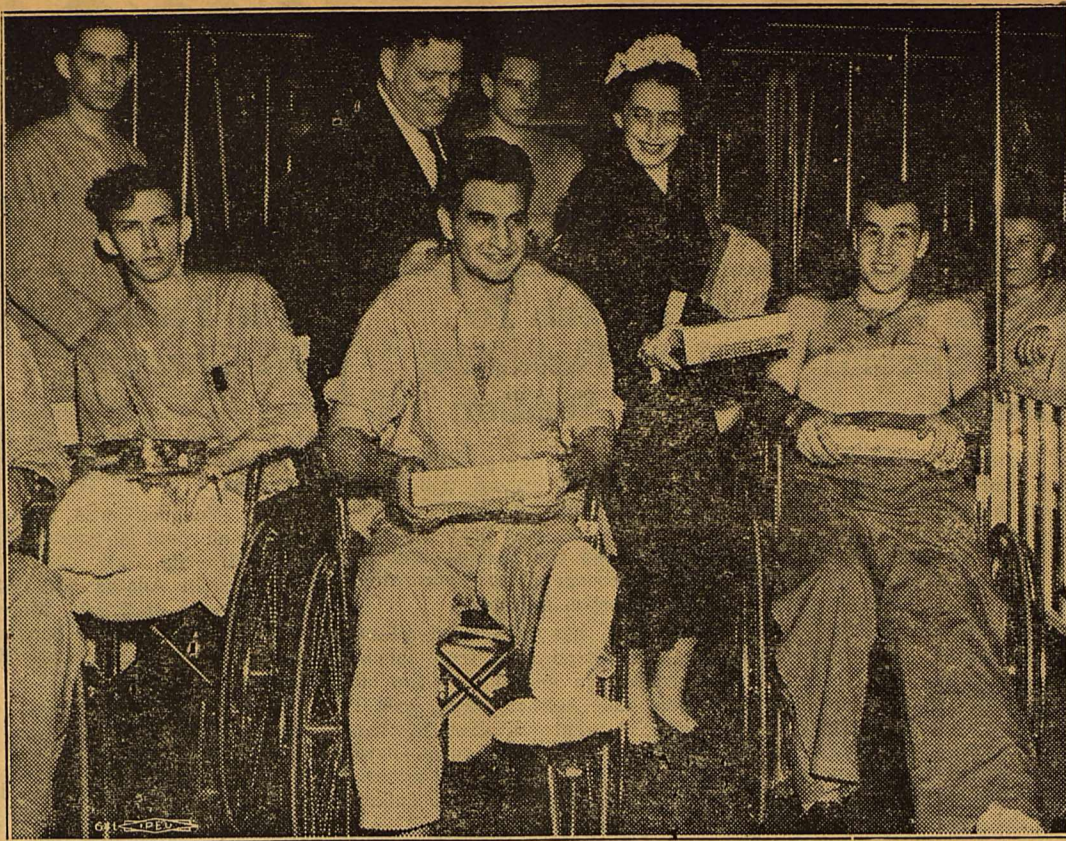

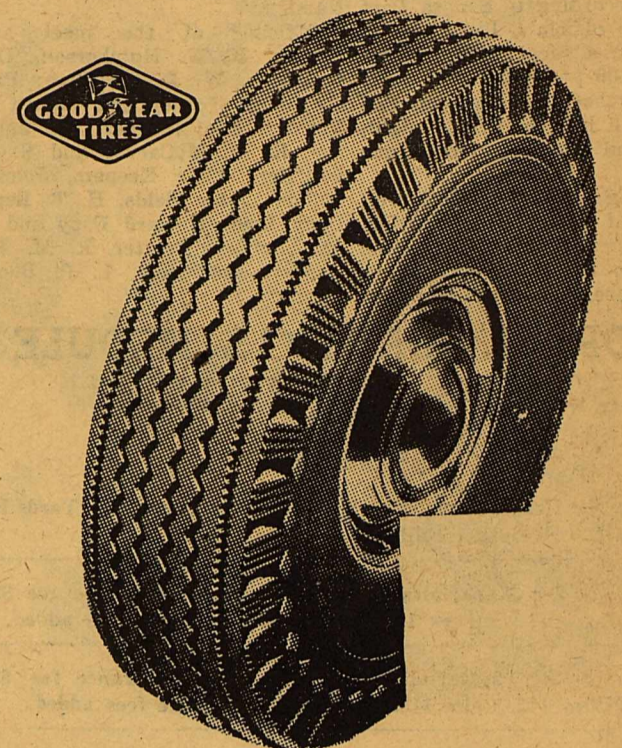

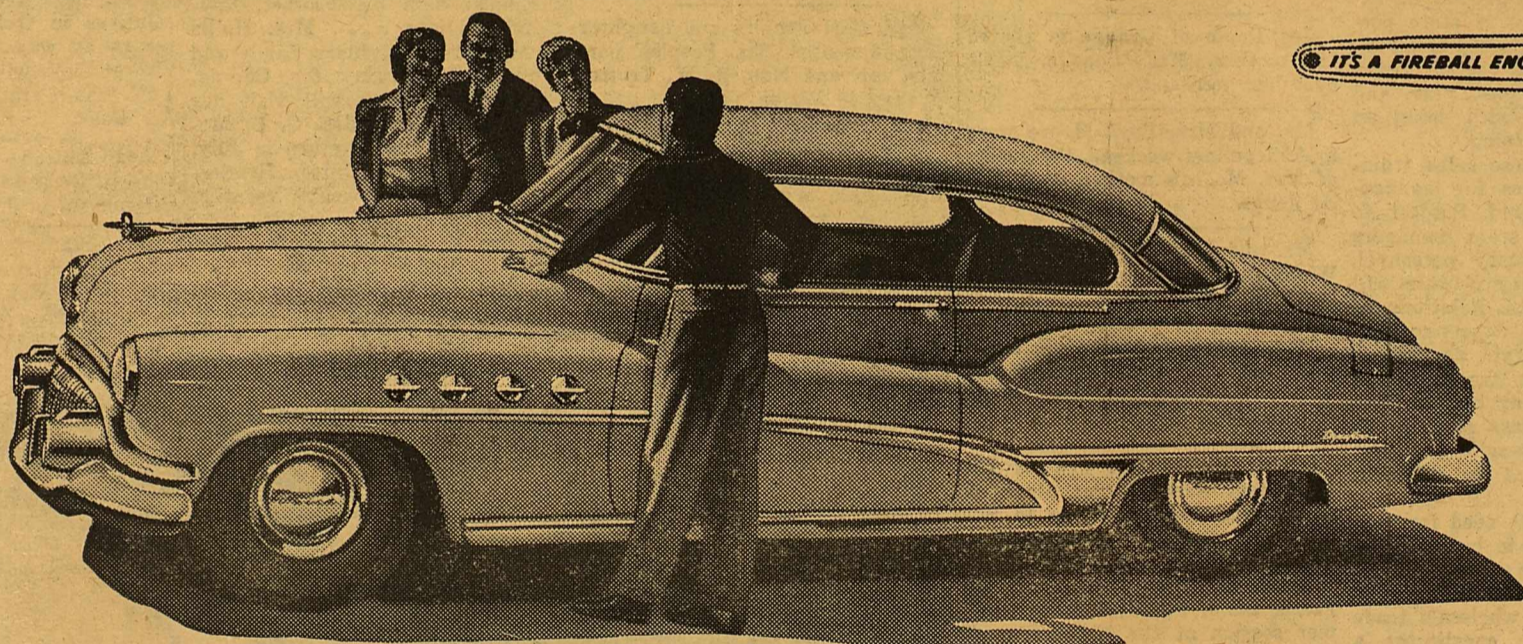

**TIDELANDS LEGISLATION** got the green light in the House last week when Speaker Rayburn asked the Judiciary Committee to bring out a bill. He said his decision had been delayed because of hopes the Senate would act. Texas people and many Texas Congressmen had become quite impatient at the delay. In all likelihood a bill will be reported to the House soon and passed. The big test will come when, if a bill is passed by the House and Senate, an attempt will come to override a Presidential veto which is certain.

It will be recalled that the House has acted twice before on the subject. By a vote of 288 to 67 the House passed a Tidelands measure back in 1946. The Senate could muster but 44 for and 84 against at the time, and President Truman's veto could not be overridden because the Senate obviously lacked the two-thirds necessary to override.

Then in the 80th Congress, the House repeated its prior action and passed a bill by a whopping vote of 257 to 29, but the Senate Committee pigeon-holed it and the attempt to correct the steal of our tidelands fizzled.

Now we are girding for another attempt. I believe the House will pass the new measure overwhelmingly, but what the Senate will do, despite the valiant efforts of the Texas Senators, remains to be seen.

