one about the telegraph editor of the Little Rock Democrat many years ago who was going through a long article with a pencil in his hand. A friend asked, "What are you doing?" He replied, "I'm editing the President's message." The friend exclaimed, "What. You, a \$35-a-week newspaperman editing the message of the President of the United States!"

But the other was undisturbed. He countered, "I'd edit the Sermon on the Mount if I found a split infinitive in it."

Well, that reminds me of the time that I "edited" the speech of a justice of the Supreme Court of the United States.

Several years ago, when the State Bar Association was meeting in Houston, I was assisting the association by acting in a public relations capacity. An Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court was to speak and it was late in the afternoon that the copy of the address he was to make that night was delivered to me. (I was to furnish a condensed copy to the newspaper.)




