**Veterans' News**

Q. How can I arrange to have my National Service Life Insurance premiums deducted from the disability compensation checks I receive from Veterans Administration?

A. You can do this if you will go to any Veterans Administration office and fill out a form authorizing VA to make the deductions from your compensation payments.

Q. I have been turned down by a lending institution for a G.I. guaranteed loan to buy a business. Does this mean that I can't get a G. I. guaranteed loan to go into business?

A. No. If one lender turns you down, try another one. The fact that one lender is not interested does not indicate that your proposition is not sound.

Q. Before the G. I. Bill was amended, I used up my whole guarantee of \$2,000 to buy a farm. Now that the maximum guarantee has been increased to \$4,000, would I be entitled to an additional \$2,000 loan-guarantee if I wish to purchase more land?

A. Yes. If you used part or all of your loan guarantee before the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (G. I. Bill) was amended last winter, the amount of loan-guarantee credit used is deducted from the amount for which you are eligible under the amended bill, and the remainder is the amount of guaranteed credit which you may use in obtaining future loans.

Q. Can I change the beneficiary or beneficiaries of my National Service Life Insurance without letting the beneficiaries know anything about it?

A. Yes. A veteran may change the beneficiary or beneficiaries of his National Service Life Insurance at any time without their knowledge or consent by notifying Veterans Administration. For further information, the veteran should consult the nearest VA of-

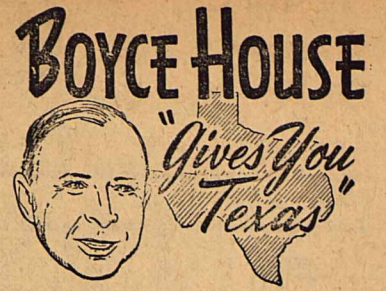

We debated such subjects as the one-house legislature, initiative and recall, capital punishment, govern-ment ownership of utilities and the tariff.

We had two literary societies and debated within our society, also in inter-society contests and with other high schools. My two collea-gues on the high school team were orators. Sterling Tracy won the State high school oratorial champ-ionship and, in the University of Wisconsin, he won the oratorial championship of the "Big Ten". Clifford Davis is about to begin his fourth term in Congress. Your columnist lacked the speaking ability of these two and so tried to make up for this deficiency by studying, extra hard, on the sub-ject. In the rebuttal, where the speaking has to be extemporaneous, I used to attain a speed of 200 words a minute. The other boys were generous and elected me captain of the team.

Certainly, I'm sympathetic for suffering Europe -- but why couldn't at least part of the food sent over there be something I don't like? Why couldn't it in-clude some squash, turnips and cauliflower?

