

"The committee and solicitors have been told that only surplus uneeded aluminum is wanted," Judge Johnson said.

All scrap collected will first be sent to a preparation center where it will be cut or ground up into the right size for smelting. It will then be shipped again to the smelting plant. Junk yards have agreed to cut and grind the metal free of charge.

Supplementing a previous letter to the 254 county judges of Texas, asking for their leadership in various phases of the civilian defense program in Texas, Governor W.Lee O'Daniel, as chairman of the National Defense Committee for Texas, today sent further details of the aluminum collection campaign plans to these officials.

The Governor was named by Mayor F. H. LaGuardia, Director of Civilian Defense, as chairman of the campaign for Texas. He immediately designated the county judges as leaders for their respective areas and requested the judges to ask the mayors of incorporated towns and cities to serve as chairmen of their localities.

The house-to-house canvass and collection will take place July 21

Aluminum so collected will be deposited in central bins, such as in fire stations; or in other designated places; then taken to the yards of waste dealers for sorting, classifying, and baling; then shipped to smelters.

The waste dealers have been asked as a patriotic service to contribute their supervision and facilities without profit, the Gov-

The metal will be said to the smelters as a special uniform price fixed by the government. The smelters will pay directly by check to "National Scrap Aluminum Fund," care of the nearest Federal bank. The entire net proceeds will be available to the Office of Civilian Defense, and any expenditures required for the proper defense of the civilian population.

Those wishing to participate in the collection of the aluminum may communicate with the mayors of





Vegetable Salads For Summer Meals

By Katharine Fisher Director, Good Housekeeping Institute

Nutritionists tell us to "work in" a leafy, green or yellow vegetable, raw or cooked, once a day, sometimes twice. What better way than via the salad bowl? Salads or raw shredded cabbage, raw slivers of carrots or turnips, diced tomatoes, celery, oucumbers, scallions, etc., temp ingly seasoned with salad dressings, give you all the vitamins and minerals raw vegetables offer.

As for cooked vegetables, into many refrigerators go leftover cooked peas, limas, string beans, carrots, etc. If you toss them with crisp salad greens, raw vegetables, a bit of minced onion, diced green or red pepper, or minced parsley (peppers and parsley are both rich in vitamins A and C) and salad dressing, you can have a salad bowl as varied as you please. Fresh herbs, such as tarrezon, chervil, dill, and sorrel, uplift the salad, too. And if a hearty version is more to your liking, just add some grated, crumbled or slivered cheese, diced hard-cooked eggs, meat, fish, or chicken—home-cooked or canned.

Good Housek-eping In making salad dressings frequently use lemon juice as a seasoning, for it adds vitamin C. Try, too, adding minced onion, chutney, chives, curry, fresh or dried herbs, or sliced clives to bottled or homemade salad dressing.

Jellied salads fit especially well into hot-weather meals. They can be made and safely tucked away into the refrigerator early in the day, or the day before. You can buy packaged geltin aspic, to which you can add vegetable, meat, or fish mixtures.

String-Bean Relish Salad

Tested by Good Housekeeping Institute. Use Institute-approved measuring eups and spoons. Measure level.

1½ lbs, green string beans 3½ tsp. salt 1 c. boiling water ½ c. chopped white onions 2 tbsp. salad oil

1 tsp. granulated sugar Speck pepper ¼ c. vinegar ¼ c. water Salad Greens

Cook beans, which have been cut lengthwise into 1½" pieces, with 3 tsp. of the sait and boiling water, covered until beans are tender—about 25 min. Drain; add remaining ingredients except salad greens. Mix well with a fork. Chill for several hours. Serve on any desired salad greens. Man Suggestion: Serve with sautéed flounders, sliced tomatoes, cornbread, and raspberry taploca.

Ham Supper Salad

Mr. Allen enjoys stamp collecting, the fascinating hobby that has become widely popular in the United States lately. Though stamp collecting seems to persons unfamiliar with the hobby to be a rather foolish pastime of pasting meaningless squares of paper in a book, it is really a study in itself. Philately is a hobby that combines geographical and historical fact with an appreciation of artistic engraving.

Mr. Allen's collection of stamps contains American issues that date back as far as 1851; it includes stamps of over seventy countries. The stamps range in size from a little half inch square to those three inches long; in shape, from a rectangle to a triangle, and are of all colors from drab brown and grey to bright scarlet. And each stamp has a historical or social meaning.

China's recent series of stamps in which the American flag has a prominent place is in Mr. Allen's collection. The collection was issued as a gesture of appreciation of the United States aid to China in ther war with Japan. Stanley's famous search for Dr. Livingstone is commemorated on a Belgian Congo stamp with the portrait of the great American journalist. In fact, the highlights of each naftion's history may be read from the stamps of Mr. Allen's collec-

These tests come from the labpratories of the American Institute of Laundering and are practical as salt. You'll need a packet of matches when making the tests for you'll be burning threads pulled out of the fabrics

Burning pure wool smells like burning hair whether the odor comes because a live cigarette ash dropped on your new tweed suit or from a single thread unraveled from fabric at the sales

And, if you've never burned your hair and aren't familiar with the odor, look at the ash. If it is black metallic, the thread is woolen. Also, wool burns very slowly.

Pure silk burns in exactly the same way except it burns slowly, instead of very slowly. The appearance of the ash is black metallic and the odor is of burn-

Cotton, however, smells like burning paper, burns with a flare and leaves a gray powder. Lin-



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

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
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
