in the James Lehea Survey of the Erwin Heights Addition, Pct. 2.

This property lies just east of the city limits of

Ranger, off Old Highway 80. The county reserved certain exceptions, and stated that all utility easements would be preserved.

Also approved was the extension of county road maintenance to include County Road 621P, Pct. 1/3. This one-half mile stretch of road is in Pct. 3, but is being worked by Pct. 1 Comm. Lyerla.

This is not a county road, but a public road going to a house. Lyerla said the mail carrier "can get down it some time."

There was further consideration of hiring a Grade-all operator for the county. Permission was granted to advertise for someone to fill this position.

County Clerk Joann Johnson brought a report on her plans to have temporary branch voting for the General Election in November.

"I believe it will work out," Mrs. Johnson said. She mentioned Wal-Mart and grocery stores as locations in the north side of the county, with community rooms or Senior Citizens Centers as possible locations in the south part.

She said she had already had some good volunteers, and was asking some others to assist her.

Ken Lyerla discussed information from the West Central Texas Council of Governments on a new type of computer for the 9-1-1 system it operates with what is called a "Global Positioning Sys-

tem," which runs off a satellite.

In connection with 9-1-1, the Texas Department of Transportation is remarking county roads at this time.

The Commissioners advised all to have their 9-1-1 addresses up where someone can see them. Reflective letters are needed on rural houses.

All cellular phones should be speed dialed into the local dispatch, or emergency calls will be answered at some distant location, they said.

"We can't get what we're paying for if we're not cooperating," a member of the Court stated.

Things seemed to be rather quiet at the jail this time. Pct. 4 Commissioner Reggie Pittman reported 22 inmates, a figure which was holding pretty steady. That was the way they wanted it - a total less than the 24 prisoners allowed under the State Jails Standards Commission.

Another bunch of reports showed a lot more activity - the monthly accounts sent in by each Fire Department in the county. There were numerous grass fires reported in July, with some in hay fields as well.

Hopefully the cooler weather and showers will fix some of that.

## Gulf Moisture And Cooler Weather

Late last week Hurricane Dolly made landfall near Tampico, Mexico, spinning a lot of Gulf moisture across Texas.

The heaviest rains came in South Texas and turned to the west of Eastland County. Abilene to New Mexico and the Big Bend got anywhere from 2 to 5 inches.

Eastland County got scattered light rains, recording a trace up to about an inch in some locations.

Totals for the weekend included: Cisco .90, Eastland .48, Carbon .30 and Ranger .15.

## Vietnam Vets And Their Children To Benefit From VA Decisions

According to Bill Richardson, Veterans County Service Officer for Eastland County, Vietnam Veterans afflicted with prostate cancer, acute and subacute peripheral neuropathy are to be entitled to disability compensation based on exposure to Agent Orange. There is to be proposed legislation that would provide for children of these veterans who are suffering from spina bifida.

These decisions came after Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) completed an in-depth review of the March report issued by the National Academy of Sciences. The study showed that there is new limited or suggestive evidence that associates prostate cancer, acute and subacute peripheral neu-

ropathy in Vietnam veterans, and spina bifida in their children, with the veteran's exposure to Agent Orange.

Since VA does not have the authority to provide benefits to veterans' children based on birth defects, Jesse Brown, Secretary of Veterans Affairs, plans to seek legislation that would provide a remedy.

VA is planning to develop, as early as possible, a regulation that would allow VA to begin compensating Vietnam veterans who are disabled from acute and subacute peripheral neuropathy, if "manifested within one year of herbicide exposure," and those with prostate cancer. The final rule should be published in October.

Vietnam veterans who

believe they or their children have health problems that may be related to their exposure to Agent Orange while serving in Vietnam or their survivors should contact the nearest Texas Veterans Commission office, Veterans County Service Officer or VA medical center or regional office. The VA's national toll-free number is 1-800-827-1000.

A one-car accident southwest of Eastland late Saturday night reportedly caused severe head injuries to an Odessa man, George Vix Jr.

His car was eastbound about 11:15 p.m. when it ran off the road on the right side. From there the car veered sideways, apparently turning end over end several times in the center median.

Vix was thrown from the car. He received treatment at Eastland Memorial Hospital, and was then transferred to Dallas.

The Department of Public Safety investigated the accident.

