Students Must Ask Deferment To Keep Status

A July draft quota of 387 men for Texas was received today from national headquarters, Brigadier Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, announced.

This is the state's share of a national quota of 15,000, announced several days ago from Washington. The Texas quota is the smallest monthly quota received since beginning of the conflict in Korea.

Local board quotas for the July call are presently unavailable at state headquarters. Quotas will be sent to local boards sometime after June 15, according to present plans at state headquarters.

The July call brings the Texas total of men called for since the beginning of the United Nations fight in Korea to 27,207. During the same period, the entire nation has been called upon to furnish 565,000 men.

At the same time he made this announcement, the state Selective Service director passed on some advice to college students.

Students who plan to request

deferment to continue their studies should notify their local boards immediately after the close of their current academic year.

"To get deferment consideration from local boards", General Wakefield said, "student registrants have to request it. Taking the college qualification test or ranking high in their classes won't assure consideration for deferment unless they ask for it in writing."

The Selective Service college qualification test is an examination to demonstrate high educational aptitude. It is estimated that 400,000 college students have registered for these tests.

Failure to furnish information showing intention to request deferment, in some cases, may result in a student's being inducted into service at the end of the 30-day postponement period commencing at the end of the current academic year, the state director said.

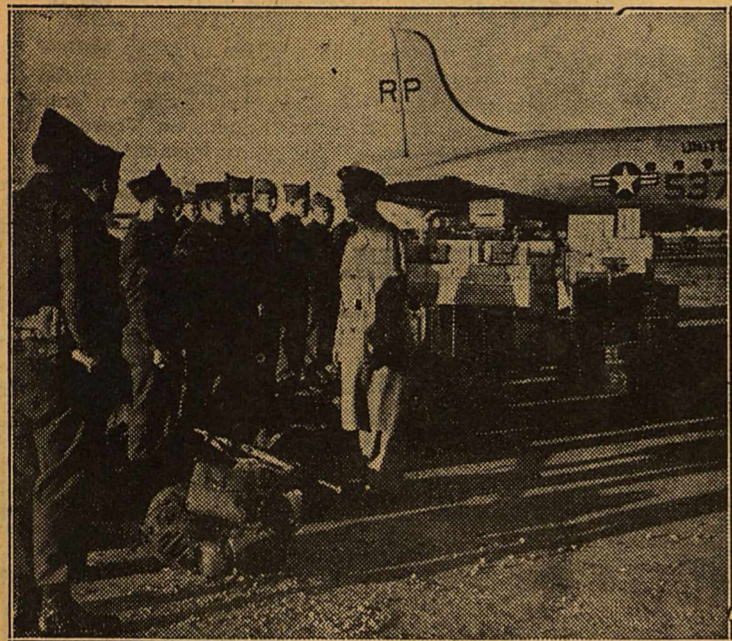

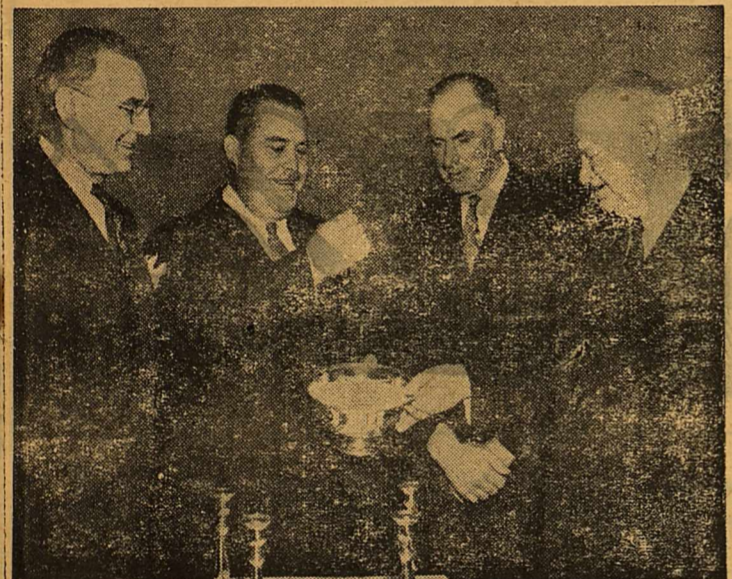

HOOVER HONORS TOP WHEAT FARMER



The threat of a farm-food crisis and a predicted short 1951 wheat crop drew former president Herbert Hoover (right) to help Senator E. J. Thye of Minnesota (left) and P. S. Pillsbury crown Oscar Barnes this year's Wheat King in an effort to emphasize the importance of good farming. Barnes is tenth winner of the annual Philip W. Pillsbury award for the best wheat grown in the United States. He received his award at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York as the climax to an expense-paid trip for himself and his wife from Nunn, Colorado, and back. The award, sponsored by Pillsbury, goes to the grower of the best wheat of the year judged by a panel of four university agronomists. He won in a field of 48 top samples from 21 states. Thye, a long-time farmer in his own right and member of the Senate Agricultural Committee, Pillsbury, Barnes and Hoover are pictured with a sample of the prize-winning wheat—a Commanche hard red winter variety—produced on Barnes' Nunn, Colorado, farm.

