FAME IS SUCH a fleeting thing. What was the name of the fellow who said "Anybody can achieve fame for about 15 minutes?" Unfortunately most of us go through life without ever achieving our 900 seconds in the sun.

For instance, do you remember that Neil Armstrong was the first astronaut to set foot on the moon? That happened 18 years ago this week.

Twenty years from now will we remember the name of the wistful-looking little military colonel who was pounced on by all those Democratic congressmen who were trying to smear the Republican administration's reputation so that they could get Democrats into the White House at the next election?

Being "rich and famous" is an ambition which most young folks aspire to until they reach about age 40 and discover that it's not worth the effort.

Most of the famous names that we remember best are associated with products that we buy, such as Stetson, Folger, Revlon, Winchester and Ralph Lauren. But fame which comes at the expense of the public seems rather tacky to us, since we are the ones paying the price. Right?

It would be nicer to have the type of fame that comes when a lasting monument is established in your name, such as Mt. McKinley, the Lincoln Tunnel, Stemmons Freeway, or Ellis County, Texas. (Couldn't resist that last one.)

But true fame comes when your name becomes not just a household word, but part of the language. Think about the Bowie knife, the Bunsen burner and the Graham cracker. Is a Macintosh the name of an apple, a computer or a type of raincoat?

Poor old Thomas Edison didn't even get the light bulb named after him but A.M. Ampere and James Watt, the Scottish inventor, fared a little better. The enshrinement of some others need no explanation: Rudolf Diesel, George M. Pullman, Louis Pasteur, the Earl of Cardigan, Louis B. Braille.

Would the old Indian Geronimo be pleased to know that when his name is evoked it is usually followed by an exclamation mark?!

Charles Lynch was a Virginia planter at the time of the American Revolution who formed his neighborhood into vigilante mobs to go out and string up the Tories. He did not believe in the jury system, and from him comes the term lynch mob.

The sidewiskers of Ambrose Everett Burnside, a Union Civil War general, became the fashion of his day. At first, they were "burnsides," but later because of the location on the face, they became "sideburns."

Sam Maverick went against tradition when he did not brand the calves in one of his herds. They came to be known as "mavericks."

The Earl of Sandwich, John Montagu, was a notorious gambler. He insisted on putting his lunch between a couple of pieces of bread so that he could eat without having to leave the gaming table.

Luigi Galvani used electric shocks in his experiments on animals. It was probably an accident when he invented the metallic arc which eventually came to be used to put a thin coating of zinc on other metals to prevent rust. And so we have the word galvanize.

The Marquis de Sade gave us the word sadism and J.I. Guillotin proposed a humane method of execution during the French Revolution. This only proves that when your name reaches the status of fame it does not necessarily have to be associated with something nice.

Possible Courthouse Elevator Discussed

A passenger elevator for the Parmer County Courthouse could become a reality sometime in the next few years.

A consulting engineer met Monday with the members of the Parmer County Commissioners Court in Farwell to discuss the elevator prospects.

Joe P. Grimes of Lubbock gave commissioners a report and various specifications on how an elevator could be installed in the historical courthouse with very little remodeling.

Grimes represents Design Professionals of Lubbock. He said a new elevator could be installed in the west foyer of the courthouse. Specifications were submitted by the engineering firm for more than one price range. The commissioners inquired about cost, but has not yet approved the project.

Grimes told the commissioners his preliminary report is dealing only with ballpark estimates, but said his company believes the county could obtain a new elevator for an estimated \$70,000 to \$100,000. The ideal elevator for the three-story building would be hydraulic, Grimes said. The elevator works on the same principle as a car lift at a gas station or garage, he said.

The commissioners have been discussing the need for an elevator for some time, according to County Judge Porter Roberts. By inspecting specifications, the commissioners hope they can budget the funds for the elevator into the county's 1988 budget. The new budget year begins on January 1.

According to the initial plans by Design Professionals, the foyer and two nearby stairways would require minor modifications. The stairs would be extended into the hallway for two extra feet and a hole would need to be dug or drilled for the elevator's hydraulic mechanism. A new library on the courthouse's second floor would also need to be relocated.

"Installation of the elevator shouldn't be too disruptive," Grimes said. His company would serve as an agent for the county. Design Professionals would take the bids, make sure that the contractor selected was properly insured, licensed and bonded, and would also oversee the construction process. Construction should be completed within 180 days, once started.

In other business, Mary Alice Roberts, a marketing representative with Nu-Road System of Mineral Wells, spoke about road coverings. Mrs. Roberts is not related to Judge Roberts.

