Support Asked For Bond Election

Released By Sutton County Commissioners Court

In this issue of The Devils River News there will appear two notices of election, covering two different propositions to be submitted to the bishop of the Diocese of West Texpeople of Sutton County, at an election to be held March 17.

The first of these propositions would authorize the County to take up the 30c ad valorem tax to be relinquished by the State this year. Last year and during most recent years, the State has levied an ad valorem tax on local property of 72c per hundred dollars. This year, as Hauser, rector. a result of an amendment to the State Constitution, the State will relinquish 30c of its ad valorem tax so that the State rate will be only Jones has been making annual vis-42c. The Counties can take up this 30c for road and bridge and flood its to Sonora for the past seven control purposes, if so authorized by an election held upon the question. If the 30c relinquished by the State is taken up by the Counties, it will not mean an increase in taxes. The people will pay no more in taxes than they did last year, but there will be a transfer of the 30c from the State to the Counties.

Actually your Commissioners Court had not planned to ask authority for the County to take up any of the State's tax, and did not plan to hold an election for such purpose, however, a bill has now been introduced before the State Legislature, and strong pressure is being brought, to have the State discontinue paying to the Counties certain money that the State has been paying to them out of a surplus in the State Bond Assumption Fund. Sutton County has been receiving its part of this money, which last year amounted to a little over \$12,000. 00. By adding this money to its other funds available for road construction and maintenance, the County has been able to maintain fairly low tax values and rates, in spite of constant increases in costs of materials, machinery and labor. So far the County has been able to avoid making any raise in property values in spite of high prices. But if the State discontinues payment of the bond assumption money to the Counties and the \$12,000.00 received last year, or any part of that amount, it not paid to Sutton County, the County will be forced to raise property values to make up the loss. However, since the State is relinquishing the 30c ad valorem tax to the Counties it will be possible for Sutton County to make up the money witheld by the State by using the 30c ad valorem tax released to the Counties, and still not have to raise taxes or property values, provided of cause that such is authorized by an election.

That is why this proposition is being offered at this election. If it is approved the County will simply use a sufficient amount of the the parish house following ser-State's ad valorem tax to make up the sum which the state witholds vices. from the Bond Assumption fund. It is possible, of course, that the legislature will not pass the bill taking away the County's part of the Local Exhibitors bond assumption surplus, or that it will pass a bill taking away only part of that money. In that case this County would not levy the 30c or would levy just enough of it to make up any part of the bond assumption money actually witheld by the State. But in this connection the County would have to play safe and if the State Legislature had not made any decision in the matter by the time the County tax rate has to be set then the County would have to levy enough of the 30c to make up the \$12,000.00 in case it should be witheld, but even in that case there would be no increase in taxes over last year.







Mild Epideniec Of Measles Seen

Measles in Texas is reaching a mild epidemic stage at present. with outbreaks fillowing closely who is governess at the Arthur the main lines of travel across the State, according to information made public today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"The peculiar pattern of this spread of measles re-emphasizes the fact that it is a contagious disease, passed on from one person to another,"Dr. Cox said. "Guard against exposure by avoiding contact with measles patients."

Dr. Cox said that measles alone is not necessarily a dangerous disease, but dangerous complications, such as streptococcus, mastoiditis, and pneumonia which frequently follow, make it a disease to be carefully nursed, with close attention from a doctor.

"Unskilled treatment of a plain case of measles can result in camplications which often kill," Dr. Cox warned, "and it is not to be regarded lightly as simply another childhood disease."


Dr. Cox urged parents to carefully watch children exposed, and at the first sign of temperature, flushed face, sniffles, or watering eyes, advised that the child be put to bed immediately and placed under a doctor's care.