Texas Wildlife Worth Millions

Wildlife furnishes not only recreation and food for a considerable number of the people of Texas, but also an income of more than \$2,000,000 yearly to landowners for hunting and fishing leases, while the pelts taken by hunters and trappers of furbearers amounts to several millions more. The wildlife population of the land is perhaps more thoroughly safeguarded and more widely distributed today than at any time in recent years. In 1950, for example, 996 deer, 160 antelope and 557 other wild species were shifted for restocking game preserves in other adapted areas. Inland fish resources stem from about 150,000 ponds on farms, 1,049 lakes of five acres or larger with a combined water area of 392,900 acres, and 2,009 miles of fresh water streams.

Preservation and propagation of species of animal and bird life in Texas is attributable in substantial measure to the demonstration in conservation which the A. N. M. College Extension Service has sponsored in cooperation with land owners for the past decade and a half.

The Extension program is headed by R. E. Callender, wildlife conservation specialist, working as

an assistant-at-large to county Extension agents who deal directly with the people. In this capacity Callender prepares subject matter for use in the field and assists Extension district agents with plans for demonstration in their districts. In addition, he cooperates with Federal, State and local organizations concerned directly, or in association with phases of wildlife.

Selections from achievements in 1950 reported by county agricultural agents reveal substantial to excellent wildlife programs in 212 counties; 13,500 persons cooperated in 1,738 demonstration areas representing 14,631,000 acres, and 27,600 protective signs or markers were posted on property of cooperating land owners. The Extension specialist estimates that since the Extension program was commenced 14 years ago, more than 125,000 such markers have been erected at a cost of about \$73,000 to cooperators. Other, but related, activities included 9,761 farmers assisted with specific improvements for wildlife; 18,407 farm ponds constructed by cooperators; 6,233 farm ponds stocked with fish; and more than 38,000 predatory species trapped or destroyed by other means during the

year.

