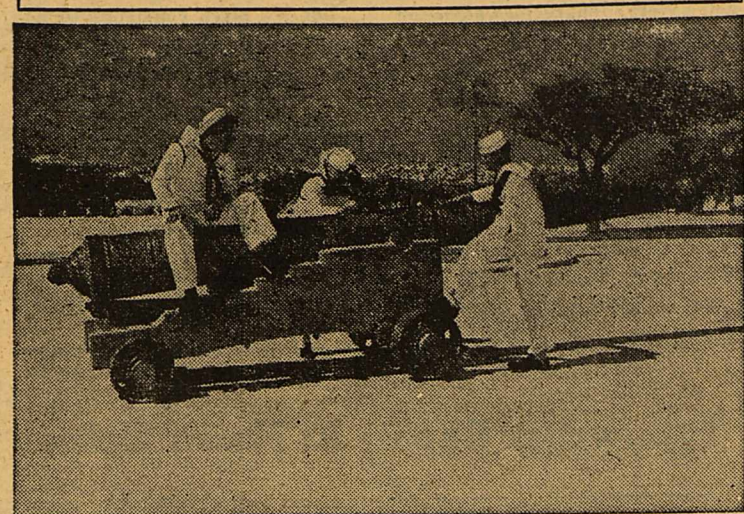

To The Citizens Of Sutton County

Your Commissioners Court offers the following statement in connection with the election which is advertised in this issue of the Devil's River News.

One of the County's most important responsibilities is the construction and maintenance of lateral roads, that is, roads leading from Sonora and from the various State Highways to all sections of the County. These roads are of course, not the same as the elaborate highways the State builds, but they do consist of a caliche base some four inches thick and permit travel in practically all weather. They are of vital importance to the ranchmen who use them for the transportation of products and for quick access to town, and they are equally important to the merchants whom the ranchmen come in to trade with.

During the last few years prices have more than doubled. Many counties and other taxing units

have found it necessary to raise taxes in order to continue operating. So far, Sutton County has been able to carry on its regular work without raising either taxes or values, but even with the most careful economy it has required every available dollar to pay normal operating expenses and there is not sufficient extra money, over and above the amount needed for operating expenses, to purchase machinery for road construction.

In order to carry on road construction, the County is faced with the necessity of purchasing new machinery. The old machinery is wearing out. It is also inefficient and very expensive to operate. It does not produce the most for the money spent, and its continued use is holding up necessary improvements.

Your Court has made arrangements for the purchase of machinery of the type needed, and in an effort to avoid asking for a bond issue or ordering a general increase in property values, your Court is asking for what is known as a Re-allocation election. It should be understood that adjustments in property values, sometimes requiring raises, may have

to be made from time to time, but your Court desires to avoid a general or blanket raise in values.

Other Counties have already held this type of election or a similar one. Schleicher County held an election some years back and raised the tax rate for their Road and Bridge Fund from 15c to 30c on a permanent basis. Crockett County just recently held an election and authorized a permanent increase in their Road and Bridge Fund from 15c to 30c. And both of these Counties have already purchased the same type of machinery that Sutton County is now purchasing. Sutton County has always been a progressive community. It has usually led in road construction. We don't want to fall behind.

The particular election which your Court now proposes, provides for a re-allocation or re-adjustment of tax rates for a period of six years, that is, the change is effective for six years only. After that time the rates will revert back as they now are. The effect of the election may be explained as follows:

Under the Texas Constitution all counties are authorized a tax

rate of 25c on each one hundred dollars worth of taxable property for the General Fund, 15c for the Road and Bridge Fund, 25c for the Public Improvements Fund and 15c for the Jury Fund. Sutton County does not need to tax the full 25c for the Public Improvements Fund nor the full 15c for the Jury Fund, therefore, if by this election the people authorize the Court to do so, as much as 15c can be taken from the Public Improvement Fund and allotted to the Road and Bridge Fund and General Funds, and up to 10c can be taken from the Jury Fund and allotted to those two funds for a period of six years.

Your Commissioners Court proposes to increase the Road and Bridge Fund tax rate during the six year period, from 15c to 30c and the General Fund rate from 25c to 30c, with the option of increasing such funds slightly higher, to 32½c, if such should become necessary. At the same time, the Public Improvement Fund rate which was 7c last year will be lowered to 5c for the next two or three years. The 5c Public Improvement Fund money will be used to renovate the Court House. After two or three years it is anticipated that the Public Improvement Fund rate will be lowered to two or three cents. One cent taxed last year to pay the County's part of the principal and interest on certain outstanding bonds will not be collected this year.

The net result of these changes should be an increase of 17c for the next two or three years, after which the increase would drop to 14c or 15c for the remainder of the six year period. On the basis of the County's estimated taxable values for this year, this would mean that the County Road and Bridge Fund would receive about \$7,050.00 additional money, and the General Fund would receive about \$2,350.00 additional. \$7,050.00 is not a great deal of money to build county roads, and obviously will not build much road, but the County expects to use this for the purchase of machinery. It will carry on its regular road maintenance and construction work with the same amount of money it has had in the past.