Her company markets a product which when mixed with water and sprinkled onto the right mixture of dirt or caliche, will make the dirt road into a durable road.

Mrs. Roberts was invited to appear before the commissioners because Parmer County has an estimated 1,600 miles of dirt or caliche roads, according to the commissioners.

Cost of the liquid bonding material averages \$1,500 to \$1,800 per mile. The cost is for a road 20 feet wide, with a four-inch dirt or caliche base, according to Mrs.

Roberts. No action was taken.

In unrelated matters, the commissioners approved a bid of \$8,184.97 to purchase a fold-up shredder from T-Bone's Equipment and Salvage of Bovina. Two other bids were submitted by area farm implement suppliers. All three bids were in the same price range. The bid from T-Bone's was selected because immediate delivery was guaranteed. Commissioners said their work crews could not afford to wait 30 to 60 days for the needed equipment.

The commission also approved: a bid from Al Hewitt to purchase a tractor and mower from the county for \$9,500.

a payment of the annual sponsorship fee of \$3,050 for the regional mental health and mental retardation center at Plainview. A district office is located in Parmer County at Friona.

*emergency transportation cost for an indigent infant. The infant and one or both parents recently had to make an emergency trip to Dallas, where the baby had brain surgery for the fourth time.

*regular bills for the boarding care of seven foster children, who are wards of the county. The foster care averages about \$1,800 per month for the children, according to Judge Roberts. The youths live with foster parents in various parts of the county.

*installation of an automatic valve system on the lawn sprinklers at the courthouse.

County Evangelistic Crusade Is Underway

A countywide evangelistic crusade is being held in Friona this week. The crusade is outdoors, at Friona's football stadium, beginning at 8 p.m. nightly.

Dr. Rudy Hernandez of San Antonio will be the evangelist for the week. Homer Tankersley of Clovis will be the music evangelist.

Singers are being invited to join the giant choir, which will rehearse beginning at 7 p.m. each evening. Leaders stress that everyone is welcome, whether they currently sing in a church choir or not.

Noon services will be held Monday through Friday at the First Baptist Church's Fellowship Hall. Those attending are asked to bring a "sack lunch." Drinks will be provided, and Dr. Hernandez will deliver a short message.

Dr. Hernandez is a native of San Antonio, born there October 19, 1927. He has conducted revival crusades, led conferences on evangelism and preached in churches, football and baseball stadiums, tents, civic centers, bullrings and other public meeting places throughout the United States and in over 45 countries of the world including Latin America, the Orient, the Near East, Europe and Africa.

He has travelled around the world representing the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Dr. Hernandez has spoken extensively on radio and T.V., and has written numerous articles for denominational periodicals and tracts in both Spanish and English.

In November of 1971, Dr. Hernandez spoke to a crowd of over 41,000 at the Astrodome in Houston.

He is a graduate of Howard Payne University, the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, and received his honorary doctor of divinity degree from Howard Payne.

Dr. Hernandez began to preach

at the age of 13, was licensed to preach at age 17 and ordained at 19. He conducted his first revival at age 17 in Laredo.

Dr. Hernandez is speaker on "Solucion," a Spanish T.V. weekly program, and is host of "La Vida Hoy," a 90-minute weekly broadcast in Spanish, and also hosts "Life Today," a 90-minute weekly broadcast over the S.B.C.'s TV network.

Dr. Hernandez and his wife Lucy are parents of five children: Robert, Maria, Elizabeth, Ruben, Eunice and Gina.

Tankersley is serving in his 24th year as soloist and minister of music with the Central Baptist Church in Clovis.

He has served as featured soloist and music director at the New Mexico Baptist Convention, and in revival meetings and crusades across the country.

He was guest soloist for Bruce King at his inauguration as governor of New Mexico. He has served as soloist for political rallies in Texas and New Mexico.

Tankersley began his career as lead singer for the Imperials,

traveling coast to coast and appearing on national T.V. He recorded for Word Records.

He also served as lead singer for the Commodores, appearing on T.V. with such stars as Arthur Godfrey, Pat Boone, Red Foley, Eddie Fisher, Bob Crosby, Ernie Ford and others.

Tankersley has produced and directed his own radio and television shows. He is associated with Crescendo Music Publications in Dallas as a recording artist.

He has been honored by the Chamber of Commerce for service as chairman of the United Fund and other service organizations.

Tankersley and his wife Doris are parents of sons, Paul and Phil, and have two grandchildren.
