San Antonio Show Boosts Premiums

The San Antonio Livestock Exposition will award its highest premiums at the third annual show Feb. 15-24, when \$49,477 will be offered exhibitors of prize stock, it was announced Saturday by Mark L. Browne general livestock chairman.

The premiums exceed by \$1,477 the prize money that was offered in the 1951 show.

Announcement of the premium list signalled start of active planning for the livestock phase of the many-sided exposition, which is to be held at the Coliseum.

Of the total prize money, \$7,910 is being offered in the boys' fat stock show, Browne reported. This will include a new addition in the boys' section—a negro boys' pig show, with \$673 offered for single Durocs and Poland Chinas in three weight classes.

Another innovation is \$340 in premiums as a boys' show neatness award.

Browne said that 3,000 copies of mails early in October. Prospective exhibitors may secure copies of the list by writing to W. L. Jones, secretary manager, P. O. Box 1746.

Top premiums of \$8,000 are offered in the Hereford breeding class \$5,440 for Aberdeen Angus breeding stock and \$5,306 for breeding sheep and goats. One of the largest breeding sheep and goat shows among major southwest exposition, the breeding sheep and goat department will include eight sheep breeds—Rambouillet, Delaine, Corriedale, Shropshire, Southdown, Suffolk, Hampshire and Columbia.

Premiums of \$3,710 are offered for open class steers—Hereford, Shorthorn, Angus and Brahman.

Other premiums in the open show are: polled Hereford, \$1,000; Short horn breeding cattle, \$3,000; Brahman ABBA, \$3,000; Jerseys \$2,000; Holsteins, \$1,000; milking shorthorns, \$1,000; open class fat lambs, \$918.

In the boys' show 15 places have been added in three weight classes for Hereford steers, making 15 additional steers eligible for auction. Premiums total \$3,005. Other boys' show premiums are dairy heifers, \$535; lambs, \$1,005, and pigs, \$3,865.

DROUTH SENDING PRICE OF COTTONSEED HULLS UP

Cottonseed hull prices in Texas were up 29 per cent in September over the same period last year, mainly because the drouth in Central and South Texas caused a livestock feed shortage. Dr. A. B. Cox, University of Texas, cotton marketing expert, reported.

However, prospective increased supplies of cottonseed oil and Number 2 lintners caused price declines for those products in September comparisons. Dr. Cox said. Dr. Cox based his estimates on September 14 prices. Cottonseed meal prices dropped only 10 per cent, primarily because of the drouth and increased prices for beef and milk. Number 2 lintners prices were down 23.5 per cent; cottonseed oil, 29 per cent.

