### Jester Sets Dates For Texans 18 to 25 To Register For U. S. Selective Service

Governor Jester Tuesday issued a proclamation naming 17 days on which Texans 18 to 25 years of age will register for Selective Service.

The days are as follows: Persons born in 1922 after Aug. 30, 1922, will register on Monday, Aug. 30.

Persons born in 1923 will register on Tuesday, Aug. 31, or Wednesday, Sept. 1.

Persons born in 1924 will register on Thursday, Sept. 2, or Friday, Sept. 3.

Persons born in 1925 will register on Saturday, Sept. 4, or Tuesday, Sept. 7.

Persons born in 1926 will register on Wednesday, Sept. 8, or Thursday, Sept. 9.

Persons born in 1927 will register on Friday, Sept. 10, or Saturday, Sept. 11.

Persons born in 1928 will register on Monday, Sept. 13, or Tuesday, Sept. 14.

Persons born in 1929 will register on Wednesday, Sept. 15, or Thursday, Sept. 16.

Persons born in 1930 before Sept. 19, 1930, will register on Friday, Sept. 17, or Saturday, Sept. 18.

Persons born on or after Sept. 19, 1930, will register on the day

they are 18 years of age, or five days after.

Hours for registration on the days designated were proclaimed by the governor at 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Local boards over the state will name registration points in each county.

Groups exempted from registration are as follows:

Members of the armed forces on active duty, including members of the coast and geodetic survey and the public health service.

Cadets of the U. S. Military Academy and Coast Guard Academy.

Midshipmen of the U. S. Naval Academy.

Foreign diplomatic and consular representatives and members of their families who are not citizens of the United States.

Other persons in the United States to be specified by the president who have not declared their intention to become U. S. citizens.

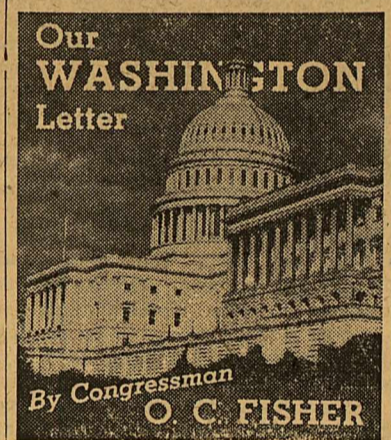
According to the proclamation, men may register late only when prevented by circumstances beyond their control. Men of registration age in foreign countries must present themselves for registration within five days after returning to the United States or its possessions.

The curtain was pulled down again Saturday on the 80th Congress as the called session came to a quiet end.

A housing bill liberalizing Government loan guarantees to builders of low-cost homes and large-scale rental projects, was passed. Senator Taft, joint author of the T.E.W. housing measure, joined in removing socialized housing, subsidized slum clearance and rural housing provisions from the bill. Those were the controversial matters and the legislation had easy sledding once they were stricken out.

The primary purpose of the housing bill as passed is to channel materials into big city low-cost housing, encourage production of low-cost housing and an expanded production of rental housing units.

Another bill that got the green light has to do with consumer credit controls. The purpose of this Act is to make it possible to curb the volume and velocity of consumer credit and thus slow down an inflationary pressure. The Federal Reserve Board is given authority to restrict installment credit and to tighten up on bank reserve requirements.

Over in the Senate, Senator Barkley offered an amendment to restore wartime O.P.A., along with other suggested provisions included in the President's recommendation. But the effort got only 33 affirmative votes. In the House the O.P.A. question was not raised and no vote was taken on that subject.

All in all, the called session was an unusually quiet one. One of the mildest filibusters in history was put on in the Senate by the Southerners to block the Federal anti-poll tax bill. It seemed that everyone was happy over the talk-fest. Nobody got mad at anybody and after a week of it, the Republicans side-tracked the measure and proceeded with the business of the session.

Most of the Texans in Congress will spend the summer and fall in Texas. Bob Poage of Waco, who fractured a heel in Waco a month ago, will remain in Washington for

## \$3,000 Paid For 5.23 Acres East Of City Limits

The Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital came a step nearer to reality Friday when directors voted unanimously to buy from G. C. Stephenson a site adjoining the city limits on the east boundary and comprising 5.23 acres. Purchase price was \$3,000.

