

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

The Ranch, a 960-acre heavily wooded tract, located on Spring Creek near Tankersly, was purchased last year at a cost of \$75,-000, and is described as fully adequate for planned activities of the boy citizens and ranch projects designed to make the home partially self-sustaining. Boys' Ranch is operating now

under the supervision of an experienced ranch foreman. One boy, a victim of parental discord and neglect, is already on the ranch and a barracks-type building is now being remodeled preparatory to admitting five more boys with in the next sixty days.

Some livestock, including cattle and sheep, have been donated to the ranch, and a feed crop consist ing of several thousand bundles of feed and some two thousand irement of a \$50,000 indebtedness bushels of oats, all produced on the farm land in the ranch, are in storage to feed stock. The farm land has been replanted in oats and a good stand has developed, the committee reported.

Applications of boys throughout the region to be served will be considered by a citizenship committee and admitted on recommendation of their county judge.

Considerable building will necessary before the Ranch will be equipped to care for its capacity. At the meeting in Ozona, Sol Mayer stated that 345 boys were actually committed to the State Training School at Gatesville during the period, 1936-45, from the 32 counties Boys' Ranch is to serve, because there was no one to care for them, not having committed a crime at all. He pointed out that juvenile delinquency cases are more frequent in our urban areas but none of our towns are so isolated that they cannot be affected by what goes on in their adejacent communities.

Mayer further stated that 59 per cent of county welfare unit activities throughout the region are spent on "dependency-neglect cases"; those products of broken homes, parental inadequacies, unmothers, abandonment, and working mothers. From this group, the boys admitted to Boys' Ranch will be chosen, rehabilitated, and discharged if (1) it is found that the natural parents have become capable of giving them satisfactory home, educational and church requisites to a wholesome upbringing; (2) a home suitable to all requirements is offered by another family than his own; (3) he graduates from high school and takes a job or goes to