"The Gargoyles were supposedly carved and discarded by the stone masons because they were imperfect. Even Frolo, through his zealotry, makes himself an outcast."

Many of the film's collaborators made the first of several trips to Paris in the fall of 1993. There they soaked up the atmosphere of Hugo's beloved city and spent three days touring the passageways, hidden rooms, stairwells and towers of the great Cathed

dral Notre Dame.

Being there helped the filmmakers realize the size and scope and beauty of the magnificent building, and experience what it must have been like back in the 15th century when it was the centerpiece of the city.

As the story began to take shape, the filmmakers began searching for opportunities to inject fantasy and humor into the story. The inspiration for the film's gargoyle characters came from Victor Hugo himself.

**AUSTIN** — Democratic state Sen. John Montford resigned last week to become chancellor of Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock appointed Republican Sen. Bill Ratliff of Mount Pleasant to replace Montford as chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee.

Ratliff, former chairman of the Senate Education Committee, rewrote the state's education law in 1995. Bullock, a Democrat, told the *Austin American-Statesman*, "I'm sick of partisan politics. The extremists in both parties are missing the mainstream Texans. Bill Ratliff works for everyone."

As chancellor, Montford, former Lubbock County district attorney, becomes Texas Tech's chief fundraiser and government liaison.

Montford's departure from the Senate makes his district a prime target for the Republican Party of Texas, said Tom Pauken, state GOP chairman. Now, a GOP majority is possible: Republicans hold 14 of the Senate's 31 seats, and half of the seats are up for election in November.

Montford was elected to the state Senate in 1982. He was roundly praised for his service over the past 14 years. Gov. George W. Bush, who will call a special election in September to fill Montford's seat, said, "I am sorry (Montford) is

leaving the Senate. He has been an unbelievably good member."

Anne Marie Kilday, spokeswoman for the state Democratic Party, said "It is Texas Tech University's gain and the entire state of Texas' loss."

Montford, 53, said he sees himself at Tech for five or six years.

### Laney Appeals Redistrict Order

House Speaker Pete Laney asked the U.S. Supreme Court last week to overturn an Aug. 6 federal court order to redraw boundaries and set special elections in 13 Texas congressional districts.

In his appeal, Laney argued that redistricting is a "legislative duty" and that state legislators should be allowed to redraw the boundaries during the 1997 Legislative session, beginning in January.

Laney has said that special elections with Dec. 10 runoffs would be confusing to voters. And, he said, the panel of three federal judges redrew more districts than necessary to correct the three districts in Dallas and Houston declared unconstitutional because of "racial gerrymandering."

"I hope the mid-election confusion and expense the judges have caused in 13 districts within 28 counties can be eliminated and elections can be held as planned," Laney was quoted in the *Dallas Morning News*.

### Slots Banned in Bingo Halls

The Texas Lottery Commission ordered all bingo license holders to move "eight-liner" slot-type gambling machines from their bingo halls by Sept. 1.

Billy Rhea, security director of the commission, said the machines violate state law, which bars other forms of gambling at bingo halls.

Any halls that have the machines after Sept. 1 could lose their licenses and the operators turned over to law enforcement agencies for prosecution.

Under state law, gambling de-

vices are legal as long as they pay no more than 10 times the cost of a single play or \$5, whichever is less.

In some of the banned machines, a dollar can be inserted and credits can be built up to hundreds of dollars.

### Insurance Case Gets Green Light

The Texas Supreme Court, in a ruling last week, denied a request by Allstate and Farmers Insurance companies to dismiss a lawsuit alleging the companies overcharged customers more than \$100 million.

Six South Texans brought the suit over the companies' practice of "double rounding" insurance premiums to the nearest dollar. The companies divided the annual premiums into two six-month payments and rounded the payments again to the nearest dollar.

Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer has clarified the rules for calculating premiums, and has disallowed double rounding.

But the plaintiffs obtained court permission to pursue a class-action lawsuit on behalf of millions of Texans who were covered over the past decade by Allstate and Farmers.

### Other Capital Highlights

■ About 1.3 million Texas children under age 18 have no health insurance, and state officials are looking for ways to help parents who can't afford coverage. Texas Health Commissioner David Smith said it would cost nearly \$1 billion to insure those youngsters. Of the billion dollars, \$300 to \$400 million might come through some type of health premium subsidy provided by the state.

