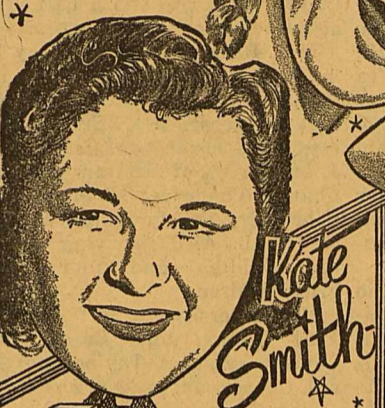

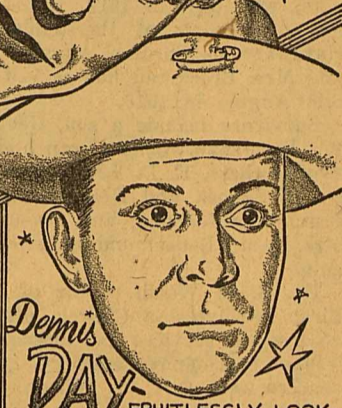

IF YOUR DOG HAS BAD HABITS

It's easy for a farm dog to develop bad habits. It's almost as easy for you to break them. Here are some pointers on how you can help convince your dog himself that he shouldn't jump up on people or chase cars. The instructions are from the informative Purina Farm Dog Book on how to care for and train the farm dog.

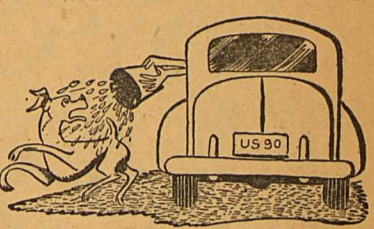
Jumping Up On People

Friendliness or affection may cause your dog to jump all over visitors and members of your family—to the considerable detriment of their clothing. Stop this habit in puppyhood! Slap the over-enthusiastic pup slightly with a handkerchief. If he still persists, raise your knee and bump him on the chest. Or step lightly on the toes of his rear feet.

Always use the command "NO" in an angry tone, while correcting.

Chasing Cars

Many a good dog has lost its life through this habit. It is especially frequent with dogs with herding instinct. Lead your dog to your standing car, then have somebody sitting inside pour a bucket of water over him; repeat this procedure several times.



Then have your helper drive the car slowly along a side road while you walk towards it with the dog on leash. When you meet the car have the driver pour another bucket of water over the dog.

You might get a little wet during the treatment, but it's probably worth it if it teaches him to respect cars.

Mild Epidemic Of Measles Seen

Measles in Texas is reaching a mild epidemic stage at present, with outbreaks following closely the main lines of travel across the State, according to information made public today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"The peculiar pattern of this spread of measles re-emphasizes the fact that it is a contagious disease, passed on from one person to another," Dr. Cox said. "Guard against exposure by avoiding contact with measles patients."

Dr. Cox urged parents to carefully watch children exposed, and at the first sign of temperature, flushed face, sniffles, or watering eyes, advised that the child be put to bed immediately and placed under a doctor's care.

