The Henderson ranch is stocked with cattle and sheep; there are 60 cows, 105 dry heifers, 1,635 ewes and 408 yearling ewes.

The average stocking rate is bout one animal unit per 30 acres; however, this varies with the pastures and their general ondition. Mills studies his aninals and pasture conditions very losely and makes adjustments then needed.

A calf crop of approximately 90 sercent and a 100 percent lamb crop have been obtained on the anch for the past three years. Calves average better than 500 pounds at weaning time, and lambs better than 85 pounds at weaning. A lamb crop of more than 100 percent was delivered last fall.





A July draft quota of 367 men for Texas was received today from national headquarters, Brigadier Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, announced.

This is the state's share of a national quota of 15,000, announced several days ago from Washington. The Texas quota is the smallest monthly quota received since beginning of the conflict in Korea.

Local board quotas for the July call are presently unavailable at state headquarters. Quotas will be sent to local boards sometime after June 15, according to present plans at state headquarters.

The July call brings the Texas total of men called for since the year, the state d rector said. beginning of the United Nations fight in Korea to 27,207. During the same period, the entire nation has been called upon to furnish 565,000 men.