In buying the site the directors also voted to buy an additional strip of land 300x500 feet immediately east of the above mentioned acreage, if a deal can be negotiated. The strip already bought runs west to 480 feet along the fence line next to the Chappel residence, and 500 feet south from the Chappel fence corner.

The directors also voted to authorize the city of Sonora to buy sufficient 6-inch pipe to extend a 6-inch water main to the hospital location for which the corporation will pay, but with the understanding that some kind of an arrangement or agreement should be worked out with the city for the hospital corporation to be paid back to at least some extent when others are permitted to use the new water main.

At the request of the executors of the Hudspeth Estate, the directors appointed Robert Halbert, Fred Earwood, Bryan Hunt, Joe Logan and Ben Meckel to inspect the Odom ranch and determine how the ranch should be stocked and operated.

**S. J. R. No. 2**  
**A JOINT RESOLUTION**  
proposing an amendment to Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board for apportioning the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor; and making an appropriation.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislature Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial representative districts, as the nature of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledge as the act and deed of such Board, and, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and

amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the State into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

"Against the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

**H. J. R. No. 7**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an Amendment to Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 3a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify, before taking his oath of office as Governor; and providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended, by adding another Section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows:

"Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all the restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State

on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying for such succession in other contingencies."

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

**H. J. R. No. 13**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

amending Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a provision that the husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severally or into undivided interests all or any part of their community property, whereupon without prejudice to the right of existing creditors the portion of interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse; further providing that such Constitutional Amendment if adopted shall be self-operative and self-executing; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 15. All property, both real and personal, of the wife, owned or claimed by her before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent, shall be the separate property of the wife; and laws shall be passed more clearly defining the rights of the wife, in relation as well to her separate property as that held in common with her husband; provided that husband and wife, without prejudice to pre-existing creditors, may from time to time by written instrument as if the wife were a feme sole partition between themselves in severally or into equal undivided interests all or any part of their existing community property, or exchange between themselves the community interest of one spouse in any property for the community interest of the other spouse in other community property, whereupon the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse.

This Amendment is self-operative, but laws may be passed prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of execution of such instruments, and providing for their recordation, and for such other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith as the Legislature may from time to time consider proper with relation to the subject of this Amendment. Should the Legislature pass an Act dealing with the subject of this Amendment and prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of the execution of such instruments and providing for their recordation and other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith and anticipatory hereto, such Act shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character and shall take effect just as

though this Constitutional Amendment was in effect when the Act was passed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severally or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severally or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations; providing for submission to the qualified electors and for the necessary proclamation by the Governor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to be and read as follows:

"Section 1-a. From and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within this State for general revenue purposes. From and after January 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) value of residential homesteads, not to exceed thirty cents (30cents) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenue derived therefrom shall be used for construction and maintenance of Farm to Market Roads or for Flood Control, except as herein otherwise provided.

"Provided that in those counties or political subdivisions or areas of the State from which tax donations have heretofore been granted, the State Automatic Tax Board shall continue to levy the full amount of the State ad valorem tax for the duration of such donation, or until all legal obligations heretofore authorized by the law granting such donation or donations shall have been fully discharged, whichever shall first occur; provided that if such donation to any such county or political subdivision is for less than the full amount of State ad valorem

taxes so levied, the portion of such taxes remaining over and above such donation shall be retained by said county or subdivision."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties and other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3 The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

**H. J. R. No. 30**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated as "Section 60" to authorize counties of this State to provide insurance for county employees; providing for the Governor's proclamation, and submission to the electorate.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 60" to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3 The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**H. J. R. No. 35**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes; providing the effective date; providing for the admission of said amendment to a vote of the qualified voters at an election and providing for necessary proclamation and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Sections 1-b and 1-c be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:

"Section 1-b. Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed

taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.