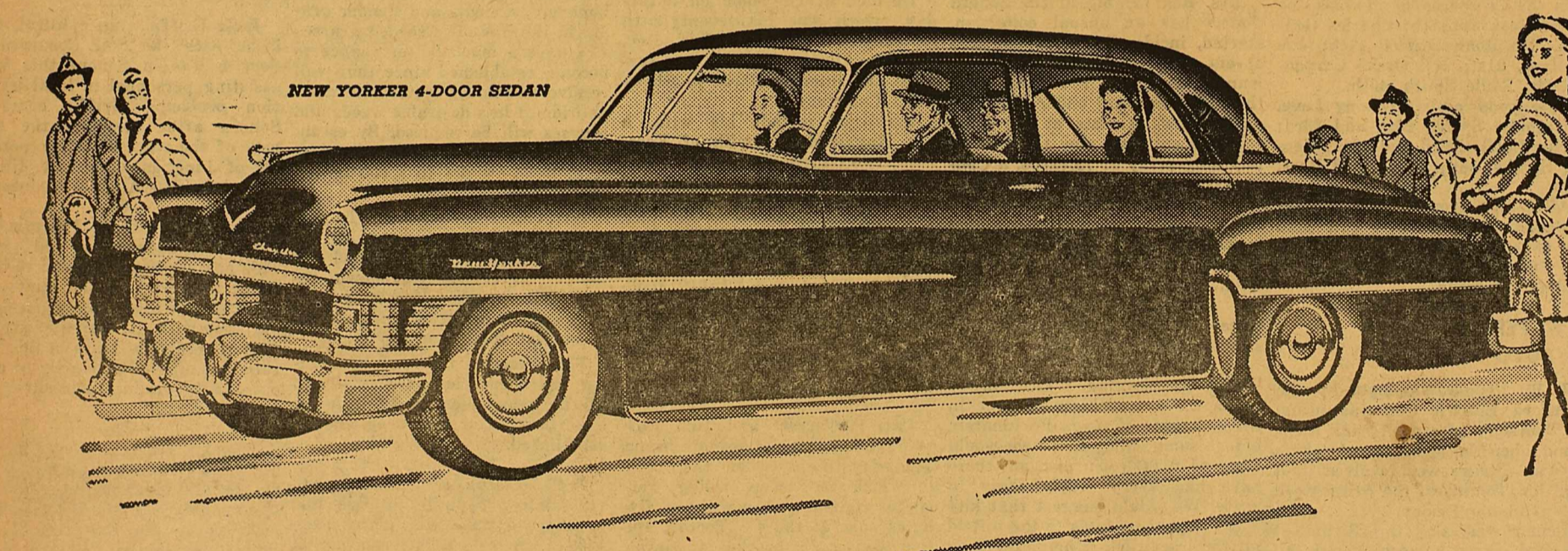

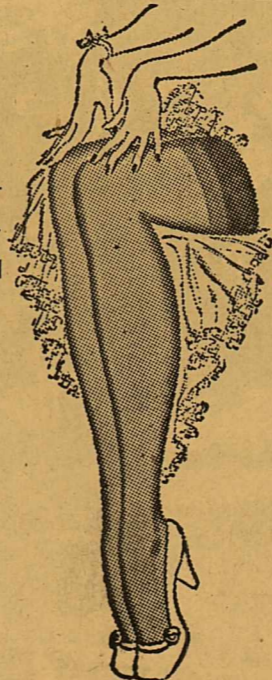

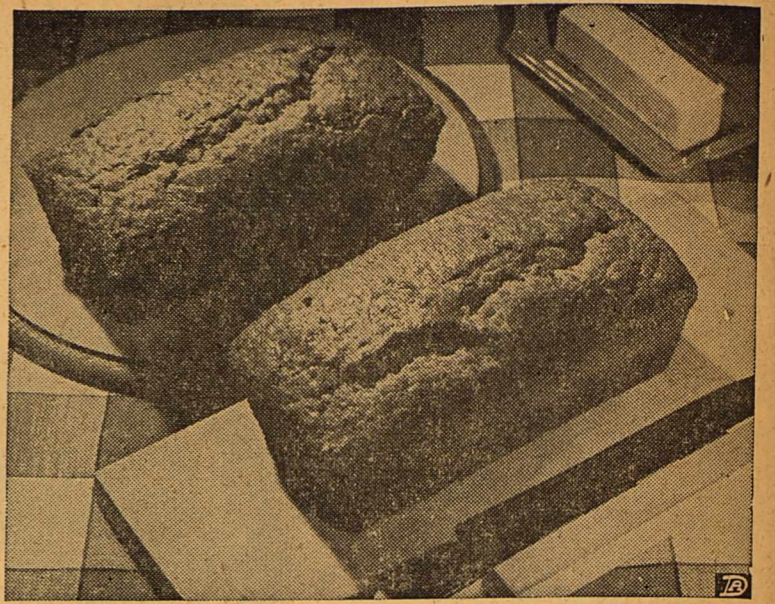

- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 1/4 cups chopped unpeeled apples
- 1/2 cup grated cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped nuts

