## SCS Field Day, Election At Jones Ranch Saturday

Barbecue, a Conservation Field Day and Supervisors election all rolled into one will be held at Cleve Jones Sr., Taylor 1000 acre pasture Saturday, October 6th.

Supervisors of the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District are sponsoring a program starting at noon and Jones is furnishing the barbecue and a pasture that has made considerable range improvement as the result of applying some sound range management practices.

All ranchers living in the Edwards Plateau District are invited. Those ranchers who are resident landowners living in the area East of the San Angelo Highway and north of the Junction highway are eligible to vote in the Supervisors election to be held at 11 A. M. prior to the Field Day. Voters will select a rancher to represent their area on the District Board of Supervisors.

Ranchers here decided four years ago that they wanted to protect their land and water resources. But no man in Washington can order all the people to apply modern soil conservation measures, so this Soil Conservation District was organized, freely and voluntarily to do the job according to the principles of self-government.

The Board of Supervisors elected by landowners within each District administer and control the District program and operations.

Wide support of the rancher elected to the Board helps strengthen the District, further the cause of self-government and hasten the conservation and improvement of our great resource - grass.

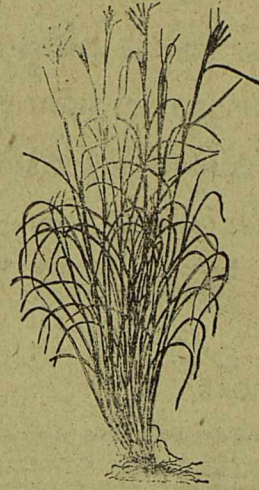

## Know Your Grasses



BIG BLUESTEM

Big bluestem is another member of the bluestem family found in the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District. It is not as prominent as other bluestems but can be found at present in many protected places. Probably the largest single stand in the District will be found in the Hospital Trap of the Joseph Vander Stucken ranch. Here, under good grazing management, it appears to be increasing.

Like many other grasses, big bluestem reproduces from underground runners as well as seed. An erect leafy grass, it commonly grows 2 to 3 feet tall and has a seed that resembles a turkey track. For this reason, it has sometimes been called "turkey-foot grass."

Shoots of this grass are flattened, and the lower sheath and leaf blades are often covered with white silky hairs.

Like other bluestems, it is a warm season plant which is most

palatable during the growing season. Ordinarily it produces considerable high quality forage before July 1. Following this early growth, it seems to grow faster as the days become shorter and the nights longer. Seed development takes place from early September until frost. Deferred grazing is therefore most beneficial for this grass during the early growing stages and for two or three weeks following seed maturity. Grasses store most of their food reserves in the roots after seed has matured. It is with this food reserve that the grass will start growth the following spring.

Information developed by the Texas Experiment Station shows protein contents of mixed bluestems was slightly higher than mixed grama grasses and buffalo-grass during the growing season and a little less during bloom and mature periods.