Section 1-c. Provided, however, the terms of this Resolution shall not be effective unless House Joint Resolution No. 24 is adopted by the people and in no event shall this resolution go into effect until January 1, 1951."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State taxes," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State taxes."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties and other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

**H. J. R. No. 36**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an Amendment to Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs, who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, constables, deputy constables, and precinct law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis in all of the counties of this State beginning January 1, 1949; providing for submission of this Amendment to the vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 61, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties of this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers including sheriffs, who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Courts may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified

electors of this State at an election to be held on the date by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Section 61, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution providing that all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables and other law enforcement officers shall be compensated on a salary basis."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine and each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**H. J. R. No. 39**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

proposing an Amendment to Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 1-a, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of Appellate Courts and Judges of District and Criminal Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed; providing for the submission of the Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication thereof.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as "Section 1-a," which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-a. The Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal Courts on account of length of service, age or disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts of this State on account of length of service, age or disability and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of Judges and Commissioners of the Appellate Courts and Judges of the District and Criminal District Courts of this State on account of length of service, age or disability and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

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**YOUR HEALTH**

Sixty Texans died as the result of appendicitis during the first five months of 1948, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health.

"This figure does not appear large when compared to the deaths from cancer, tuberculosis and heart disease," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer said, "but with the knowledge that these sixty Texans died needlessly, the figure is tragically high."

More than anything else, Dr. Cox said he would attribute fatality in appendicitis to the complacent attitude of the people concerning the disease. It is not put in its "proper perspective." Too often, the Health Officer said, people have the vain hope that the prolonged pain in their stomach will "wear off." He cautioned that the stomach ache which lasts more than three or four hours should be considered a serious matter.

Appendicitis killed 60,000 people in the United States and Canada last year, Dr. Cox said. He warned that young adults are especially susceptible to attacks, and that appendicitis is a leading cause of death among children and adolescents.

"Operative techniques have been improved to the extent that an unruptured appendix can be removed with great safety," Dr. Cox said. "It is therefore apparent that the negligence in appendicitis rests with the patient who fails to seek prompt medical attention."

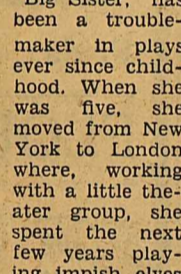

Sponsoring Wool Garment Contest  
Texas girls, particularly those in the wool and mohair producing areas, are eligible to enter "Make It Yourself - With Wool" home sewing contest. This contest is for girls 14 to 22 years of age and is being conducted by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association in cooperation with the American Wool Council and the Woman's Auxiliary of the National Wool Grower's Association. Mrs. John Will Vance of Coleman, Texas, state auxiliary president, is director of the contest; Mrs. Sayers Farmer of Junction, Texas, is co-director, and nine other state auxiliary members are serving as area chairmen. The contest, which is directed toward promoting home sewing and designing with virgin wool material, is for two age groups: Junior Class - 14 through 17 years of age; Senior Class - 18 to 22 years of age. The age of the girl on January 15, 1949, will be the basis considered for classification. There will be three divisions in the contest: Coats, Suits, and Dresses. Entries will be judged on workmanship, judgment in selection of fabric and trimmings, fit and becomingness to the contestant and tasteful choice of accessories. A girl may make her choice of the town where she wishes to model her garment and send her entry to the chairman there. # A LOOK AT THE BOOK

PRESIDENT OF BOB JONES UNIVERSITY GREENVILLE, SOUTH CAROLINA

Ours is a tired generation. Men are physically exhausted and mentally worn out. I read sometime ago a magazine article which offered suggestions as to how we might beat fatigue. The author suggested that to overcome physical exhaustion, we must learn to relax and to use only those muscles which are needed for the job at hand. To conquer mental fatigue, the author's suggestion was that we should not dwell too long on any single problem but should shift frequently and that when we get into bed at night, we should dismiss altogether from our minds the responsibilities and worries of the day. All that sounds like good advice, but there is one sort of fatigue which the author did not mention—that is spiritual fatigue—soul exhaustion. This comes from the burden of sin which men bear, from guilty consciences which "prick and sting us."

God's Word offers a wise solution for all three types of exhaustion, wiser indeed than any psychologist can ever devise or recommend. Jesus Christ says, "Come unto me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls" (Matthew 11:28, 29). He takes away the guilt and burden of sin. Coming to Him, we find our hearts and souls cleansed; and having the guilt of sin removed, the burden of the conscience is lifted. No one else but Jesus Christ can do this for men.

