

On a farm not far from the campus of the A. and M. College of Texas lives a quiet little man whose genius has done much to feed a hungry world. He is Edgar S. McFadden, plant breeder for the U. S. Deparment of Agriculture and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, who has been working at A. and M. since 1935. Known as the "Burbank of the Wheatfields," Mr. McFadden developed the world's first rustresistant wheat, parent stock for grains which now grow on millions of acres around the world where wheat once could not exist. Since 1935 his work has spread the Texas wheat belt to three times its former size. He has received the Readers Digest annual award for service to humanity, is one of the five Texans to be named as Fellows of the American Society of Agronomy and has received citations of merit from scientific societies throughout the world. The farmers of his native South Dakota have erected an imposing marble monument to him in his old home town of Webster. The work of this one man is said to be worth hundreds of millions of dollars a year to the farmers of America.



SAFETY EDUCATION CAR — T. M. Harvey, Sonora high school driver education instructor, accents keys to new Pontiac sedan from Wesley Granger as L. E. Johnson looks on. Granger and Johnson are owners of the Granger-Johnson Pontiac and Cadillac Company, which donated the new car to the schools for use in driver education. Harvey, who had 20 students but no car last year, said that the course may be made compulsory for every student 14 and over who has no drivers license. Harvey said he plans to teach parallel and diagonal parking, turn-about, reaction to signs and signals, hand signals, right-of-way and, toward the end of the course, highway driving. "The goal of this course," the instructor said, "will be to make every student a safe driver, capable of passing his driver's license tests, and a driver who realizes his responsibilities to himself, his family and his community."

The Granger-Johnson Co. paid for the car and assigned it to the school. The schools will pay the upkeep and insurance but servicing will be done by the dealers. At the end of the year the car will be offered for sale. The two-door sedan has conventional gearshift and dual controls will be installed within the next few

Speaking of the feasability of teen age driver education, Granger quoted statistics recently released by the State of Delaware. Comparisons between a group of 800 trained teen age drivers and a group of 800 non-trained teen age drivers showed that only 3 percent of the trained group had auto accidents, while 14 percent of the untrained group did. Also only 4 percent of the trained group were arrested on driving charges while 27 percent of the untrained group were arrested on similar charges.

#### The National Guard Shoulders Arms

This is the second of a series of sketches dealing with National Guard state organizations which have been called to active duly in the present emergency. Throughout the nation more than 1,000 Army and Air Force units, representing 41 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, have answered the call to active service. More will be called as and if they are needed in the future. All members of the National Guard are volunteers and at least onefourth are veterans of World War II.

#### 2. PENNSYLVANIA NATIONAL GUARD

"The National Guard is always ready and willing to help," is a saying common in Pennsylvania. When the National Guard was called to active duty during the national



emergency 10 years ago Pennsylvania Guardsmen were included in the first group called up. Again they were represented in the first call when part of the National Guard was ordered to federal service during the past summer as part of the nation's accelerated defense rearmament program. Included in National Guard units from 41 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto

states, the District of Columbia and Fuel Rico, called to full-time duty was Pennsylvania's 28th "Bloody Bucket" Infantry Division which won more than 3,000 awards during World War II. Under command of Maj. Gen. Daniel B. Strickler, the division is training at Camp Atterbury, Indiana.







Enlisted memers of civilian components now serving overseas will be returned to the United States for discharge.