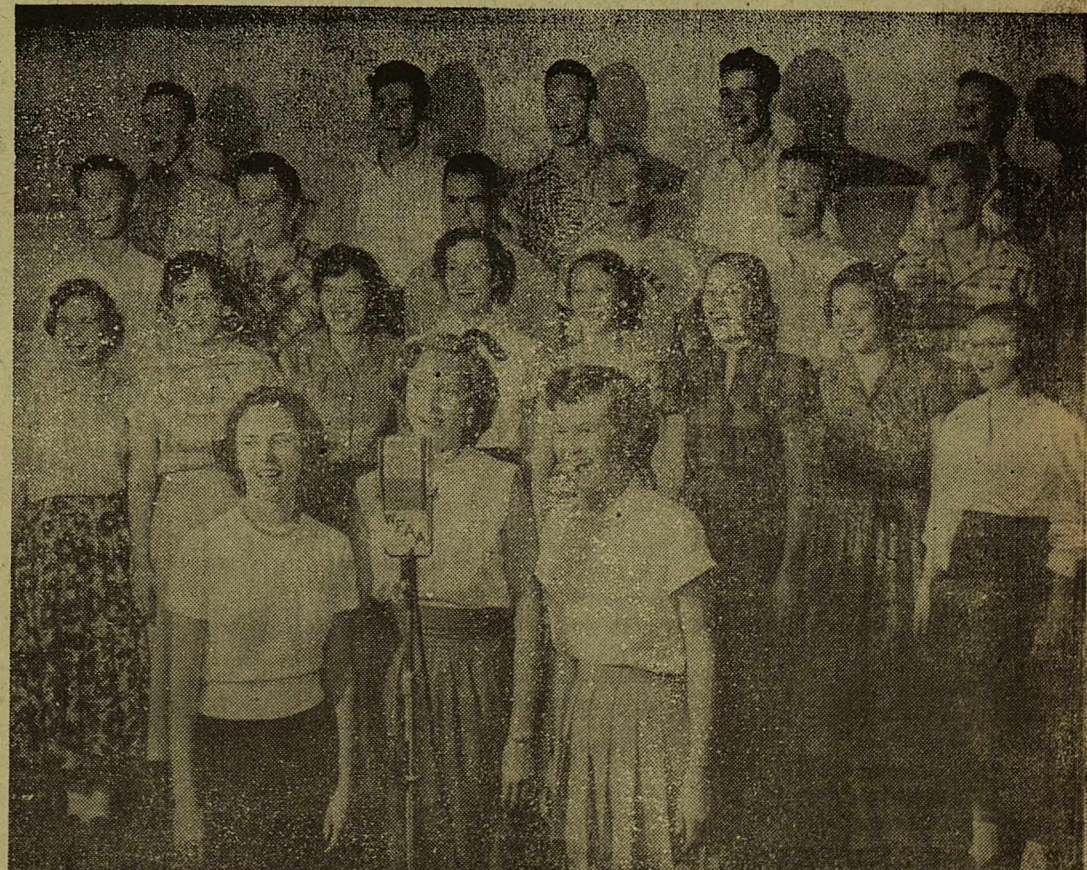
## DWI Fines Total \$500

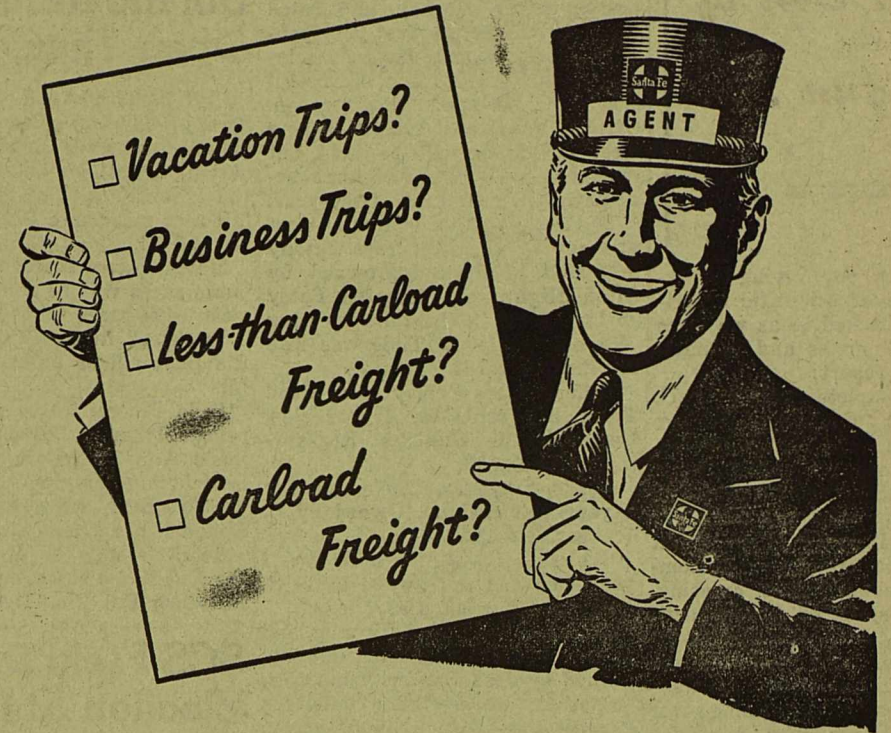

### Thompson Sought By F. B. I.

Robert George Thompson, 36  
Alert citizens and law enforcement agencies throughout the nation have been requested by the

FBI to assist in locating Robert George Thompson, one of the convicted Communist Party leaders who are now fugitives from justice. A description of Thompson is as follows.