But mental fatigue He also removes. When every thought is brought into captivity to the Lord Jesus, we no longer feel the necessity of solving our problems alone. We cast all our cares upon Him, knowing that He cares for us and that His wisdom is as strong as His love. He says, "If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not" James 1:5. And knowing that we have wisdom which comes down from above, we no longer bear the mental strain of solving problems purely in the strength of our own intellect. Knowing that He plans our tomorrows, we are no longer forced to burden ourselves with worry about tomorrow.

Physically, we find rest in Him. The man whose life is yielded to the Lord Jesus Christ finds in Him freedom from old habits of life—freedom from the bondage of old sins which take their toll of physical strength. He no longer exhausts

himself in the ceaseless round of useless activity and a vain search for fleeting pleasures.

After all, the mind and soul and body are interrelated. Bearing guilt and worry, the body shows the strain of this burden of conscience or mind. Nervous tensions develop; and, physically, we become exhausted through the strain of a guilty heart. Sin, though a thing of the heart, can thus affect the body. Bearing mental burdens, we feel physical exhaustion. Where else can rest be found, then, save in the One who is the God of all? Here is the secret of relaxation and refreshing: "Rest in the Lord" (Psalm 37:7). Obeying this command and accepting this invitation, we find, indeed, that our "youth is renewed like the eagle's" (Psalm 103:5). The Gospel is good medicine, better far than any vitamin capsules, and the surrendered way of life is a path of pleasure and a road of peace and rest.

