

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



to override. Then in the 80th Congress, the House repeated its prior action and passed a bill by a whopping vote of 257 to 29, but the Senate Committee pigeon-holed it and the attempt to correct the steal of our tidelands fizzled.

Now we are girding for another attempt. I believe the House will pass the new measure overwhelmingly, but what the Senate will do, despite the valiant efforts of the Texas Senators, remains to be seen.