Age, 36 born June 21, 1915, at Grants Pass, Oregon; height, 5' 9 3/4"; weight, 170 pounds; eyes, dark brown; hair, brown, thick,

straight; complexion, light; build, muscular; race, white; nationality, American; scars and marks, bullet wound left knee, appendectomy.

His complexion is sallow and he walks with a slight hop or limp from the wound in his left knee. In the past he has driven a 1948 green Chrysler four door sedan, New York license 4C5674.

He has worked as a machine operator in a linoleum factory in California and as a laborer in a cannery. He has also worked at wheat harvesting and lumbering in Oregon. He speaks slowly and usually carries a briefcase.

Thompson was convicted on October 14, 1949, for violation of the Smith Act and was sentenced to three years' imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine. A bench warrant was issued for his arrest on July 2, 1951, when he failed to appear in Federal Court for commitment to prison.

Any person having information which may assist in locating Thompson is requested to immediately notify the nearest FBI office. The phone number will appear on the first page of the phone book.

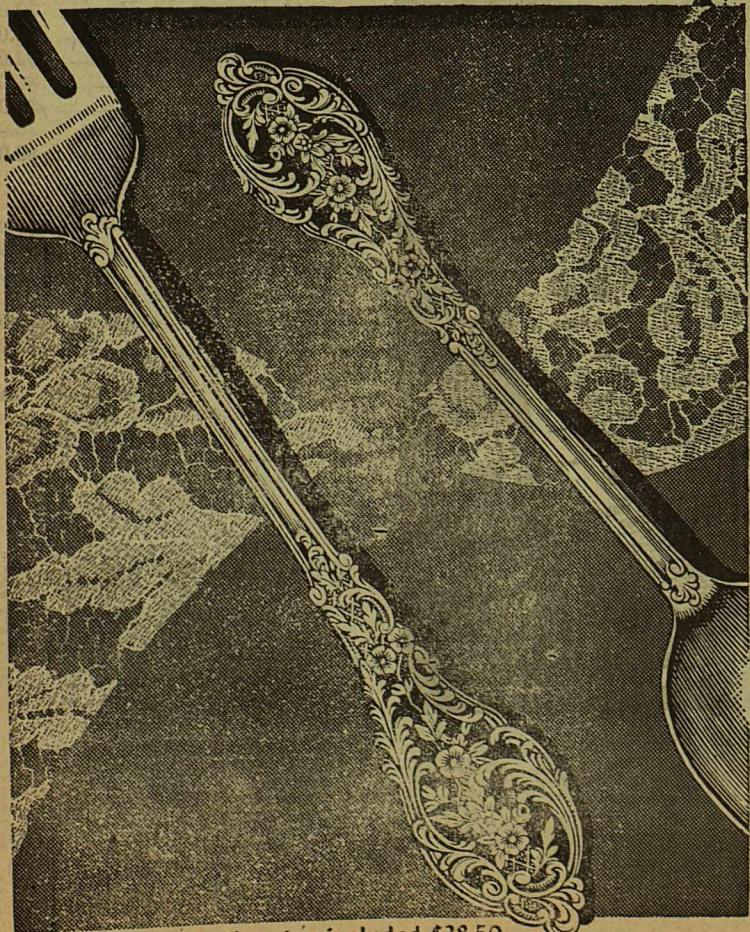

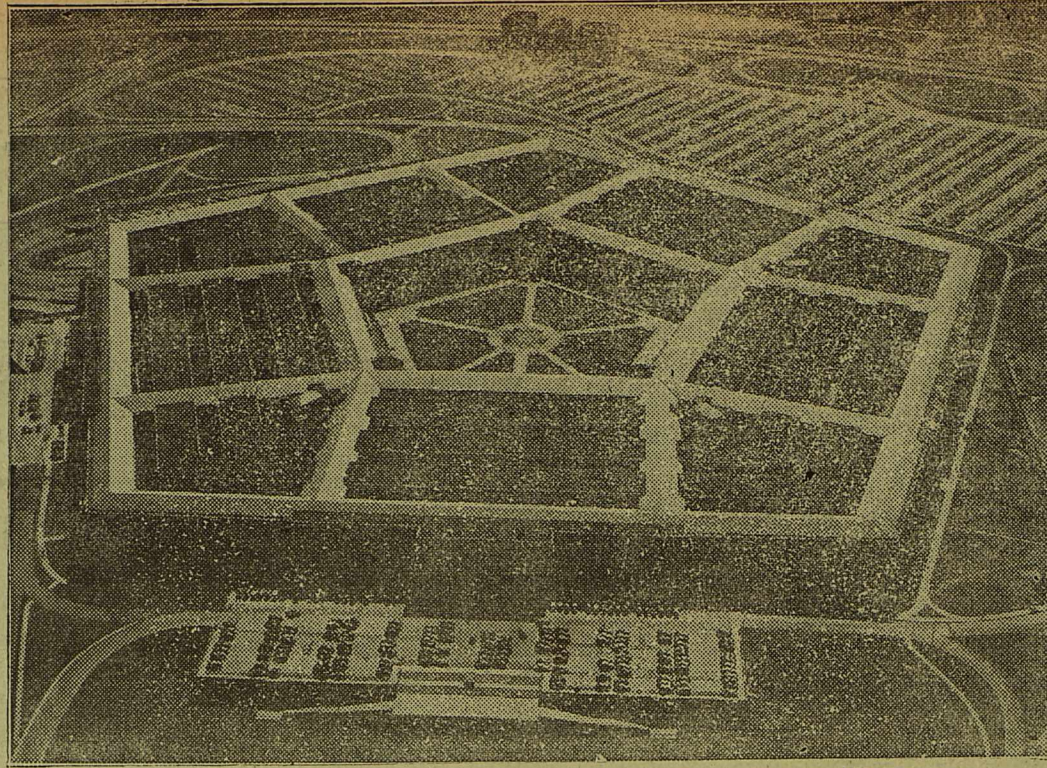

FIRST DECADE OF THE PENTAGON—The Pentagon, headquarters of the Department of Defense, the world's largest office building is now in its tenth year. Construction was begun in September, 1941. The building covers 34 acres. It has five floors, a mezzanine, a basement, and a sub-basement. The National Capitol would fit into any one of its wedge-shaped sections. Framework of the Pentagon is steel reinforced concrete. Outside, exposed walls are of monolithic architectural concrete. The mile-around perimeter wall is faced with limestone. It was ready for occupancy in October, 1942.

The corridors of the Pentagon are 17 1/2 miles long. The Department of Defense telephone system, operating 39,000 telephones and staffed with 200 persons, is the largest branch exchange in the world. A system of this size normally would provide service for a city of more than 200,000 residents. The building has complete banking service, medical