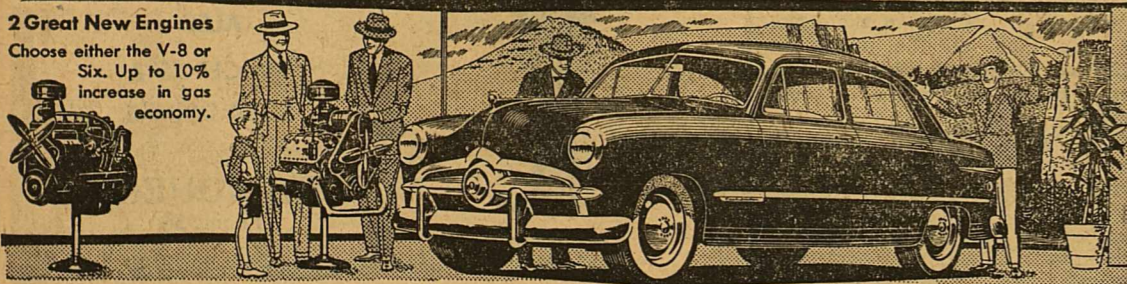

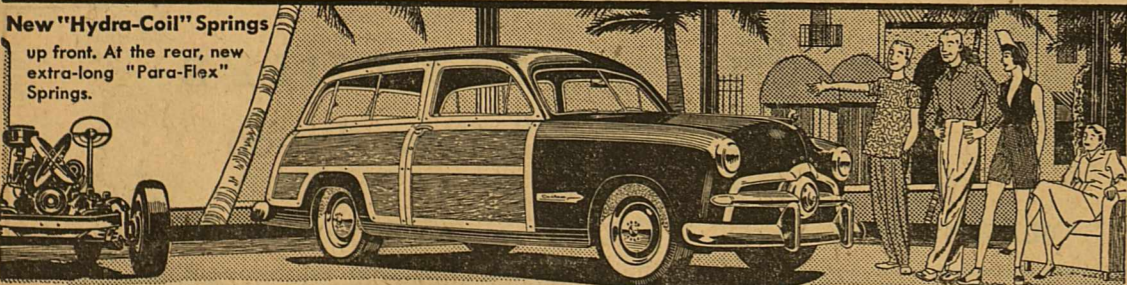

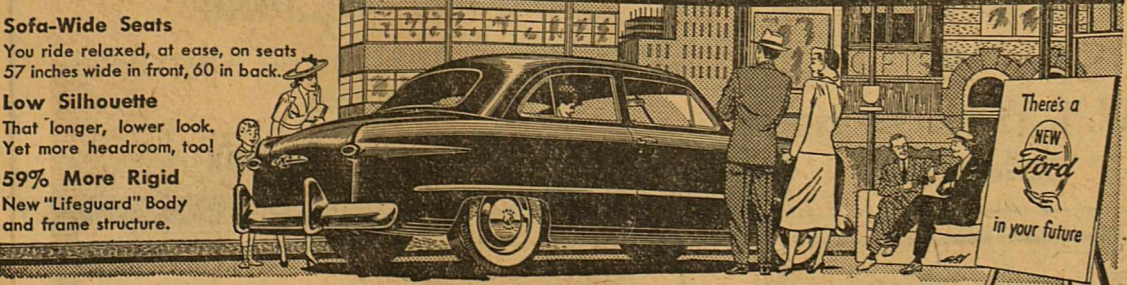

**A&M ANNOUNCES NEW ANT KILLER ON MARKET**

"There's a new ant killer on the market, which should be good news for the homemaker now, as this is the season when they are most likely to take over in the kitchen," V. A. Little, professor of entomology of Texas A&M College, says.

The new killer is called chlordane, and it is a more efficient killer than DDT for ants and roaches, Dr. Little says, and directions for its use must be followed carefully, as it is poisonous.

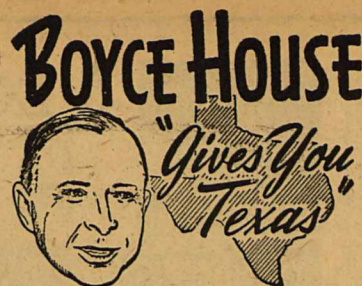
"Of course, the best way to get rid of ants," Dr. Little points out, "is to follow the trail back to the colony or nest and put the poison there. However, this isn't always

easy to do, as sometimes the insects nest in the foundation, walls or other hard-to-reach places."

If it is possible to find the ant colony, pour a small amount of a two or three percent oil solution of the chlordane in the entrance. Then check the nests about a week later, and if necessary, repeat the treatment.

With considerable nervousness, I called his room, got him on the phone and said that no disrespect was intended but that I had a suggestion to offer.

"You and I know, of course, that Shreveport is in Louisiana," I said, "but some of your listeners might not know that you know that. We usually express the idea, 'from El Paso to Texarkana.'"

In a very courteous tone, the Justice said, "Go ahead and change it."

And so that is how, though I have never "edited" a message of a President, I did "edit" a speech by a member of the United States Supreme Court.

Well, they finally got the justice of the peace precincts all straightened out. As nearly everybody knows, it suddenly developed last election day that George Barrow, justice of the peace for Precinct No. 1 and running unopposed for reelection for that precinct, was living in Precinct No. 2. The law says that he must run in the precinct in which he lives. It used to be that Precinct No. 1 took in all of Sonora, but in 1946, when the county was redistricted, nobody thought about the JP. There are several kinds of precincts, it seems. There are commissioners precincts, election precincts and voting precincts.

Right now, all these different precincts are the same, but after January 1, 1949, only the commissioners and voting precincts will be the same. The justice of the peace will be changed by order of the County Commissioners so that all of Justice of the Peace Precincts No. 1 and No. 2 will be put in Justice of the Peace Precinct No. 1. So now George can still legally be our justice of the peace.

We realize that this is a very clear and simple explanation of the problem and its solution, but those who would like a legal version are asked to look elsewhere in this edition for a column titled, "Legal Notice."

Speaking of cleanups, the city of Paducah, Texas, (somewhere around Dallas) had a dilly last Friday. The town's greatest cleanup campaign followed an outbreak of polio.

Every store in the Cottle County seat town of 3,500 closed shop and

every businessman from the banker to the office boy grabbed brooms, mops, hoes and shovels to wipe out debris-filled alleys and other places that needed cleaning up.

More than 50 trucks were in operation and acting mayor Hubert Lee estimated that more than 500 tons of trash were hauled during the day. W. D. Powers, Lubbock sanitary engineer who was dispatched there after nine polio cases were reported, said it was the best cleanup campaign he had seen, and he brought in a fogging machine Saturday to spray the entire town.

Over 300 of the townsmen met on the courthouse lawn in a mass meeting preceding the mopping up drive. They were assigned duties under direction of precinct foremen. Seven of the polio patients are in a Plainview hospital and one is in a Wichita Falls hospital. Their ages range from six months to adults.