Your Court believes that this is the most efficient way to handle the problem facing us, and if conditions and prices stabilize during the next six year period, when this program will terminate, it is hoped that the County can continue

to operate thereafter as it has been operating in the past.

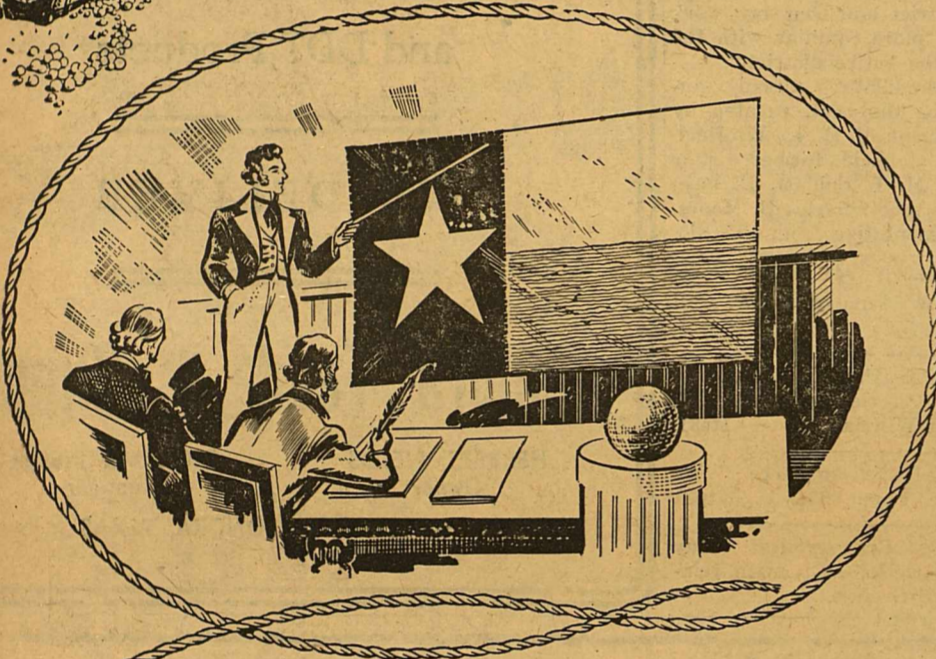

War Assets Adm. Surplus Sales News

Heading a series of new war surplus clearances being announced this week is a \$250,000 sale to be conducted May 24 through May 27 at the Naval Air Station, Corpus Christi. Offered in regular priority sequence will be photographic equipment, heavy machinery, textiles, office machines and furniture, vehicles and industrial machines. Inspection of the approximately 150 lots is to continue from May 24 through May 25, with floor bid awards announced May 25 at the station's hangar 182. On May 27 a total of 21 house trailers will be offered at fixed prices to World War II veterans.

One of the largest offerings of surplus camp buildings to schools and other priorities will involve 815 structures of the Amarillo Army Air Field. The buildings are for off-site use only and include mess halls, recreation, store-

houses, hutments, warehouses, latrines, lavatories, officers quarters, office buildings, post office post exchange, administration and similar types. The Grand Prairie WAA office of real property will entertain qualified applications until May 28.

Another big war surplus sale in Texas is being planned at Fort Bliss, near El Paso. Besides some \$90,000 worth of machine tools and similar equipment to be offered the various purchasers, more than \$100,000 worth of consumer goods and veterans setaside items will be ranged for informal bidding and fixed price awards. Inspection on the industrial equipment will open at the site on May 10. Announcements of this and similar smaller sales will be made in local papers nearest the installations involved.

War Assets extended its rules further this week to accommodate emergency needs of the armed forces. Hereafter all sales announcements will carry the line "Items currently being purchased by the federal government for National Defense are subject to withdrawal up to time of a commitment for sale." This will mean that on all sales offerings of materials conceivable of use to the military, the army, air force, navy and maritime commission will have the right to claim goods any time prior to their award to any other buyer or claimant. Generally, any withdrawals will have to be in whole lots rather than in separate items.

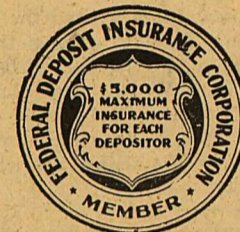

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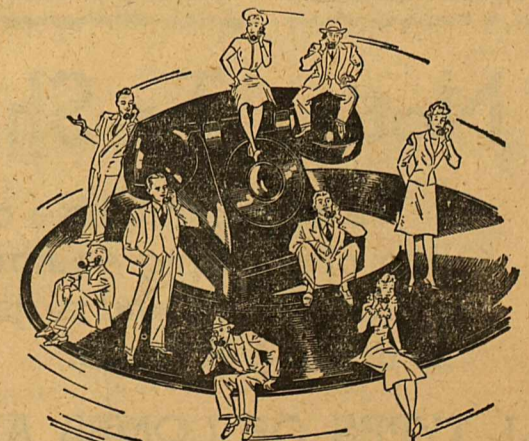