and dental clinics, post offices, barber shop, uniform and tailoring shop, shoe shine and repair shop, jewelry store, railway and airline ticket service, dry cleaning and laundry shop, florist, bakery, cafeteria and dining rooms, a department store, drug store and a book store. Daytime population of the Pentagon now exceeds 80,300. Peak daytime strength during World War II was 27,000 in April 1945.

College Frosh Get Break From Draft Boards

The freshman college student gets a break this fall if he receives an order to report for induction from his draft board, says Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield.

"If a man is in his first year of college and has never before been postponed or deferred to stay in school," General Wakefield said, "he automatically gets deferment for a full academic year."

"Congress has given the first-year man a break," the state draft

director continued. "He doesn't have to satisfy board members or meet any test or scholastic requirements. He only has to pursue a full-time course of instruction to the satisfaction of college authorities."

General Wakefield advised freshmen they "had better study hard this fall and next winter and spring," as they will likely have to satisfy minimum draft board standards for deferment in the second scholastic year.

"One of these standards is their first-year class standing," he pointed out. "So it would be a good idea for a freshman to start applying himself from the beginning. Apparently, Congress decided

that every young man who goes to school would get the same chance the first college year," he continued. After that he has to prove on the basis of his own merit that is due further deferment to study."

Undergraduates beyond the first year, in order to be eligible for deferment under the student classification plan, must satisfy the draft board on at least three out of four points:

- (1) Successfully have completed at least a year in college,
- (2) be accepted for admission to the class next commencing,
- (3) have a record of required scholastic standing in his last year of work, and
- (4) have made the required score on the Selective Service college test.