■ The Texas Commission on Judicial Efficiency has forwarded a list of proposals to lawmakers to consider in efforts to improve the state's judicial system. One proposal is to raise state judges' pay 30 percent. Doing so would cost taxpayers about \$16 million a year. Another proposal would require the state to fully fund all state courts.





Adjustments have been made for the Ranger College football program this season as the Rangers hope to improve last season's disappointing 2-5 Texas Junior College Football Conference record, 3-6 overall.

Former Rangers Assistant Coach Phil Warwick steps up to take over the head job replacing Kurt Nichols. The 1989 graduate of Southwest Baptist has previous coaching experience at Southwest Baptist and Kickapoo High School.

The Rangers will make their bid for a successful '96 season with nine returning starters and 21 letterman. The offense will be lead by tight end John Hawpe, 6-6, 245-lbs., from Stephenville. Last season, Hawpe was fourth in the TJCF in receiving yards with 255 total on 24 receptions.

The Rangers use a multiple one-back offense using a split-T and offset-I formation at times. Returning to fill in the position is Malcom Mathis, 5-11, 184-lbs., from Rockwall.

"Our offense will be a balanced, 50/50 run

and pass game," said Warwick. "Hopefully the run will open up the passing game."

The defense will have five returning Ranger starters along with 11 lettermen. They will be led by strong-safety Desmond Gant, 6-3, 210-lbs. and

linebacker Warring Vital, 6-0, 207-lbs.

"Our secondary will be young," says the new RC head coach. "But the linebackers will be our strength."

Gant, second-team All-TJCF player of a year ago, had 98 tackles and three interceptions. Vital, Honorable Mention All-American in the NJCAA, will be returning this season after missing the '95 campaign.

"If there is ever a week I don't feel confident of a victory, I will call the opposition and let them know, that way they can save some bus money," concluded Warwick.

The Rangers begin their '96 season Saturday, August 31, when they travel to Roswell, New Mexico for a 7:00 p.m. non-conference game against New Mexico Military Institute.



## CHANGES WITH AGE

Our feet undergo gradual changes as we age. These changes usually begin to register when people are in their 50s. The feet broaden, the natural padding on the soles flattens and the skin becomes dry. Each of these changes can have painful effects.

As the years go by, the broadening may require shoes that are as much as one size larger than customary. This is especially pertinent for women who habitually endure shoes that are too tight. Choosing shoes that accommodate broadened feet may help relieve problems created by years of wearing too tight shoes. Among other changes, the loss of natural padding makes elements of the feet more susceptible to stresses that cause painful conditions. Chronic dry skin can develop painful cracks, often in the heels. The cracks may invite infection.

Being aware that such changes occur doesn't mean one must accept foot problems as part of aging. See the podiatrist for relief.

**HELP!** — I read your Home Tips in your paper. I think they're great — keep it up, please!  
I need to know if there is something I can do when I get water rings on wood tables. They turn white. I've tried paste, but it didn't work. Also, how can I get perfume stains out of blouses? I would sure be grateful if you can help. Dorothy S., Lancaster, N.Y.  
**EDITOR'S RESPONSE:** For water rings on wood, try rubbing a little baby oil over the rings. They should disappear. Once you get them out, make sure everyone in the house uses coasters instead of setting sweaty glasses on wood tables.  
As for your perfume stains, since they're most likely caused by the oil in the perfume, I'm afraid the blouses are permanently stained. Putting perfume on clothes doesn't serve any real purpose anyway. The aroma in perfume is triggered by perspiration, thus the advice to dab perfume on pulse spots. From now on, just dab perfume lightly behind the ears and at the base of the throat and on the wrists.

**ODOR EATER** — To remove musty odors or to just refresh a piece of luggage that has been stored, crumple newspapers and place inside baggage for a couple of weeks or until mustiness is gone. Ann M., Glendora, Calif.

# Why I Believe In Old Rip #9

"Rip", the famous horned frog of Eastland, Texas is at Hotel Pennsylvania basking in the hot glare of public attention and particularly enjoying the succulent insects being sent to his suite by kindhearted suburbanites. It was on February 18 of this year that 'Rip' made his startling return to the world after having been incarcerated in the cornerstone of the Eastland County Courthouse since July 29, 1897.