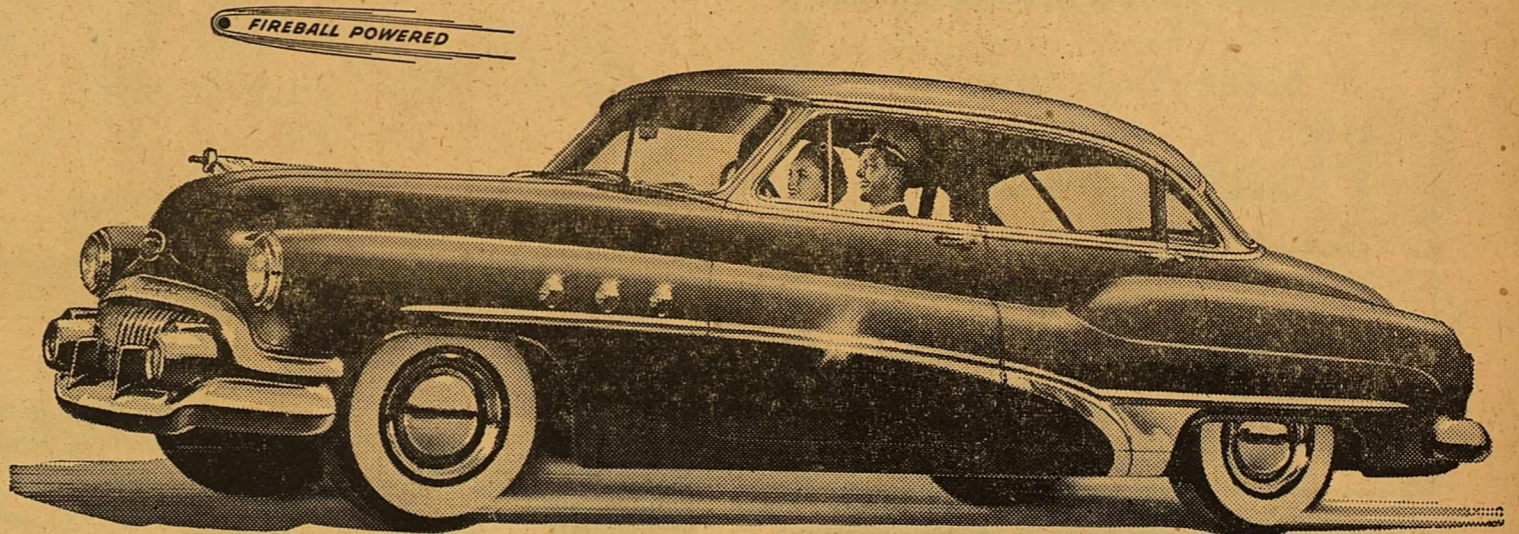
Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs and mix well. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with apples.

Mix well. Add cheese and nuts. Blend well. Bake in greased loaf pan in moderate oven (350°F.) 70 minutes. Makes 1 loaf.

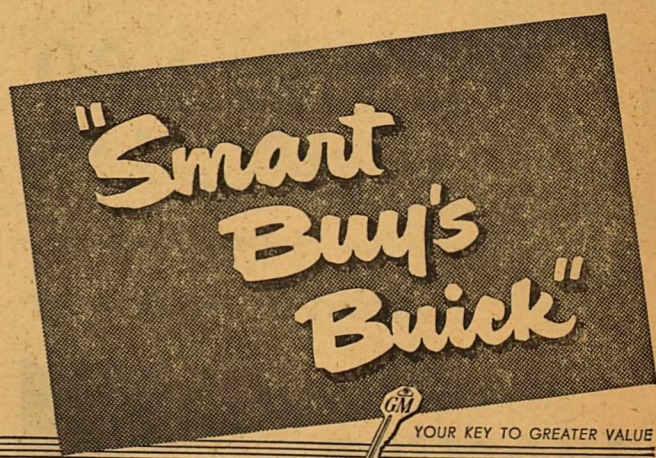

Soldiers And Sailors Relief Act Passed For G. L.s Protection

Army reservists ordered to active military service, either voluntarily or involuntarily, are entitled to protection from civil lawsuits, eviction as well as reemployment rights, under the provisions of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Act, Colonel C. M. Culp, Chief of the Texas Military District, stated this week.

Personal affairs officers will be available at training centers to assist individual reservists with their problems. In cases where whole units are called into service, arrangements have been made to place members of the Judge Advocate General Department reserve officers on temporary duty to assist reservists with legal problems, prior to departure from their home stations, Col Culp said.

While this relief law has been in effect since 1940, and was extended and broadened by the Selective Service Extension Act of 1950, some reservists have been applying for delays and deferments from military service because of personal obligations which the act covers.

In general the law provides that neither personal nor real property can be repossessed from an individual ordered to active military service without a court order. If court action is resorted to by the lender, the serviceman may be represented by a dependent if he is unable to attend the hearing or the court will appoint a qualified attorney to represent his interest. The court may stay proceeding if the serviceman's ability to make payments according to the original contract has been affected by his entry into military service. Also, foreclosures of mortgages and deeds of trust may be stayed by the court. This provision includes property purchased under the GI Bill of Rights as well as other mortgage loans. If court action is

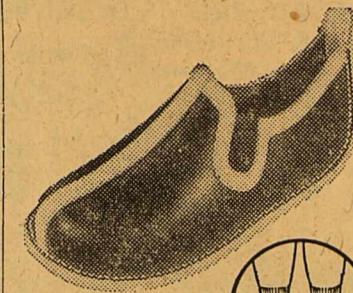
started by the lender involving the payment on loans, mortgages on real or personal property or other installment obligations, the court, if it sees fit, may lower the payment or declare them suspended until three months after honorable discharge.