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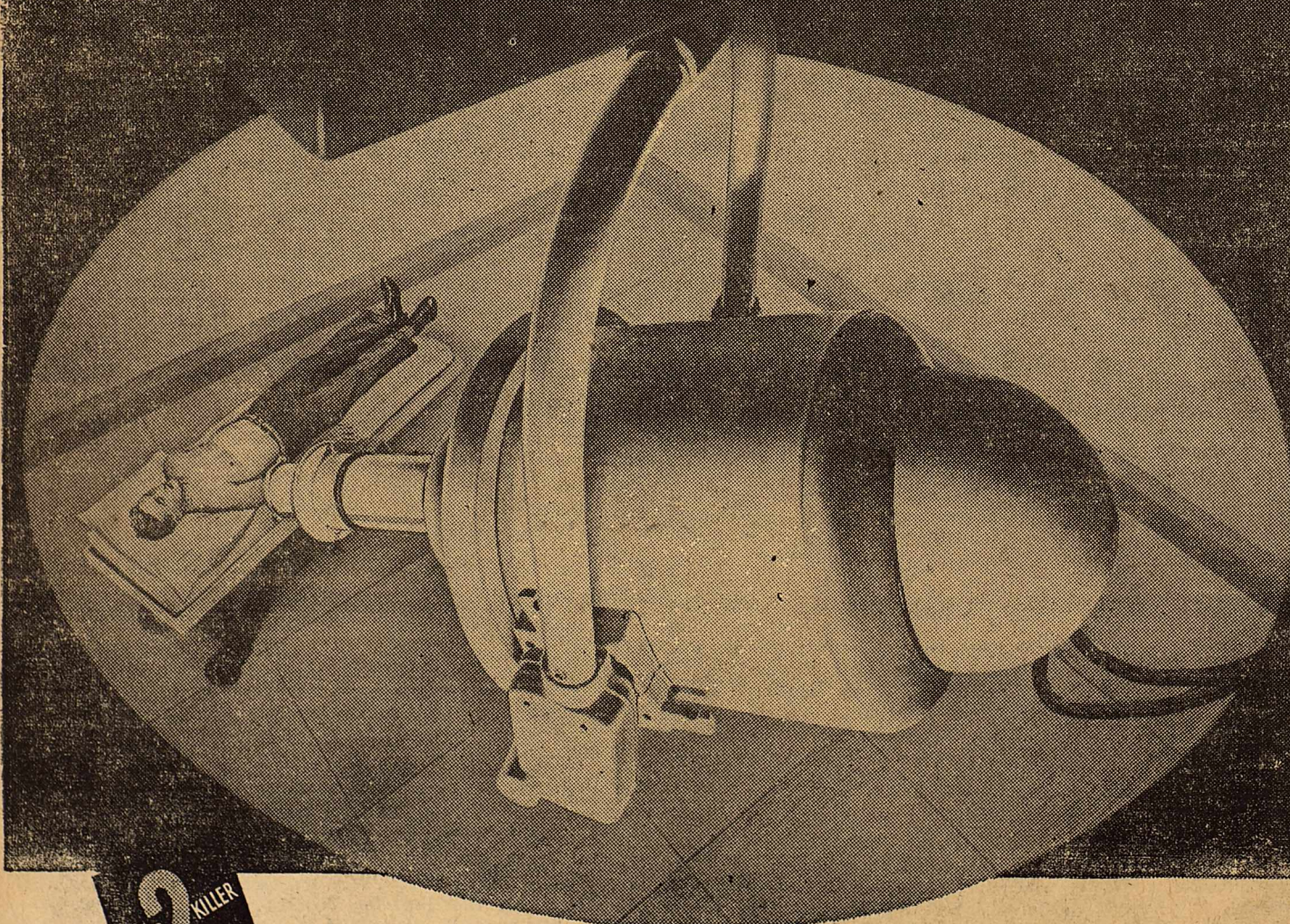

### Health Officer Warns Of Danger Of Pneumonia

With the approach of fall and the attendant seasonal changes of weather, common colds become much more prevalent and widespread in the state.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning against the careless treatment of any respiratory illness since they can and frequently do result in the dreaded complication, pneumonia. He emphasized the fact that pneumonia usually strikes with little or no warning, following a simple cold, an attack of influenza or some other respiratory infection.

"A cold or any other infection of the breathing passage, especially if accompanied by fever, demands the immediate attention of a doctor," the State Health Officer said. "To try to fight such a disease without bed rest and by means of self-medication may endanger life

unnecessarily." According to Dr. Cox, prevention is better than cure and in order to avoid colds, influenza, and pneumonia he advised building up normal physical resistance by sufficient ventilation, adequate nourishing food, outdoor exercise and sufficient sleep and rest. "However," he added, "if, in spite of such care, a respiratory illness develops, the family doctor should be called immediately."

The fact pneumonia is definitely a communicable disease is often overlooked, Dr. Cox stated, but this should be borne in mind so that the danger of passing the disease from one person to another can be eliminated.

R. A. Halbert's show herd of Polled Herefords from his Sonora ranch gathered in quite a list of winings at the Warren Gammon Centennial Polled Hereford Show at Des Moines, Ia., last week, with the senior yearling, Advance Mischief 64th being declared the champion.

The Halbert herd competed with animals of 50 exhibitors from 11 states in which 232 head were shown.

Advance Mischief 64th won over 123 bulls in the individual bull classes and was selected by John Burns, Fort Worth, the judge as the champion bull.

Domestic Mischief, the Halbert's chief herd sire, won first place over nine entries.

Other Halbert winnings at the DesMoines show included; first on three bulls and first on two bulls, making four blue ribbons, which were more than any other exhibitor collected.

In addition to the four blues the herd won two reds and two whites.

Particularly in the bull classes was this herd strong. Domestic Woodrow 2nd, was second prize senior yearling bull; third place junior yearling bull was Star Domino 10th, and fourth place senior yearling bull was bred in the Halbert herd.

In the senior bull class class, Domestic Mischief 73rd won, third for Halbert.

"The Halbert herd contributed greatly to the Polled breeds' greatest show," reported Don W. Chittenden, field secretary for the American Polled Hereford Breeders' Association.