A new draft-UMT bill will soon be sent to the White House. It's a compromise between the House and Senate. Briefly, here are the main provisions:

1. The draft age is set at 18½, but all eligibles at 19 and above must be called before dipping below the 19 year level.
2. Draft service is set at 24 months, and the draft law is extended to 1955.
3. Mental standards for inductions are cut and physical standards are lowered to the standards in effect for men of the same age in January, 1955.
4. A five-million-man ceiling is placed on the Armed Services—about 1,500,000 more than the present goal.
5. A UMT commission of five provided to prepare plans for a universal training program. Actual beginning of the six months of training provided for will not go into effect, however, until world conditions permit a shift from the draft to UMT. A part of the training may be integrated with school work, and each young man will, after completing the training program be put in active reserve units for a period of 8 years.

THE QUESTIONNAIRE which I mailed to residents of the district has caused much interest in

the subject covered and the responses have been generous. They are now being read and processed. The results will be announced as soon as possible. The answers and comments are most revealing and interesting.

The Mason Lions Club spent a program discussing the questionnaire and sent me the results of votes on each of the 15 questions. Several teachers have reported discussions of the questions by students in civics classes. One man at Kerrville showed his roll to a visitor from Orange and the letter asked me to send him 100 for distribution to interested people down there.

Here are a few comments on the questionnaires, taken at random:

A. F. Leesch of Boerne, former Master of the Texas State Grange, wrote:

"Yesterday at the official opening of the A. & M. College adjunct and presentation of awards in Region 2 of the Ft. Worth Press Conservation awards at Junction, I heard much favorable comment on your idea of the questionnaire. . . We appreciate this and the good work you are doing in Washington for us."

A Civil Engineer at Del Rio, after comments, noted: "Please continue with this questionnaire. Need two copies in the future, however, as sometimes there is quite a difference of opinion between the members of the household."

A Uvalde man writes: "I feel that any Washington official who feels that we can reach an agreement with the Communists, without either appealing them or whipping the devil out of them, should have had examined as undoubtedly, his brains are petrified."

A Petroleum Engineer at Brownwood likes the questionnaire idea: "I have taken the vow over one hundred times, that I would stay in closer contact with our Congressmen. I am glad this opportunity to get better acquainted with you, and hope that I can become more so in the future. . . On preparedness and universal military training: now is the time. Tomorrow will be too late. We had better wake up; pick a road to follow, and take after our objective with full speed."

A farmer and livestock producer at Coleman writes: "I think you have something here, and I only want you to go on using your own

**Grass Planter Aids Recovery Of Poor Land**

Many ranchers in the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District have found that small acreages of cropland are not economical to cultivate when the soil is shallow and rocky, and subject to erosion. Approximately three thousand acres of land in this District have been retired from cultivation. The local Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors had the foresight to recognize this need, and purchased a grass planter last year for use in the District. From time to time, they have been able to obtain small quantities of grass to use in reseeding overgrazed pastures for distribution among District Cooperators for trial plantings.

As a rule, the ranchers have obtained additional seed in order to plant an entire field at once. Most of the seed purchased has been K. R. bluestem, but other such as slender grama, blue grama, blue panicum and Canada wildrye, have been purchased also. Some of the plantings have been made in fields for seed produc-

tion and grazing, while others have been made in native pastures and wildlife exclosures.