It is not the purpose of the act to make military service a refuge for anyone attempting to avoid legitimate obligations where the entry into the armed forces does not affect the ability of the person to properly discharge such obligations. Therefore, throughout the act, such expressions as, "such other disposition of the case as may be equitable to conserve the interest of all parties," "discretion of the court," "materially affected by reason of military service," appear repeatedly. Each case will be adjudged by the court according to law and the circumstances surrounding that particular case. Each case must stand on its own merits and will be adjudged according to the circumstances and equities of all parties concerned.

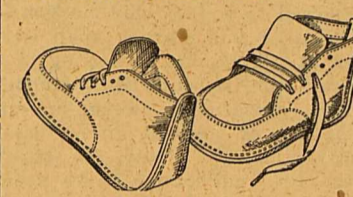
In the recent ording to active military service of company grade Army reserve officers, the announcement by the Department of Defense at Washington specifically pointed out the fact that officers volunteering for active service would have their reemployment rights protected under the reemployment provisions of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief Act as amended. This section of the act assures those entering active military service that their civilian jobs will be restored to them if reasonably possible and that they will return in the status and with all the benefits and advantages that would have accrued to them if such civilian work had not been interrupted by military service.

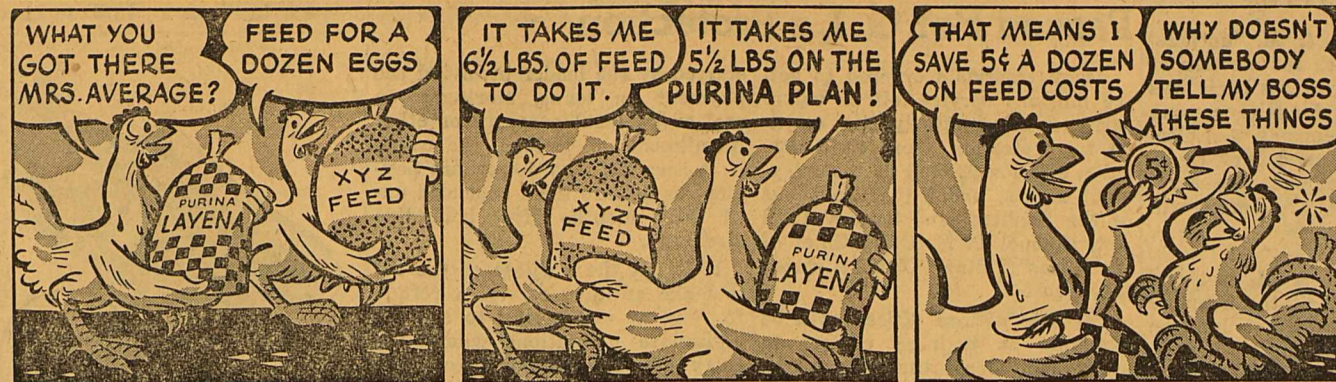

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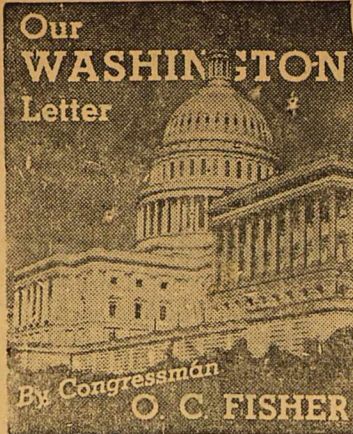

IN TEXAS, A TOTAL OF 19 daily papers have Washington reporters on their payrolls. Tex Easley, of Ft. Worth, is the AP man here and is highly respected for his fairness and accuracy. The Dallas News has three reporters Walter Hornaday, Barry Bishop and Ruth Schrum, all of whom rise above petty things and report the news objectively. The same is true of the venerable author and writer, George Stimpson, who is listed for the San Angelo Standard Times and who is regarded as an elder statesman among journalists here.