Under the plan, the student must satisfy the first two requirements and one of the third or fourth. A local board can also consider other information about a student.

"Boards may take under consideration any information outside the scholastic," General Wakefield said. "They are not bound to consider tests or class standings, but their decisions are subject to appeal by the student if he acts within 10 days."

The state draft director noted that Selective Service re-

gulations are different in the case of graduate students and professional students of medicine and related fields. These are eligible for deferment if they currently meet requirements leading to graduation or degree.

General Wakefield emphasized that education deferments, like other deferments, are not exemptions from military service. He said a deferred student has an obligation to serve later.

"Under new amendments to the law," he said, "men deferred to go to school, for civilian jobs, as farmers, or because of dependents, will be obligated to serve until age 35."

The obligations stops at age 26 for all others.

YOUR HEALTH

"Recent outbreaks of food poisoning show very strikingly the need for special care in handling and refrigerating any food that must be prepared some time in advance of serving," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Prevention of food poisoning requires clean food handled as little as possible and consumed while it is fresh. Foods prepared hours before serving, and allowed to stand at warm temperatures become good culture media for bacteria. Cooked products of a perishable nature are readily subject to decomposition, and must be kept well refrigerated.

"Most food poisoning is caused by infection by certain types of bacteria which grow rapidly under favorable conditions, such as high temperature and high humidity. The infection may come from dirty hands, utensils, flies, rodents, contaminated water, infected food materials and in some cases in certain types of bacteria, which are rapidly spread and not necessarily associated with filthy conditions.

"If food must be prepared much in advance of use, cook it thoroughly, keep it refrigerated and otherwise protected at a temperature under 50 deg. F., until you are ready to use it. Avoid serving foods that are readily infected, such as certain salads, and cream filled pastries. Any foods that are not to be served immediately should be from approved sources."

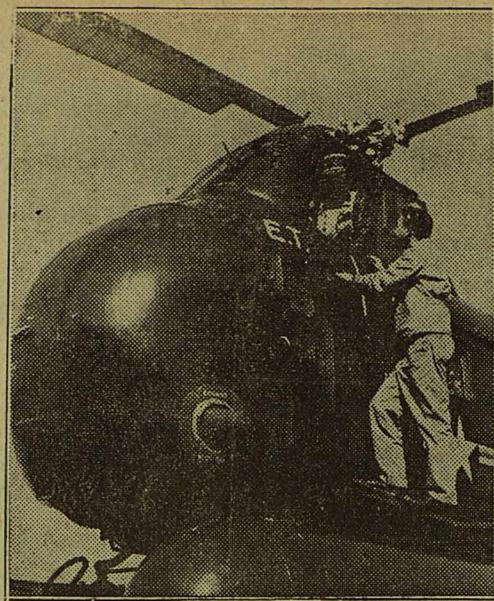

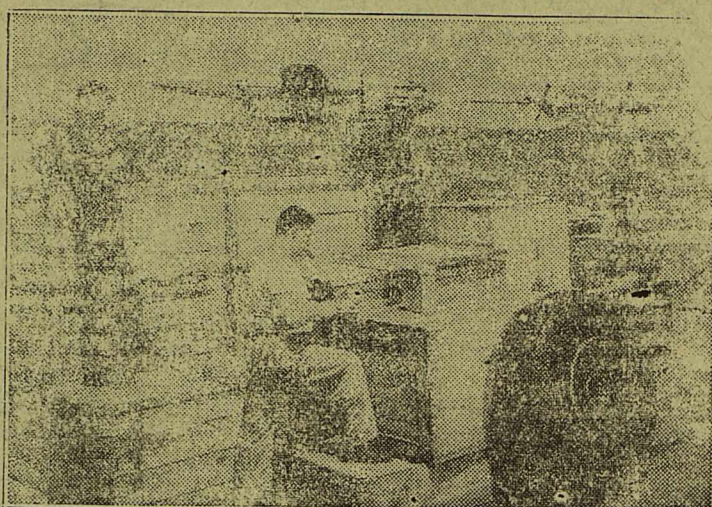