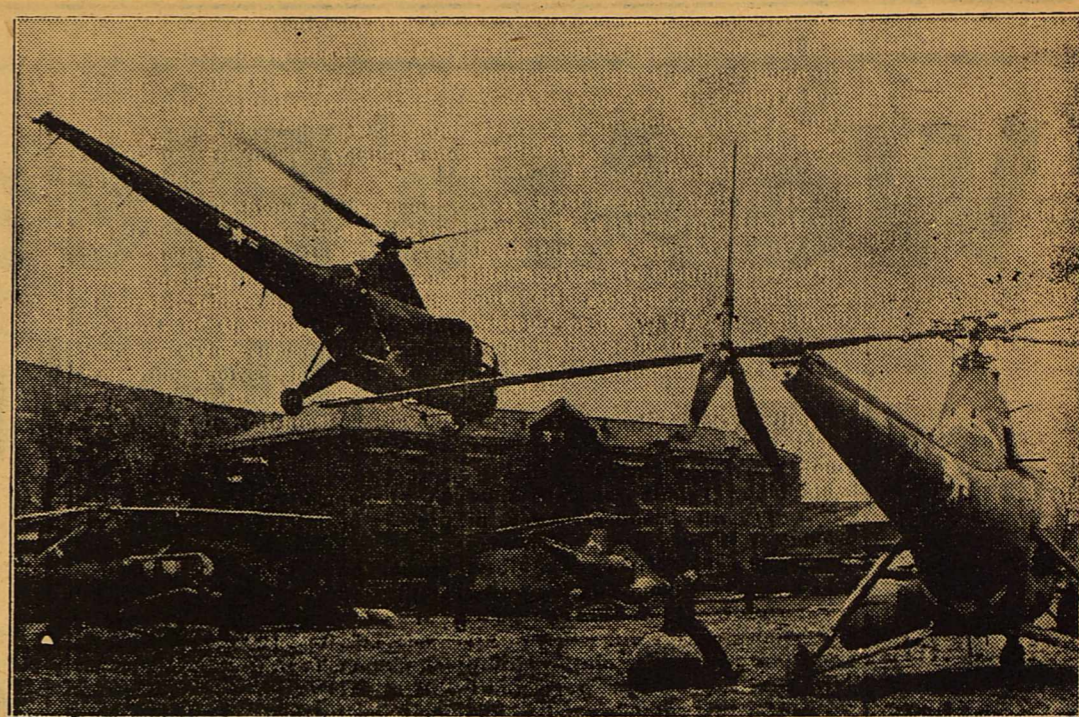
The K. R. bluestem is a perennial mid-tall bunch grass forming good sized leafy tufts the first year. It will produce two or more crops of seed each year. It is a very palatable, nutritious, drought resistant grass that produces a large quantity of forage, and will withstand moderately heavy grazing.

This grass is a native of India. It was first introduced into this country on the King Ranch in South Texas, from which the name K. R. was derived.

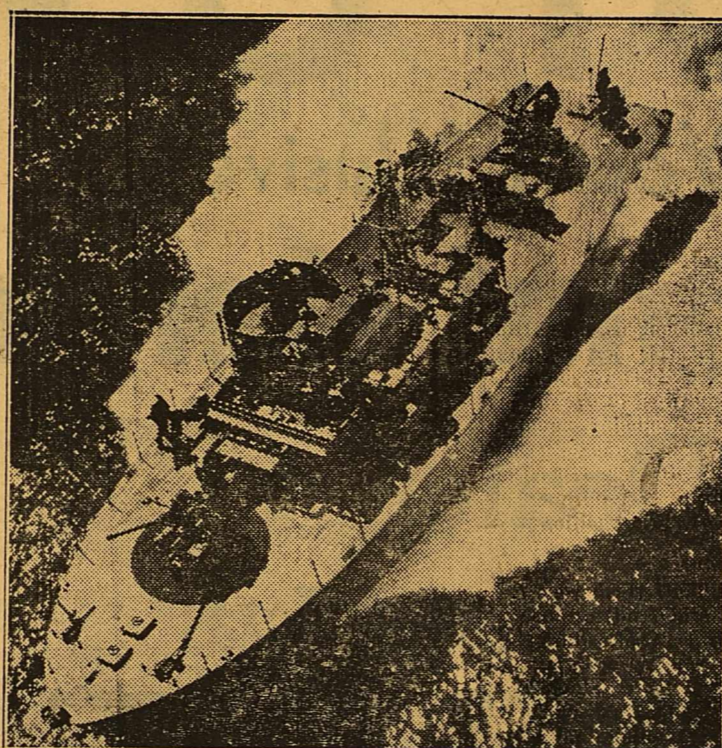
Slender grama is a native of the Rio Grande plains, but appears to be an excellent grass for the Edwards Plateau. It is a good grass to use in reseeding overgrazed pastures.

Blue grama is a native grass found growing on some of the deeper divide soils. It is a good grass that probably existed in much quantities on these sites originally, before being removed by heavy stocking.

Side oats grama is a native mid-tall bunch grass that should be familiar to everyone in the District. It is one of the better native grasses and is found in abundance on good and excellent ranges. It

is leafy and palatable and readily taken almost the year around.

Blue panicum was introduced to the United States from Australia. It is a tall deep rooted grass with a high protein content. It is recommended for seeding fields to be used as a tame pasture. It will do well in competition with native grasses. There has been some objection to blue panicum by several who have used it since livestock will not graze it readily if it is

allowed to get coarse and stemmy. In order to prevent this, it must be kept down to a height of eight to ten inches by concentrated grazing for short periods of time, followed by short periods of rest to allow the plants to recover.