BASCOM TIMMONS IS LIKEWISE highly respected. He writes columns for 21 different daily papers over the Nation, including a few in Texas. He, like others who cover a wide field of papers, must hire employees to gather much of the news. Until recently he had a man named Leslie Carpenter on his rolls, gathering news. Carpenter is no longer on the payroll of the Timmons' syndicate.

IN WASHINGTON REPUTATIONS of reporters get around rather fast in the tense political atmosphere. The established newspaper men here are generally quite influential. Many of them are taken into the confidences of men in high places and know a lot more "off the record" than they feel free to put "on the record".

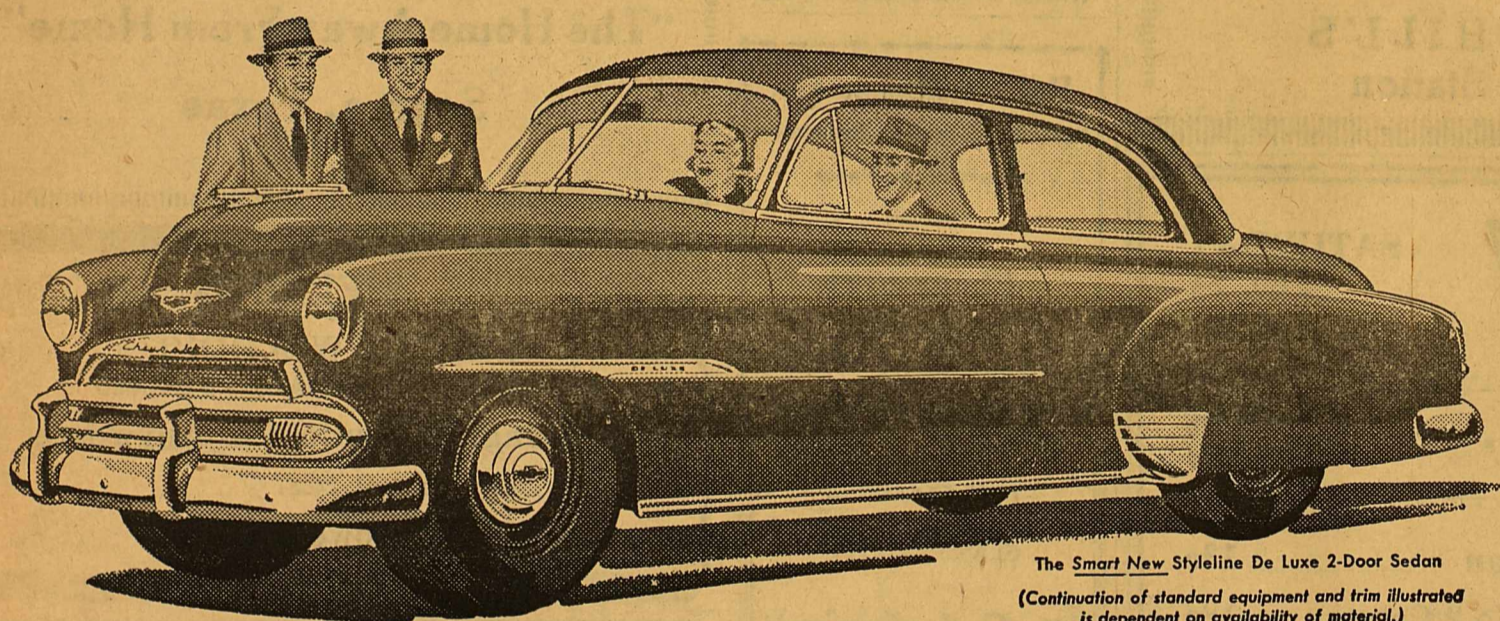

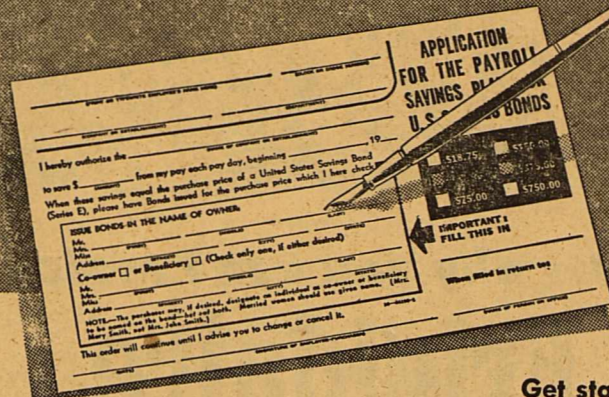
