Tom Darrow, district conservationist, explained how Jones had managed his pasture and reported' the changes in grass composition and livestock production.

Jones, a cooperator with the Edwards Plateau Soil Conservation District, had cut the cedar, cabled the oak brush planted the stump holes with desirable grasses and deferred the Taylor pasture during: the growing seasons of 1949, 1950 and 1951.

As a result of these efforts, the better grasses have increased 15-20 per cent. even though the current dry spell has curtailed growth the past growing season. Jones has received only six inches of rain this year.

Until 1949, this pasture propasture was deferred March 1 to November 1, 1949, and then grazed at the rate of 37 Animal Units 1914 Otenos Kaundas, Lithuania; per section on a yearlong basis. From May 1, 1950 until September 15, 1950 the pasture was again deferred. On September 15th the pasture was stocked with 100 cows for 7½ months, 100 sheep for 40 days and 100goats for 30 days.

This amounted to 56 Animal Units per section on a yearlong basis. Jones states that the livestock that were in this pasture looked better than stock in his other pastures, even though they were all fed the same amount of supplemental feed.

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Hospital Statistics:- September percentage of occupacy at the Hudspeth Memorial Hospital was 24.6. Twenty-seven patients were admitted and 25 dismissed. There was one death and four births. Income for the month was \$2,777.58, and expenses were \$4,713.87, a net loss of\$1,936.34. At first glance this may appear discouraging, but it must be remembered that the hospital is just starting out. It costs very little more to operate on 100 percent occupancy than it does on 24.6 percent occupancy. This loss is a calculated risk taken with the opening of the hospital. The percentage of occupancy is gradually rising as the hospital becomes better known. When it Star. reaches around 45 percent, the hospital will break even.