Canada wildrye is a native winter growing grass. It is a high forage producer with excellent palatability and nutritive value. It is recommended that it be seeded in pure stands because of its difficulty to stay in a mixture due to its high palatability, and the scarcity of other green forage during its winter growing season. It is found growing locally in bottomlands and along draws. It is

sometimes found on the lower slopes and in among the rocks and crevices on the hill sides.

Additional information concerning the seeding of these and other grasses may be obtained by contacting the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District Office or any of the local SCS technicians.

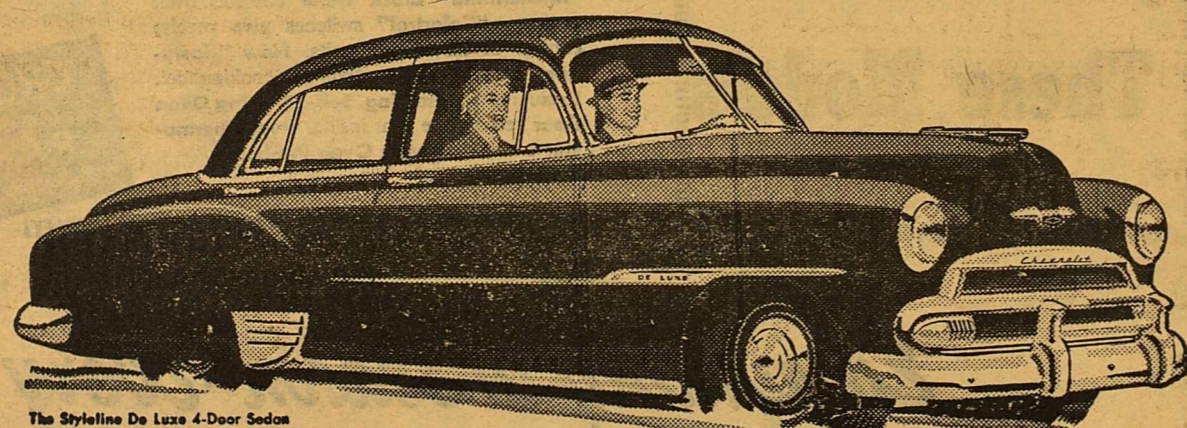

In announcing the Fifth Annual Home Sewing Contest for 1951 the Wool Bureau of New York has issued a brochure in which the contest rules are given. Mrs. Willie B. Wilson of 1510 W. Avenue J, San Angelo is the State Contest Director and those interested in entering the contest may write her for information in regard to rules. Deadline for sending in entries will be September 15. Entry blanks are included in the Wool brochure this year and State entry blanks should be sent to Mrs. Wilson, whose name appears in the front of the brochure. As there will be no area contest, entry blanks are to be sent in for just the State and National contests.

The "Make It Yourself With Wool" home sewing contest, offers

an opportunity to all girls and young women living in the "Wool Growing Empire" of the United States to express their home-sewing and fashion-creative ability with virgin wool fabric and also compete for valuable awards.

The contest is held each year to promote skill in styling and making apparel of virgin wool materials. The contest is open to girls of 14 through 22 years of age, including girls from California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

Wool formal will be included in the contest this year, along with coats, suits or dresses made of virgin wool fabrics.

The contest is held each year for Junior and Senior for home sewers whose garments are made from commercial patterns or original designs.

Awards to be given the winners in the State contests, by the Woman's Auxiliary to the TS&GRA, will be \$300 for Style Show expenses, first, second and third prizes in both junior and senior divisions of the sewing contest and will pay expenses for the two girls who will be sent to El Paso for the annual convention of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association in November, and also pay the expenses for the two girls and a chaperon for their trip to the Final Fashion Show in Portland Oregon in December.