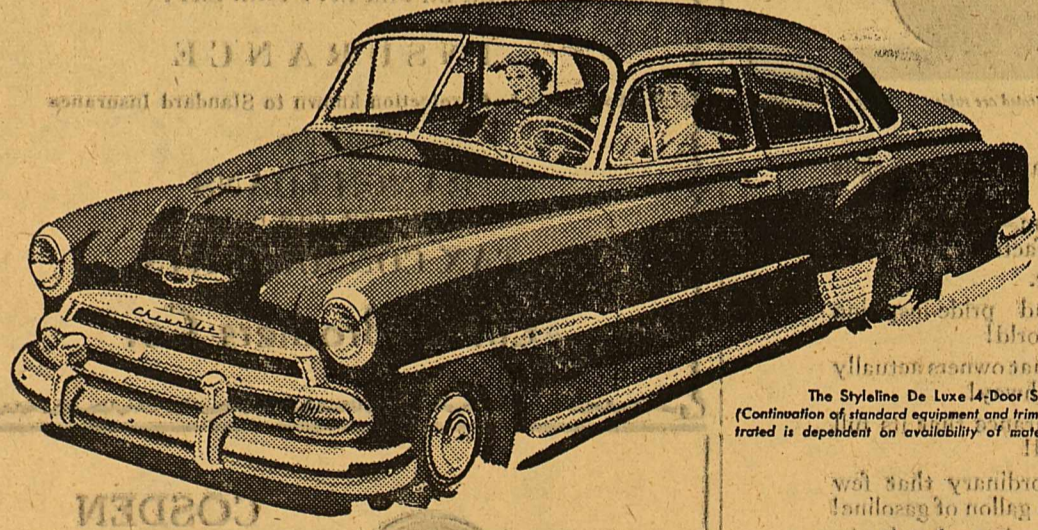

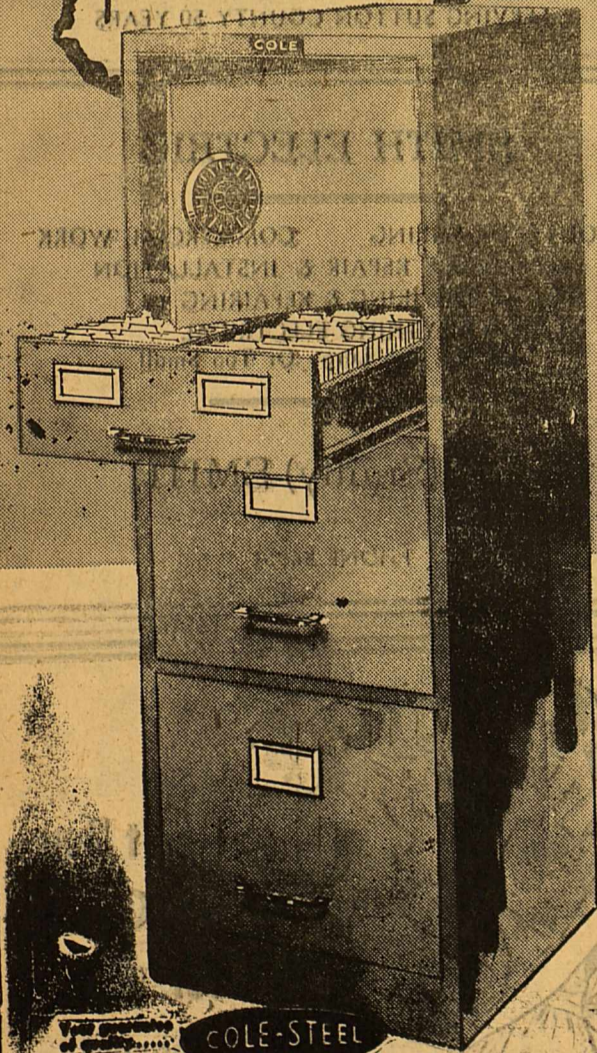

SCOUT CAMP—

One of the most outstanding attractions in Scouting was recently experienced by two Sonora Scouts, Turney Friess and Robert Guest, who spent two weeks at the Philmont Scout Ranch near Cimarron, New Mexico this summer. They were accompanied by Lawrence Nichols and Harold Friess.

Philmont Scout Ranch was donated to the Boy Scouts of America by Mr. and Mrs. Waite Phillips, Oklahoma oil people. It contains 127,000 acres of the most scenic country in northern New Mexico. Each summer thousands of Scouts from all over the nation assemble at the ranch and enjoy the beauties of nature.

The ranch is stocked with some 500 good Hereford cows, 325 pack horses, and 300 burros. Wild game found include elk, buffalo, mule, and flagtail deer, antelope, mountain lion, bear and many wild horses. The streams are stocked annually to provide fishing for the boys. The hills heavily timbered with pine, spruce, white oak, yellow pine, and many other trees as well as beautiful flowers and wild

strawberries. Turney and Robert arrived at the camp June 22. After two days of conditioning hikes without packs, the group donned packs and made an eight-day hike of 84 miles through the mountains. They carried an axe, cooking kit, and from one to three days rations on their backs, along with their bedrolls, and camped at designated camps along the trail.

While on the hikes the boys were earning Scout awards, including cooking, conservation, nature, and similar awards.

The group examined several old copper and iron mines and visited the old Kit Carson home and museum. This museum was originally known as the Carson Maxwell Trading Post where many early day pioneers exchanged furs and skins for groceries.

After leaving Philmont Ranch on their way home the Scouts enjoyed a scenic trip up to Eagle Nest Lake where they all saw for the first time huge pine trees made into rough lumber as a saw-mill. They also visited Taos and historical Old Santa Fe.

What with deer and turkey hunting season fast approaching, it might be well to review a few statistics on the cost of hunting. Henry C. Hahn, Jr., Kerrville member of the Game Commission, aided by a staff of 14 biologists and 6 game wardens, have figured that deer meat costs the average hunter roughly about \$2 a pound, and turkey meat if the hunter only kills one, costs about \$93 per pound. This we assume is the approximate cost of legally killed game. If you put your deer or turkey through the game warden it is said to cost considerably more. Hahn bases his statistics on facts gathered during 1947 season.

