B. W. Hutcherson became the Sutton County Democratic nominee for Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector Saturday when he defeated the incumbent, Sheriff Leo E. Brown, by a slim margin of 48 votes. The count, as canvassed Monday by the Democratic executive committee, showed Hutcherson to have 492 votes to 444 for Brown. In the only other county run-off, Wesley Sykes beat J. V. Alley by a single vote for Commissioner of Precinct 4. In the July 27 primary, the two had tied with 24 votes each. Saturday's returns gave Alley 26 and Sykes 27.

Biggest lead taken in county voting was that of Beauford Jester over Dr. Homer P. Rainey. Jester polled 719 to Rainey's 161.

In a letter to members of the Democratic Committee, Sheriff Brown asked that the voting list be checked for irregularities and illegalities in voting Saturday. The list was checked Monday afternoon and it was found that there was but a total of 35 votes which could be questioned as to legality. Late Monday afternoon Sheriff Brown met with the committee and went over this list, but did not indicate whether he would contest the election.

Assuming that the 35 questionable votes were all cast for Hutcherson, Brown would still fall short of a tie by 13 votes. According to law, Brown has five days after the canvass in to file a contest. This would place the deadline at Saturday, August 31, at midnight.

ANSWERS TO OUESTIONS REGARDING TERMINAL LEAVE PAY

What sort of bonds are those and when do they mature? A. They are non-negotiable non-transferable and may not be pledged as collateral. They draw interest at 21/2 per cent and mature five years from the first day of the first quarter following the separation for which they are paid. If a man was discharged on January 10, 1943, his bonds will mature in April 1, 1948. Will I receive my discharge paper back?

Yes. The finance officer will mail it to you as soon as he is finished processing your application. The check and bonls will be mailed later.

I live near an Army post. May I get my application processed

more quickly if I go there in person?

No. All applications must be handled by mail.

Where can I receive help in filling out the form? Any of the 3.000-odd Veterans Community Information ad Advisory centers in the nation will be prepared to help yu

fill out your form. Most of these centers will have a Notay Public handy who will notarize the form free of charge. Q. If I send my original discharge paper to the finance officer] may have to go several weeks without evidence on my perso of honorable service. Have you any suggestions to con

Many of the larger Veterans Community Information and A. visory Centers maintain photostat plants where copies of di charge papers are made free of charge. Others have con mercial contracts for this work at low rates. Should I hurry to get my application in?
That is not necessary. You have a year, until September 1947, to file your claim, and your bonds will mature on the second same date regardless of when you file.

How long will I have to wait to receive payment? There is no way accurately to answer this. Within a she space of time you will receive your discharge paper back wi a notation on it to the effect that your application is bein processed. In due time your bonds and check will be maile to you. Do not write your finance officer asking about the progress of your application. Replying to this correspondence will only take up time that he could use otherwise to process

ANSWERS TO OUESTIONS REGARDING TERMITTI TO

President Truman has signed into law the Leave Act of 1946, which equalizes leave benefits for officers and enlisted persons of the armed services and grants cash and bond payments to certain veterans. Here are a few questions and answers of interest to former service

Q. What veterans are affected by the Leave Act of 1946? Any person honorably separated from the service between September 8, 1939 and September 1, 1946, who had at the time of separation accumulated leave credits for which he was not compensated. Does this include officers?

Yes, those officers who had enlisted time during the period

mentioned above. Under earlier law they already have been compensated for leave accumulated as officers. How about women in the service? They are eligible for benefits, too, but WACs may count only the time they served after the name was changed from WAAC

How does a person go about collecting his benefits?

Get a form at any post office, fill it out and have it notarized. and mail it to the appropriate finance officer with the original copy of your discharge, a photostatic copy, or a true copy certified by an authorized civil official. What if I have lost my discharge? Apply for a Certificate in Lieu of Discharge to one of the ing: The Adjutant General of the Army, 4300 Goodfellow

ROBBERY UP 158% -Rural Crime Nearly Twice '44 Rate

Criminals are preying upon the ural population of Texas at nearly Service Life Insurance premiums? double the rate of two and a half years ago, Director Homer Garrison of the Department of Public ment of any premiums other than Safety declared this week.

Garrison said rural crime increased 85.27 per cent from the first six months of 1944 to the first six months of 1946.

Biggest gain was in robbery, up 158 per cent. Another staggering gain was shown in burglarly, up 121 per cent. Auto theft jumped 96 per cent; felony theft 61 percent; murder and homicide 55 per cent; and rape 48 per cent.

During the same period crime ncreased 42 per cent in the cities. The overall gain for both rural and urban jurisdictions was 54.54

Garrison said law enforcement officers are "holding their own against long odds," for arrests have increased in direct proportion to the gain in crime.

Convictions, however, are lag-ging behind. The penitentiary system received 930 new prisoners in the first half of 1944; 862 in the first half of 1945; and 1,221 in the first half of 1946, Garrison said. This represented an increase of 31 per cent from the 1944 to



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

Teaching Positions Still 12% Under Normal Needs

POOR SALARIES PAID GIVEN AS CAUSE

The Texas State Teachers Assocation has just completed a survey according to A. E. Wells to determine the number of teaching positions now vacant that must be filled by September 1 if schools are to open with a full staff of teachers.

Replies were received from 813 superintendents representing 33,958 teaching positions or approximately 75 per cent of all the 12.7 per cent of the total. The picture is much worse for rural schools. The survey disclossed that in these schools there were more than 17 per cent of all positions vacant. The larger cities were affected the least by vacancies. Most of them have been able to provide salary increases for teachers this year due to the increased per capita apportionment for the comng school year.

It is evident that unless salaries are increased substantially by increased local and state support hat the schools of Texas may soon find one-tenth of their classrooms

vacant. The legislative program of the Texas State Teachers Association for 1947, according to President Elizabeth Koch of San Antonio, would be to secure better state support for the purpose of increasng teachers' salaries. She said, This is a must on our legislative agenda. The program should be supported by every citizen in Texas because our situation is more acute today than at any time since 1941, and it appears that the situation is growing worse each year."



out a sure cure. They are members of the Texas Bankers' Association and they have a standing offer of \$5,000 ready for anyone who kills a bank robber according to their specifications. The association states emphatically that it "will not give one cent for live bank robbers. They are rarely identified, more rarely convicted, and most rarely stay in the penitentiary when sent there---all of which operations are troublesome, burdensome and costly to our government."

The requirements for "legally" killing a bank robber aren't really hard---all you have to do is be on your toes and have a good place to hide in case you miss. The asociation says that the robber must be killed in the bank or leaving the bank, or while the holdup or threats are being committed in the bank or while the robbers are resisting legal pursuit or arrest within five miles of the bank robbed or within one hour of the holdup. The reward does not apply to night attacks on member banks.