First prize in each the junior and senior classes, will be a \$100 bond, second prizes will be a \$50 bond and third prize will be a \$25 bond. There will only be the three picked from the entire junior and the entire senior classes. 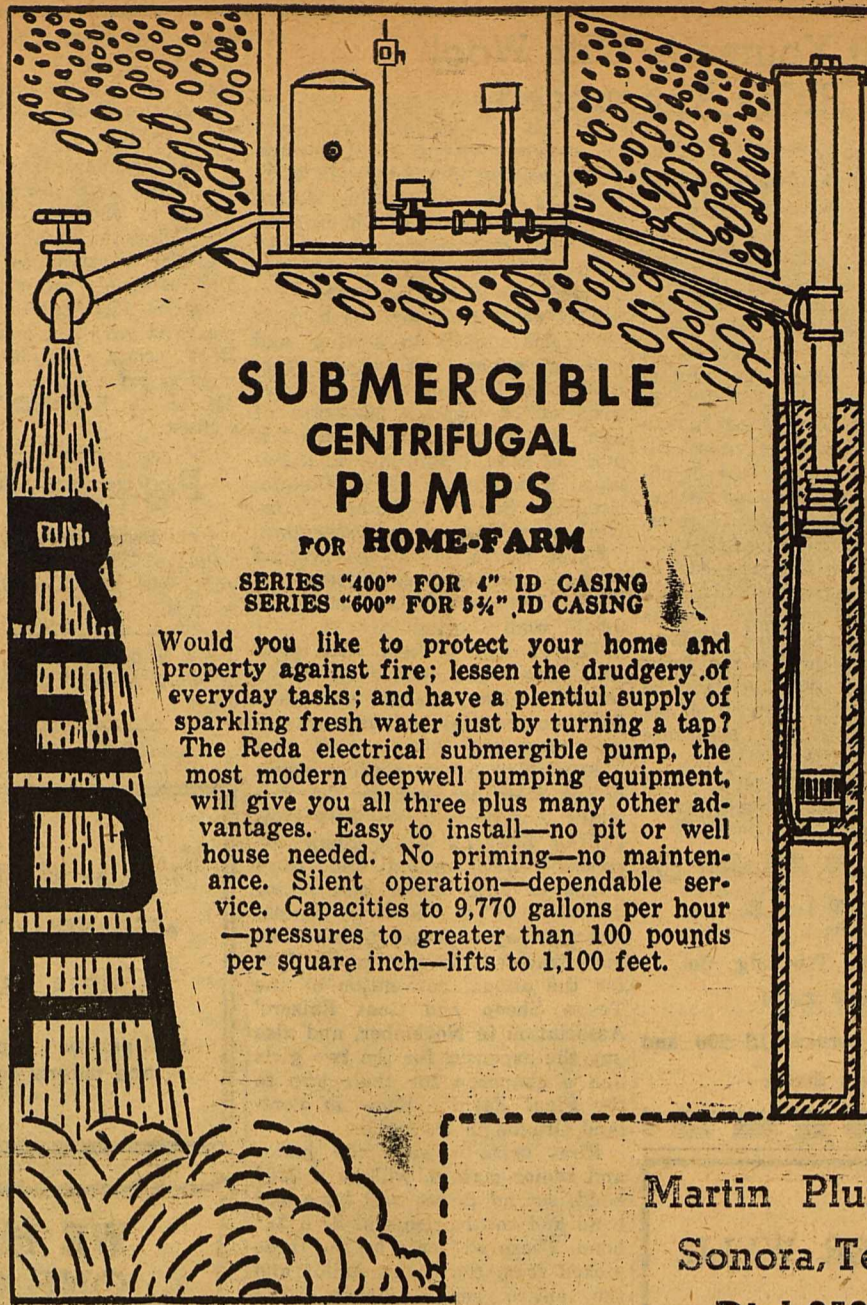

"The ranch labor situation is most critical," he said, and if Texas ranchmen are to do their best in producing meat and wool and mohair, they're going to have to have help on their ranches.

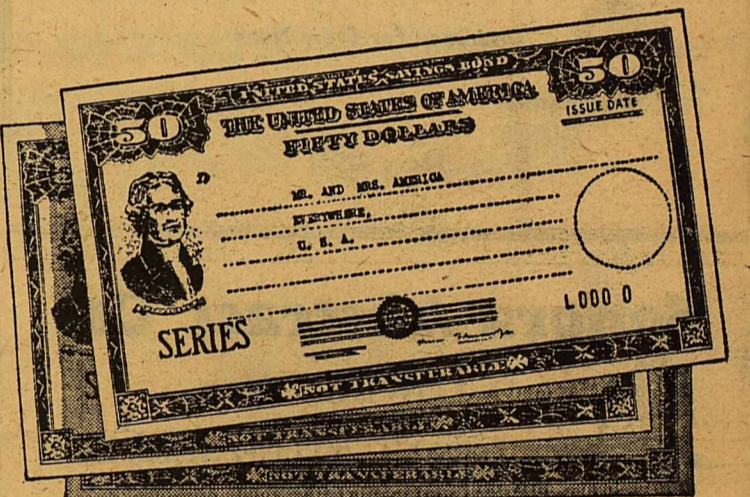

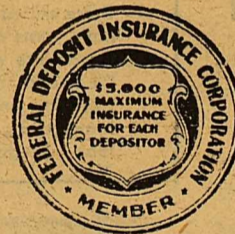