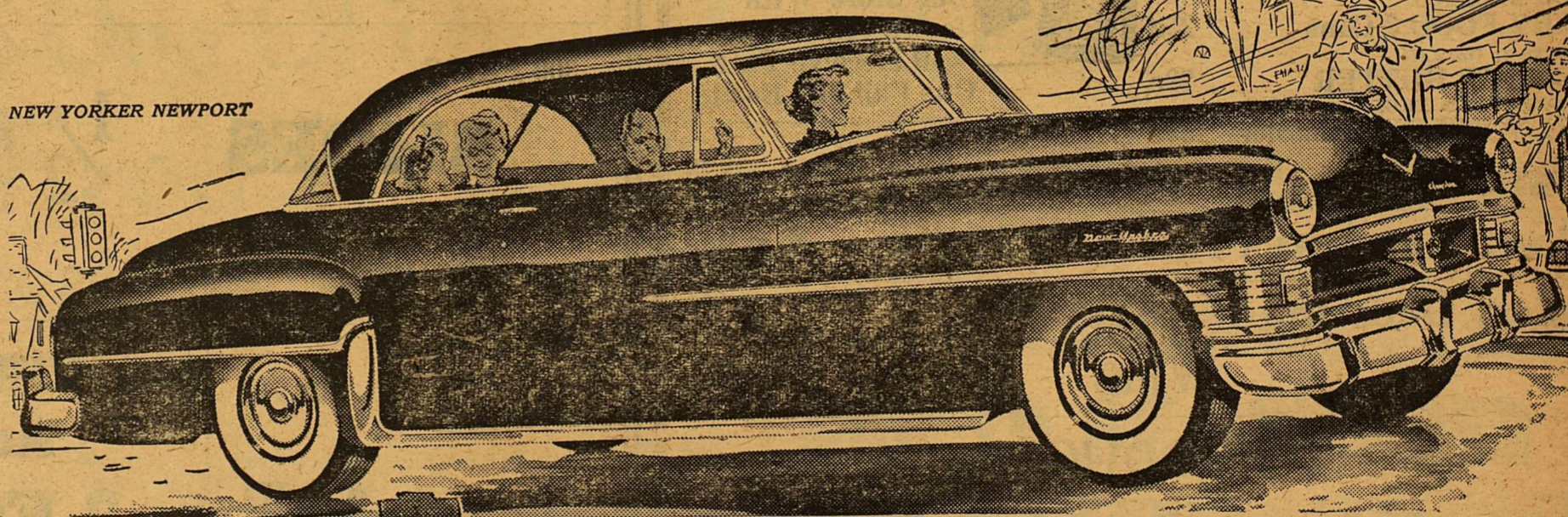
A wildlife conservation demonstration program for members of 4-H clubs, with 11,034 enrolled, was conducted by the Extension specialist in association with county agricultural agents parallel with that for adults. In the course of this work 13 counties wide 4-H Club conservation camps were held and 298 communities were represented at county, district, or state camps. A total of 3,800 4-H members received training in marksmanship and these youths accounted for 6,594 predators by different means in 1950. In the same period, 1,002 club members produced 28,657 rabbits for meat or breeding, while over the state 124 community cooperative game management associations were active.

The variety of Texas' wildlife is diverse and several species are plentiful. The Extension specialist lists 32 game and fur bearing animals extant, and 11 species of native and migratory fowls and birds. But some animals have dwindled to mere traces. Bighorn sheep, for example, are found sparingly in two Texas counties; black bears in three, and ocelot in a like number.

YOUR HEALTH

"Environmental sanitation is the public health term for clean, safe housekeeping whether it applies to a private home and its surroundings or to towns and cities. Among other things, it insures safe drinking water, proper garbage and sewage disposal, the safe service of wholesome food including milk, rat and insect control, and general cleanliness of the premises. However, for environmental sanitation to be effective, it is essential that not only public health officials that the citizens living in their respective homes or operating establishments is employed by the Humble Seismograph crew.

STATE BREAKS UP WIRE SERVICES

The past week witnessed Texas' biggest crackdown on gambling and organized crime.

The House Crime Investigating Committee held closed hearings which blew the lid off secrets of the Maceo gambling syndicate in Galveston and revealed an annual gross income in excess of \$3,000,000 from slot machines, tip books, dice tables, roulette, horse race betting, and related businesses. A public hearing is tentatively scheduled for June 25.

Attorney General Price Daniel, who helped the committee in its investigation, followed through with a law suit against the 16 Maceo partners, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and South-

western Associated Telephone Company, to stop horse race gambling information from being brought into Texas over telephone wires.

District Judge Jack Roberts of Austin granted Daniel's request for a temporary restraining order and set the hearing for a temporary injunction for June 18.

By 3 o'clock on the afternoon of filing suit the five elaborate Maceo gambling parlors had closed down because their wire service had been stopped by the court's order.

Daniel's suit was similar to the one he brought in 1949 against Western Union Telegraph Company and the Texas "front" for Continental Press which resulted in the first state-wide injunction in the country against using telegraph wires for transmission of gambling information.

Daniel alleged that the gambling information was being assembled from race tracks throughout the nation by "a so-called news service known as the Continental Press." He said "this organization is substantially influenced and in some places controlled by the Capone Crime Syndicate, which steals or otherwise obtains racing information from most tracks in violation of state laws . . ."

Daniel said his assistants and investigators had been working on the case for months, but that they had withheld action until the House Crime Investigating Committee could complete their preliminary hearings on the Maceo operations. He said the committee hearings had been very helpful in completing certain phases of the case.