While 'Rip' took a nap yesterday in his temporary home, a fish bowl with a little sand at the bottom, Will M. Wood and S.H. Ruff, who brought him to Manhattan, were his spokesmen with the Press. 'Rip' bestirred himself long enough for the camera men while having lunch, but for the most part he appeared bored, a condition brought on by the cold day, it was said.

Thirty-one years ago the Courthouse of Eastland, then a village of possibly 400 people, was being completed. On the day of the cornerstone laying E.E. Wood, then district clerk of Eastland County, came home and saw his small son playing with a horned toad. As it happened, Mr. Wood had read an article on the hibernation-plus propensities of the horned frog. This promoted him to have his son's pet sealed in the Courthouse cornerstone that afternoon.

"Witnesses Remember Incident

"There are many citizens of the thriving city of Eastland who remember the occasion well, a number claiming to have been eye witnesses of the frog's imprisonment. This winter when the Courthouse was to be torn down Mr. Wood, among numerous others, began to speculate on the chances of the frog being alive. Legend says that it is possible for such frogs to live one hundred years without air or food, in a state of suspended animation, but nowadays there aren't many people who believe in legends.

"However, the daily newspapers started pondering the question and on the day the cornerstone was to be lifted there were several thousand people on hand to 'see for them-

selfes' if 'Rip' as he then began to be called, would emerge safe and sound.

"That he did is attested by the sworn testimony of many ministers, lawyers and other reputable citizens. The horn-like spikes on the reptile's head had been worn off, his back left leg broken and one of the claws of his right front foot broken off. His mouth was shut and did not open for ten days and it was five weeks before he had his first meal. However, he immediately showed enough life to encourage his discoverers that they might bring him back to normalcy.

"Learned scientists have disputed hotly as to his ability to live through such an experience, but the younger Mr. Wood, who as a small boy started the frog on his adventurous career, is indignant that anyone should be skeptical concerning 'Rip.' Regardless of unbelievers, Mr. Wood and his father, who is still a resident of Eastland, claim that the truth has been proved.

"Rip" has been exhibited in Memphis, St. Louis, Washington and other cities and everywhere has been a sensation attraction, according to Messrs. Wood and Ruff. He even had an audience with President Coolidge, who is reported to have said, 'How remarkable.' He will be here until next week unless the weather gets colder or kind admirers fail to send in sufficient insects for his meals.

The Friday, May 11, issue of the paper had a picture titled BEAUTY AND THE FROG. "Miss Irene Delroy, star of 'Here's Howe,' a new musical comedy at the Broadhurst, is holding 'Rip,' the horned toad which slept thirty-one years in the Eastland, Texas Courthouse. The picture recalls the fairy story of the frog that became the playmate of the beautiful princess. 'Rip' is safely guarded at Hotel Pennsylvania, so will not be able to wait at the stage door for Miss Delroy."

The fellows did take Rip to the play and enjoyed it so much. Will gave such a good report of it that he eagerly awaited for it to be made into a movie a few later. The family saw it at the Eastland Connelley Theater several times.

Edward Borden, Publicity Manager of the hotel wrote the following letter on May 8, 1928, to Dr.

Henry Fairfield Osborn, of the American Museum of Natural History, 77th Street and Central Park West:

"Two gentlemen, guests at Hotel Pennsylvania, Mr. Wood and Mr. Ruff, have in their possession a horned toad, which apparently has been through the unfortunate experience of 31 years interment in the cornerstone of the Courthouse at Eastland, Texas. The frog has had wide publicity, and these gentlemen have appealed to me to advise them, as a publicity man, on how to realize on their possession now that they have him promoted.

"The only solution I have of the problem is to make a motion picture of the history of that phenomenon known as suspended animation, with the frog playing the lead. "I therefore appeal to you for a few moments interview, in which to verify, if that be possible, the theory of suspended animation.

"Rest assured that I am in no way trying to secure an endorsement from you, nor am I convinced beyond the evidence of the prowess of this extraordinary beastie. It is merely my business to offer my services as a Statler employee to any guest. We have for years tried to fill every need. Perhaps I am the most taxed of any in the organization."

Another letter written May 14, on the hotel stationery and left for Will in Room 497:

"My dear Mr. Wood, I called at the hotel this evening to see you and the 'Texas Toad.'

