

we're saving a nickel every time we drink a cup will last? \* \* \* \*



All of the bonds will be of the revenue type. They will be paid by profits derived from the sewer system and from the water system. Taxes would not be molested in any way if the sewer system goes

The commission was petitioned fied voters to call the bond election. Rhinehart estimated that if the vote was "for" the sewer system, it would be about 90 days before the contract for construction could be let.