Green Beans With Hot Mustard Sauce
 ½ teaspoon dry mustard
 ¼ teaspoon flour
 ¼ teaspoon salt
 3 cups hot green beans
 2 beaten egg yolks
 3-4 cup milk, scalded
 2 tablespoons lemon juice or vinegar
 Mix mustard, flour and salt in double boiler; add egg yolks; beat well. Slowly add hot milk; cook until thick, add lemon juice. Pour over green beans. Serves 6.

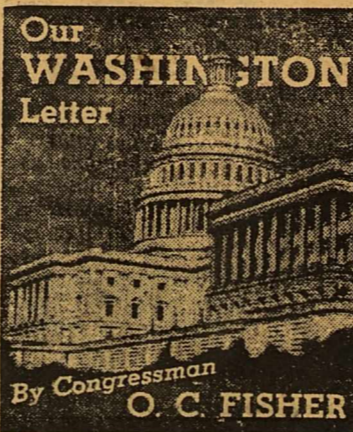
STANOLIND WIVES GUESTS AT BRIDGE WEDNESDAY

IN A HISTORIC DECISION, the Supreme Court last week upheld the conviction of the 11 Communist leaders for conspiracy to overthrow the United States government. Heretofore there has been constant confusion regarding the legal status of American communists and what could be done about them without bumping into constitutional road blocks.

The opinion written by the Supreme Court does not make it illegal for a person to be a member of the Communist party, but it does make it a violation for such party members to conspire together

by words and deeds with a design to overthrow the government by force or violence.

Herefore the courts have been troubled by some Supreme Court decisions regarding the right of individuals who were communists. Only a few years ago an attempt was made to deport Harry Bridges, the West Coast left-wing labor leader on the ground that he was an undesirable alien. A tremendous amount of evidence was collected to prove his communist status, and the Attorney General ordered him sent back to his native Australia. But the Supreme Court nullified the order and Bridges was released, much to the elation of the CIO other organization that fought to keep him here.

Bridges was then given citizenship. But two years ago, as a result of a collection of incriminating evidence collected by Congressional Committees and from other sources, the Department of Justice obtained an indictment against Bridges for perjury, claiming he lied when he swore he was not a Communist at the time his citizenship was granted. A jury convicted him and the case is now on appeal.

AN UNFORTUNATE THING about the case of the eleven Communists is the very low penalties levied out to them. Their prison sentences were up to five years and fines of \$10,000 to each. They should be executed or put away for life. I plan to introduce a bill to provide much higher penalties for such treasonable acts when and if others are convicted in the future.

The effect of the Supreme Court ruling should be very helpful in future prosecutions of this character. It will put the fear of God in every communist who collaborates with his fellow-travelers to destroy our government. And it will discourage the millions of Communist sympathizers who blather about civil rights and constitutional liberties every time a communist is flushed out of cover and his treasonable plans are exposed.

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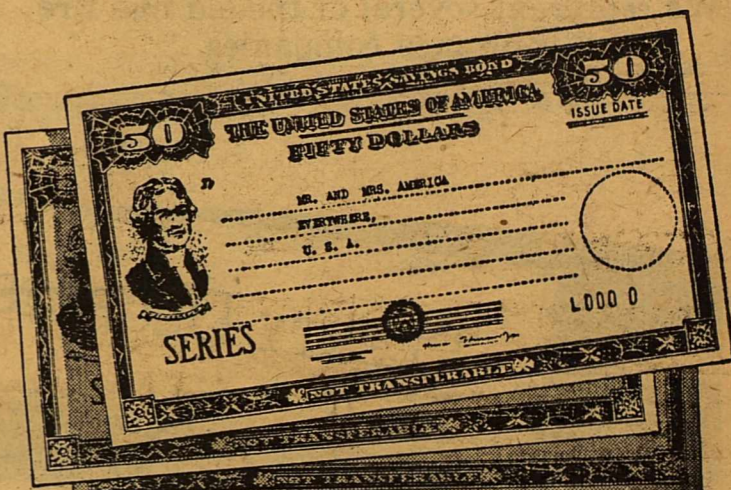

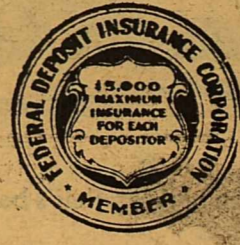
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