"My interest is that my father, Prof. Israel Alexander Dodge, and I experimented for many years in keeping tabs on entombed horned frogs and he drove over from Mineral Wells to attend the ceremonies in laying the cornerstone of the Eastland Co. Courthouse and had the children procure a horned frog to place therein.

"I still have the letter my father wrote, telling of the matter at the time of the occurrence in 1897. After 15 years, and it may still be with old letters at my sister's home in Oklahoma, for I told my sister that I believed the horned frog was alive and would be alive after another 15 years when the courthouse would be demolished, maybe to demonstrate harmony between the faith of religion with the experiments of science.

"You may even at the age of 4 years remember the kindly old gentleman who had you get the frog, as surely your father and elders will remember him. "I may see you sometime this week and tell

you of some of my experiments and prophecies which have been realized. Your Texas friend, Elizabeth W. Dodge."

Later, she returned to the hotel with Tedah A. Chamberlan. They were very nice looking and beautifully dressed. She had a coat with a big fur collar and a hat similar to Irene Delroy's, so I always thought it was the Broadway star's photo. They had a camera and took the only snapshots taken on the trip. The women had their photos made with Rip clinging to their dress as if he were a piece of jewelry. Elizabeth held Rip in her hand, Will held Rip and Webb held Pollyanna, my baby horned frog.

An unidentified article had Will's picture with Old Rip on a table with his head held high for "A Curiosity Shop" Column with photo by Herbert Photos, Inc. The title was "Rip Van Winkle has Rival" and "Rip Van Winkle of Sleepy Hollow fame now has a rival, a very diminutive one to be sure, but still a rival. Rip, the Second is the tiny creature seen in the picture squatting on the table in front of Will M. Wood, of Eastland, Texas. Mr. Wood says this his father buried 'Rip' to test the Texas tradition that a horned toad can live for years without food or water."

According to Boyce House in his I GIVE YOU TEXAS column in many newspapers in Texas on June 16, 1960:

"In New York City, a news reel with sound (this was in the early days of the 'talkies') was made with Will Wood doing the talking; a crew of 18 men was required and the cost was approximately \$5000."

Wallace O. Chariton in UNSOLVED TEXAS MYSTERIES:

"Rip was such a hit that a movie company actually wanted to make a film of him eating. Unfortunately, red ants are the main staple of a horned frog's diet, and none could be found locally in New York. A Professional bug catcher was called in and he supplied ants at 50¢ a bag. The cameras rolled and Old Rip enjoyed a feast."

I remembered it was as 50¢ an ant.

Henry Ford was on the same program. They got to meet him.

Talking pictures had arrived! Movie theaters were adding sound equipment in the big cities. The

only time the sound was used was with the news reels. Since Eastland did not have a theater with sound, Will never did get to see the news reel. Margurite Day Blandford, Will's cousin saw it in Fort Worth.

The telegrams resumed resumed as one was sent from Philadelphia May 17:

"LEFT NEW YORK TODAY NOON WILL BE HERE OVER TOMORROW SURE WILL SEE WHAT KIND OF TRADE WE CAN MAKE HERE MY ADDRESS HERE IS BENJAMIN FRANKLIN HOTEL IF NOTHING IS DONE HERE WE WILL START FOR TEXAS SOON WILL WIRE YOU WHAT WE DO."

Will reported that the luxury of the majestic hotel was most enjoyable, as were the many places of historic interest and charm. Old Rip charmed the children at an orphanage.

The absence of newspaper clippings and the mention of the visit there in Boyce House writings is unusual. The only information was from the telegrams: "May 18. MADE CONTACT WITH 'RIP' FOR TWO DAYS AND POSSIBLY FOR ALL NEXT WEEK WILL KNOW AFTER SUNDAY WILL WIRE YOU IF WE STAY OVER NEXT WEEK TELL DAD WE HAVE A SIXTY FORTY CONTRACT WITH WILLOW GROVE PARK EXPECT TO START BACK TO TEXAS SOON AS FINISHED HERE."

The next day, Earnest sent his telegram to Will concerning the Penney suit. Brelsford was the lawyer:

"ALL WELL BIG FLOOD COVERING EAST PART CITY THE HEARING ON VENUE SET MAY TWENTY SIX BRELSFORD DOES NOT THINK NECESSARY YOUR PRESENCE NOTICE SERVED ON ME."