## SWING OF SOUTHWEST MARKETS

Livestock, cotton and some other farm products brought lower prices than a week ago at southwest markets, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration.

Sheep and lambs declined largely \$1 to \$2 for the week, though Wichita and Kansas City showed little change. Spring feeder lambs held their own fairly well at Texas markets. Common to good kinds brought \$19 to \$22.25 at San Antonio while Fort Worth paid \$20 to \$23.50. Goats lost \$1.25 to \$1.50 at San Antonio, but kids held steady.

Cattle sold generally 50 cents to \$1.50 lower than a week earlier. Stocker cows ranged from \$16 to \$18 at Houston and Fort Worth. San Antonio handled medium and good yearlings at \$25.50 to \$26.50. Oklahoma City moved good steers, yearlings and calves at \$26 to \$28. Wichita sent medium and good light stocker steers and yearlings back to the country at \$23 to \$27. Good and choice stocker and feeder steers changed hands at \$26.50 to \$31 at Kansas City. Denver paid \$24 to \$28 for medium and good.

## ANGELO FAIR GROUNDS GETTING FACE LIFTING BEFORE RACING MEET

More than \$5,000 in improvements to the San Angelo Fair Grounds will be completed by the first of September in preparation for the second post war West Texas Exposition and Race Meet September 21-26, according to fair officials.

Expenditures include painting of the grandstand, which will be used twice daily, once for the races and once for the night show which is expected to surpass all previous productions of this nature in West Texas; erection of floodlights over the entire Fair Grounds to lighten the area for night shows and marking lanes and other improvements to the parking areas as well as other improvements.

Exhibit space for this year's fair will be in the cattle barn which will be a great improvement over last year's exhibit space. County, community and individual agricultural exhibits—the women's division and commercial exhibits will all be in this one big building.

Some of the premium list has already gone to the printer and the book should be released within a few weeks, officials said.

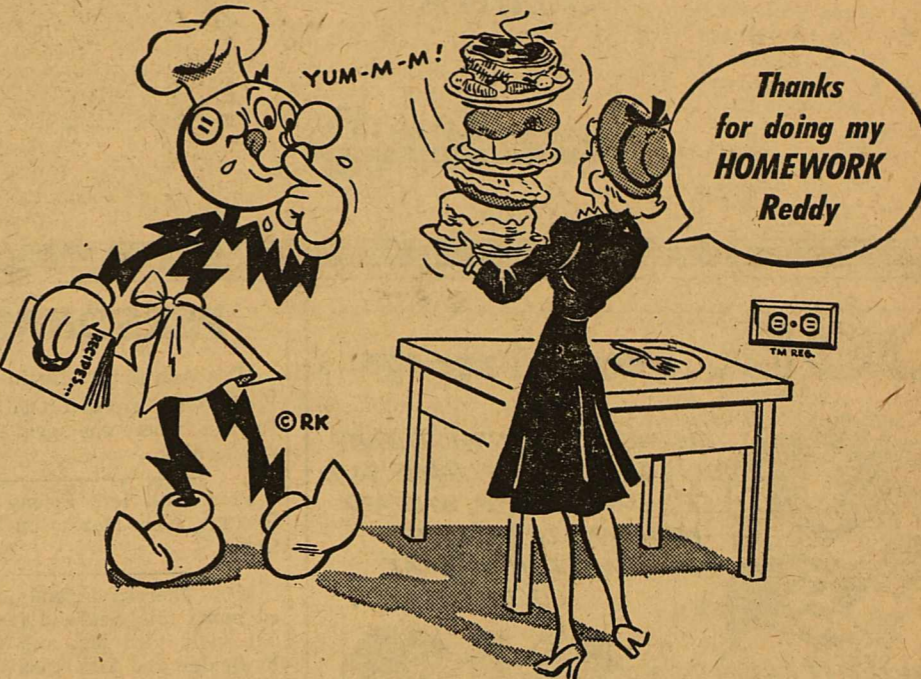

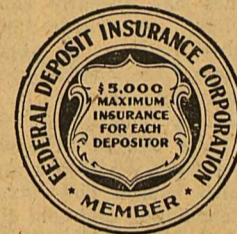
