A room temperature within the range suggested, plus the careful main-tenance of proper humidity, will help to prevent needless sickness and protect the good health of your family."

Sixteen honor graduates of Texas high schools, represeming every section of the State, will enter Texas A. & M. College in September as the first winners in a ner major scholarships program. The scholarships, known as "Opportunity Awards," are designed to offer oustanding Texas boys who would otherwise be unable to ittend college an opportunity to secure an education.





Q. Can a disabled eteran takng a course under Polic Law 16 continue his training for more than four years?

A. Training in exess of four years may be approved when the veteran's disability is such that no course of training which does not exceed four year will restore him to employability, or circumstances beyond the ontrol of the veteran necessitate the extension beyond the prescribed four year period.

Q. Can an amputee veteran select the type of artificial limb he wants and the firm he wants to buy it from?

A. Yes, the veteran will be permitted to select the artificial limb of his choice but it must be purchased from an approved prosthetic appliance manufacturer under contdact with VA.

Q. Am I entitled to field trip expenses in gathering material for a thesis while I am in school under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act.?

A. Veterans Administration will not pay for occasional field trips, whether to summer camp or for data for research or thesis, where the charge to the student is a separate charge not included in the tuition or laboratory fee customarily paid by all students enrolled in the course.

Q. How may application be made for domiciliary or hospital care of a veteran?

A. Veterans Administration Form P-10, "Application for Hospital Treatment or Domiciliary Care" should be executed by the veteran or nearest relative, guardian, or representative and forwarded to the nearest VA hospital, regional office, or contact office. If found

Cut flowers were used on the chancel rail and candles and cedar were used in the windows. The church was lighted by candles.



### Things are NOT always as they seem



A 1-inch pipe and a 4-inch pipe run water into gal-lon pails. It seems as if the 4-inch pipe would fill 4 times as many pails in a given time. The truth is that it will fill 16 gallon pails while the 1-inch pipe is filling one.

When you read something like this: "Meat in commercial storage on January 1 was about 590,-000,000 pounds\*", it sounds like a lot of meat.

Soda Bill Sez: that labor saved is money made. . . speak well of your enemies—you made them.

But this big country consumes about 50,000,000pounds of meat every day. So when you figure it out, this reserve supply in commercial storage is only enough to last 12 days. Yes, some meat is frozen during months of peak production and stored until months of low pro-duction. But practically all of the beef, veal and lamb that is in storage is the kind preferred for meat loaves, sausage, prepared meats—not the kind that goes over the butcher's block as steaks, roasts, chops, etc. Also, the amount frozen is relaroasts, chops, etc. Also, the amount frozen is relatively small, as it has never exceeded 1.9% of the annual beef production, 9/10 of 1% of the lamb, less than 6% of the pork.


In selling, the meat packer must also follow the market trends established by those who buy the meats. He stands the risk that meat demand will fall off and prices decline between the day he buys the livestock and the day he sells the meat-also the risk of accidents and delays in transit which can wash out his profit.

An average profit of less than 2% on sales is a small return for taking these substantial business risks.