He said the minimum expenditure per hunter that years was \$2-the price of the old resident hunting license—that the maximum individual expenditure was \$3,618.50. The \$271.97 spent by the average hunter included such items as the following:

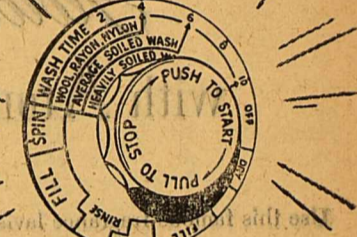
Supplies and equipment, \$107.48; transportation, 251.72; hunting lease, \$37.34; food, \$22.61; miscellaneous (camp cook, labor, insurance, etc.) \$16.84; refreshments and amusements, \$12.77; hunting dogs, \$10.68; mounting and tanning \$3.88; game storage and processing, \$2.66; hunting lease elsewhere in addition to the one on Edwards Plateau, \$2.59; lodging \$1.91; telephone and telegraph, \$1.49.

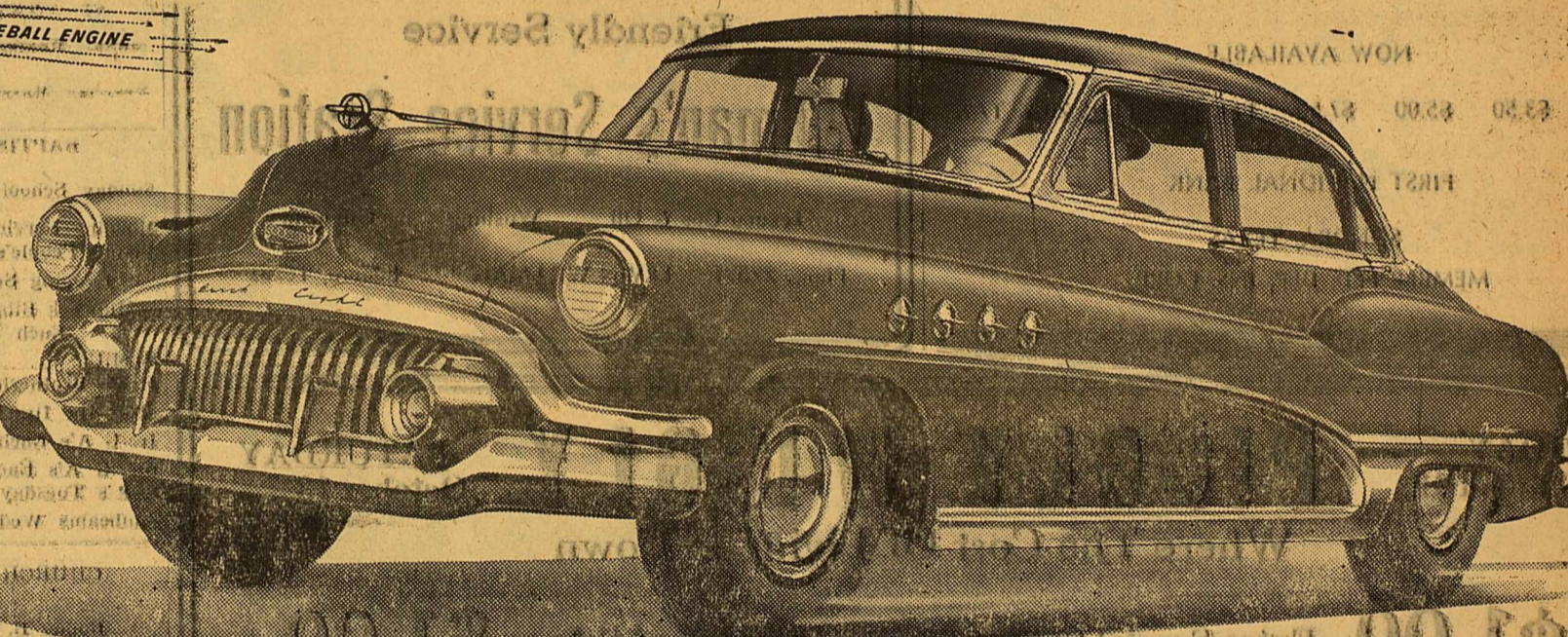