The next telegram was sent from Hagerstown, MD on May 21:

"WE ARE ON OUR WAY BACK TO TEXAS WILL GET IN ABOUT FRIDAY OR SATURDAY WILL HAVE A DELAY HERE WE BROKE A SPRING ON THE CAR WILL BE THROUGH WHEELING TOMORROW YOU CAN TELL MRS. WEAVER AND SHE CAN WIRE ME AT HOTEL THERE WILL CALL FOR MESSAGE."

The May 22 message was from Wheeling, WV:

"I WILL STAY HERE TONIGHT EXPECT TO BE IN INDIANAPOLIS TOMORROW NIGHT AT THIS RATE WE SHOULD BE IN HOME SATURDAY TELL EDITH THAT POLLYANNA DIED LAST NIGHT I GUESS WE WILL RETURN BY OKLAHOMA CITY AND WICHITA FALLS WILL WIRE TOMORROW NIGHT."







## Texas Federation Of Teachers Lottery For Literacy



When third graders took the TAAS in 1996, more than 20 percent of them—41,205 students failed to pass the reading portion. Virtually all of these students moved on to the fourth grade as though everything was just fine, and they will probably continue to move up the school ladder until they reach the tenth grade and fail to pass the exit-level TAAS. If we all agree that learning to read is vital to success in school, we ought to do something special to help these kids learn to read before it is too late.

In January, TFT launched the Basics First! Campaign, to raise public awareness of the situation and pressure educational leaders to come to grips with the problem. The Basics First! program calls upon school

boards to do four things:

\*Make sure that no student leaves third grade unable to read.

\* End social promotion.

\* Restore teacher authority on grades.

\*Intervene intensively with kids who are failing.

"Surely you do not want an 18-year-old sitting in third grade?" That is question I often hear when I explain our campaign.

No, we do not want 18-year-olds sitting in third grade, but we do not want them to get a diploma they can't read, either. Presently, school administrators pressure teachers to promote kids who haven't learned, and sometimes administrators simply change

grades or promote a student over the teacher's objection when the teacher balks. Although this may save the school district the time and trouble with that student's problems, it certainly does nothing to help that student in the long run.

It may be true that simply holding a student back year after year does not help that student learn, but it is true that simply promoting the student to the next grade is equally bad. We know two things that don't work: simple retention of failing students and social promotion.

The need for some special, intensive help for kids who aren't learning to read seems obvious. When kids are experiencing learning problems, we know what needs to be done: more individu-

als help, smaller classes, etc. The problem is that those things cost money.

To his credit, Governor Bush has spotted this problem and has suggested that the state should set aside \$35 million for reading academies to teach all kids to read by the end of third grade.

The TFT is proposing that we raise the ante and put some real bucks into this push for literacy.

Lieutenant Governor Bob Bullock claims to have found a bonanza in state lottery monies. It seems the state will have at least \$527 million more than expected in lottery money next year, and the lieutenant governor has invited folks to give him ideas on how to spend that money. We are taking him up on that invitation.

TFT is proposing that half of the bonus money from the lottery be used to establish reading programs for kids in pre-kindergarten through third grade, especially programs aimed at helping non-leaders learn to read. School districts would be required to use that money for something new, something different, some-

thing special to help kids learn to read by the end of third grade. We would stop the practice of socially promoting kids who failed the TAAS in reading at the third grade level, and use this money to put those kids into special, intensive remediation programs to help them learn to read.

I am sure there will be intense competition for this windfall that Bullock has discovered.

I am sure there will be intense competition for this windfall that Bullock has discovered. Some will want to use this extra money to pave more miles of highway, build more prisons, or simply to keep a lid on taxes. If we are looking for a way to get to get a great return on an investment of this money, though, I cannot imagine an investment that would return a greater dividend to the state than an investment in teaching young children to read.

Right now, most of these go on to be dropouts in high school (we lose 33% of our students between seventh and 12th grade) because they get far behind that they give up. Some of these

kids will go on to make a life for themselves despite their lack of an education, but for most dropouts the future is grim. More than 70% of the inmates in Texas prisons are high-school dropouts, and about 75% of welfare recipients are functionally illiterate. The governor's business council estimates that functionally illiterate adults cost \$224 billion a year through welfare, crime, and other costs. We spend far more locking up or feeding dropouts than we would have spent had we put more money into educating them.
